# **Project Watch**

We have been monitoring three major Meredith projects announced by Council over the last 18 months and compiled this update based on information provided by the shire of Golden Plains.

#### Meredith Integrated Community Hub

We reported in our December issue that doubt hung over the federal government's commitment to funding for this project. Days after we went to print, this was dispelled with an announcement the coalition government would provide \$480,000 to complete the funding package necessary to bring this project to fruition. Since then, the Shire has advised tenders for architectural services are currently being evaluated with an appointment due to be made soon. Consultation is a key role of the brief and this will happen during Feb/March. Key stakeholders are in this project, according to the Shire, are:

• Learning Centre Committee & staff

- School Principal
- o Community members
- Program staff
- Service users
- DEECD

Tenders for construction will be called in June 2014 with work commencing in Aug 2014 with practical completion expected in March 2015.

#### **Meredith Streetscape**

This project was funded under the Victorian Government's Regional Growth Fund Consultation program and made \$450,000 available for streetscape After an intense round of public improvements. consultation nearly a year ago, a number of minor projects for Staughton St and the Midland Highway were exhibited. Golden Plains Shire is now saying detailed landscape design work will occur in early 2014 with residents having the opportunity to provide input into identifying preferred plant species, quantities and locations. #### **Meredith Interpretive Centre**

Well I must say that it has been an extremely busy start to the new year for both me and my Golden Plains police colleagues for 2014 with crime being committed in the area, fires, serious motor vehicle collisions and a variety of other jobs.

On or within a day of Saturday the 11<sup>th</sup> of January 2014 a colour bond garage located on a 150 acre property was broken into in Deans Road, Meredith. Offenders have entered the property on foot from Deans Road and accessed the building by smashing the lock on the personal access door.

Offenders stole a brand new Karcher brand pressure washer and a Stihl chain saw. If any one may have information or have seen unusual vehicles or activity on that day or Friday the 10<sup>th</sup> of January I would encourage them to contact me at Meredith Police Station on 52 861222. Please feel free to remain anonymous and to leave me a detailed phone message if I am not on duty.

On Saturday the 11<sup>th</sup> January we unfortunately saw what can only be described as a horrific but avoidable accident in Eclipse Road, Meredith. A 10 year old girl was very seriously injured and air lifted as a result of the accident which is under investigation by detectives from the Major Collision Investigation Unit at Brunswick.

On Tuesday the 14<sup>th</sup> of January the female driver of a small station wagon rolled her car on an un sealed section of Mount Mercer Road at the intersection with Arthurs Road. In the car were 2 very young children and another male. Amazingly none of the occupants sustained injuries.

On Thursday the 9<sup>th</sup> of January, I again utilised the Automated Number Plate Recognition Vehicle from Melbourne with assistance from the Moorabool Highway Patrol. It was so pleasing to see that there were only a very small number of vehicles detected committing offences with over 1000 vehicles checked. I anticipate that more of these days will be run throughout 2014.

# Lightning Strikes Spark Beginning of Fire Season:

On the evening of 15th January 2014, Meredith and surrounding districts experienced a high volume of lightning strikes. Several of these strikes caused a large number of fires which kept Meredith, Elaine, Morrisons, Mt Wallace and various other brigades extremely busy over the following 24Hours.

The first fire reported was at approximately 3:30pm on the corner of Cameron Rd/Meredith – Mt Mercer Rd, but thankfully a light shower of rain followed the lightning which halted the spread of the fire. Responding tankers mopped up the smouldering edges and the fire was deemed safe a short time later.

Around 9pm another large storm front passed through the area which sparked what was to be an extremely busy few hours for our brigade. Several reports came through at the same time of fires along Shelford Rd, another on Davies Rd and one on Green Tent Rd. Thankfully a heavy shower of rain followed through the area just after the fires were reported so again, the spread was minimal.

Just when our tankers were back in the shed at approximately 10:30pm, a call came through of a fire in a Pine Plantation, Morrisons. Meredith Tankers responded, along with Robert Cook and his private tanker, to what would become a long night fighting fires. Once the tankers found where the fire was (given its isolated location) crews from Meredith, Morrisons, Elaine, Mt Wallace and Mt Edgerton fought hard to contain the spread of the fire to a track well overgrown in the middle of a dense pine plantation. A fantastic job by each and every member on scene.

