

All in all, the past few months in and around Meredith has seen a very small crime rate indeed. I would however like to bring readers attention to the following three crimes and I would be grateful for any information that anyone may have that may assist me in solving any of these thefts




On the 19th of February, 2013 a theft has occurred at the Meredith Recreation Reserve where a large section of white hose and a watering sprinkler has been stolen. The hose is described as being a Pastoral brand white coloured hose which is 25 millimetres in diameter and was 25 metres in length. The hose was valued at \$700. The sprinkler is described as being a galvanised metal free standing sprinkler 1 metre tall. It is so very disappointing to see thieves steal from a club in this manner where the club is there for our community.

On the 8th of February a concrete Buddah type statue was stolen from a private address in Staughton Street, Meredith. The statue was in the front yard of the address near the Meredith Hotel when stolen.

Between the 6th and the 12th of January, 2013 the victim in this matter had his tractor parked well inside a paddock on Deans Road, Meredith. Offenders have stolen a Super Cheap Auto battery from the tractor and left the gate open which contained stock.

On a really positive note with regard to traffic, it has been great to see no major accidents within the area over the Christmas and New Year period. I spend a large portion of my time patrolling the Midland highway and rarely detect vehicles speeding with the moving mode police radar. Again this year, police will be utilizing the Automated Number Plate Recognition Unit from Melbourne. This vehicle is used stationary and is able to detect various offences like unregistered vehicles, theft and outstanding warrants. And we have some photos of the final Meredith Blue Light Disco for 2012. Four lucky children took away a BMX bike each on the night and again we felt that the night was a great success for the kids of Meredith. I want to take this opportunity to thank the kids of Meredith who attend the discos for there terrific behaviour at the events and I encourage as many kids as possible to attend the next disco. Held last month, the second Meredith Main Street public consultation meeting was attended by 15 town and district residents. It was presented with a list of the options derived from earlier consultations and attendees were invited to vote for their four favoured projects. An approximate costing was then given to each project and a second vote cast, this time for first, second and third preferences. A similar process was offered to those who visited the project web site and will shape the draft master plan to be presented to Council early this month.

Subject to Council's response, the plan will be placed on exhibition for two weeks and a further two weeks allowed for a final public response before the master plan is finalised. Council is planning to make a substantial start on approved works by the end of June.

Dog Declared 'Dangerous'

A Berringa resident pleaded guilty in the Ballarat Magistrates' Court to a number of charges arising from a dog attack in August last year.

The most serious of the charges related to an incident when his German Shepherd dog bit a pedestrian and seriously injured her leg. Mayor, Cr Jenny Blake expressed her concern about the incident, stating dog attacks on pets, livestock and in particular people are unacceptable. "Council will investigate dog attacks and when necessary pursue irresponsible dog owners through the Courts," she stated.

"Residents need to be aware of the damage their dogs can cause when not securely confined or controlled. Penalties for the owner of a dog that attacks include fines of up to \$5,634, destruction of the dog and in serious instances involving Dangerous, Menacing or Restricted Breed dogs, may also include a prison sentence," she explained.

As most dog attacks in Golden Plains Shire occur when dogs are wandering at large, Council officers will be issuing fines to owners who fail to keep their dog securely confined as part of a program aimed at reducing the number of dog attacks in Golden Plains Shire.

In her sentencing remarks, the Magistrate stated that she needed to send a message to the community that owning a dog carries significant responsibility. She convicted and fined the dog owner \$1000 and made an order for \$71.40 in costs.

The Council has declared the dog to be "dangerous" meaning the dog must now be kept in accordance with restrictive legislative requirements aimed at improving public safety.

From the Afghan Front

Jim Baker (Meredith's Correspondent in Afghanistan)

My name is Jim Baker, husband of Geraldine and we live in Meredith. I am saying G'day to you from the wilds of Afghanistan. Well, where do I start? I guess from the beginning.

In June 2011 I was approached by an old friend who asked if I would consider working in Afghanistan {AFG} with the company he was working for. The position would be General Manager of Kandahar Airfield {KAF} fuel storage and distribution facilities.

KAF is the largest NATO forces base in the AFG theatre of operations and is the busiest single runway airfield in the world. Most of the air traffic here is, of course, military with a sprinkling of civilian just to give us a sense of being in the real world.

