## **Rescue for Dummies**

Meredith Fire Brigade conducted a rescue assimilation last month to give members experience in what may be encountered in a house fire. The exercise, undertaken on the grounds of Meredith Primary School, took a scenario where persons were trapped in a smoke filled room. Brigade members had to position appliances and hoses to attack the fire, as well as attempting to rescue the trapped people.

This was also assimilated by positioning two heavy dummies in the playground equipment while brigade members, wearing full protective suits and blindfolds, took turns of locating and extracting them. Working in pairs, this required them to rely on their sense of direction and communication with each other to navigate through the obstacles to locate the bodies and remove them by the same route.

Captain Chris Jones said this is an important part of the ongoing training all brigade members undertake.

Leading Senior Constable Greg Kitchen

Hello again all. Well, I am happy to be able to report that crime within the area has remained very low during the past month. I would like to however make people aware of a situation where dogs could be targeted by offenders for breeding or fighting purposes, which I touched on in my previous article. Recently, and since my last report, two Labradors were located in bushland on the east of the Meredith Township. Both these dogs were owned by dedicated owners and it would seem extremely unlikely that the dogs have been able to escape the property without assistance. Both were some distance from the owner's address and both dogs are micro chipped. In addition, I have received other information that some residents have put information on face book detailing similar situations in nearby areas. I would strongly urge anyone with any information to contact me at the Meredith Police Station on 52 861 222 if they have any information and I would urge dog owners to be aware.

I know most residents would be aware of the recent life threatening motor vehicle collision which occurred on the Midland Highway, Meredith near the Intersection of Creamery Road on Monday the 1st of July at about 7.20 p.m. Firstly, I can report that both the young driver and passenger are both expected to make full recovery's. I have attended hundreds of collisions during my 24 year career and would say that this was among the worst of them.

I would like to take this opportunity to highly praise the efforts of the Meredith CFA for their actions at the scene during the course of the incident. Under difficult and trying circumstances, it was impressive to see the high level of professionalism and efficiency displayed by the chief fire officer in charge, Mr Chris JONES and his members as a whole. Well done to all involved. I would also like to praise the efforts of the Bannockburn SES for their efforts. The accident highlights the need for all drivers to be aware of their driving at all times and in all weather conditions. The matter is currently being investigated by the Major Collision Investigation Unit based in Brunswick.

Recently, I recovered a number of very old and distinctive knives and knife scabbards from a property on the southern side of Meredith. These knives are very unique and possibly valuable. I suspect that they have been dumped many years ago after a burglary or theft possibly within the local area. I would be eager to hear from any long term residents who may recall someone who has had these very unique items stolen. The condition of these items together with the location of the items would suggest that they have been there for up to or in excess of 20 years.

#### **Golden Streets Project**

Golden Plains Shire Council was successful in securing a Regional Growth Fund. \$1,290,000 of the grant has been allocated for main street development works in the townships of Haddon, Rokewood, Meredith and Teesdale. #### from Media Release

#### Mt Mercer Wind Farm

Over the coming months, sections of 64 large wind turbines will be travelling through the Golden Plain Shire to our region's first renewable energy farm; Mt Mercer Wind Farm, 30 km from Ballarat. The oversized loads will include the steel towers, the 45m long fibre glass blades and the nacelles (housing box) for the wind turbines.

Commencing from 1st August, escorted wind farm components will be transported six days a week from the Port of Geelong to the Mount Mercer Wind Farm between the hours of 1am and 6am, which will maximise public safety and minimise any inconvenience to other road users and the local community.

While these large loads are being transported on our roads, residents are urged to take care and respond to the Vicroads directions to ensure the safety of all road users. Once the components arrive on site it will take a crew of 50 people approximately a day and a half to erect each turbine, which will stand 126 metres tall to the tip of the blade.

#### Listening to Jack

#### Jim Elvey

I recently spent an interesting couple of hours talking (well, listening mostly) to 85 year old Jack Powles, Meredith's policeman for 21 years from 1958. He was the last appointment classified as a 'mounted policeman' and was readily able to look after the few police horses that were always resting in the "Police Paddocks."

