A pleasant afternoon tea was enjoyed by all before heading for home. A great day was had by all. Many thanks to our new driver Alan for a job well done.

Leading Senior Constable Greg Kitchen

Since the publication of the October police article I have had some annual leave and was unable to report in the November Newsletter. I am however fairly happy to be able to report that crime seems to have slowed somewhat within the area.

On Monday the 8th October at about 2.30 a.m., two offenders were disturbed committing a burglary at the Elaine general store. These offenders had gained entry via a side roller door where they were disturbed thankfully without stealing any property. This matter is currently being investigated by detectives at the Moorabool CIU and we are confident that offenders will be charged very shortly in relation to this matter.

On Saturday the 10th November sometime after 10.30 p.m., a white coloured Holden utility which was reported as stolen collided with a fence in Wallace Street, Meredith when believed to be travelling towards Ballarat. This matter is also under investigation at present.

As Christmas and the holiday season rapidly approaches, Victoria Police will be running a series of traffic operations which will target driver behaviour and drink driving. Recently, on Thursday the 1st November, I ran an operation in Meredith which involved the use of the ANPR (Automated Number Plate recognition). Approximately 1300 motor vehicles were checked from about 3 pm until 7 pm. Several vehicles were detected for offences including unregistered and outstanding warrants. I will be running another operation prior to Christmas.

The final Meredith 'Blue Light' disco will be held again at the Meredith Hall on Friday the 30th November. Disco Des from Ballarat will be there again and we will be giving away kids bikes and other great prizes to some lucky kids.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all a very safe and prosperous Christmas and new year and please stay safe while on the roads.





His opponent was off a handicap of 1 and David was off 3. His latest achievement was to win the Victorian Golf League Championship where he received the Dennis Farrell Memorial Shield.

Meredith Primary School staff member, Ben Gallagher, has been named Victoria's IT Teacher of the Year for his work within the information & communication technologies (ICT) area. He has provided the students of Meredith Primary School with outstanding learning opportunities, having introduced a range of innovative practices into the school such as the "Digital Sandpit" and "iLearning." He was selected to take part in the *Innovating with* Technology Game-Based Learning Research Trial in 2011 and, as a result, he and Meredith PS colleague, Fairlie Pritchard, were selected to be a part of an Education Department Case Study, looking into the work that they have done within the ICT area. Further on from this, Ben took up an opportunity to write for the Department's "Playing for Real" teacher resource game that will be part of its "FUSE" teacher resource web site.

the Victorian Information Ben presented at Technology Teachers Association Conference last year and this year at the "International Society for Technology in Education" Conference in San Diego.

The school now receives regular visits from teachers throughout the state to see what Ben is doing in the information technology field. While he is right to point out the planning, work and support provided by his Meredith colleagues, his efforts certainly deserve to be recognised.

Wilma Webb Celebrates her 80th

Wilma's mother ran a Post Office at Mead between Kerang and Cohuna. Her father was officially the Post Master but he worked as a contractor and blacksmith. When he died, Wilma's mother moved the family of nine children to a dairy farm near Kerang where she share farmed and supplied most of the town with fresh milk.

After leaving school Wilma learned dressmaking and tailoring in Melbourne. She met Ron Webb, they married, built their first house in Kerang, worked in a local store and had two daughters, Trudy and Kylie.

They moved to Colac to run a Newsagency and then bought a Newsagency and Post Office in North Burnley.

They were there for 16 years before buying the Alphington Post Office.

Wilma says it was like semi retirement at Alphington after the long hours, from 4 am-7.30pm at Burnley. She also relieved in the Post Offices at Bannockburn and Meredith.

In 1986 they bought about 40 acres at Bamganie with a hayshed, only five trees and overlooking the Leigh River. They built a garage and camped in it at weekends, before building a house. They planted hundreds of trees and a garden and planned to retire there.

Ron had always been a CFA volunteer so while living in Melbourne he was invited to help at the Fire Museum in East Melbourne. This became a life long passion for Wilma and Ron. Wilma helped on stalls, cooked and used her tailoring skills to dress bears as firemen which sold for about \$70 each to raise funds for the Museum. She only stopped dressing the poplar bears two years ago. Wilma is a Life Member of the Museum.

Wilma and Ron retired in 1997 and moved to their country retreat. Sadly Ron was diagnosed with cancer a week after he retired and died in that year.