My team consists of people from nations all over the world, in total 460. I manage and they operate a number of bulk fuel installations, refueling operations and a Forward Aircraft Refuelling Point (hot refuelling of combat aircraft).

AFG is a landlocked country and the logistics train we utilize is huge and diverse. It has to be, in order to keep up the flow of essential supplies and materials to not only the military and their support elements but relief to the Afghan population as well.

We (Supreme) totally support the Afghanistan National Rugby Union and Cricket teams. They are still fledgling teams but improve with every game.

Christmas in KAF was as good as we can make it. Decorations in and outside every office, Christmas trees and music playing really lifted our spirits. Christmas Eve, we had carols by candle light (torch light) under the stars, then we attended an all denomination midnight service.

It was very emotional as you realized you were not with your family, but as the Padre got into it you were soon singing along and offering prayers with your adopted family all around you.

It suddenly dawned on me that the magnificent stars we were under were the same stars that shone over the little town where it all began and as the crow flies not too far from where we were standing. A very enlightening and calming experience!

On Christmas day we all greeted each other with the usual greetings and small gifts. Then it was time to go to work, just another normal day.

That evening all of the staff assembled in the mess and we, the managers, served them their Christmas dinner and handed out gifts to each and every one of those fine young men and ladies. A visit from Santa Claus was the highlight of the evening. It all went extremely well and everyone departed in high spirits, singing could be heard coming from all of the buses transporting our folks back to their

barracks.

We welcomed the New Year with a toast and some non alcoholic wine and beer {worst drink I have ever tasted}. We then closed out with a very emotional rendition of "Auld land Syne". To add a down under flavour, another Aussie and I and a Kiwi sang "Waltzing Matilda". We started very slow and haunting and then got fast and happy. Then off to bed for some sleep as the next day as all days here was just another work day in an area of conflict and all that goes with that.

I talk to my darling wife daily and those talks keep me sane. I will be home in March for awhile so if you see me in the pub say Hi!





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
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

Jeremy had his first joy flight in Queensland as a 14 year old.

He enjoyed it so much that a week later he went back for his first flying lesson and got his license and flew his first solo flight when he was 16 years old.

Jeremy has logged about 6000 hours in the air. His strong passion is for performing aerobatics. He wears a fire resistant suit, a light weight aerobatic helmet with a visor and gloves. At Ballarat Air Show to start his display he flew to about 10,000 feet and then to everyone's amazement he did 19 spins.

Jodie tells that he performs unique

maneuvers such as "hesitation stall turns, shoulder rolls and an outside barrel roll. Jodie is excited that students that she is instructing in Certificate 4 Aviation at Geelong Secondary Schools were

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
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

The Death of a Loved One

When a loved one dies, family and friends initially rally together to comfort, support and soothe each other. Funerals often provide opportunities to reconnect with family members or rekindle long lost friendships. Unfortunately before too long everyone moves on and their daily life returns to normal. At this point you may feel that they have left you "*high and dry*" as you continue to struggle with the agonising pain and try to adapt to life without your loved one.

I often see bereaved people a few months after the death of their loved one and they have sought help because they are still hurting, crying, suffering from insomnia and do not want to leave their house. Many come with an expectation that they should be feeling better and I am amazed when they tell me that their family and friends have told them to "get on with life". If only it were so simple!

What I know about grief and bereavement is that there are no timelines or rules! We all deal with it differently in our own unique way. We all take our own time to manage and cope with living again.

The following aspects about bereavement maybe helpful;

- Take your time and do not be in a hurry to get over it quickly
- Tears are very healing, do not suppress them. Every tear shed honours the relationship you had with your loved one
- The pain you feel will be emotionally and physically exhausting, much rest is needed. It is perfectly OK to spend the days on end at home, reading or watching dvds. You will resurface eventually, when you are ready.
- Accept help from others and more importantly ask for help. Do not make the mistake of thinking that people do not care if they do not ring you or visit regularly. They will most likely think you are doing OK unless you tell them differently
- Be honest with people about how you are managing. You are a human being with feelings and it is perfectly fine to express yourself to others. If someone suggests that you should get on with life and you do not feel ready yet then tell them you need more time
- Communicate anyway you can with your

loved one. Some people find it comforting to talk to a photo, some prefer to write letters and others converse at the dinner table. It is extremely healthy to talk out loud, scream, cry, ask advice, or simply state that you wish they were here

• Talk with others you know who may have lost a loved one, they will surprise you with how much they understand what you are experiencing. Likewise seeking professional help from a trained Grief and Bereavement counsellor can help too.