When he was first appointed, Jack occupied one of two rented houses on the north side of Staughton Street near Reid Street. Electricity wasn't yet connected to the town and his station and lock up were small portable buildings located on the same site as the house. The timber lock up was dismantled and reassembled at the site of the "new" police station on the south side of Staughton Street, next to the old Shire Hall/kindergarten when Jack and his family moved there in 1961

Our real reason for seeking out Jack, was to get some help in locating the site of a former bluestone police residence and stables believed to have been built on The last 'mounted policeman' to be appointed to

the foundations still there and is certain as to their at the age of 85. location. If the long grass can be tamed, there is a good chance they will be found.

Reflecting on his time working with the police horses, Jack described as "useless" the horse yards still evident in the north west corner of the Police Paddocks. He always caught the usually well-trained horses with the offer of food nearer to the Nuttall Street entrance. The horses arrived by train from Melbourne via Geelong, loaded in cattle trucks, not the padded and penned carriages uses by trainers. As a result, they were often bruised and scraped from their journey.

When retired from the police force, the horses were often given to the Oaklands Hunt Club. Jack, himself a trainer of trotters, was at home with horse handling and well suited to these extra duties.

At 85 years old, Jack still keeps a horse or two on his property to the west of town where he lives in rural peace with Carmen, his wife of 53 years.

## in my garden

I am not a proper gardener, some would think, because I did not plan my garden on a piece of paper, before I turned the first sod and planted the first of many, many plants – too numerous to number. The plan for my garden, if it existed at all, was and is in my mind's eye only. That does not infer that my garden has evolved without thought but rather it has emerged from how the garden has needed to work for me.

My very first plantings were several punnets of red petunias placed close to the house. We moved into the house on a green-field site just before Christmas and I planted to petunias as a gesture of Christmas cheer. And so it goes, the garden has arisen as the need presented.

The lawn was an early consideration: grandchildren needed somewhere to run and play particularly during warm weather. An area big enough to accommodate the Christmas Day cricket game was required. Paths around the full extent of the garden winding through thickets and garden woodland were required to facilitate hide and seek, as well as barrow access to all areas.

The placement of the chook pen was another 'no brainer': I wanted it as far away from the house as possible, and did not it want it seen from the street. I needed to ensure that the pen was protected from extreme weather and had shade in summer, and it needed an all weather path from the house to the pen to facilitate easily delivery for chook food and kitchen scraps and the collection of eggs. It also needed to be near water to permit easy filling of the water container. I found a corner of the garden that fitted the need – no need for any more planning than that. Better to save the energy and just get cracking on with bringing it to fruition.

My garden is constantly in a state of evolution. Early garden bed plantings need refinement over time just as other aspects of the garden may need to be changed as the garden matures. It seems to me that evolution and formal planning are mutually exclusive concepts. Formal planning infers stasis, while most gardens are the very opposite and are very dynamic entities.

I find that winter is the best time for evaluating the basic structure of my garden, as the deciduous trees have all but disappeared to reveal what I regard as the basic structure, whereas late spring is the best time to evaluate the garden as a whole. Having said that, evaluation, for me, is an ongoing process – not merely an activity undertaken twice a year. I am constantly evaluating the garden and constantly changing the garden in both big and small ways.

Evaluation is a mental process that occurs as I walk around the garden and cast an eye over the garden from different perspectives. If an area of the garden is not pleasing to my eye, or is not working in some other desired way, then something needs to change. Usually this means the removal of plants that fail to meet expectations and replacing them with something better. Alternatively, it may mean the extension of a path or the creation of a new one; the relocation of a bird bath; rearranging a collection of potted plants; and so on. This process is the garden in evolution. I fail to see how a garden plan would aid this continuous improvement process.

Perhaps if I had a talent for art I would think differently and enjoy the process of putting my garden dream on paper before turning the first sod. I can also see the merit in formal garden planning if you intend to get someone else to bring your dreams to reality, or when a professional landscaper is designing a garden for someone else. For me, however, it is just a waste of time, a delaying activity preventing me from the real work and joy of gardening.

#### **Dealing with Anxiety**

Did you know that anxiety disorders are highly prevalent in our community affecting more than 14% of our population (Australian Bureau of Statistics).

The range of anxiety disorders include, generalised anxiety, panic, obsessive compulsive, post traumatic stress disorders, as well as phobias. They cause individual's considerable psychological distress resulting in problems with their relationships and social functioning. The basis of anxiety is worrying about potential threat or danger and losing confidence about coping.