Wilma celebrated her birthday with a party for 80 invited guests in the Meredith Hall on Saturday, October 27. The guests were encouraged to dress in 30's gear and they enjoyed a buffet lunch catered for by the Meredith Kindergarten.




It's on it Way



further consultations with residents as this display and information facility finds its place in the community.


From the drawing board, the elevations below give a sense of the finished building which will certainly enhance the presentation of the town to passing travellers.

North Elevation




West Elevation





Dot delivered mail to the Meredith town but when she won the contract to deliver mail to Bamganie she had to resign as the Crossing Supervisor as she couldn't guarantee that she could be back in time. Dot was a terrific Mail Lady for over 29 years, delivering through rain, hail, sleet and snow. She delivered newspapers, groceries and anything that was required to be taken out including repaired tyres.

She also worked in shearing sheds and was once a film star!

\$600K for Pre-School

The State government announced last month that \$600,000 has been allocated to Golden Plains Shire for the construction of a new pre-school centre on Meredith Primary School land, next to the Community Centre.

Committee President, Stefania Parkinson, says the new facility will allow for increased numbers and a sustainable service. It will comprise two early years rooms, sessional consulting space, storage, amenities and outdoor play spaces, and include additional space for Maternal and Child Health and other early years, health and community services. Project details and timing are not yet known.






News from Meredith CERT Team

Recently a number of members of the team (Martin, Cathie, David, Jo and Mary) spent the weekend at Halls Gap in the Grampians for the annual Volunteers' Conference. This conference is a chance for CERT members from across the Barwon South West and Grampians regions to get together to share experiences and add to their knowledge in developing their skills (and to have some fun as well).

The conference was opened on Saturday morning by Greg Sassella, CEO of Ambulance Victoria (AV). Greg outlined some of the strategic directions AV will take in coming years. He also showed us what our new 'blue' uniforms will look like. The first day concentrated on *Health and Wellbeing*. That is, the health and wellbeing of our volunteers. All members were invited to have a workplace health check from an attending health professional. Each member was asked to outline their daily diet, if they smoked, and had their blood sugar and cholesterol levels assessed. A computer program then assisted the professional in advising whether or not they were at risk (e.g. of diabetes, heart attack etc). The second part of the health check applied only to men-you guessed it-a prostrate check (for those that still have one!!

A very open and moving presentation of life after prostate cancer was made by Tony Walker, Executive General Manager of AV. He spoke of his experience in being diagnosed with prostate cancer, how he reached his decision of having it removed (by a robot!!) and of the importance for men having their prostate regular checked by their GP. He emphasised it is not just a disease of *old men*. Young men under 40 have contracted this disease. He also spoke openly of how his libido was affected following the operation. He also stressed, to the women in the room, to get the men in their lives to visit their GP for the check.

Saturday's session also included a presentation on Stroke Management. The essential management being recognition of someone having a stroke (FAST)* and getting them to hospital within 4.5 hours for administration of a clot-busting drug.

Sunday's session was most informative. It concentrated on the use of illicit drug-taking within the community. Alan Eade pointed out that alcohol abuse and its dependence is increasing in Australia. Its cost to us is over \$15 billion per year, and results in around 3,000 deaths. This he compared to the road toll of fewer than 2,000 deaths per year. Alan went on to talk about other illicit drugs including GHB or Gamma Hydroxybutyric Acid-(date rape drug) that is derived from circuit board cleaner. He also mentioned a new drug recently being imported from the UK called *bath salts* (other names include White Lightening or Snow Leopard-not to be confused with the Macintosh operating system of the same name).

The frightening statistic he quoted was that of all presentations to hospitals for drug abuse, 80% are for prescription drug use, while 20% are for illicit drugs. About 15 years ago, these percentages were reversed. We read in the paper where some of our Seniors are selling their prescription drugs to people to make money-presumably to supplement their incomes. This is an alarming consequence.

Overall, the conference was a great event. As a CERT group, Mary and Jo allowed themselves to be entered into a competition to win a baby *resus annie* (a baby doll for practicing CPR on). Despite their best efforts (see picture), our team came second (we should have won according to the audience) and received two very large boxes of chocolates for us all to enjoy last training night.

Finally, at the time this edition of the Meredith News hits the stands, CERT will be about to open its new home. Thanks in part to winning a Community Grant from BlueScope Steel, Meredith CERT is able to build its new headquarters (for the car) next to the Community Centre, on the Primary School land. The shed will be officially opened by Ambulance Victoria on the 14th December, in conjunction with other financial providers including the Golden Plains Shire, FairDinkum Sheds, and of course you, the people of Meredith.