The next morning, Meredith Fire Brigade was on alert knowing that there was certain to be undetected strikes from the night before. As expected, at around 11am Meredith responded to a report of smoke showing from behind a property on Slate Quarry Rd, Meredith. Lightning had struck on a ridge above the Moorabool River behind properties and was spreading into light bushland. Tankers from Meredith, Elaine, Morrisons, Mt Wallace, Maude, Lethbridge and Bannockburn were quick to stop the spread of this fire and a short time later it was deemed safe.

As the tankers were returning a call came in of smoke showing from the Brisbane Ranges, at the same time Meredith received a call to a fire spreading towards Pioneer Ridge from Coopers Bridge on the Meredith -Steiglitz Rd. Upon arrival a call was made for multiple tankers and thanks to the quick actions from a private unit and the Meredith, Elaine & Morrisons Tankers a small holiday house was saved from being razed by the spreading fire. The fire took a lot of hard work to contain and black out. Other tankers attended from Maude, Lethbridge, Ballan, Mt Wallace, Buninyong and several other neighbouring brigades. As the fire was controlled tankers were sent to Anakie where there was a fast moving bushfire that caused Evacuation and Warning alerts to be issued to townships in its path. The Coopers Bridge fire was deemed safe at approximately 4pm.

Sometime between 3:30 and 4pm Meredith again responded to a call of fire rapidly spreading on Slate Quarry Rd. Thankfully, with the assistance of a Helicopter and the response of both private units and CFA Tankers,

the fire was quickly halted. A bulldozer put a containment line in around the edge of the fire which gave crews a good chance to get in and around the whole fire's edge. Again tankers attended from Meredith, Elaine, Morrisons, Mt Wallace, Lethbridge, Maude and Bannockburn.

The weather was forecast to get a lot worse on the 17th, so the members of the Meredith Fire Brigade manned the station to allow for a faster response should we have received a call.

A call came in of smoke showing at 7:30am along the Meredith-Ballan Rd just north of the township. Thankfully, it was a false alarm as there were harvesting contractors working in the area, throwing up a lot of dust.

At 5:30pm, Meredith received a fire call along Coopers Rd, Bamganie for smoke showing in the area. Again it was a false alarm.

Meredith received some 17 calls over this period which is around our average for the whole year.

All the members of Meredith, Elaine, Morrisons and surrounding communities should be extremely proud and thankful to have such dedicated fire fighters who are willing to give up time from their families, farms or work to serve and protect our community when emergencies arise. I am extremely proud of each and every member of the Meredith Rural Fire Brigade and to lead such a dedicated and competent group of people. I also extend my thanks to the families of all my members. Without your support our brigade would not survive.

#### Vale Neil George Hart

Neil was born on December 8, 1933 at Carlton and was the first child of George and Lorna Hart of Malvern. He left school at 15 to take up a plumbing apprenticeship and attended night school at Caulfield Tech, completing his Junior Technical Certificate.



As a youngster, he always had a strong interest in ballroom dancing and at age 15, he and his sister Elaine became dance instructors at Harvey's Dancing Academy in Oakleigh.

He married Pauline in the early 1950's and they had a daughter Dianne. After the marriage ended he lost contact with Dianne for nearly 32 years. In 1985 they reunited and Neil met her husband and their 6 children.

In 1957 he travelled to the Wimmera to help build a house. He fell in love with the Wimmera and its people and decided to stay on. He met Phyllis Stehn at a local dance and she became his life long dance partner. They married in 1960 and relocated and renovated a house on the family's property at Minimay where they lived until 1974. During this time they had 3 delightful children and some of the happiest times of their lives.

During this time he converted from being a plumber to being a farmer, learning how to shear, obtained his wool classing certificate and embraced his new life on the land.

He played tennis, cricket and football at Minimay and was President of the Border Districts Football Club in 1972 and 1973.

In 1974 Neil and Phyllis made the tough decision to move the family to Meredith where they built a new home on a 90 acre property just out of town and Neil transformed from being a farmer to a builder.

Apart from kids' sport which occupied a fair amount of Neil's time, he played a little cricket and enjoyed playing golf. He held many executive positions at the Golf Club including being President for 2 years and he played a major role in the construction of the current club house. He was President of the Hall Committee, a School Councillor, was actively involved in the Catholic Church and the Bannockburn Lions Club.