The symptoms of anxiety can be, edginess, sweating, heart palpitations, nausea, breathlessness, dizziness, thoughts of terror, panic, self inadequacy, doom, failure, fear of dying, losing control or going crazy. These symptoms are extremely distressing and people find themselves taking desperate measures in order to stop the anguish. Unfortunately, if left untreated the anxiety will continue to reoccur whenever there is exposure to a potential threat. It is likely to become much worse over time and may even trigger the onset of physical illness, depression or other mental health conditions.

Fortunately anxiety disorders can be successfully treated so there is no need to live with it or have it control your life. The following treatment options are known to be very effective;

- *Self help books*, check out the local library for books on anxiety treatment. A popular book is "Living with IT" by Bev Aisbett.
- Step by step *graded exposure* to fearful situations, facing the fear in very small steps works well with phobias, obsessions and panic disorders. Imagine gradually overcoming the fear of flying and the first step might be to look at a photo of a plane, the next might be listening to a tape of a plane and gradually step by step reach the point of being able to board the plane. An experienced therapist trained in graded exposure treatment can assist you.
- *Breathing and relaxation exercises* are essential for managing any anxiety disorder. Practising these exercises when in a calm state initially enables them to be applied when in an anxious state. Just like breathing during childbirth, breathing when feeling anxious is extremely helpful.
- *Thinking better by* learning how to challenge the unhelpful negative thoughts associated with anxiety and replacing them with more balanced and helpful thoughts will help you to establish better control.
- *Medications* can be useful and it is worth discussing options with your doctor.
- *Counselling, group therapy or online* professional help is readily available and you can access free services as well as private therapists.

Jim passed away peacefully on June 26 at Ballarat Health Services, aged 71 years. At the funeral service at Doveton Park Funeral Centre his friends related stories about his interests in greyhound racing, motor bikes and the Collingwood Football Club. A huge bouquet of white roses adorned Jim's coffin which was accompanied by his motorbike helmet and Collingwood scarf.

Jim grew up at Berringa but had been working in Melbourne driving trucks. In May 1966 he came to Meredith to visit his friend, "Bill the Big Greek" who was working on the railway gang. His friend assured Jim that he could get him a job with the gang and Jim soon joined the team. They were replacing the rail line from Gheringhap to Dunnstown.

Jim told stories about how the camp was pretty wild, that the men were rough and tough and that grog and tucker ruled! The men camped in railway carriages that were decked out as living quarters which slept four (in single beds) and were complete with a kitchen, wood stove and dining facilities – and there were even chooks in the back yard. The carriages were situated on the west of the line opposite the Meredith Railway Station.

In the team there were many new Australians, Italian market gardeners, a few Aussies and two men who had "drunk their farms'. After an episode with men and guns, Jim borrowed a small caravan and lived in it on the other side of the line near the Railway Station. Jim drove a truck and went along the line cutting the rails in half with an oxy torch so they could be hand winched onto the railway trucks and carted to Melbourne.

Jim met Joyce Lowne at social table tennis in the Meredith Hall. Romance blossomed and Jim soon became part of the Meredith community. He was proud of his two tone blue, big Chev; often taking friends to dances and to the drive-in. Jim and Joyce married in 1970 and made their home in Staughton Street. Joyce worked for many years at the Royal Hotel for Jed and Deb Barrett. When Jim changed to a job in Ballarat they moved to Humffray Street in Brown Hill. Joyce died in1988. Jim and Joyce are survived by their three children: Gordon, Timothy and Verona.

#### **Citizen Science**

Citizen science is a subject that is appearing more and more in media and scientific publications, but what is it? Citizen science is scientific research conducted, in whole or part, by amateur or non-professional scientists. Citizen science is sometimes called "public participation in scientific research". Before you get too excited, this doesn't mean you can rock up to the nearest laboratory and ask to borrow a lab coat and get your hands dirty (but it would be fun!). Citizen science tends to be most useful in disciplines which require good powers of observation. Amateur astronomers have been proving this for centuries, but recent interest has been in monitoring flora, fauna and other things important to the environment, farming and general human welfare.