Main Street Development - but Which One?

A "walkshop" held last month discussed how best to spend \$450,000 on Meredith's main street. One of the first issues encountered was to question what is the "Main Street"? Those with a memory and a sense of history insist it is Staughton Street west of Wallace Street (the highway) while others maintained it is Wallace Street. It does raise an interesting question: "what is a "main street"? We would usually think of it as the one with the most commercial and civic activity. Not too long ago it could be argued it was still Staughton Street with it's bakery, hardware, milk bar, post office, butcher and other businesses. These have all gone - some to Wallace Street and, while other businesses remain, it is the highway businesses that generate the most traffic - local and passing. So, is a main street still a main street when it is no longer the main street?

This could be enjoyed as a rather idle question if there wasn't nearly half a million dollars of improvements riding on the answer. Well, in fact that is not quite the case, as the consultants conducting the program are of the view that vicinity is the more important concept and much attention was given to treatment of the "hub", being the intersection of the two streets.

It is more important that the outcome of this significant investment contributes to a place that residents enjoy that is also a source of civic pride. (And such an outcome is likely to also encourage travellers passing through the town to stop for more than a toilet break and a tank of petrol.)

The walkshop was attended by some 19 townspeople, and conducted by consultants CT Management who were represented by Carmel Boyce and Perry Mills. Working with them was David Engwicht who has had an international influence on better design practices for streets, place making and promoting active community use of streets. The Shire's Community Projects Officer, Paul Ryan, opened the session before David lead the group on the "walkshop" down Wallace Street to the Staughton

Street corner, making a number of observations along the way.

A key message was to make town spaces into places where people want to go or linger, something he calls "linger nodes".

The group returned to the community centre for an activity called "speed dating" which consisted of two rows of people facing each other with one row having an idea and the person opposite helping with suggestions. Then one row moved up one person, and the ideas were further embellished as the process continued. Several good ideas came out of this activity. These Consultant David Engwicht engaged "walkshop" participants with his urge

decks to form outside eating areas, treasure hunt type trails, historical treasure hunts, randomly placed rocks, outdoor seating, and decorated wheelie bin covers.

The consulting team was delighted with the turnout and very pleased with the warm and engaged response. And they could tell Meredith residents are good neighbours by the closeness of their noses throughout the "speed dating"

There will be another workshop on Saturday February 9th at 9.30am to progress some of the ideas and priorities that flowed from the first session. ...and the outcomes were?

The group found consensus on the following points:

- General agreement that the priority should be on Staughton St as the 'main street', not the highway;
- General agreement that underground drainage is not a community priority;
- Bluestone drains in Staughton St do need bridges for access and there are drainage issues on Staughton St that do need to be fixed, however there was general agreement that the bluestone gutters should be retained due to the value they contribute to the town's character;
- Priorities for the main corner lighting, flowers, creating linger nodes;
- The opportunity needs to be considered to create a town square, public space, on the garage site. The property owners (the Parkinson family, in attendance) stated they would consider taking fence down, but are concerned about litigation and maintaining opaque privacy screens or paint on the building windows. There was consensus that it would be appropriate to spend project resources on this space even though it is private land, as it is "a perfect opportunity".
- Connect new information to the township with paths, perhaps a right-turn-only exit so they have to loop around other streets, trail of ibises or sheep to follow? David recommended creating curiosity, have an incentive (treasure hunt?) to get visitors to stay longer.


Almost Like Spring

"As I Walked Out One Midsummer Morning" by Laurie Lee.

That's what he did!

One summer morning he left his home in a Cotswold village in England to discover the world and as he turned the corner, he closed that part of his life forever.

It was 1934 and he was 19 years of age.

He carried a small rolled up tent, a violin in a blanket, a change of clothes, a tin of treacle biscuits and some cheese.

He was propelled by traditional forces that had sent many generations along the road away from the small tight valley closing in, the local girls whispering "marry me" and settle down and the cottage walls narrowing like arms of iron.

He set out to walk to London but detoured to get his first sight of the sea, worked for some time in London then because he knew one Spanish phrase he decided to see Spain.

For a year he tramped through the country in which there were many signs of impending civil war but he wandered and enjoyed the people and the land, experienced many situations and played his violin to earn money.

Thirty years later Laurie Lee wrote this book and captured the atmosphere of the Spain that he saw with all the freshness and beauty of a young man's vision, creating a lyrical and lucid picture of the beautiful, backward and sometimes violent country.

