# **Mapping Meredith's Future**

from Media Release

Golden Plains Shire Council has drafted a Meredith Community Facilities Map which sites the preferred location for various facilities, should funding become available.

It is based on the 37 responses received from 250 survey forms distributed earlier this year, which indicated the following priorities:

- *Visitor Information Centre* 36 submissions, with 25 of these preferring the land west of Wallace Street between Russell Street and Lawler Street.
- *Kindergarten* 24 submissions, with 19 of them preferring the current primary school / community

#### Pet Registration Amnesty During July

Golden Plains Shire Council is offering residents with unregistered pets an amnesty during the month of July in an effort to encourage responsible pet ownership. For the month of July, Council is offering residents the opportunity to register their pets with 'no questions asked'.

Under state law, all dogs and cats over the age of three months are required to be registered with the local Council.

Registering your pet can be the difference between Council officers returning your pet to you when it is found or delivering it to the pound which can be inconvenient and costly for owners and stressful for the lost pet.

From the end of July, residents detected with unregistered pets may be issued with a \$244 penalty infringement notice for each unregistered pet on their property.

Owners who intend to register their currently unregistered pets with Council are reminded their pets must be microchipped before Council can accept the registration application.

This week I met up with Rebecca whose great grandmother was Ginevra Wyatt {known as Jean, sister to Charles Wyatt who was killed at Fromelles in WW1 }.

Rebecca and her mother were honoured to be invited guests as relatives of a potential "missing" soldier at the Fromelles {Pheasant Wood} Cemetery and Re-internment Ceremony in July 2010. The remains of Charles Wyatt have not yet been identified but the family have supplied DNA.

Charles Wyatt was the son of William and Elizabeth Wyatt and went to Meredith State School. A pine tree was planted for him at Bamganie State School but he is not on the Bamganie Honour Roll. He was listed as missing on July 19, 1916 and family tell that his death was not confirmed for some time after.

He is also honoured in a framed photo of him presented to the Meredith State School by Cr McWillets, a former employer.

# Water Rates up 10.57%

Effective from this month, Barwon Water residential customers will face increases of over 10% for water. It includes a 3.33% allowance for inflation and, according to Chairman Roger Lowrey, will help fund major capital works designed to ensure supply security and maintain quality services.

For someone consuming 165 Kl per annum (which was, until recently, a government domestic usage objective) the increase will be about \$93 a year.



Several Brigade members qualified in the use of Breathing Apparatus have recently been issued with new structural uniforms which provide much better protection inside a burning structure.





#### A Personal Journey to Crete

Recently John and I travelled to Crete for the 70th Anniversary of the Battle of Crete in which my Father was involved. It was a most rewarding and unexpectedly emotional experience.

The Battle of Crete was unique as Cretans were the only civilian population in Europe who actively fought the German paratroop invasion using whatever implements available. Hence there remains an overwhelming gratitude to the Australian and New Zealand soldiers who fought alongside the Cretans.

There are numbers of memorials and we attended five of these. Each memorial has a service very similar to our Anzac service following prayers by the Greek Orthodox priests. Wreaths are laid by principal parties followed by wreaths from every community group. I was invited to lay a wreath at the Australian Memorial at Retimon which is sited in a garden square in the centre of town. The Australian Army, Navy and Air Force provided the Catafalque party. We were privelaged to meet both veterans and Cretans who had participated in some way including a woman who as a girl of 12 joined three other girls to put a blanket on a badly injured soldier feeding him honey and milk ignoring the battle around them.

In his speech at the New Zealand memorial this former soldier credited them with saving his life. Another elderly lady told us of how her family had hidden, fed and clothed escaped soldiers until the British Special Forces could evacuate them from the island by fishing boat or submarine. The penalty for assisting soldiers was the execution of the whole family - men, women and children.

Approximately half of the soldiers were evacuated from a tiny

gravelly beach after marching over high and rugged rocky terrain with little food or water. The remainders became prisoners of war and were taken to Germany, Poland and other work camps for 3 1/2 years.

Prior to this special week primary children were familiarized with the events of seventy years ago and then received a weeks holiday.

Crete is a most beautiful, mountainous, rugged island having picturesque beaches along its northern coast. It is not surprising that it a popular tourist destination.

# Visitors at the Lodge

On Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> June members of the Meredith Freemasons Lodge opened the facility to the Meredith Heritage Group and gave the group an insight into Freemasonry.

Barry Pearce talked about the beginnings of Freemasonry in the 1770's and the early history of Freemasonry in the Steiglitz and Meredith district. Past Master of the Lodge Alan Beales explained that the Lodge is not a secret society and when members talk about the Lodge it is like them giving a description of their Credit Card without giving the pin number. John Payne, John Marchment and George Enoch Mayo had arranged for the Masonic symbol of the compass and the square to be placed on their headstones. These men had significant careers in the district outside of Freemasonry.

Freemasonry has had an interesting history with many people either not knowing about it or misunderstanding the significance of the organisation. Freemasonry is a society of men who wish to improve themselves so that they can better contribute to their community. Freemasonry has many community activities including hospitals, retirement homes and community outreach programs. Freemasons have been repairing fences in fire affected areas of Victoria for the past couple of years and will continue to do so until the job is complete.

> The Meredith Lodge No 163 meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday of the month in the Lodge building on the corner of Creamery road and Midland Highway, Meredith at 7-30pm.

