A willing group of volunteers last month planted out nearly 300 trees along a section of creek flats in the Meredith Police Paddocks. This is the seventh planting bee over the last six years; a project that is already having a noticeable effect to the attractive reserve on the edge of the township.

The Ballarat Environment Network (BEN), which manages the 20ha reserve, and the local volunteer support group, have been successful in winning grant funds from Golden Plains Shire and the Foundation for Regional and Rural Development which will allow, in the second half of this year, construction of a first stage of a gravel walking path, signage, and some seating.

It is already a very accessible and beautiful place to warm



up with a winter walk though, with entry points from Campion Street (with a car park) and Nuttall Street.

Another two planting bees are planned for the year, one on July 1st and the other on August 26th. Both start at 10.00 am from the Campion Street car park.

Anzac Day Crowd

I refer to the photograph on the front page of the May 2012 edition of the Meredith & District Newsletter and the caption accompanying it.

I believe a caption should be a word, phrase or sentence describing the contents of the photograph to which it pertains. My pedantic nature therefore is troubled by the caption which states " A large crowd of locals braved a chilly Autumn day to observe Anzac Day in Meredith. Story p.11 "

All I can see at the memorial in front of the decommissioned RSL Hall are the four members of the Catafalque party (none of whom are locals), the president of the local RSL branch, Mr. David Jones, and two of the district's veterans of the Vietnam War, Mr. John Parkinson and Mr. Tim Wood, a total of three locals.

However, out of the view of the photographer's lens, there was the largest crowd of attendees at an Anzac Day service in Meredith that I have seen in my twenty years of attending these services, and most of them were locals. Even more encouraging was the fact that this was on a day when the forecast was for a cold and miserable morning, so to have had, at my guess, between 350 and 400 people in attendance was a fitting tribute to the Anzac spirit.

Leading Senior Constable Greg Kitchen

In the May addition of the Meredith & District Newsletter, I reported the theft of a large brand new garage which had been stolen from a rural property in Duggan Road, Meredith shortly after it was delivered from the manufacturer.

On Friday the 18th May and following information and extensive investigation, I executed a Search Warrant at an address in River Drive, Teesdale where I located the garage in its complete form together with a stolen tandem trailer. As a result, two males have been formally charged with offences including Theft of the Garage, Handling Stolen Goods and Possessing the Proceeds of Crime. A 42 year old male from Teesdale and a 43 year old male from North Geelong have both been formally charged and bailed to appear at the Geelong Magistrates Court Wednesday the 27th June, 2012.

The stolen property will be returned to a very grateful owner in due course.

On Saturday the 28th April a Burglary was committed at a house in Meredith Shelford Road, Bamganie where a rifle was stolen. The victim observed two older male offenders leaving the house in a black coloured Holden utility which is believed to be a late model vehicle.

The utility is believed to have substantial damage to the driver's side from the fuel filler cap forward to the door and was described by the victims as being 'hotted up'. This vehicle left the house and travelled towards Teesdale along the Shelford Meredith Road. If this vehicle is sighted, please do not approach it or any of its occupants however if a registration number can be obtained it may be of significant value.

Again, I urge people although living in the country to be mindful of firearm security and also home security.

Crushing Crocs feed on Crays



In early May the Crocs headed off to Wodonga intent on reversing the outcome of their road trip to the Murray Crays last year.

With only 16 players, most of whom came out the over 47s team, the prospects of victory seemed unlikely. The Crays' run and share with handball, coupled with the Crocs wastefulness, especially around goal, was setting up what appeared to be a one sided no contest.

The insertion of Doopa and Springer into the midfield were inspired coaching moves and gradually the Crocs were able restrict the influence of the opposition onballers.