The pain will be intense and weigh heavily on your heart. Some say that the pain never goes away but the weight you bear gets lighter as you manage over time to adapt and find yourself living again rather than just existing.





in my garden

Monthly musings from the happy gardener

It will not be news to anyone who loves gardening that gardening is both an art and a science. It is also just plain hard yakka at times, especially when day after day brings only hot, dry conditions. Anything that might be remotely considered the art or science of gardening gives way to long, potentially mindless hours on the end of a hose, in the vain attempt to maintain a level of moisture in the ground that supports plant life. February in my garden has seen little or no activity which could be classified as artistic but I have found that watering the garden provides ample opportunity for thinking: for scrutinising the health or otherwise of each plant, for planning future garden activity and evaluating what has been done in the past.


During this lengthy hot, dry spell my thoughts returned repeatedly to the creation of a new shady retreat: specifically, a comfortable garden seat placed in the cool shade of a weeping willow (Salix babylonica) that would grow beside the duck pond. I had become committed to the idea and tried to source an advanced weeping willow, unsuccessfully. It had become evident that weeping willows are not only unfashionable but are regarded as some type of environmental hazard. Further, it was suggested that if I were to plant a weeping willow I might even be an environmental vandal, and a thoughtless and reckless neighbour.

Not easily put off, I thought further about this new state of affairs: surely there must be some circumstances where a weeping willow can grow in harmony with the environment and the neighbours. Research via the internet and resource books revealed that responsible plant ownership was what was required. Since weeping willows love water, my willow will not be planted near any septic tanks or drainage pipes, and the duck pond will provide all the water a willow could want. It is to be noted that weeping willows live, on average, for about 30 years so with a little bit of luck I will be able to keep it in check to its end.

Happily, while watering, I was able to think through the issue until resolved in my mind. Just as soon as the hot dry weather gives way to cooler autumn weather the search for a vigorous young weeping willow specimen will continue or it will be down to the local creek to take a few cuttings to propagate my own.

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"Nine Parts of Desire" by Geraldine Brooks

Geraldine Brooks spent six years, from 1987 as a foreign correspondent covering the Middle East through wars, insurrections and the volcanic upheaval of resurgent fundamentalism. Her husband left his job to accompany her as a freelancer, a situation that frequently amazed the women she spoke to for the book.

Brooks had difficulties obtaining stories as men were not used to being approached by a lone woman but then she realized that she had the opportunity to tell a story that was closed to most reporters: the story of Islamic women of the region.

The headline events were only the backdrop to a less obvious but more enduring drama; the daily life of Muslin women. She got to know many women, observed a revival of strictly observed Islam and tried to work out what was driving the revival. The book is her account of this experience.

Sahar had been the Wall Street Journal's bureau assistant in Cairo in stiletto heels with poise and sophistication. She



now worked at the next desk to Geraldine in her Nileside apartment and had opted, in Egypt's tormenting heat, to wear the Islamic dress hijab. This signified her acceptance of a legal code that valued her testimony at half the worth of a man's, an inheritance system that allotted her half the legacy of her brother, a future domestic life in which her husband could beat her if she disobeyed him, oblige her to share his attentions with three more wives, and accept that he may divorce her at a whim and get absolute custody of the children.

Geraldine Brooks studies the life of the Prophet and the teachings of the Koran, which she found at odds with the strict dress code, female genital mutilations, honour killings and polygamy in the many countries of the Middle East. Her story encompasses leaders like Ayatollah Khomeini and of the Shah and his Queens.

She writes frankly and emotively without being sensationalist. It is a powerful and enlightening book that illustrates how Islam's holiest texts have been misused to justify repression of women and how male pride and power have warped the original message of a once liberating faith.

The book for discussion at the next book club meeting is "The Book Thief" by Markus Zusak. The club meets on the third Thursday of each month to discuss a book that we select, but supplied by the Council of Adult Education. Discussions are lively, interesting and friendly. New members will be made most welcome!