The Meredith Lodge traces its origins back 120 years with Murray Millar from Lethbridge being installed as the 120<sup>th</sup> Master in 2011. This makes it the oldest continuous community organisation in Meredith. At its peak the Meredith Lodge had over 150 members; this was before the building was extended to its current size.

The origins of the Lodge were in Gippsland when it was formed as the Hopetoun Lodge. When the miners of Hopetoun moved to Steiglitz they brought the Lodge with them and met in the Old Court House at Steiglitz for several years before the Lodge moved again and formed with a group in Meredith. The community of Hopetoun then formed a second Lodge and the name was transferred back to the community of Hopetoun and the Lodge renamed Meredith Lodge No 163.

The present Lodge building was originally the Free Presbyterian Church built in 1885 and was taken over by the Freemasons in 1935. The building was extended with a demountable building being added as a supper room, before the current Lodge Room, formerly called the Temple, being added in the 1960's. Former Master of the Meredith Lodge, Allan Beales gave the group a tour of the building and explained some of the significant aspects of the Lodge Room.

Barry talked about some of the former members of the Lodge and showed pictures of where former Masters like

'I'm going to America for three weeks.'

I listened when my housemate and best friend Lucy told me that,



#### The Macphersons in Meredith

Derek Macpherson

On a chilly Sunday morning in mid May, I travelled to Meredith with my brother Stuart and father Keith Macpherson to visit our relatives, the Hearn family. Our hosts for the morning were Ron and Margaret Hearn, who had kindly invited us into their home. We were joined there by Ron's brother Darryl and local historian, Margaret Cooper.

Our family of interest is the Macpherson family, early pioneers in the Meredith and Steiglitz area and shared ancestors of both the Hearns and the Macphersons. John and Jessie Macpherson, accompanied by their five children, left the Isle of Skye in the North-West of Scotland following the highland clearances and widespread famine. They arrived in Australia on the Highland and Island Emigration Society's ship the Georgiana on the 16th of October 1852. It is not known exactly when the family first came to the Meredith-Steiglitz area, but they owned property there by the 1870's.

The morning was spent poring over old photos, family trees and title maps of the local area. Ron and Margaret showed us the beautifully restored Hearn family bible and allowed us to take a copy of the births, deaths and marriages going back to the 1870's, recorded in it.

Many a story was shared about members of the family who are now long gone. Keith Macpherson remembered visiting Ron and Darryl's parents, Archie and Lila, when he was a child. He recalls that their visit was unannounced yet Lila went out and wrung the neck of a chicken and Archie lifted some potatoes and picked some peas and a nourishing meal was soon on the table. Ron told an anecdote of Jim Harper, another descendant of the Macphersons, who on a visit back to Meredith had painted his khaki army truck blue. Jim and a mate had accomplished the deed one night with a can of paint, a hearth brush and broom and the evidence was there for all to see the next day. Ron said that it took another couple of coats of paint to remedy the first coat of paint and finally cover the truck's khaki colour.

Later in the morning Darryl Hearn drove us out to Geoff and Denise Hardy's property on the Moorabool River. Geoff and Denise had kindly allowed us onto their property to view the remnants of the Macpherson's home there. Geoff pointed out the foundation stumps of the former home. Also the remains of the kitchen chimney with its large open fire, where the cooking pots had once hung. The kitchen chimney featured a bread oven built into its side.

Keith Macpherson, 91, recalled his trip there with his parents more than eighty years ago. A trip that must have had an element of risk associated with it considering that it was taken in a horse and gig over a steep and winding track.

Leaving the Hardy's property we visited another former Macpherson property at Macpherson's Swamp, once owned by "Big" Jim Macpherson. The remains of the dairy and foundations of the former home are still to be seen.

We then returned to Margaret and Ron Hearn's home, where Margaret served up a sumptuous lamb roast followed by delicious golden syrup dumplings. The hot meal went a long way towards taking the outdoor chill from our bodies.

#### "The Map that Changed the World" by Simon Winchester

William Smith was born in Oxfordshire, on March 23, 1769 into a world of dogma, faith and certainty and into a deeply conservative English Society.

Most people believed that "God Made the World in Six Days and Rested on the Seventh Day" and many believed that the world had been created exactly four thousand and four years before the birth of Christ.

William Smith's discoveries would one day help to shake these beliefs to their very foundations., eventually demonstrating that the earth had taken millions of years to develop.

William Smith was not rich or connected but he had a passion for rocks and fossils. He worked as a surveyor and his work included designing canals to cart coal for the industrial revolution and as a drainer, designing drains to get water off paddocks.

He had a fondness for travel and often walked to jobs and all the time noted the presence of this rock here and that rock there and the importance of that cliff or that valley, those rivers or that spring and the fossils.

He kept a diary and noted all his discoveries and developed a large geographical map, eight foot by six feet, which now hangs behind the blue curtains in Burlington House.

It was the first geographical map of England and Wales, the first geographical map of anywhere in the world and was finished in 1815.

It is a map that laid the foundations of a field study that culminated in the work of Charles Darwin.

However it was not all smooth sailing. His wife went mad, his work was stolen by jealous colleagues, he was imprisoned for debt and the value of his work was not recognized for many years.

In his later life he received medals and was recognized for his contribution to science and was granted a pension.

Simon Winchester has written a fascinating tribute to the unsung hero, "Strata Smith" or the man who put the unseen world of the underground on display.

Simon Winchester has researched in detail and the reader also learns a lot about geology.

The book for discussion in July is "Nickel and Dimed" by Barbara Ehrenreich.The blurb tells that the author went undercover in low-wage, USA.
