Old 'Footprints' in the Paddocks

Members of the Wathaurung (Wadda Wurrung) language group conducted a brief field survey of parts of the Police Paddocks last month. They had no difficulty finding evidence of stone tool making by aborigines once occupying the area.

Such finds are important as they provide a link to the pre-European past and build on the Police Paddocks' historical significance.

The three officers involved are mapping sites on both private and public land in conjunction with Victoria University. They have recently Above: Remnant chips from tool undertaken surveys of other nearby sites, making at the Police Paddocks, including the route of the recently completed Lethbridge to Meredith pipeline, and will conduct a more extensive survey of the 'Paddocks' when the heavy grass and weed cover is depleted.


New Faces



Leading Senior Constable Greg Kitchen

Crime within the region has been very low I am extremely happy to report. There has been a steep decline in the number of Burglaries and thefts being reported within the area. I would however like to bring to people's attention that there has been a car trailer stolen from a yard within the Meredith Township between Monday night the 20th February and Tuesday 21st February. The trailer is very distinctive and there is a photograph of it below.



It is possible that the offenders are not local but spotted the trailer from the Midland Highway on passing. It is a timely reminder that items need to be secured when in clear sight of the road. If any person within the community has seen anything opposite the Hotel on this evening, I would greatly appreciate a call with any information. It is my understanding that the owner is offering a monetary reward to any person who may supply information which would lead to the trailer's recovery.

It is of great benefit to police in solving crime if owners of property of value etch or stamp their drivers licence details on items such as mowers, chainsaws, tools of value and trailers. Search warrants are regularly executed by detectives and uniform police where stolen property is regularly recovered in large quantities. It is an easy process to return property to owners when driver's licence numbers are located on the item. I have an engraver of my own which I am only too willing to loan out to any person within the community for this purpose.

I have unfortunately attended three motor vehicle accidents within the past month. Thankfully none have been life threatening or within the Meredith area however I can report that two drivers were conveyed to hospital following a recent two vehicle collision in Elaine. In a separate collision in Lethbridge, a driver will be charged by way of summons for driving a truck whilst his licence is suspended as a result of this accident.

Both of these collisions occurred in the event of a driver failing to give way at an intersection. It is easy to become complacent while driving in the country and it only takes a momentary lapse of concentration to become involved in a life altering event. Victoria Police will be targeting alcohol and drug effected drivers through the month of March.

The March 'Golden Plains Music Festival' is closely upon us and will be held between the 10th and the 12th of March. The

organisers and I are confident that traffic management and event planning is coming together very well.

Finally, I can report that I am progressing towards having the first of the 'Blue Light' discos up and running hopefully by mid year. I am currently in discussions with Ballarat police members who run these events in Ballarat. I am currently seeking assistance in getting things up and running.

At the Australia Day Awards Ceremony at Bannockburn on Tuesday, January 24 Sue Woerner became an Australian Citizen.

Sue decided to become an Australian Citizen because she has got Aussie kids, she has Aussie grandkids, because she barracks for Australia in international events and she thought it was time.

Her application was approved and she was invited to attend the ceremony at Bannockburn where she pledged to be a loyal Australian.

She received a framed certificate, a coin, a copy of the pledge and a native Australian plant from Mayor Geraldine Frantz.

Sue tells that her parents and their 5 children came from England on SS New Australia in 1956 as £10 Poms!

They had lived in a small village in a semi detached house with Grandad, with a Nana across the road and Uncles and Aunties a short distance away.

But her father had decided that he wanted a better life for his children.

They arrived in Adelaide and he went to the job he had been allotted at a petro chemical plant, north of Adelaide in the middle of the desert. He refused to take his family there so they were transferred to Norlane where they were housed in the Norlane Hostel and he got a job at Shell Refinery.

They moved to a commission home in Norlane where Sue and her siblings frog spawned in the creek in wheat fields that is now the suburb of Corio.

A Fifth Generation Steps Up

Matilda's great great grandmother Catherine Louisa Deans (McKenzie) went to Meredith State School. She was raised by her grandmother who was a bush nurse and midwife and they lived near the railway line beside McLeod Street.

Matilda's great grandmother Janet Catherine Cooke (Deans) also went to Meredith State School. She lived at "Kyloe" on Deans Road with her parents, younger brother Bob and her step brother Keith Tanner.

