Australia Day Awards Shine on Meredith

The 2012 Golden Plains Shire Senior Citizen of the year is Meredith resident Dawn Macdonald. Among Dawn's many good deeds recognised at a ceremony held at the Shire Hall last month, were her long time membership of the Red Cross, (current President and former State Council member) the CWA (former secretary), Meredith Community Centre (former president), Meredith Cemetery Trust (current secretary) her foundation of the Meredith Kindergarten (and its first president), service as a Guide leader and nearly 30 years as a member of the committee that produces this newsletter. She is also known for giving generously of her talents in the fields of music and golf. (Incredibly, she has played off a handicap of less than 10 for over 50 years!)

Dawn is one of those people who selfishly and tirelessly work to make living in our community a richer experience.

The Shire's Citizen of the Year is Bannockburn's Seka Powell, who over several years has worked hard to promote the needs of greater recognition and support for mental health. This has included the successful "Christmas in July" fundraiser which has yielded over \$100,000. The Young Australian of the Year is David Beath of Napoleons.

Meredith residents stepped up again when the History

Interest Group was awarded the "Event of the Year" for the Bamganie Soldiers Memorial Rededication which marked the discovery and refurbishment of a World War I memorial plaque that is now proudly hung in the Shire Hall. The history behind the plaque was the focus of a community ceremony and captured in a book published by Marg Cooper.

Then Meredith resident Barry Pearce was honoured with a Citizen's Recognition Award for his work with the Arts Trail Committee and representing the interests of returned soldiers. And, in case that wasn't enough, long time resident Sue Woerner attained her Australian citizenship at the same ceremony.

On behalf of our readers, we extend our heartiest congratulations to all recipients.

Yes, but Where?

Golden Plains Shire CEO, Rod Nicholls, issued a media release reaffirming Council's commitment to the establishment of a Visitors' Centre in Meredith. This follows Council's receipt of a petition seeking review of the chosen location. Consultation sessions held late last year identified Council owned land on the corner of the Midland Highway and Lawton Street as the preferred site.

Mr Nicholl's said the Centre "...progresses several priorities within the Meredith Community Plan, including the desire to develop visitor information and continuing to enhance heritage aspects of the township."

Council determined to seek an officer's report on the siting issue.



Fire Restrictions are now in force across Golden Plains

The Country Fire Authority (CFA) has introduced Fire Restrictions (Fire Danger Period) for all private land in Golden Plains Shire. from 1am on the 26th of December, 2011 and will remain in force; unless otherwise curtailed or extended, until 1am on the 1st of May 2012.

During this period residents are required to obtain a permit to burn in the open air. Golden Plains Shire is situated within the Central Fire District, meaning Total Fire Bans for the Central Fire District apply to the whole of the Golden Plains Shire area.

Council urges all residents to take the necessary steps to ensure they are FireReady. CFA has plenty of resources to help you prepare this summer. Talk to your local brigade or visit the CFA website <u>www.cfa.vic.gov.au</u>.

All in all, the Christmas and New Year period has been very quiet within the Meredith Township and the surrounding district. I am so pleased to report that there have been no motor vehicle accidents of note reported to police in the area and crime has been extremely low. I have just returned from three weeks of annual leave the feedback from police members from surrounding stations was excellent in that very few jobs were attended within the last month in the area.

The Meredith Music Festival which was run in December went well with only a few issues being raised. On the Friday at the commencement of the festival, I arrested a Geelong based male who was attending the event and who was in possession of a significant quantity of amphetamine. This male was later conveyed to the Geelong Police Station where he was interviewed and charged with serious drug offences.

Two of the issues which have been bought to my attention relate to the temporary speed restriction signage along Meredith - Mount Mercer Road during the running of the event and the behaviour of young drivers and festival goers around the Meredith Township on the Friday morning of the event. Both of these issues will be the focus of future pre planning and overall improvement for the event.

The Golden Plains Music Festival will be run this year from the 10th to the 12th of March. All of the 9000 tickets have now been sold and planning for the event is well under way. Again there will be a focus on driver behaviour at the commencement and at the conclusion of the festival. It is important that drivers using Mount Mercer Road between Meredith and the festival site be mindful of temporary speed restrictions. It was disturbing for me to see the number of alcohol impaired drivers leaving the event and being detected by police.

On another note, it has become evident that rubbish has been frequently dumped around the Meredith skate park. This week, I have had cause to speak with young people who I watched discarding rubbish onto the ground not 5 metres from bins provided. This is extremely frustrating to watch as the park has been established for the benefit of the community's children. I would like to take this opportunity to appeal to parents to encourage their children to be mindful that bins are provided and that the current penalty for depositing litter is \$244.00.

I will close the months report and wish everyone within the Meredith district a very safe and prosperous start to 2012.