In later life he developed a passion for lawn bowls, playing at Bannockburn Bowls Club where he was President for 2 years and later at Geelong Cement Bowls. He loved being involved in the local community, was always willing to put his hand up to help out where required and was good at organising social functions.

The last function he organised was a Deb Ball for seniors where Phyllis finally made her own debut after they had trained 25 deb sets together.

Neil and Phyllis retired to Geelong in 1997. When Phyllis's health took a turn for the worse in 2005 Neil devoted himself to her care until she died in 2007. Neil had his own health issues over the last 30 years but continued to follow the sporting endeavours of his family, have a beer, a laugh and enjoying being with his family and friends.

He died on January 13 and a Funeral Mass was held at the Holy Spirit Catholic Church, Manifold Heights on January 22.

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# in my garden

There is nothing like a spot of extreme weather to bring out the extreme in this usually well balanced (mentally - my assessment of course) and happy gardener. While rational and well adjusted people are carefully ensuring their own health and well being during an extreme heat event as advised by authorities, the obsessed and irrational gardener becomes focussed on the health and wellbeing of their garden. Of course, the wellbeing of this gardener is intricately tied to the wellbeing of the garden: this gardener cannot possibly hope to achieve a sense of wellbeing in the absence of a healthy and resilient garden. So looking after self has its foundation in looking after the garden.

Fortunately, these days we have a weather bureau that has lifted its game considerably and provides reliable weather warnings. This allows the obsessed gardener time to prepare a strategy to manage the garden under such conditions. Clearing the calendar and cancelling all events away from the home during the period of extreme weather is the first essential step. One must be available to the garden throughout to monitor and respond to any plant distress. Extreme heat, in my opinion, can only be mitigated by building and maintaining the resilience of the garden. Essentially this means providing water and shade in quantities that will keep plants well hydrated throughout. The entire garden needed watering daily and some parts of the garden twice or more times The greenhouse and potted plants are daily. especially vulnerable and received extra attention, as did the pumpkin patch. Although I have water in volumes that permit this, it is not easy to achieve because of the size of the garden, and it does require the obsessed gardener to spend considerable time outside in the heat attending to the various tasks involved in watering the garden: moving hoses to connect to poly pipe watering lines or sprinklers, and a significant amount of hand watering. I did wonder how our CFA men and women manage to fight fires under such conditions because it is not easy being out in the heat.

Providing additional shade is also challenging. I do have some shade cloth that I pull out for such times but this is supplemented with garden umbrellas and old sheets that are pegged to various structures erected around the plants that require additional protection. Although it is not a good look, and a visitor to my garden may very well think that I had hung the entire contents of my linen cupboard out in the garden, it is essential and effective. All hydrangeas and fuchsias receive this treatment.

The apricots ripened rapidly in the heat and these needed to be picked before the birds had eaten the entire crop. Obsessed gardeners are also often obsessed about using the produce from the garden and consequently there is pressure to put all the picked apricots to some culinary use. In this case it is apricot jam, bottled apricots and frozen apricot puree. Of course, they are beautiful eaten fresh but I would not recommend that anyone eat more than 6 per day.



It seems that nothing was lost to the heat but there are some partially scorched leaves and flowers which are now being cut back. I was delighted and simply amazed that the most advanced flowering cherries came through absolutely unscathed. What a treasure of a tree. I am pleased to advise that the pumpkin I hope to enter in the biggest pumpkin competition continues to do well and may have even had a growth spurt during the heat. I think that I will start measuring its circumference to chart more closely its growth.

Yes, it has been a busy start to the gardening year. I am looking forward very much to the coming seasons.

## Vale to Gay Tansley

Gay grew up on a farm at Wal Wal, near Horsham. In 1950 she married a handsome young stock agent Ted Tansley who had gone to school in Geelong with her brother. They started their life together as a married couple on the Mulligan farm at Wal Wal.

His job involved many relocations and Gay worked hard to make a home wherever they went until Ted was allocated a Soldier Settlement Block on the Moranghurk Estate at Meredith in 1955.

Gay and their two daughters, Jo and Jen, stayed with her parents until Ted had the garage ready for them to move into, prior to their house being completed. She made it comfortable with curtains for walls, second hand cupboards and second hand sisal matting for flooring.