This book is important because it recalls the last years of a way of life when frontiers were lines on a map when a boy with a violin tucked under his arm could walk through Europe without passport, visas or inoculations, with few questions and almost no travellers.

The book for discussion in December is "Nine Parts of Desire" by Geraldine Brooks.





Vale Ray Hewitt

Former Meredith resident, Ray Hewitt died on Saturday, October 20 after a short illness. He was farewelled with an 11 am service at St Arnaud Hall on October 29 followed by a private burial.

Ray and Aileen Hewitt bought a small farm in Bamganie Road in 1986 and ,while they lived in Meredith, he worked as an Air Traffic Controller at Avalon. Their children Tracey, Claire and Andrew attended Meredith State School.

Ray was a very capable man; whatever he did he did well and made the most of every opportunity

Family say he was the first student at Wedderburn to pass the Leaving Certificate and that he could answer most questions on quiz shows such as "Sale of the Century".

He was Secretary of the Cricket Club in Meredith and he initiated and planned many social events including a huge reunion dinner in the Meredith Hall and annual Melbourne Cup Events where the fillies of Meredith were given nicknames and phantom races were called. "Tassie Turtle" was the nickname of his wife.

He also wrote informative and entertaining reports for the newsletter.

This was at the time when the Cricket Club was booming, winning flags and a host of young local men were having a good time.

In 1972 Ray trained as an Air Traffic Controller at Launceston, Hobart and Melbourne. In 1975 he was transferred from Melbourne to Avalon and worked there for 18 years. In 1993 he went to Albury Tower, in 1997 he returned to Melbourne Tower and he retired in 2000 after 29 years of service.

Ray and Aileen bought the old Malcolm Inn at Stuart Mill for their retirement project, restoring the building beautifully to live in and as a Bed and Breakfast. Ray also bought some land as he always wanted to be a farmer.

He was elected as a Northern Grampians Shire Councillor in 2005 for the Bolangum Ward and became Mayor in 2010-2011.

The Shire reported that Ray was a true gentleman, a great civic leader who relentlessly lobbied for better deals for businesses, families and farmers. He had instigated and contributed to a lot of projects at St Arnaud, near where he grew up and Stuart Mill where he retired to.

Ray was a great contributor to his community, wherever he lived!

Moving Out of the Masonic Centre

The History Group held its first meeting in 2008 in the backyard of St Joseph's Presbytery in Meredith, sitting on outdoor furniture in the sun. Meetings were held in St Joseph's Parish Centre until the Masonic Lodge members invited MHIG to use their facilities.

The Masonic Centre was ideal because it was an historic building, most Meredith people had never been in it, it was suitable for storage and had facilities to hold meetings and events. When the Masons moved their meetings to Lara, a clearing sale of their furniture was held and the building was offered for sale.

Last month MHIG was advised that a sale was imminent and we had to vacate. An urgent meeting was called and a number of suggestions made for new accommodation. The storage of the collection and the furniture were the most imminent problems and thanks to kind hearted and helpful members all was relocated.

MHIG express its thanks to the Masonic Lodge for the use of their Centre for a number of years.

George Enoch Mayo

Records are not available that tell when he was inducted as Master but he died in March 1912 so the photo would be over 100 years old. He was initiated into the Buninyong Lodge on 31/8/1898 and resigned from there on 2/1/1901. Mr Mayo had the Railway Store

in Staughton Street Meredith and it is known that he was in the shop by 1901. He married Lillie in 1908 and records indicate that his brother Samuel Henry Mayo was in a store in Wallace Street from 1901 to at least 1928.

MEREDITH - There were more visitors to Meredith than usual this Christmas. The Moorabool and Leigh rivers are handy to the township, and both attracted many tourists ---Mr. I. Hall of Meredith, who is leaving the district, was entertained and presented with a travelling outfit.

The Argus Melbourne,, Wednesday 2 January 1924 MEREDITH - Mr. P. Parker, of Lal Lal, caught a trout weighing 4½lb in the basin at Lal Lal Falls. Messrs. A. Wells and C. Mooney have been elected secretaries for the carnival week to be held in Meredith at Christmas.

The Argus Melbourne, Friday 4 December 1925 MEREDITH - It rained all day on Saturday and the cricket match between Inverleigh and Meredith had to be postponed until next Saturday.

From the Back to Meredith celebrations £200 was obtained.