Sandy Cameron was closing down the Murray forwards while Sammy Saya and Phil Unsworth had taken control of the wings and were passing the ball precisely into the forward line to the inaccurate Scott Cowie. By the end of the third stanza the Crocs had worked their way back into the contest and were carrying the momentum into the final quarter. Pedo and Trof had shut down the Cray's half forward line allowing Sid to continue driving the ball inside 50. Cowie (3.8) finally got his kicking boots on the right feet and the Crocs were able to sneak away to win by 16 points- 11.12 to 10.2. Also among the better contributors were the five players lent to the Crocs by the Crays all of whom seemed equally keen to celebrate a victory over their team mates.

The Murray Masters provided an outstanding meal for the players, then followed an evening of celebrating that drained the last of the energy reserves from the weary combatants.

In round 4 the Crocs hosted the Gippsland Tigers which marked the successful home debut of the clubs over 47s side. The travelling Tigers proved no match for the Crocs in either match with resounding victories recorded by both the over 35s side and the over 47s; results which were enthusiastically appreciated by the good sized crowd.

In the main game the Crocs struggled to shake off a tenacious Tiger outfit for the majority of the first half. With scores level at the first break and small lead at the main interval it looked as if the home side was in for a stern test. The junior Crocs broke the game open in the second half as their opponents began to tire. The relentless efforts of Michael Dagg, Paul Simpson and Aaron Newel eventually suffocated the tigers resolve

and the Crocs kicked away to record a comprehensive 54 point victory 15.6:96 to 6.6:42. Ashley (Grippa) Perkins was best on ground- his four goal return a just reward for his four quarter effort in the midfield. Doopa reinforced his leadership credentials with another lead from the front display in the centre. Damian Priddle, Steve Mileto and Tim Booley were also amongst the better contributors in an even performance against a team that has recently posed problems for the Moorabool Valley side.

The early game found the senior Crocs rarely troubled by score board pressure but such was not the case on the field. The Gippsland Tigers strong attack on the ball and precise clearance work at the stoppages, helped to reduce the ruck dominance of Wayne Tyquin who was also exerting his aerial superiority around the ground. Sandy Cameron and Col Mullane were regularly turning defense into attack from the full back line as the visitors frequently pushed forward to no avail. The Moorabool Valley onballers were dominating around the ground. With Tyquin, Sid and Gary Polglaze driving the ball forward to a rampant Cowie, the margin on the scoreboard growing steadily throughout the game. Peter Blacklock moved forward late in the game and contributed 3 majors but it was Cowie with 8 goals and numerous assists who was the irresistible force in front of the sticks. All 23 players contributing to ensure a winning margin just shy of the century- 19.14:128 to 5.4:34

There is still plenty of room in both teams for additional players. Anybody interested in a game is invited to join in training at the Rec Reserve from 6.00 on Wednesdays.

The Crocs will also be celebrating "a decade of dominance" with a 10 year reunion at Capri Receptions in North Geelong on July 20th. All past players, their partners, officials and supporters are invited to attend (details available from the club).

It is Coming

It is galling that most in our readership district can only access what is called "ADSL1" services or worse, and these are offered at the same or higher price than the much faster "ADSL2" services that

have been around for larger towns for some time. Most can also access "ADSL2+" or other, even faster variants if not cable services.

By way of comparison, ADSL in our area seems to have a maximum capacity for data delivery of 1.5 million "bits" per second (Mbps). (A test of the connection where I am writing this, indicates a 'line speed' - capacity - of 1.2 Mbps and an actual performance of .6 Mbps.) One regional provider's web site states network tests indicate "...50% of users obtain speeds of 12Mbps or above" for their ADSL2 customers.

So, the coming National Broadband Network (NBN) is of particular interest to district residents and businesses who regularly use an internet connection.

But finding out about *what* and *when*, is wrought with difficulties, as there are a myriad of variables. As much as we have been able to glean, the NBN roll out should be substantially completed by 2015 and, for our district, will offer a "fixed wireless" service which will transmit data from a local tower to a personal antenna. If distance or topography inhibits transmission, a "satellite broadband" service will be provided. There is already an "interim satellite service" which is available to those who can't get a reasonable commercial service where they live.