Brian Hangs up the Handpiece



Brian (Barney) Dunne, who is hanging up his shears, says the time has gone awfully quickly and sometimes it only feels like yesterday that he started in the sheds. It is 50 years! He left school in 1962 to work on the family farm.

The next two years he worked in a few sheds as a roustabout but he didn't like that much. He wanted to shearer like his father and started shearing in 1965 and shore his first 100 at Larundel that year.

The Meredith and Elaine districts were the home of shearers in those days. Some famous local shearers were Ron, Basil and Cam Musgrove, Keith Taylor, Norm, Brian and Daryl Lewis, Tim and Barry Wells, Tojo and Ron Hearn, Jeff Cooper, Dodger Connell, Don Sellars, John (Jacko) McColl, Laurie Paulden, John and Kevin Parkinson, Eric Miller, Jim Ryan, John Morrison, John and David Mohr, Joe, Tom and Kevin (Sticks) O'Brien, Norm Smith, John and James (Willie) Nolan and Ricky Sergent.

Brian shore his first 200 at Max Le Maitres with Barry Wells. Brian shore 217 for the day and he thinks Barry shore 237. Barry encouraged him and told him to relax and



to not get too nervous! Brian was nonetheless proud of that achievement.

He shore at about 100 different sheds over the years including shearing for Robert Bowers and for Kevin Ryan for over 40 years, at Chestervale for over 16 years, at

> Larundel, Narmbool, Glenspean, Moreep, Gurra, Emily Park, Barries and for Spielvogels for over 20 years.

> Jack Rankin had the toughest sheep to shear. He had northern merinos that cut a lot of wool but when the wool got wet it went green and blue and got tough to shear. It was hard to shear 100 and no one ever shore 200 there but Jack was a great bloke to work with.

> The Spielvogel family had the first sheep with wool down to 12 microns.

Brian shore with three generations of the Conroy family. At one shed the owners dog ate his lunch and he was the first shearer to get a meal at the homestead.

Barney remembers getting blamed for shearing a prize dog that later died of cold but he wasn't guilty. You didn't get paid for shearing a dog! It was better to shear a sheep! When he started shearers were paid 18 cents per sheep.

Jock Le Maitre, Pat Ryan and Terry Innes were top roustabouts in those early days.

Brian only cut his finger once and tells that the simple harness made a huge difference to the stress on the shearers body. He wonders why he didn't think of that invention!

He has met heaps of people and has enjoyed the companionship in the sheds. Brian believes that shearers today are better because they have been trained to shear by instructors. He had to teach himself!

Now he has retired from shearing he intends to grow a bit more wool and more fat lambs. He says he can still shear 200 - but now it takes him two days!

SOME HISTORY

One of the earliest recorded fires in this district was documented in the Melbourne Argus in December 1888, where fire had broken out on Native Hut Creek station, (*now Adrian Mohr's property*) just south of the Meredith township. At this time Mr. Robert A. Molesworth occupied this property. Gale force northerly winds carried the fire south, until it reached the railway line which served as a good firebreak. Unfortunately the wind then moved round to the south and forced the fire towards the Meredith - Cargarie Road. Mr. Milne, the station manger had to be rescued. It was reported that the damage had also affected the property's of Messrs Armstrong, Deans and Grant.



The Meredith Rural Fire Brigade has been awarded a Government grant which has allowed the Brigade to purchase a brand new 3.4C Heavy tanker (as seen above) which will replace our current Brigade owned Small Tanker.

Thanks to the hard work by all our volunteer brigade members we were able to raise in excess of \$65,000 to meet our share of the cost. The new tanker is meant to be here later in the year and we all look forward to the new appliance adding the Brigade's capability at all incidents we attend.

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
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
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


This 41mm seasonal deficit now puts our rainfall over the last 12 months at 89% of the long term average.

Annual Meeting

On February 23 the Annual Meeting was held in the shearing shed of John and Mary Nolan at Cargerie. Marg Cooper was re-elected President, Peter Griffiths was re-elected Vice President and Fay McEarlane was re-

was re-elected Vice President and Fay McFarlane was re -elected Secretary Treasurer.

The President gave an account of the events held in 2012 and a healthy financial statement was presented by the Treasurer.

Most of the money on hand is already allocated for specific projects including the "Moranghurk" Soldier Settlement plaque and book and for purchasing stationery to record the history of every house, building and block of land in Meredith.