She recalled 1955 was a very wet year and they couldn't get their Ford Pilot into the yard. Gay had to wear gumboots to get to the car, which was parked on the roadside to go to hospital to have their son Jack.

She remembered boiling nappies in a bucket made from a kerosene tin on the wood stove and the bush shower that Ted erected in the corner of the garage.


Gay was very involved in the community at Meredith. She served as Secretary of Red Cross for over ten years, was a member of Mothers Club, Treasurer of PWMU, and Handicap Manager of the Golf Club. She joked that she had to leave town to get out of the jobs! Gay and Ted sold their farm at the end of 1969 and built a home on five acres at Wallington. After Ted died in 2009 Gay moved into Ocean Grove.

In 1975 Gay joined the Barwon Heads Golf Club where she served on the committee for several years and regularly played golf. Family tell that it was her second love after family and friends. It was whilst playing golf with friends on November 26, 2013, that she had a tragic accident.

Gay's health was excellent for an 85 year old and her death was unexpected.

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




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

#### FESTIVAL TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT PLAN

I am writing to notify you about the traffic management plans for Golden Plains 8 scheduled to occur on Saturday 8 March – Monday 10 March. We will be implementing the same plan that was in place for Golden Plains Lucky 7 last year.

The summary the plan is outlined here.

- We will implement one-way traffic on Mount Mercer Road from Bamganie Road to Cameron's Road from 4am Saturday 8 March to approximately 7pm. Traffic within the one-way zone traveling to Meredith will be diverted down Cameron's Road.
- We will implement a speed reduction to 40klm per hour from Friday 7 March – Monday 10 March on Mount Mercer Road near Bamganie Road and on Meredith Mount Mercer Road immediately South and North of the festival site.
- We have assigned traffic controllers to the corner of Midland Highway and Staughton Street on Monday 10 March to assist vehicles turning left or right onto Midland Highway.
- We will install a no-parking zone along Mount Mercer Road and some surrounding roads.

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# What is a Wicking Bed

You might remember the photo on the front page of the July Meredith and District Newsletter. Two busy 'bees' were filling one of our school garden wicking beds with scoria and soil ready to plant. Before the Christmas holidays we harvested from metre high broad bean plants, picked lettuces, snow peas and parsley.

Our eight wicking gardens have been a great success and we are now up to some summer produce. There are more lettuces, little green tomatoes starting to ripen and beans, zucchini and capsicum on their way.

So, what is a wicking bed? It is a way of growing plants in which the plants access the water by wicking it up from an underground reservoir. The reservoir is a layer at the bottom of the garden filled with a coarse aggregate like scoria, which is filled with water. The next layer is the soil layer where the plants are grown.

How do you make a wicking bed? Any container that holds water can be used or you can line the container, like we did, with pond liner plastic. Lay a slotted piece of pipe along the bottom and a filling pipe up the side. Put in the scoria layer, top up with the soil layer, fill up the reservoir via the filling pipe and start planting. If this sounds a bit confusing, come to school and have a look and a chat.

What are the advantages of gardening this way? There is an increase in production because plants have continual access to water and nutrients. Water use is reduced by at least half. Less frequent watering is required. Evaporation is significantly reduced and so is time spent watering because the beds are not watered from the top but on a weekly basis by putting a hose in the filling pipe.

At school, this is particularly important because the wonderful summer growing months, which are also our hottest and driest, are over the summer holidays. Our roster of waterers only needed to pop in once a week and top up the water reservoirs. There have been no more limp, thirsty tomato plants waiting for a drink.

We were fortunate to receive a grant from the Bannockburn Bendigo Community Bank to fund the purchase of the gardens and a solar pump so we can use the water collected in our two large water tanks. Bunnings in Geelong supplied the pipe fittings for us and some plants to get us started. The gardens were supplied by Aussie Wrinkly Tanks in Moolap by way of Kruger's Sheetmetal in Bannockburn. One of our parents, Helena Lindorff, supplied the know-how, taking a workshop beforehand, sourcing the makings of the gardens at affordable prices and leading us in our whole-school and community garden-making day.

You are very welcome to come and have a look at our school gardens – we have eight wicking beds, one no-dig garden bed and a traditional bed. Give us a call on 5286 1313 just to make sure there is someone available to give you a tour. If you have any excess seeds or seedlings we would be very grateful to have them. You might even like to plant them yourself – you will have plenty of helpers!