Tales from the Tucker Tent

From high up on the hill on Bamganie Road, you can see them. They stretch along Mt Mercer Road like a slow-moving metallic snake, the morning sunlight glinting off a hundred windscreens. They've trundled along the Midland Highway in convoy, and stocked up on supplies at the petrol station and corner store. Now they're arriving out at the Meredith Supernatural Amphitheatre, thousands upon thousands. In the Tucker Tent, the barbecues fire up.

From sunrise until late in to the night at both Meredith and Golden Plains Festivals, the Tucker Tent not only provides great food at low prices, but vital funds for Meredith organisations and community groups. From humble beginnings in a hot, smoky and dusty tent, the Tucker Tent has grown along with the festivals, leading to the construction of a purpose built, comfortable, functional and permanent building in 2009. The new building on the usual site features running water, fans and a concrete floor, and definitely makes a six hour shift more enjoyable! Over the years, the Tucker Tent has kept on barbecuing through scorching afternoons battling dust and flies, electrical storms and one of the wettest weekends to hit the district in living memory, when most festival goers were covered in mud and chilly volunteers warmed up next to the bain maries. The gorgeous weather of December 2011 caused a steady demand for ice, with the volunteers manning the ice truck selling out almost as quickly as they could heave bags out of the truck. On Saturday afternoon the queue eagerly awaiting the next delivery stretched all the way across the food court, but spirits remained high and strangers were seen to embrace when the truck finally pulled in again, before dashing off to restock their eskies. Despite any challenges presented by the unpredictable weather conditions, customers often comment on the friendliness of the volunteers, the speed of the service and the quality of the food served up at the Tucker Tent.


The amount of organisation required for the Tucker Tent to cater at both festivals is enormous, and this year-round undertaking is led by a hard-working committee made up of representatives from the various groups involved. These individuals put in an incredible amount of work attending meetings, organising supplies and, when the weekend arrives, coordinating teams of up to 40 volunteers over a six-hour shift. With many volunteers returning each year it's a fantastic chance to catch up with friends, see some great bands and help out our community.

In 2011 the Tucker Tent was once again a popular choice among hungry revellers in search of good food. Each year the profit raised over the two weekends is divided among community groups including the Meredith Primary School, hall, kindergarten and cricket, football, golf and tennis clubs. A portion is donated to the Nolan family to assist with the ongoing costs of their son Christopher's care. Since the first years of operation, funds raised by the Tucker Tent have been put to good use by the community groups involved, in specific projects or simply as essential means of staying up and running. Past projects include:

- Meredith Primary School Learning resources, Classroom computers, Refurbishment, New playground equipment
- Meredith Memorial Hall Improvements to facilities, Maintenance and repairs, new kitchen appliances including ovens and pie warmer
- Meredith Kindergarten Funds from the Tucker Tent play a vital role in keeping the kindergarten operating
- Meredith Cricket Club Equipment for juniors, New nets
- Meredith Golf Club Upgrade of change rooms, Upkeep of grounds and equipment, New equipment including sand scrape and mower
- Moorabool Valley Football Club Junior Crocs football program, Professional umpiring, Transport, Lighting -New uniforms, General upkeep and maintenance of grounds and facilities, New equipment



We were interested to read recently about the need in 1988 for the Meredith Primary School Council to confront the then Shire of Bannockburn over material it submitted for attachment to the community newsletter which was then produced under the auspice of the School. Inclusion of Shire material, usually a collection of articles around Council activities, was a regular practice, but on this occasion the 'President's column' extolled the "dangers" of returning the incumbent government at the forthcoming State elections.

The Primary School, an instrument of the state government like the Shire Council, was expressly forbidden from any political partisanship, and sought an apology from the Council and an assurance that future attachments would not contain any such material. It was a protracted affair with the Shire denied access to the Meredith Newsletter's readership for several months as it refused to either apologise or guarantee no subsequent breaches of protocol in the pages of its appended report.

It's pleasing to note the newsletter long ago brought such a measure of integrity to its practices, something we hope to maintain through our present day publication guidelines.

Christmas Sheep


Marg Cooper Thank you to all the people who contributed time and effort and their artistic skills to the Christmas display in Meredith.

Police Paddocks' Big Year

What is expected to be a big year for the Meredith Police Paddocks, begun with Golden Plains Shire constructing a short extension to Campion Street and a car parking area for the reserve. This considerably improves vehicle access to the site and makes it a lot easier for residents to get to the pathways meandering through this attractive landscape on the very edge of town.

Local volunteers were also successful last month in getting a grant of \$4,100 from the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal and is hoping for funding from other sources to make a start on what is expected to be a \$25,000 project constructing the first stages of a network of all weather walking tracks, drainage, signage and seating.

