In the simplest terms, cloud computing means storing and accessing data and programs over the Internet instead of your computer's hard drive. The cloud is just a metaphor for the Internet. What cloud computing is not about is your hard drive. When you store data on--or run programs from the hard drive, that's called local storage and computing.

For it to be considered "cloud computing," you need to access your data or your programs over the Internet, or at the very least, have that data synchronized with other information over the Net. With an online connection, cloud computing can be done anywhere, anytime. Leading Senior Constable Greg Kitchen

Greetings all and apologies for not getting an article in the last Meredith News. Since my last article we have seen a real spike in burglaries being committed in and around Bannockburn and further north of us at Elaine. Inevitably at some point offenders will turn there eye to the Meredith area so I truly encourage residents to be vidual ant at all times. Offenders have now been identified for burglaries committed in Sutherlands Creek.

Over recent weeks I have been investigating the theft of an item of plant machinery valued at \$40,000. I stumbled across the item on the Hamilton Highway early on Sunday the 15th June and extensive enquiries have led me to a suspect who will have been arrested, interviewed and processed by the time this article is published. This piece of near new plant was stolen from Geelong and was clearly being transferred to the Golden Plains area.

A substantial burglary was committed in Mystery Lane, Elaine on Wednesday the 25th June where offenders have ransacked a large shed. Multiple items were stolen from this location and it is clear that the offender parked a vehicle in Mount Doran Road near the Intersection with Mystery Lane. If any person sighted any vehicle on this date early morning I would greatly appreciate any information directed to me or to Detective Senior Constable PAGE from the Moorabool CIU.

On or about Tuesday the 10th June unknown offenders have driven a vehicle onto the Meredith Reserve oval and caused an amount of damage. These 'burnouts' were thankfully isolated to the southern end of the oval however it is so disappointing to think that an irresponsible fool would be prepared to do this. Again I would greatly appreciate any information at all in relation to this.

I have recently received complaints from a resident from Pioneer Ridge Road in relation to driver behaviour. His legitimate complaint was of drivers cutting corners into roads which run off Pioneer Ridge Road. We are both of the belief that it is only a matter of time until an accident occurs so I urge all drivers to take that little extra care on unsealed roads both on Pioneer Ridge Road and surrounding roads.

I know that I owe the local Meredith Kids an apology for not being able to run the March Blue Lights to date. Disco Des was unfortunately unavailable and in South Australia for the June event so I will remain focussed on the two following dates in 2014 –

FRIDAY 12th SEPTEMBER – Term 3 FRIDAY 5th DECEMBER – Term 4.

These dates will be confirmed closer to the event but it is most likely that these will be the dates. We hope to have many kids there having plenty of fun and prizes to be won. Any enquiries to me here at the Meredith Police Station.



A Message from the Mayor

Cr Jen Blake Mayor, Golden Plains Shire Council

In June I attended the 2014 Australian Local Government Association's National General Assembly in Canberra. The Assembly brings together council representatives from across Australia to discuss national priorities for local government.

Challenges have arisen from the Federal Government and State Government budgets, which aim to cut spending, pay debt and maintain services, placing additional financial pressure on Local Government and ultimately ratepayers.

A key discussion at the Assembly was the Coalition's plan to develop two important documents; a White Paper on Reform of the Federation and a White Paper on Taxation. A White Paper is a report or guide helping readers understand an issue, solve a problem, or make a decision and these two Papers will look at how we finance all levels of government.

There are many opinions around resourcing Local Government but fundamentally we must decide, what is the core business? What do people think Council should be focusing on and what should we no longer deliver?

It is important that there is full consultation and debate around the roles and financial relationships between the three levels of government and there are opportunities for ratepayers and residents to get involved. People will be able to make submissions to the Papers to have their say.

Budget 2014-15

June's ordinary meeting of Council will look to adopt the Golden Plains Shire's Budget for 2014-15 after having taken into consideration the submissions made. Council thanks all of those who took time to write to Council about the Draft Budget. The result is a responsible budget delivering, within our means, a large program of building, road works and the delivery of a large range of services and programs.

An item raised was the Milton Street Roundabout in Bannockburn. The roundabout is required to meet the shopping precinct development requirements and, with the impending closure of Burns Street (McPhillips Street end), will make Bannockburn a safer place for pedestrians and drivers alike. Council received approval from Minister Mulder to access some funds from Country Roads and Bridges program, which combined with the developer and Council contributions, will enable completion.