#### "Saturday" by Ian McEwan

He wakes before dawn and observes from his window an aeroplane, on fire, descending. He assumes it is a terrorist weapon heading for Heathrow. He finds later that it is a cargo plane that radioed for permission to land in London after a fire broke out in one of its engines.

This event and the street march against the Iraq War sets the background for the day that develops to unexpectedly involve Henry and his family in a threatening situation.


Henry's day involves a minor road accident after trying to avoid a street march, confrontation with the driver and his two friends, a visit to his mother in a nursing home, shopping for ingredients for a special dinner, a game of squash, the welcome of his daughter from overseas, attending a music recording session of his son, his father in law and the driver's hostage of his family and revenge.

Henry Perowne is not only the main character but the centre of consciousness in the novel. All the events of the long day are filtered through his mind. Through the kaleidoscope of Henry's thoughts and activities in the course of this day, the author gives us a sense of the role and importance of work in our daily lives and of a long and happy family life.

The hostage scene most dramatically shows the fragility of even the happiest lives.

"Saturday" is described as a humane, life-affirming novel. Bookclub members enjoyed this book and found "the thoughts recorded" reflected what thoughts run through each of our minds, sometimes at extraordinary speed in various situations.

The book for discussion next month is "Coda" by Thea Asthley



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## Vale to Fritz Teven

Fritz died suddenly while holidaying at Phillip Island on January. He had a "stent" inserted in October 2013 and told friends and family how he had instantly felt better and that his energy levels and enthusiasm had returned, so his death was something of a shock.

A Memorial Service was held at Lethbridge Recreation Reserve and tributes were given by his son Mark, a brother and a friend of his wife, Marilyn and Fritz's grandchildren Kaleb and Tylah.

His ten grandchildren had each written something about what they had done with their Pop that was special to them.

Fritz grew up at Portarlington after his parents and their eight children came from Holland when he was 9 years old. He attended Portarlington State School and Geelong High School before he started work with the PMG as a local postie and telephonist at Portarlington. He then worked on the Radio Lines for the PMG, building telecommunications towers all over Victoria and as far away as Broken Hill. Fritz and his crew built the tower on Mt Buninyong.

He married Marilyn in 1971 and they travelled around the country to wherever he was working for about five years, staying in a caravan. They built a house in Portarlington when the children, Darren, Mark and Kelly arrived. Marilyn then stayed home and Fritz came home at weekends.

About twenty years ago Fritz was supplementing their income by being a "garbo" over the summer when he met a man at the Portarlington Caravan Park who wanted to sell a property at Meredith.

Fritz had always aspired to own some land so he bought the property and then had room to break in horses, run some cattle, tinker with machinery, ride motor bikes etc. He worked at Happy Hens and went to Portarlington at weekends. As the children were moving out and establishing their own lives Marilyn decided to move to Meredith. They sold the house at Portarlington and bought "Castlewood" on Coopers Road.

As well as running his farm Fritz worked at Meredith Dairy then later became a fencing contractor. He had recently purchased more land between Bamganie Road and Coopers Road to make his holding almost 1,000 acres.



Fritz loved horses, playing darts, being on his farm, fixing things and talking. He was never idle, couldn't sit still and had sometimes been described as "a ferret on steroids". He was a "jack of all trades" and could do whatever he set his mind to. He was tough and never complained, even after he crushed his hand in the post driver, he was stubborn and he had a loud voice and was always yelling. When a horse rolled on him and he was yelling for help no one took any notice because they were used to him yelling!

Marilyn says the only time he would relax was when they travelled in their Motorhome. They intended to do more of that after he turned sixty five years old next April.

One of Fritz's last jobs was to dig the holes for the signs at the Police Paddocks.

On a cool sunny day in late December, my friend, Vicky, and I went for a bushwalk in the northern part of the Brisbane Ranges National Park. The start of our walk went through an area that has had several control burns in recent years. We could see how slowly the shrubs grow back, due to the poor soil. Beside the track we found an old pair of boots. I believe that people should take their rubbish home with them, but these boots had become part of the environment. The soles had fallen off, lichens were growing on the leather, and they looked as if they could provide useful shelter for small animals such as lizards and beetles.