Citizen science, however, is not a modern idea but an old one. The early pioneering scientists weren't paid to do their work but did it because they were interested. Mind you, it was usually people of wealth who had the time and money to spend, but they were intelligent, educated and keen, so real progress was made without having to apply for government grants. The paid professional scientist has only become typical in the last century and a bit, so citizen science is really a return to the roots of science: people doing science in their own time because they want to!

One of the major research programs to rely on an army of volunteers is the Atlas of Australian Birds

(http://www.birdata.com.au/about\_atlas.vm). Over 7000 volunteers have contributed over 6 million bird sightings, allowing the distribution and abundance of most bird species to be accurately mapped and monitored. Some other useful, interesting and fun programs are:

Fungimap, recording sightings of fungi (http://fungimap.org.au/) Waterwatch, investigating small freshwater animals and measuring chemical and physical properties of waterways (http://www.vic.waterwatch.org.au/)

Reef Watch, monitoring marine life

(http://www.reefwatchvic.asn.au/Home.htm)

- Feralscan, recording sightings of a wide range of feral animals (http://www.feralscan.org.au/)
- BowerBird, for recording photos and sightings of all sorts of flora and fauna (http://bowerbird.org.au/).

The development of apps to allow recording of photos, sightings and observations in the field with hassle free transfer of data to an online site means that citizen science doesn't necessarily involve a lot of paperwork.

If you're interested in a particular subject or type of flora or fauna, there's bound to be a group or online community for you. Other generalist groups such as the Field Naturalists have clubs in locations such as Geelong

(http://home.vicnet.net.au/~gfnc/) and Ballarat (http://fieldnatballarat.wordpress.com/). What are you waiting for? Get out there and have fun!

#### "Pushing Time Away, A Memoir, My Grandfather and the Tragedy of Jewish Vienna" by Peter Singer

In this book Peter Singer has explored the history of his grandparents and used it as a vehicle for him to examine the life he has chosen to live, the value of his own intellectual path, and to discover the influence of his grandparents on his own thoughts, and if there was something that bound them together.

Singer takes the reader with him as he walks around Vienna, meets with his grandfather's former students, gives a talk at his grandfather's former school and examines documents, photos and some of his grandfather's letters that he found in a relative's apartment in Melbourne

Peter Singer's grandfather, David Oppenheim, was a classical scholar whose passion was to look for "the secrets of the human heart" in the writings of Greek and Roman authors who lived two and a half thousand years ago. He was also an Austro-Hungarian army war veteran, a one time member of Sigmund Freud's Wednesday Group, a friend and supporter of Alfred Adler and played a minor role in the intellectual and cultural history of early twentieth century Vienna. David married Amalie because she understood him and she had "worth of character".

David and Amalie were distinguished not only by their intellectual gifts but also by their enlightened attitude to sexual difference.

They carried into their union the bourgeois German-Jewish values of the time, scholarship, hard work, good manners and social responsibility.

During WWII David and his wife Amalie were hounded out of Vienna by the Nazis and were sent to an overcrowded and half starved ghetto in Czechoslovakia.

There, David, ill and malnourished, separated from his family and friends, perished in obscurity in 1943.

The two daughters of David and Amalie left for Australia and England during WWII but David and Amalie procrastinated and then could not leave.

Singer wonders how his grandfather, a scholar of human behaviour so badly misread the signs of impending doom.

Singer reaches across time or "pushes time away" to prove his similarity to his progenitor who was man of principle and whose life was a testament to humanism and tolerance. He also reaches across time to ameliorate the injustice of innocent lives destroyed by a murderous ideology. What binds us pushes time away!

The book for discussion in August is "Tiger's Eye" by Inga Clendinnen.

## Lethbridge Airport upgrades with new funding

His dream was to fly and to own an airport. In 1991 Garry Baum bought a 200 acre sheep farm on the Midland Highway between Meredith and Lethbridge. Garry saw that the farm had air space, good contour for drainage, was a good shape for an airfield and was far enough out of Geelong but close enough in! He obtained a permit to fly and started with ultra light aircraft.

Every year since 1991 he has applied for permits to expand and to improve the airport, to build sheds, hangars and to alter the house etc.

The Geelong Sports Aviators who moved from Geelong and have about 100 members had clubrooms built for them, their planes were housed and they meet at the airport every weekend for a barbeque, weather permitting them to fly or not.