One reference from the sprawling NBN web site says "peak speeds" up to 12 Mbps can be provided by these technologies, but it is unclear if that applies to both. Nothing like the staggering 1 gigabit per second (that's 1,024 Mbps) cable service to be eventually offered to towns with a population over 1,000 people, but a big improvement nonetheless.

Federal MP Darren Cheeseman's office told us the next round of announcements regarding the fixed wireless rollout will be in the last quarter of this year and 'hopefully' Meredith will be included. Typically, construction starts around 12 months after the announcement and completed within three months.

She is the only woman to be honoured with a Life Membership of the Meredith Golf Club. Janet remembers that she was Ladies President when the Golf Club ran a huge garden party at the home of Sir Henry and Dame Edith Bolte. Over \$3,000 was raised to build the septic toilets at the new golf house.

Janet married Lloyd Cooke in 1945. She tells that her kitchen tea was held in the Shire Hall about the time that PEACE was declared.

Janet was a dedicated member of Meredith CWA. She especially enjoyed the craft and even after she moved to Geelong in 1989 Mavis Griffiths and a group of ladies met at her home to learn new crafts.

She played tennis in Meredith in her younger days and later took up bols. DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT STEIGLITZ. STEIGLITZ, SUNDAY.

A block of buildings - embracing Gill's Coffee Palace, Dr. Scott's residence, and M'Clellan's grocery store - was totally destroyed by fire about 4 o'clock this morning. The cause is not known, but the fire originated in the billiard-room of the coffee palace, a large wooden building of 25 rooms. Ellis's drapery shop opposite was saved with difficulty. The whole of the buildings are owned by Mr. Eyre, of Melbourne, and are insured in the South Australian Company for £1,000. Mr. Gill's stock and furniture were insured for £600 in the Northern and Sun, Mr. M'Clellan's for £80 in the Northern, but Dr. Scott was uninsured. Very little was saved, there being no water supply, and the inmates only escaped with difficulty. The estimated total loss is £2,000.

Saturday Night in Steiglitz.

Part 1 of a very descriptive report in The Steiglitz Miner August 1, 1894 written by "Fossicker"

Steiglitz is at its best on a Saturday night, but the lamps of Regent and Clow Street are not particularly bright and their gleams are reflected fitfully on the slippery footpaths and the muddy roadways.

But despite of darkness and cold, steep streets and slippery paths, there is a vigorous life in Steiglitz to which most country towns in Victoria are at present strangers.

The life is, of course, the life of a new goldfield, and the life to be seen is that of men unrefined by much feminine companionship.

Regent Street officially commences at the Coffee Palace. Above that is all void and blackness. At the Coffee Palace the lights are bright and the bar is well-filled.

For the coffee palace is also a wine saloon. And the wine consumed there would be quite abnormal for a town to say nothing of a goldfield. The wine is good, however, and possibly that may account for it.

A glass of hot spiced gives a man a comfortable glow on nights like these in this thin air.

From the interior come the sounds of music and sing-song and merrymaking. It is not pleasant to leave the fireside for the whistling, marrow freezing wind outside.

Around us, indistinct and vague there rises up the monotonous undertone of the stampers, an unconscious source and accompaniment of all this life in Steiglitz.

Towards the south there is only darkness and the abandonment of the day. There are no people there. The lovers, who seek a little solitude and seclusion, are behind fire-lit curtains somewhere. I saw their shadows on one or two as I passed.

The shops on either side as we come down are little oasis of light; in one are men selecting duds: in another more men reading from a slip of papers their week's list of groceries.

The Post and Telegraph office is just closing, opposite a few figures pass between us and the open doorway of the Free Library.

The Geelong coach has drawn in under the high archway of Cobb's stable : and opposite Ward's horses are champing in their stalls, freed for one whole day from the labour of the Meredith Road.