Members suggested that MHIG

- should GPS sites of historical significance,
- should record significant trees of the area,
- create a Web Site and
- try to interest young people.

The shed was an ideal setting for the meeting. It was large, cooled by fans and the breeze in the big north door and it suited the talk theme. Dale McIntyre spoke about his more than 20 years as a shearer in the Western District shearing in other countries including Canada and New Zealand. He then spent over 20 years as a Representative for the Sunbeam Company selling shearing gear.

During those years he developed a love and a lot of respect for the shearing industry, gathering a huge knowledge of shearers, sheds and shearing equipment and collecting handpieces, shearing tools and barbed wire! Unfortunately he has recently packed up his collection and it is about to be relocated. But he did display a modern handpiece cut in half to show the inside workings, magazines, historical photos and two small shearing machines. One of these machines was called the "husband and wife machine", because the wife had to wind the handle while the husband shore! Dale suggested that they wouldn't be married for long!

Dale's talk covered air operated handpieces that tended to freeze rather than get hot like modern electric handpieces, the first shearing machine invented by Frederick Wolseley of Walgett, NSW. Patented in 1877, it revolutionized the shearing industry. He mentioned there used to be more than 50 companies in Australia that made shearing equipment and now most of it comes from China. He remembered as about the best shearers he had seen, the four Griffiths brothers who, in a shed in NSW, shore over 300 sheep each per day for a week.

Dale finished his talk by relating that the shearing industry is a great industry with a great history and is part of Australian folk lore. Unfortunately, a lot of shearers work hard for years and end up with a bad back and no money because they have drank and gambled it away.



Who Lived in My House?

Glenetive - a Story in Parts

The Geelong wool sales opened on Friday, before a crowded attendance of English, Continental, American and colonial buyers... the highest price of the season, viz., 16¹/₄d,... was paid for Glenetive (Bamganie), a very light-conditioned, shafty merino.

The Horsham Times 24 October 1899

Mr. W. J. M'Coll, of Messrs. M'Coll Brothers, "Glenetive," Bamganie, Victoria, writes as follows:- The ram which we purchased at Springfield last February won first and champion at Royal Show, Melbourne, and also first and champion at Geelong Show, beating the fine-wool western district rams. "Dalgety's Review," reporting the last Geelong and Western District A. and H. Society of Victoria's show, says:--"The sheep were very first class. Practically all the best western district breeders were represented, and the competition was of the keenest. Messrs. M'Coll Brothers took the championship for merino... *Australian Town and Country Journal 2 November 1904*

MARRIAGE: McCOLL—JOHNSTON.— On the 11th January, at Lindesfern, Morrison, William J., fifth son of the late Hugh McColl, of Glenetive, Bamganie, to Adelaide, second daughter of Charles Johnston Esq., Lindesfern, Morrison.

The Argus 14 January 1905

Glenetive Station of 2,200 acres near Meredith (V.), ... has been sold by Mr. A. D. Vanrenen ... to Mr. A. R. Bailey, son of the late Mr. N. Bailey, of Terrinallum Station. Delivery with all stock and plant will be given at the end of the month. The Glenetive sheep, of Avoca Forest blood, form one of the best flocks of small merino sheep in Victoria. Their wool averaged 22.1d per lb at Geelong this season.

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...& "Glenetive" the Story so Far Marg Cooper

Hugh McColl came to Australia from Scotland in the ship "Abdalla" in July 1853. It is told that he intended to go to the goldfields and seek his fortune.

When he discovered the huge cost of having his goods taken to the goldfields he purchased a horse and dray and he became a carrier. His wife Mary {Kincaid} and 4 children, Janet 8 years, John 6 years, Duncan 4 years and

Mary 2 years came to Australia in the barque "Cairngorm" in July 1854. He settled at Native Hut Creek and later bought land from selectors and put together a property at Bamganie that he called "Glenetive". named after where they came from in Scotland. They had 4 more children born i n Australia, Malcolm. Robert. William and Donald. Hugh McColl died September on 2. 1896 and

at "Glenetive".



parents Robert and Isabella McColl (Grant) until he was 12 years old in 1920. He attended Bamganie State School. His father bought "Braeside" on Deans Road and the family moved there in 1922.