When Janet started school Keith and her rode a horse called "Dolly", left the horse in the paddock behind the railway houses that faced onto Staughton Street and left the saddle and bridle over the Post Office fence. When Bob started school Keith was given a bike, which he left at Wards fruit shop, and Janet and Bob rode "Dolly". As with siblings there were a few arguments while riding the horse and the parent's punishment was for Janet and Bob to walk the 12 kms to school and back the next day.

Matilda's great grandfather Lloyd Cooke also went to Meredith State School. His family lived in the house of the local corner store before moving to the farm on Slate Quarry Road in 1929.

Matilda's grandfather Robert Cooke started at Meredith State School aged 4½. The Headmaster was Bill Henderson and Robert remembers the local teacher Miss Lorna Wells hitting him over the knuckles and breaking her 15" plastic ruler for some minor misdemeanour!!!!

Matilda's father Andrew commenced school in Meredith in 1982 joining his two sisters Joanne and Fiona. Matilda's teacher, Mrs Gargan, also taught Joanne and Andrew.

Festival Traffic Plan

The 2012 Golden Plains Festival traffic management plan has been approved by VICROADS, the Golden Plains Shire and Victoria Police. The summary of the plan is outlined here.

- We will implement one-way traffic on Mount Mercer Road from Bamganie Road to Cameron's Road from approximately 4pm on Friday 9 March to approximately 7pm on Saturday 10 March. Traffic within the one-way zone travelling to Meredith will be diverted down Cameron's Road.
- From approximately 4pm Friday 9 March 7pm Saturday 10 March we will implement a speed reduction to 40klms per hour on Mount Mercer Road near Bamganie Road, on Mount Mercer Road approximately 3klms South of the festival site, on Mount Mercer Road immediately South and North of the festival site and on Cameron's Road.
- From approximately 7pm Saturday 10 March 7pm Monday 12 March we will implement a speed reduction to 40klm per hour on Mount Mercer Road at Bamganie Road and on Mount Mercer Road immediately South and North of the festival site.
- We have assigned traffic controllers to the corner of Midland Highway and Mount Mercer Road on Monday 12 March to assist vehicles turning left and right onto Midland Highway from Mount Mercer Road.
- We will install a no-parking zone along Mount Mercer Road and some surrounding roads.

It is also important to note that cigarettes can no longer be sold from the festival site. We have notified the public via the festival website and pre-festival email that they should bring what they need with them however we do anticipate some people will drive into Meredith over the festival weekend to stock up. We will be providing a shuttle bus service to help decrease additional vehicles on the roads.

Hall of Fame Induction

On Tuesday, March 27 at Wagga Wagga William Grant will be inducted into the Hall of Fame of the Australian Clay Target Association for his expertise in clay pigeon shooting prior to 1940. They hold an annual evening where they induct one or more Clay Target Shooters during their National Trap Championships.

William and his brothers Samuel (Tommy), Richard, James and Robert were expert shooters. Their father Richard Grant worked on "Golf Hill Station" where all the boys did, was shoot! Tommy Grant and his wife Clara (Wells) lived on Coopers Road.

Yvonne Broom, daughter of Tommy thinks that William was the best shooter in the family. He never married and even declined an invitation to go to Monte Carlo to shoot because he wasn't keen on boat travel. He worked around Gippsland before he died.

In August 1898 William, then living in Meredith, secured absolute possession of the Melbourne Sparrow and Pigeon Shooting Club's trophy with a score of 21 consecutive kills.

In September 1898 he won the Sparrow Sweepstakes at the Melbourne Sparrow Club.

He won the Commonwealth Sparrow Championship in 1911, 1912, the Victorian Sparrow Championship in Bendigo in 1912, the Victorian Pigeon Championship in Ballarat in 1912, the Commonwealth Pigeon Championship in 1912, the Cootamundra Pigeon Championship in 1912, the Commonwealth Starling Championship in 1913 and many more championships and in 1914 he won the Sparrow Championship of the Wimmera.



Siting the Visitors' Centre

We reported last month Golden Plains Shire had been petitioned to review the location of the proposed Meredith Visitors' Centre. The 50 petitioners promoted the RSL Hall site, demolishing the current building and reusing material in the construction of the new Centre. They also petitioned:

- 1. When the Meredith Kindergarten located into new premises, the old Shire Hall be incorporated into the site
- 2. It be a cooperative venture with the adjoining service station for parking and access purposes, and
- 3. No commercial activities be undertaken on the site.