Garry tells that he is lucky to have his mates come to play each weekend.

His dream took a quantum leap on July 9, 2013 when the Victorian Minister for the Aviation Industry Gordon

Rich-Phillips announced that the Golden Plains Shire would receive a grant of approximately \$1,000,000 from the Regional Airports Fund for the upgrade of the Lethbridge airport

including a sealed surface for the main runway, a taxiway

complex, fuel facilities and a water hydrant installation for the use of fire fighting aircraft. The government are providing a replacement of the Geelong Airport, a base for Air Ambulance to land, refuel and deliver patients to road ambulances and a base for fire fighting aeroplanes and helicopters to land, refuel and to fill up with water quickly.

Garry tells that re zoning of the airport to a "special purpose zone" has allowed him to plan for a terminal building with café with an outside deck, an aviation shop, a tower for fire spotting and observations, in excess of 100 hangar sites, a motel, houses, also industrial sites for businesses associated with flying,

including upholstery in aeroplanes, painting aeroplanes, radio installations, maintenance of aeroplanes, charter aeroplanes and flying schools. At the moment there are two flying schools and about thirty Secondary Students are learning to fly through school based courses.

There have been few new airports established in the last thirty years and most small airports are owned by councils. It is

obvious that the government and council are keen to help a man who has a dream and a vision and who is prepared to work hard. To contribute to a facility that will service the area, that will create employment, interest and fits in with the plans for intensive agriculture in that area of the shire.

He would like people to come in and to have some fun. He wants to encourage young people to have a dream like he does and to follow their dream.

#### **Our Sally**

Picking up on the idea of a monthly feature on our pets, I have decided to introduce our 'Sally', a red and tan kelpie. She has been with us since the beginning of 1995, when she arrived as a cute seven or eight week old puppy. She was bred by Jane Stephens, the sire being her much loved working dog 'Muddy' and a local bitch of good breeding. There are a number of dogs on our side of the Leigh River who are all related across several generations. Getting back to 'Sal'.

Her first introduction in the family was to the new kitten 'Gypsy' - a simple "dog meet cat, cat meet dog". A quick smack and hiss from the cat cemented a lifelong love-hate relationship, the love all from Sally's side. Sadly, Gypsy succumbed to renal disease just prior to her 18th birthday but Sally lives on.

Sally went through all the motions of training and diligently managed to avoid retaining anything other than the most repetitive actions around the yards and pottering on behind a mob of sheep. I can't actually remember her ever really getting to grips with the technique of casting around the mob. But she was very good at stopping behind with a recalcitrant sheep, totally ignoring the rest of the mob and our ever desperate pleas to 'come behind'. But no! she just stayed with that sheep, glaring at it.

One of her less endearing habits was to get in a quick lick. I swear her tongue was three feet long. When doing lead practice as a pup, she constantly wanted to lick my hand, usually succeeding. I tried everything but finally admitted defeat when she licked all the 'Tabasco' sauce off my hand. Ho Hum!

Despite being a bitch, she was a big animal and prone to overweight, so she always seemed to be on a perpetual diet. I am sure she made up for any perceived loss of food by finding some morsel of festering, dead animal - sounds horrible! but no self respecting dog, let alone farm dog, would trot past something dead and not want to investigate. A problem with being a heavier dog was that as the years' passed she started to suffer stress fractures in the lower part of her front legs, mainly from jumping off the ute. She was still desperate to keep working, so we managed to 'do' our own backs lifting her on and off the ute each time.

She was an incredibly strong dog. When she was very young and still training, Pete, driving the ute would have her on a long lead, held out the window, following behind a mob. He swears she was capable of pulling the ute along, even up a slight slope. I think Sal would have preferred to live the life of a pampered pet, preferably in a household full of children.

All our dogs have wonderful natures, but Sally is by far the most gentle animal I have ever had the pleasure to be acquainted with. Never has she snapped or bitten and the only odd minor growl has been when we've had to remove something revolting before she eats it - she always relinquishes it very apologetically.