Most of the work to date has been undertaken by volunteers and the Ballarat Environment Network (BEN) which is responsible for management of the reserve, and has been focussed on revegetation and weed control.

In the coming year BEN and its local support group will also extend the pathway into the creek flats and across the creek, undertake planting bees in March and August as well as establish a small wildflower reserve.

Residents are urged to have a look at the works that have been done to date and enjoy a stroll around the paths which can be joined at the bottom of Nuttall Street or from Campion Street. There's even a Sunday morning social walking group. Anyone interested in joining the growing band of locals taking part in this rewarding project can contact me on 5286 1273.

VALE – Lance Noble Wray



Lance was born in Geelong in 1915. He attended Geelong College where at the age of 16 he held the title of the College's champion swimmer. Still at the age of 16 and in his final year at Geelong College, he left to become a jackeroo at Marnoo.

Lance returned to Geelong and enrolled at the Gordon Technical School to become a wool classer. He worked for Denney's Lascelles in Geelong being paid junior wages to do a senior's job. It was here that his interest in wool

became deeper.

He became a wool and skin buyer and purchased a property at Durdiwarrah. When WWII broke out Lance went to enlist in the Army, but due to being a farmer was rejected, so he leased his property and joined up again. He served in North Africa with the Australian Army and the British 8th Army. He was in the battle of El Alamein.

After the war he returned to his farm at Durdiwarrah. He then purchased a portion of Moreep Estate called "The Eclipse Run", although classified for a veterans block, Lance wanted to own property on his own terms.

He met Marjorie in Drumcondra, Geelong; little did they know they were neighbours. They became engaged and together renamed the property to "Clipswood Park". They married and settled in the cabin on the property with no power and no running water, whilst their home was being built.

Lance set about establishing a super fine Merino wool stud. He was the first man to fly over pure Saxon ewes from Tasmania to the mainland.

Lance and Marjorie had three daughters (Gail, Jan & Mabes), who Lance referred to as "his boys". When about to start a farming job he would turn to his daughters and say "ready to go boys". Once a shearer remarked to Lance saying "it's not an all girls shed is it", and Lance replied to this shearer saying "not only will my girls do the job in this shed, but they'll be better than any other bloke". Lance always encouraged his daughters to fulfil their dreams, with no gender barrier in the careers they pursed.

Lance built a super fine Merino stud, holding an average micron of 17.3 and kept his farm in an eco environment, enjoying

natural bush and never subjecting this to the tearing down of his bush property for cropping. He bred a special ram called "Lucky", who ranked second best in the Australian Sire Evaluation Scheme and Lucky's progeny was rated best ram in Victoria.

Lance was a member of the Morrison CFA, Hall Committee, Cemetery Trust, Tennis Club, on the board of the Meredith School Committee and R.S.L. member. Lance was grandfather to Simon & Sylvia, Lanon & Sarah, Bindy, Melanie & Gemma and recently became a great grandfather to baby Harryson Parker Brown. Lance's farewell service was held at Clipswood in his woolshed, amongst his prized wool ribbons, WWII medals, woollen fleece, gum leaves and roses with his immediate family. As was fitting for Lance and his love of the land.



I really do love the beach. Every year, as soon as the days heat up, I pile in to a car with my friends, crank up the air conditioning if we're lucky enough to have any, and head for the coast. I even sort of like the crashing waves that threaten to knock me off my feet and dump me unceremoniously on the sand before while rolling away merrily with my bathers. It's when a harmless clump of seaweed gets caught up in the glassy unbroken waves rolling toward me that I find myself stifling a scream of terror. There's always one horrifying moment when a mysterious dark shape in a wave might be seaweed – or might be a giant shark cruising in to bite my legs off.

When we finally make it back to the car, sandy and hot but with legs thankfully intact, I heave a secret sigh of relief that it's all over. When we're eventually packed up and crowded in, hot seats stinging, wet bathers dripping and scratchy hats poking sunburnt skin, we set off back along the cliffs. In the unbearably hot car full of irritable people, I gaze down at the beautiful beach. The sky is cloudless, the waves are gentle, the sun twinkles away benignly...I'll be back next week.

After all, I really do love the beach. Especially when we're driving home.

The End of an Era- The Last Mass at St. Mary's Lethbridge

The Catholic Community of St. Mary's Lethbridge celebrated their heritage and history of 153 years at the final Mass in the present church on Sunday January 22nd 2012 at 4 pm Bishop Vincent Long, Regional Bishop of the western region and Father Herman Licayan Administrator of the Meredith Parish of which Lethbridge is part, celebrated the Mass with a large crowd of former parishioners, present parishioners and locals.

Raymond Kelly, a lifetime parishioner and avid historian related the history of the Lethbridge Catholic community and its two churches with a powerpoint presentation and an historical display.