Council directed officers to further investigate siting options which led to the senior management group undertaking an on-site inspection last month. Their report, which is expected to report the RSL site to be a viable option, went to Council's meeting at the end of last month.

In the meantime, the Shire advises the Centre is due for completion by the 15 May 2013 and Stewart Seaton has been appointed as the architect for the project. He is now preparing final draft detailed designs which will be communicated back to residents.

Oops! ...or was it?

It's a curious human trait, but we do relish discovering the errors of others. We recently were amused by the misspelling of the word 'poisonous' in the Melbourne Age - and that was in a heading! So we weren't too surprised when we found an anonymous message on our answering machine, pointing out the error on the front page of our last issue. You saw it of course: Lawler Street had become Lawton Street.

Of course the caller overlooked it was a cryptic reference to the siting of the proposed Meredith Visitors' Centre. Initially proposed for the corner of Lawler Street and the Midland Highway, Council is having a rethink after being petitioned to use a site with frontages to the highway and Staughton Street. "Lawton" is an amalgam of Lawler and Staughton.

And, in case you are still a tiny bit suspicious, and to protect the innocent, we should point out the article was a last minute inclusion, *after* the proof reading.

Ray (Sugar) Harris

In 1960 when Con O'Brien broke his ankle, Ray Harris was asked if he'd like to work on the railways.

Ray accepted the offer and became a "repairer" on the railway line between Elaine and Meredith.

Rex Brady was the "ganger" and Ray, Ned Watts, Jack Shell and Jack McCormack were repairers in his gang.

Ray thought Rex Brady was a great bloke and good to work with. Arty Johnson from Elaine joined the gang later.

Ray would walk or drive his Holden Station Wagon to Elaine Railway Station each morning, put the trolley or trike on the line and hand push/ pull it to Meredith.

Ray tells how hard it was to push/pull it back to Elaine from Meredith on a windy day. It would test your arms out! There was no protection from the weather on the open trolley, no roof or windscreen.

Later the trolleys had 4 seats rather than 2 seats and 2 pairs of men pushed and pulled.

The gang patrolled the railway line each day and on Saturday morning from Meredith to 1½ miles north of Elaine.

They checked for broken rails, movement in the gauge ie if the lines had spread in or out from the regulation 5 foot 3 inch between the lines and for any other trouble

They regularly burnt a fire break beside the line, first one side then the other side depending on the wind.

The railways usually ploughed a fire break against the fence line before the burning. They were supplied with knapsacks and beater: a long handle with a piece of canvas attached to the end.

The gang repaired what they could using the tools they carried in a tray on the trolley. This included "...a jigger, or that's what Rex Brady called it"... to hand bore holes in sleepers for bolts. A 10lb sledge hammer was another tool often used by the gang.

Con O'Brien returned to work after recovering from his broken ankle and Ray made up time working around local farms and in shearing sheds. Con O'Brien had a hut near where the Fire Station now is at Elaine and then later a new hut was built for him near where Lara Glass is now.

But Con O'Brien got crook and Ray restarted as a repairer and stayed for 17 years. AC Grossman from the Office of the Road Foreman wrote Ray an excellent reference when he left the job on 26/8/1977.

The gang would go to the Railway Station for information about train times before they set out on the line. If they didn't get the

correct information and heard or saw a train coming, they would have to get the trolley off quick.

It was hard to get the "fairly heavy trolley" back on the tracks on your own but Ray could do it. If they knew that a train was coming they'd remove the trolley at a "take-off".

A "take-off" consisted of 4 sleepers adjacent to the line where the trolley was removed to.

Ray remembers that a flat top trolley loaded with 1 ton of anchors, which were placed against sleepers to stop the line

"... the men took their food for the day and often cooked sausages for lunch on the shovel." from slipping across, started to careen down the railway line, away from their gang, gaining speed.

The gang members fell off between Meredith and Lethbridge and sustained some

injuries but the trolley continued.

They rang from a nearby farm house to warn the Station Masters to stop the train from Geelong.

Ray tells that if the trolley would have hit the Rail Motor at a big speed, the anchors would have flown through the windows and caused huge damage to the passengers and the train.

Sleepers were put across the line at Bannockburn to stop the trolley but the trolley leapt over them. The trolley came to a halt at Gheringhap and three days later it was towed back to Meredith.

An inquiry was held and the gang were asked to explain why the trolley got away from them.

Ray tells that the men took their food for the day and often cooked sausages for lunch on the shovel.