Hairdressers with hotel-keepers are busy to-night; in both streets the knights of the razor are hard at work reaping the stubble off chins that must at least be smooth for Sunday.

Having had a shave the next thing to be done, of course, is to go and have a drink. First at one hotel and then at the other. A bar full of men: 50 voices speaking at once, a babel of sound in an infinite variety of tones, flying bartenders and clattering silver.

These are where the life of Steiglitz centres. They are the dividend paying mines of the field.

A fitness circuit, which is also a proposal from the Community Coordinators, was discussed and with input from Tim Woods, a qualified fitness instructor, a 9 station plan was put forward as the most appropriate. The proposal is that it be installed near the Recreation Reserve/ Pioneer Park so that it can be used by the various sporting clubs as well as the School and individuals. The total cost of the project will be \$25, 000. Already available is seed funding of \$5,000 from the current Community Plan, and \$5000 from the Meredith Music Festival. Steam Trains through Meredith

An article in the Geelong Advertiser on Saturday May 12 reported that the Geelong, Golden Plains, Moorabool and Ballarat Councils have all shown a strong interest in pursuing the idea of supporting heritage trains on the Geelong to Ballarat line after the huge success of the 150 year celebrations. Geelong Council has allocated \$10,000 for a feasibility study for a tourist operation. Councillor John Doull said that the \$10,000 would be used to develop a business plan for a heritage railway service between Geelong and Ballarat.

It also comes as the State Government continues to investigate the possibility of a return of passenger services on the line and beyond to Bendigo via Meredith, Maryborough and Castlemaine.

Cr Doull said that the Geelong to Ballarat line was a unique piece of infrastructure with high quality engineering and design elements. It is of great state and national significance and has the potential to grow into an international tourism opportunity.

Imagine trips on steam trains and tourists coming to the town!!

He did a considerable trade with Geelong and also supplied Steiglitz.

After the destruction of the vineyards he engaged in mixed farming and dairying.

He married Pauline Wilhelmina Baensch in 1867 and they had 11 children. She died in 1895.

He married Sarah Parker in 1896 and they had 2 sons, Ernest Llewellyn b. 1898 and Edward Arnold b. 1900.

"Shadowboxing' by Tony Birch

Tony Birch was born in inner-city Melbourne, into a large family of Aboriginal, West Indian and Irish descent. His upbringing was challenging and difficult and much of this is captured in this book, the semi-autobiographical Shadowboxing.

He was altar boy and exceptional student at his local primary Catholic School but he went off the rails as a teenager and was expelled from two schools for fighting. Although somewhat adrift following his expulsions he remained a voracious reader.

When he returned to night school to complete his studies he met his mentor, Anne Misson who told him, "You'll be great, but only if you work your arse off". He continues to live by that credo.

Through his Outreach work he visits many schools to speak to students and takes particular pleasure in returning to the two schools that expelled him, as both of his previous books are on the syllabus.

Shadowboxing consists of 10 stories or chapters dealing with the life of Michael Byrne as he grows from adolescence to maturity in inner Melbourne and his difficult and turbulent relationship with his father. The writing is spare in that there are many jumps in the stories and revelations are often made only briefly and in passing but overall the scene of hardship is drawn.

Various chapters tell of the family moving back to the city to a rented house from Clunes, Michael's father teaching him to box against his wishes, of men bashing their wives after drinking bouts and the locals turning a blind eye, of the abortionist in their suburb, of looking forward to the return of Father Christmas on the Woolworth's building in the city, of stealing cars and joyriding, of the death of his mate, of visiting the Cemetery, of finding his father after many years and their reunion etc.

One of the most poignant chapters tells of systematic demolition of large parts of Fitzroy to make was for huge housing commission flats. The Byrne family become victims of this process and lose their community.

A Review of Tony Birch's latest book "Blood" tells that it is a compelling gothic odyssey that explores landscape, place and the "ties that bind". The book for discussion in June is "About a Boy" by Nick Hornby.