We arrived at a small dam, its water black from decaying leaves. It was surrounded by eucalypts and had shoulder high reeds around its edges. Dragonflies flew over the water and among the reeds, which were fresh and bright green, with small tufts of brown flowers towards their tops. Although it was not obvious to us, the insects knew that these flowers were in full bloom. Some brown butterflies rested in groups near the dam, while others fed on the flowers. I saw one sitting on a reed with its long tongue deep in a flower. A small shiny fly and many beetles of different colours, shapes and sizes were feeding at other flowers. All this insect life attracted small

spiders. They ignored us as we admired their carefully woven webs. The spiders were beautiful, of different shapes and colours with amazing patterns of spots and stripes on their abdomens.

We walked to the edge of the flat plateau that forms a large part of the north of the park. As we approached the edge, we left the dark-trunked rough-barked stringybarks and ironbarks, and entered an area of gum trees with smooth pale grey bark. I sat on a large fallen trunk and looked from the rocky hilltop down to the green valley far below, and at the steep slope across the creek. I listened to cicadas and watched birds and beetles fly between the trees. On the steep rocky slope below me, Vicky explored and found a track made by wallabies hopping along the valley.

Our track followed the edge of the plateau for a while, with views into valleys below. We walked along a shallow gully, lined with purple daisies. We investigated a small cave above the track which appeared to be a regular shelter for wallabies. We could see the prints of their tails in the dust at the wide cave entrance. The second entrance, too small for their use, was covered in leaf litter. We walked across the plateau, seeing some summer flowers, including small shrubs of Mitchell's wattle with pale yellow flowers, and a patch of rarely seen small duck orchids, their tiny flowers looking like black-headed ducks flying on the tops of their stalks. We followed a steep path down the side of the plateau, noting the continuing changes in the plants around us, as the soil and slope changed. The end of our walk was beside a deep dry creek bed, surrounded by bushes of yellow and white daisy flowers, finishing with lunch in the shade at a picnic ground beside the creek.

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
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

Attempted Robbery

it's History

Death of the Robber. -- While M. Paterson and near Birdsey were prospecting over the new Goldfield at Steiglitz they came upon the body of a man wrapped in a blanket, and quite dead, apparently from a stab in the neck. While they were turning over and examining the body up came the landlord of the hotel, and an old shepherd, whose name we could not learn, although well-known in the neighbourhood, as a quiet inoffensive man, who confessed he had killed the deceased in self-defence. The facts of the case, as far as we have been learn, are Two men, named Hammond and Robinson, as follows:-called at the Steiglitz Hotel, on Sunday last, on their way to Balaarat. At Steiglitz they met a shepherd, with whom they had been slightly acquainted, and who agreed to go with them to the diggings. Hammond and Robinson had no money, so the shepherd treated them at the hotel, showing as he did a roll of bank notes. He spoke to them in the most friendly way, and promised to take out licences for them when to the After refreshing themselves at the hotel, diggings. Hammond pressed his mates to proceed at once, while Robinson and the shepherd wished to stay till next day; ultimately Hammond and the shepherd went on, leaving Robinson The shepherd says, that after proceeding some distance Hammond turned round, seized him by the throat, and demanded his money. The shepherd managed to disengage his arm, got hold of a knife and inflicted the fatal stab in the neck, and at once returned to the Steiglitz Hotel and reported the occurrence. The police were sent for from Meredith, and the shepherd taken into custody; Robinson was also apprehended. The statement of the occurrence by the shepherd, though of course only ex parte, bears every appearance of truth, but both he and Robinson are very properly detained till an inquest shall have been held. Robinson and Hammond were lately employed as labourers on the Fyans' Ford




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
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# STAY COOL

Extreme Heat days can be dangerous. If you are adversely affected by heat, then prepare ahead. Here are some ideas to help you stay cool.



- Drink more fluids
- Stay indoors and, if at all possible, stay in an airconditioned place. If your home does not have air conditioning, go to some place that does – like a friend's house or a public building.
- Electric fans may provide comfort, but when temperatures reach high 30s, fans will not prevent heat-related illness. Taking a cool shower or bath, or moving to an air-conditioned place is a much better way to cool off.
- Wear lightweight, light-coloured, loose-fitting clothing.
- Visit adults at risk at least twice a day and closely watch them for signs of heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Infants and young children, of course, need much more frequent watching.