Raymond told the congregation that Bishop Goold (the first Bishop of Melbourne) with his horse rested at Lethbridge when travelling from Geelong to Ballarat on the afternoon of Sunday, September 16, 1853.

Until the late 1850's Lethbridge and the district of Meredith was in the Parish of St Mary's, Geelong as the first mission station of St. Mary's. In fact the chalice used at the last Lethbridge Mass was inscribed "Meredith Mission".

It is believed that the Catholic Church was built and dedicated before 1860 as the first Catholic School classes are said to be held in the church building in January 1860. A total of 39 children were baptized at Lethbridge in 1860.

.On Monday, October 23, 1876 Bishop Goold visited Lethbridge to administer confirmation to 175 children

In 1914 the weatherboard church (the first church) was moved to Lal Lal and the building of the present church commenced. The new church was blessed and opened by the Coadjutor Archbishop of Melbourne {the Most Rev. Dr Mannix} on Sunday October 27, 1914.

In his homily Bishop Long told the congregation that "God writes straight on crooked lines" meaning that we don't always agree or understand how events unfold but we must accept change. Father Herman told the parishioners that the church building is to be sold but that the true church is the faith that people have and that the present parishioners must appreciate their grandparents and their parents' wonderful heritage.

Prayers were said for many people including the pioneers of Lethbridge who had the foresight and determination to build a church, the Priests who have served the Parish and the people who have helped to maintain the church over the years and for the young who are the future.

Rousing hymns were song with gusto and parishioners were left feeling uplifted in the fact that their heritage and contribution had been so valued.

A bookmark containing images of the two churches and the first one being moved was given out to commemorate the occasion inscribed "We have experienced changes but the memories deep in our heart will always remain."Afternoon tea was served and the congregation socialised at St Mary's Lethbridge for the last time.


The funeral service for Douglas Millar was held at Tuckers Funeral Chapel Geelong West on Tuesday November 22, 2011. Doug passed away at his home on Wednesday November 16, aged 81 years. Chaplain Neil Galbraith conducted the service at the chapel and at the committal service at the graveside in the Lethbridge Cemetery.

Doug was appointed a member of the Lethbridge Cemetery Trust on May 16, 1979 and became President of the Trust at a meeting held on June 7, 1983, holding that position continuously up until the time of his death. During his time on the Trust he worked tirelessly for the betterment of the Cemetery.

Doug was born to James and Jessie Millar (Laird) in 1930 and attended Lethbridge State School. After leaving school he cut wood before working as a farmhand on Moranghurk. His father James Millar, his grandfather Bill Millar and his Uncle Don Millar also worked on Moranghurk. Doug then managed Mr Cameron's farm for 40 years. Doug rarely missed attending the Monday stock sales at the Geelong Saleyards and he would have few peers when it came to his knowledge of sheep.

Doug married Joan Lynch in 1953. As their romance blossomed he ventured across the railway line on his bicycle to visit Joan at her parent's home. Distance would not have been a problem for a young fit Doug but getting across the railway line at Lethbridge presented its challenges during the steam era with trains often blocking the only crossing point in the town for up to 45 minutes at a time, while the locomotive was serviced in preparation for the long uphill grade to Meredith.

With no street lighting Doug would have had to be



careful moving around Lethbridge at night. Doug and Joan made their home in Lethbridge and had 3 children, Ian, Cheryl and Murray. They have 8 grandchildren 22 great grandchildren. Doug and Joan sold their home in Lethbridge and moved into a new home which they built on their farm on the outskirts of Lethbridge, in 1976.

Doug gave extraordinary service to local organizations including the Football Club, the State School, the Cemetery Trust and the Lethbridge Fire Brigade who presented him with a Long Service Medal for 45 years service. A Great Community Man.

June celebrated by going out to Sunday lunch with her family.


She grew up in Goroke and after marrying Max Heard, lived on the Heard family farm at "Riverside" near Horsham.



A new Kinder facility is a step closer after Golden Plains Shire's adoption last year of the Shire wide "Early

Years Infrastructure Report", which included the following recommendation or Meredith:

1. Capital works funding is required - initial cost estimate is approximately \$1,500,000 (following discussions with Golden Plains Shire Council Works Department). This estimate is based on the establishment of a new facility.

2. Undertake a feasibility study to formally consider capital works options.

Of course the next step could be quite a leap, depending on the outcome to part 2 of the recommendation. Clearly, State and Federal funding will be required to bring the project to fruition.

It is one of four priority projects identified across the shire, and envisages the establishment of a 'mini-hub' providing a range of complementary services, such as supported playgroups and occasional care as well as pre-school.







Members pay a yearly fee for this service and select which books the group will read..


We have a month to read each book and then members attend the next monthly meeting to discuss that book and receive the new book for discussion.