Sally was officially retired at the age of 16. She wanted to keep working (and I must say I use that word cautiously) but we felt it must have been far too painful for her. Now she spends her days asleep in the sun in the dog 'boudoir'. Occasionally we put her on the ute to take her for a drive around the sheep. Come late afternoon when it's dinnertime she comes to life and with a quick lick as she is let off her running chain, she waddles off to find something interesting around the garden, something she might possibly roll in.

I know that one day, I'll go out to let her off and she won't be able to get up or perhaps may have left us, to sit with a recalcitrant sheep in another world. I am dreading that day.

#### "Glenetive"

#### The ongoing story of the life of a district property *Marg cooper*

William {Bill} Dean and his wife Kathleen bought the property "Glenetive" about the end of WWII from Bob and Sheila Bailey. Philippa, grandaughter of Bill and Kathleen tells that their daughters Ida Mary, Fiona and Anne lived in the main house while their son Bill, his wife Francis and their daughters Dianna and Pam lived in the older weatherboard house. The attached two rooms were her grandfather's office. Philippa's father John Dean lived in Adelaide, never lived at "Glenetive" but he and his family spent a lot of time there on holidays. They had a cook whose husband was the handy man {Rona and Ray?}. They employed orphans from Geelong. {Philippa thinks they came from Geelong}. They used to take two boys who were already friends and taught them farming and then they found them jobs elsewhere when they were ready to move on. They ate all their meals in a little dining room off the kitchen with Rona and Ray. Several orphans stayed in touch with the family and one called Peter married Fiona Dean.

Bill Dean married Frances in August 1947. Frances tells that Glenetive was a well established sheep property when the Dean family bought it in 1946 from Bob and Sheila Bailey. The main house had been a wedding gift from Bob Bailey to Sheila. It was and I hope still is a very attractive and satisfactory home.

The property had been neglected during WWII and was overrun with rabbits. The Deans decided to fence the creeks to enable the paddocks to recover. This meant Bill was thoroughly occupied. About 1955 myxomatosis spread into the property and eliminated the rabbits. Initially the Dean family farmed sheep and the price of wool at that time was good. Bill started farming Poll Hereford cattle, being of the opinion that there was a need to diversify.

Arthur Elliot was the nearest neighbour. The access was difficult over the creeks and their best land was towards the Leigh River. Mr and Mrs Dean told their children that they would inherit Glenetive, until then they had to do all the work and there was plenty. They were paid a pittance-typical Australians of that time. Mrs Dean had splendid table wear, both china and silver and they could turn a splendid meal.

Francis was a doctor and attempted to do some doctoring but found it difficult between pregnancies and because doctors were expected to attend patients at night, which was quite impossible for her. She tells that she was very fond of Jill Bolte, that Jill was very public spirited and that she ran the Guides and Brownies, Church Fetes, Red Cross and organized the Blood Bank to visit Meredith to collect blood. She tells that it was exciting when Henry Bolte became Premier. Bill had been president of the Meredith Liberal Party and lots of campaigning had been done.

The Dean family sold "Glenetive" in 1956 and the family moved back to Adelaide.

#### **Treasure Time**

Many interesting and individual treasures were brought to the meeting on Sunday July 15 including old dolls, a christening robe that had been worn over 22 times and was made in an

Italian Nunnery over 100 years ago, a Black Horse beer bottle of 1855, a decorative tea caddy from England, a writing box that came from Scotland about 5 generations ago, a flat chain made by Mr Round that was used in mining, a leather box used to store men's collars and ties, a collection of marbles and a wooden spirit level ruler that was washed ashore after the ship WB Godfrey was wrecked near Lorne in 1891.

A hand bell that was rung at the start and end of each shearing run at Larundel started a discussion about other bells. The

Anglican and Uniting Churches have bells, the Morrison School bell was at Meredith State School and the Fire Brigade had a bell to ring to rally a crew to fight fires.

Gwenda Ball [Shell] brought an old photo of her family home in Meredith on the corner of Read and Staughton Streets.

She told that her mother whitewashed the fireplace every day when it had been used.

The best pipe clay came from Stow's bridge towards Morrison.

The clay was collected in a bucket, mixed to a paste with water and spread on the inside of the chimney with an old brush or rag. Once a year the built up layers of whitewash were levered off the chimney using a knife to lever the now thick layer off.

In summer she put a bucket of gum leaves in the fireplace to deter the flies from coming down the chimney.