Max Cooper recalls his father Bill Cooper worked as a farmhand and his mother Hannah Henderson did house duties at "Glenetive" for Vanrenens in the late 1920's. It was only a short distance for his mother to travel to work from the Henderson home "Leighview". Bill and Hannah married in October 1931 while working there but the farm

changed ownership soon after.

"In July 1930 Mr and Mrs A.D. Vanrenen of "Glenetive" near Geelong holidayed in Mt Gambier and attended the Hunt at Suttontown."

The Argus newspaper reported on April 18, 1934 that Mr A.D. Vanrenens sold 2,200 acres with all stock and plant to Mr A.R. Bailey son of the late Mr N. Bailey of "Terrinallum" Station.

"Glenetive" The sheep were of Avoca Forest blood and were described as one of the best flocks of merino

Mary The old house at Glenetive was lived in by McColls and Vanrenens before the McColl died in 1900 new house was built in the 1930's

The will of Hugh McColl tells that he owned a number of allotments of land, that he leased some allotments from the Crown, the land was fenced with post and rail, he had a 7 room dwelling with a detached kitchen and bedroom, a woolshed, stable and other outbuildings.

The newspapers in the early 1900's report that McColl Bros of "Glenetive' sold wool, sheep and that William McColl, 5th son of the late Hugh McColl of "Glenetive" became engaged to Adelaide Johnston of "Lindesfern".


Keith McColl told that he lived at "Glenetive" with his

sheep in Victoria.

Mr Vanrenen's father was the first to breed remounts in Victoria for the Indian Army.

When Robert Anderson Bailey married Sheila Mitchell Bellair in 1939, they named a race horse August 12their wedding date. Locals suggest that it should have been called April 1 because it ran so slow!

The property was then sold to Mr and Mrs Dean who came from South Australia. They had children, Ann, Bill and



Fiona. Their son Bill was described as a big gentleman with a roundish face and reddish complexion. His wife Francis was a doctor and she drove to attend patients around the Meredith district.

Rod McKenzie then bought "Glenetive". Two of his boys travelled to Meredith State School on the bus in 1961 and 1962.

Barry Shaw tells that Rod McKenzie was responsible to sowing the paddocks with phalaris that still grows well at "Glenetive".

Jack Connell recalls Rod McKenzie dealt in sheep and Jack remembers going to Gundagai for a load of sheep for Rod when Jack was driving for Bill Wiseman.

Len Crowe and his family came to "Glenetive" from Goroke about 1963. Ambrose and Austin Crowe played football for Meredith in 1965 and 1966. The Crowe family decorated a tree guard in Wilson Street with 9 crows. They retired to Clifton Springs. Brian Corridas leased "Glenetive" from Crowes and at the same time he leased "Paringa".

Barry Shaw bought a block of 250 acres from Doug Lamond in 1968 and in 1978, "Glenetive" consisting of the house and sheds on 370 acres. Over the years Barry bought other blocks nearby to add to his property. After many years in the district Barry and Henretta sold the property in January 2013.

The 1973 winning team consisted of Marj and Daryl Bayard from Morrison, Ron Slocombe and Billy Maher from Bungal, Derlene Le Maitre from Elaine, Diane Henderson and Joyce Stanley and Jeff Cooper from Meredith.

Joyce Stanley remembers that they played nine game sets, played against teams from country districts including Mt Prospect, Mininera, Bannockburn, Buninyong, Cressy and Waubra and that competition was keen.

She played 1st ladies with Marj Bayard and 2nd mixed with Billy Maher.

She also remembers the excitement, the exhaustion, the sunburn, the sore feet, blistered hands and the friendship. The win was celebrated at the Eureka Hotel on the following Saturday night.

(Jeff Cooper became a father for the 3rd time on that Saturday night. - Happy 40th Birthday Paul!)

Joyce recalls she won her first Country week title 60 years ago when she was 18 years old. She played with Herb, Max and Girlie Le Maitre, Ted and Myrtle Randall, Theo (Sam) Irvine and Dot Bailey (Coghlan).

The team won the coveted "Chaplin Cup" because they won A Grade 3 years in a row. Joyce played in the 1952 and 1953 teams and Monda Kennedy had played in 1951.

She was nimble and agile, played well at the net, (and didn't let on that she was frightened there) had anticipation and was consistent.

She played mixed with Sam Irvine and tells that he was never beaten and that they won a lot of matches from behind.

What a record!