If you must be out in the heat:

- Limit outdoor activity to morning & evening hours.
- Protect yourself from the sun by wearing a widebrimmed hat (also keeps you cooler) and sunglasses and by putting on sunblock

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

#### The Right Services for Men

Navigating the service system can be frustrating especially when you are a bloke in need. Some men find going to visit the doctor (GP) or dentist a terrifying experience let alone accessing support from a counsellor or other health professional. It takes a lot of strength for a man to reach out and seek help and in order to avoid disappointment some knowledge about where to begin or what to expect is useful.

Learning how to seek out the right professional help in time of crisis or need can make a huge difference and enable easier access to services.

**Important FACTS for blokes about getting the right help:** Crisis telephone lines- there are several crisis telephone services for men that operate 24/7. They have trained professionals who will listen to your problem, provide on the spot suggestions, information and offer to refer you to the closest service in your area. The crisis number you call may not be what you need at the time and they could direct you to another service. You may find yourself repeating your story as you navigate the system. They will provide you with the contact details of the most suitable service you can access in your local area. It is important to understand that you may have to make several phone calls the next day during business hours to arrange appointments to see someone face to face. Some services may not be able to see you for 2 weeks or longer depending on waitlists. However, most of the free specialists counselling services in our community have emergency appointments available for crisis situations. You may have to request an urgent appointment and it is ok to ask for the crisis line staff to refer you directly to a service if you prefer.

Your local GP- there is no better person to direct you to the right service you need. They have information about local community services and private counselling services. Your GP can also offer to see you weekly until you can begin treatment with the right service. Many GP clinics are now operating outside of business hours to cater for men who work.

Internet websites and online counselling services- most of these services are easy to navigate and at your finger tips 24/7. Just be careful about some of the information you access. Try and stick with reputable sites and remember that the Web is to be used as a guide or Encyclopaedia NOT a bible. Please avoid self diagnosis instead seek an assessment with your GP or specialist.

If you are a bloke with a problem you are not weak if you are in need of help. In fact it takes much courage and strength to face up to a problem and ask for help than it does to avoid it. The right service may take you a few steps to find but once you get the assistance you require you will be well on the road to resolving any difficulties.

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

## Meredith 2013

For many thousands of people, "Meredith" isn't a town, or even a person; it's an event. An event that is always musical and sometimes a little magical. Here Kristie Walker and the Festival Team, give us an insight into last December's "Meredith"

Meredith23 will be fondly remembered by many as one of the finest Meredith Music Festivals in the event's

history. Blessed by near-perfect festival weather, a very enthusiastic crowd piled into the festival site. The festival was made deliberately smaller by the organizing team this year – by 500 people – and it was clear that this move created more space in the campgrounds and the amphitheatre.

Meredith-goers these days come well-prepared. They set up tents, often camp *communally, with friends*. Some circle the wagons – park their cars in a circle or arc and pitch multiple tents inside, often with a 'lounge' area with a tarp or two strung across car roofs or available trees. Some arrive in motor homes, or bring caravans; there's a converted old bus or two. Some simply sleep in their cars.

Once camp is made they head down to the amphitheatre, where this year some of the most wonderful moments took place. The biggest crowd reaction was for Nile Rodgers and Chic. Nile's career started as a songwriter and band-member of Chic in the 70s, who had a string of disco hits including "Freak Out". He then produced some giant hits for artists like David Bowie, Madonna, and lately Daft Punk. He played all the hits with his amazing band, and the crowd danced and sang and went crazy for an hour and a half. Nile had played at Golden Plains a couple of years ago, and loved it so much he asked to come back. His return was a total triumph.


Because the festival has just one stage, a variety of music happens on the stage. In the mornings, more gentle artists play. On Saturday morning the City of Ballarat Brass Band pumped out some winners to an appreciative crowd; hours later the hardcore metal of US band Helmet would pound the amphitheatre. The hip-hop of Hermitude then got them dancing, Spiderbait thumped out a great set, then after Nile Rodgers DJs kept everyone dancing until dawn.

One of those DJs, Tim Sweeney, is a world-renowned dance music expert who lives in New York, but loves Meredith Music Festival so much he times his annual holiday to be able to perform there.