Staffing numbers was also an item raised in some community submissions. It is important to understand that a great proportion of staff are engaged in the delivery of Child Care, Kindergarten, Aged and Disability and other support services. On average, Golden Plains Shire cares for 663 children and delivers almost 400 services to over 200 elderly and disabled residents each week. Our region has the largest percentage of children aged 0-4 in the State and a higher than average percentage of older residents which contributes to our high need for these support services.

Our Golden Plains volunteers are absolutely crucial to the delivery of many Council services. Hall Management, Community Transport and Meals on Wheels programs would not be possible without the contribution of our volunteers who give of their time, skills and enthusiasm for the benefit of their neighbours and fellow residents. Volunteers are a valued component of Golden Plains Shire's Service delivery.

Ambulance Service Awards


On Thursday 19th June, Ambulance Victoria conducted a Service



JUNE

Winter arrived abruptly with the onset very cold, wet and windy weather. The deciduous trees are now bare and the roses are looking quite sad and unkempt, and as usual there is much to do in the garden. I do wonder why garden advice columns suggest that now is the time to be cleaning, oiling and sharpening garden tools for storage. How is the gardener supposed to garden if all tools are stored away until Spring? Needless to say, my garden tools are, as usual, ready for use and are sharpened as required.

I love the greenhouse at this time of the year. When it is bitterly cold outside, the greenhouse is my tropical paradise. When the wind is howling, it is a place of absolute calm: the perfect place to pot up cuttings even on the most unpleasant of days. I have been busy taking cuttings of Correas, the new plant love in my life. They are such stars, tolerate almost all conditions on offer and happily thrive under gum trees. As a bonus they strike very easily, are not rampant in growth and thus maintain a nicely shaped shrub without regular pruning, and they flower at this time of the year. I have several different varieties including the tall form, and I love them all.

Seed sowing is another very satisfying greenhouse activity. Last summer I grew tall Hollyhocks (grow to a height of 2 metres or more) from a few seeds that were taken from a black coloured Hollyhock . All of the plants were true to the parent plant except for one plant which had the brightest red flowers. These seeds were duly picked and saved and were planted about three weeks ago. The seeds have germinated well and it is my hope that these plants will be true to their parent and my garden will have an abundance of beautiful bright red Hollyhocks next spring and summer.

Of course, it is the perfect time to be planting bare rooted plants. This year I have started by planting a small apple orchard comprising just five varieties of fruit: Gala, Granny Smith, Pink Lady, Jonathan and Snow apple. Over time, it is my intention to add other varieties. You may remember that I have previously mentioned that possums had eaten all growth from a five year old 'Snow' apple. The new orchard is well away from any mature trees and should not be bothered by those wretched creatures. I have also planted a stunning Maple, 'October Glory' in a reasonably protected spot from extreme wind and heat and thus I have high expectations for this tree.

The vegetable garden has also received attention. Barrow loads of spent tomato bushes (many of them self sown), pumpkin, zucchini and cucumber vines have been removed and taken to the compost heap. I am allowing these areas in the vegetable garden to have a little rest before adding dynamic lifter or blood and bone and then replanting. Broad beans have been planted elsewhere, along with garlic, onions, Brussels sprouts, and other assorted leafy greens: all grown from saved seeds.

Rhubarb is a wonderful plant that keeps on giving and my crop provides a beautiful big bunch of stems every couple of weeks. The initial rhubarb crowns were given to me by a lovely Meredith friend and I continue to be grateful for her generosity. Rhubarb is easily grown, requiring little care apart from feeding twice a year and weed removal. The chooks love rhubarb leaves so there is no wastage when harvested.

The biggest pumpkin competition judging occurred on the 23rd June. Mr Ray Dodds, a Staughton Street vegetable gardener extraordinaire, duly won all elements of the competition. His bounty needed to be trucked in and included a 51lb Atlantic pumpkin, a 19lb Fairytale heirloom pumpkin (looks like a rugged version of a Long Island Cheese pumpkin and is pinkish in colour with deeply grooved segments and an uneven skin) and a 15lb Queensland Blue. Yours truly entered a Queensland Blue that tipped the scales a whole 750grams lighter than Ray's pumpkin. When asked what was the secret of his success he was not forthcoming. Well done, Ray. I must pay careful attention to what is happening on the vegetable garden side of his fence, as it is clear, I have a lot to learn.

As usual, there is much to be done in the garden, so I must conclude. Until next time, happy gardening.