He tells that they didn't wear a uniform and that he wouldn't have worn it if he'd been given it.

He tells that many wildflowers grew along the line especially north of Elaine.

Ray and his brother Max remember Elaine as a busy Railway Station and that it had a wide bull nosed veranda and attractive steel gates. They believe that the Station Master's house was removed to Lethbridge and the wooden Station building was bulldozed, one night.

There was a big goods shed, a waiting room, toilets, a big wood yard and sheep yards opposite where Lara Glass is now. They remember cream cans on the platform and that the wagons of wood went to Geelong every Thursday.

Elaine was then a booming town with lots of people coming and going from the station in horse and carts.



Back to School

The weather might still be beautiful, but now that autumn's rolling in, the sky looks a little more grey to me.

My long, lazy summer is over, and though school's been back in for about a month, uni students like myself are just starting to haul themselves out of bed and back to class.

When I was at primary school, I was always full of mixed emotions when February started to creep up on me. On the one hand, there was a lot to be anxious about – my new teacher might be scary, my new hair cut would probably be a disaster, and my new uniform would definitely be too big. On the other hand, as much as I might

mope and groan, I secretly loved school. Stationary gave me a thrill and piles of unread books left me giddy with excitement (no, I was not very cool). I'd scuff along in my ugly clunky school shoes, eyeing off shiny t-bars and aching with jealousy and pre-teen angst, but then the smell of fresh sheets of paper in exercise books and newly

sharpened pencils would reach my freckled little nose and everything would seem so much better.

Now I'm starting my sixth year of uni, I've become a lot more casual about stationary, and don't obsess too much over making sure my pencil case and folder are colour coordinated. Piles of new books are more likely to fill me with panic over my impending financial ruin, and catching

the 6.15 am train to Melbourne almost makes me long for the noisy, smelly old school bus I used to take every day, shrieking and jostling as we bounced over pot holes. Of course, there are also some fantastic things about being at uni – it's highly unlikely these days that I'll ever find a sandwich from last week at the bottom of my bag.

The books are bought, the timetable is printed, the train ticket is stowed safely in my wallet and my alarm is set for an hour I haven't seen for months. I'm all set...and that's the moment my beloved,

battered laptop groans and blinks feebly at me before shutting down for the last time.

As I groan and mentally prepare to part with a small fortune so I can get my homework done, I find myself thinking wistfully of newly sharpened pencils and exercise books.







Who knew George?

GEORGE HENRY CROFT was born in Emu Bay (Burnie), Tasmania on the last day of December in 1858, the eldest child of George and Mary.

His father had been convicted for larceny and arrived in Van Diemen's Land in 1842. His name was GEORGE CRAFT - however a new start came with a new name and his six children and descendants would all carry the name CROFT.

George Henry came to Meredith, with his parents and younger sisters, Mary and Letitia, sometime between 1862 and 1864, with his father buying his first piece of land in Meredith in 1864; Lot 1 of Section 1, on the corner of Dawson and Read Streets, near the Coolebarghurk Creek. Three other siblings were born in or near Meredith between 1865-70: Thomas, Bridget Teresa and Margaret.

George and Mary CROFT lived in Meredith for the rest of their lives; they were illiterate but their children must have attended schooling and George Henry seems to have been a sociable person playing his violin at the wedding of William and Ellen Lowne (Austin) in 1879 and playing again for them on their 50th wedding anniversary in 1929.

After 1879 George Henry went to NSW where he worked as a Modeller (Plasterer) in Sydney and it was here that he married his first wife, Margaret Connelly in late 1881. Two of his eleven children were born in Newtown, NSW – the others all born in Prahran or South Yarra, Victoria from 1886 to 1903.

His sister, Letitia Croft married a local lad, Louis De Grandi in 1882. He had trained in the saddlery business and was a crack rifleshot, who stayed in Meredith until 1890 and was eventually to open a cycle and gun shop in Warrnambool in 1897. This family owned and operated Sports Store celebrated its 100th year in May 1997.

George Henry must have spent most of his time working in Melbourne to support his large family yet he seems to have retained strong connections to Meredith and when his father died in 1892 it is George Henry who, as a resident of Meredith, was the informant on the Death Certificate. He is also appointed as sole executor of the Will and is the sole beneficiary of all the property, etc. acquired by George senior, after his wife Mary's death.

Mary Croft died in 1910, a horrible and lingering death after being burned on the back and abdomen when her clothing caught fire. She was 83 years old and once again, George Henry is the informant on the Death Certificate.

It seems likely that he may have been living permanently in Meredith prior to his mother's death as he is on the Electoral Rolls for the area in 1903 and 1909. Certainly from 1910 he was in Meredith while his wife Margaret and children continued to live in Melbourne – several of these children being still quite young. Margaret outlived him by a year, dying in 1945.

In 1921 at the age of 63 years, George Henry married Mary Ellen Coakley at St Patrick's Cathedral in East Melbourne and they lived in Meredith, presumably at the house that was described in the Inventory of his father as scarcely habitable!

In 1943 George Henry wrote a short piece on the early days of Meredith, as he remembered them. It has since been adapted and is on the current 'History of Meredith' website.

Mary Ellen died in 1934 at the age of 60 and he died in 1944 at the age of 85. They are buried at the Meredith Cemetery in the Catholic Section together with his parents; a simple four-section gravesite with a granite gravestone bearing a marble plaque – "In Loving Memory of"

By the time of George Henry's death in 1944, he owned 11 Lots of land stretching on both sides of the Midland Highway – 'with an extremely old four-roomed weather board dwelling-house'. All were sold in 1945 for the princely sum of £230.0.0. Most of this money was left in equal shares to two of his sisters, Letitia De Grandi and Bridget Plant.

An interesting man, an enigma of a man – many questions unanswered!



Thomas Donovan married Catherine Kay in Creswick in 1885. He was a miner in the Bamganie/Meredith area and then moved to Mt Egerton where he died in 1903. He was a talented sportsman and his grandson Thomas Donovan Arklay captained Geelong Football Club in the 1940's.

Henry Saville was a Mounted Policeman in Meredith in 1856-57. He was also a policeman at Steiglitz, Moorabool, Winchelsea, Inverleigh and Steatham. He retired in 1877 from the police force and took up land at Pyramid Hill. He was presented with a timepiece by the members of the Moorabool Viaduct Temperance Society on June 1, 1860 for taking active part in the cause of Teetotalism. It seems that Henry was a policeman at Moorabool when the railway line was being built. If anyone has any information about Thomas or Henry please let us know so we can help their families with their research. We catalogue on the last Thursday of the month at the Masonic Centre from 9 am. You are welcome to join us for a quick visit, a short time or stay all day.

From The Argus, Thursday 14 March 1912 *Jan McDonald*,

'It is with deep regret that the site chosen for the new Court House for this township is not only beyond the boundary of Meredith but at a corner remote from the bulk of the inhabitants and at the extreme end from the principal entrances into the township.


The site chosen lies in a low swamp spot, that the building would have to be raised and the mile or so entrance from the road into it would be a work of considerable expense.'

Abbreviated from a July 1859 letter from 'your memoralists' and signed by William White, John Bell, P O'Keefe, Wm McAdam, Henry O'Brien, Michael Ward, John Lewis, Wm Henry Robinson, Thomas Connor, Thomas Linehan, Geo Reckey, Peter McLean & R Gosling.

The memoralists suggested the Court House be erected on said Government Reserve opposite Block 3 in Wallace Street. Apparently construction had already started close to the Police Paddock in what is now Nuttall Street.

In October 1875 the Geelong Advertiser reported that the wooden Meredith Court House erected 15 years ago on an elevation, a slight distance from the township was said to be a disgrace but still in

Apparently her sister set up a writing group with a couple of close friends to force Mary Ann to write a book as she found writing difficult.

Sadly her health had started to fail before she finished the revisions so her niece Annie Burrows completed the task.

The book tells the story through documents, particularly letters.

The book is set in Guernsey in 1946, only 8 months after the official end of the war.

Most of the details of Guernsey during the occupation are conveyed in the book by Islanders telling their own stories to Juliet who is a London based writer.

We learnt much about the occupation including that England didn't defend the Islands but offered to evacuate the children to England with notice of one day. The children returned after 5 years.

During the German occupation of the Channel Islands in World War II the residents formed a bookclub.

The act of reading served as a crucial bond for a group of people trying to bear the unbearable.

Despite the dark threads of war stories this is a feel good novel which seduces the reader with the Society's literary journey of discovery.


Juliet visits Guernsey after corresponding with many members of the Literary Society and soon becomes one of their community.


Her positive role, both personally and as a chronicler of the Islanders' experiences, achieves healing and catharsis within her new community.