Now that the weather has turned damp, it is a great time of year to look for fungi. Fungi come in many shapes, sizes and colours. Some are so small they are barely visible, while the biggest can be 1m wide and weigh over 20kg! The part of the fungus that we see above ground is known as the fruiting body. Most of the fungus lives and spreads in the ground or in wood, throughout the year. It is made up of thin threads. Like a fruit tree, when the weather is right, the fruiting bodies appear. They produce spores, which like seeds, create new life.

Fungi are most commonly brown, but also come in blue, green, yellow, red, purple and all the other colours of the rainbow. There are many different forms including round puffballs which have a hole in the top to release spores and bracket or shelf fungi which grow on trees. Stinkhorns can smell horrible and come in a range of bizarre shapes, including starfish fungi and cage fungi. There are also corals, jellies, and fungi with sponge or spines under their caps.

The fungi that people are most familiar with are the mushroomlike agarics, with gills under their caps. One of the best known is the red one with white spots which is found under trees including pines and oaks, and in children's storybooks. Its common name is the fly agaric, as it contains toxins and has sometimes been used to poison flies. It has a ring of membrane on its stalk and a cup shape around the base of the stalk. If you look at a button or cup mushroom bought from a shop, you can't see the gills or only some of them. They are covered by a thin membrane called a veil. As the mushroom grows, the veil breaks, and in some species, such as the fly agaric, part of it remains attached to the stalk as a ring. The fly agaric has a second veil which covers the whole mushroom when it is very little and breaks as it grows. Remnants of this second veil can be seen as the cup at the base of the stalk and the white spots on its cap, which are pieces of veil that have stuck there. Fly agarics form a relationship with the tree under which they grow. The threads of fungus help the tree gather nutrients and water from the soil. In return, the tree provides food to the fungus.

Another image from children's stories is the fairy ring. They are most noticeable in lawns and can grow a little larger each year. This is caused by the threads of fungi in the ground growing outwards in all directions, taking nutrients from the soil as they go. The grass in the centre of the ring may turn yellow. When there is no food left in the middle of the circle the fungus dies there, returning nutrients to the soil, but the ring continues to expand. Fruiting bodies appear at the edge of the ring. A fairy ring found in France was about half a mile wide and estimated to be 700 years old! The fairy ring champignon is small, light brown and has a lump in the middle of the cap, but many other fungi also grow in rings.

Another noticeable fungus is the spectacular rustgill, which grows in clumps of large orange-brown mushrooms, often on

tree stumps. The fungi have a ring on their stalk, and their gills are often rust-coloured due to spores which have been released from the gills. They are recyclers and over time break down the wood to return nutrients to the soil.

In gardens and nature strips, on roadsides and in the bush, look for fungi. When you find them, think about what they are doing. Some cause harm, but many help trees grow or are recyclers, creating new soil for new life.

June Violet Upjohn was born 80 years ago to Dr William and Norma Upjohn (later to become Sir William and Lady Upjohn). June was born into a happy, secure home, being the youngest of four. June has always loved and admired her two elder siblings, Rosemary and John and was very close to her nearest sibling, David her brother who was born with cerebral palsy (CP) and died at the age of 15.

June began her early years in a world that was clouded by war however she was nurtured in such a way by her family, both immediate and wider that she recognized that she had been born into a wonderful world and given a life and opportunities that needed to be grasped with open arms and with every ounce of energy she could muster. Thus was launched a most amazing woman who has continued to embrace her loved ones and precious connections of her past as well as move forward embracing new opportunities and those she collides with as these opportunities materialize.

June's wider family, as mentioned already played a significant role particularly in June's earlier life, included her aunties and uncles and cousins who lived on farms in the Southern Riverina, NSW. June visited these relatives during her school holidays learning to enjoy farm life, an important factor in the next chapter of her life. June's wider family also included her school community at Lauriston Girls School where she attended her whole school life. Here was also fostered the belief that we were privileged and with this went responsibility.

After leaving school June commenced her tertiary studies, at first commencing Arts at Melbourne University. June failed to see a future with the grounding these subjects were offering, especially demoralized after enduring a tutorial for one of her subjects, Philosophy where in June's estimation too much time was spent debating whether the chair in the room was really a chair and was it there! Encouraged by her father June then enrolled in a much more practical, pragmatic course, Physiotherapy and three years later received a diploma in Physiotherapy issued by the Masseurs Registration Board of Victoria. June then worked at Royal Melbourne Hospital and the Royal Children's Hospital, Carlton.

In her early twenties June met and married Neil Cameron and so settled into life in the country at "Glenspean", Meredith. After marrying Neil, June wasted no time and nine months later Jane was born. In fact in less than four years of marriage the family had extended again by three, Alexander (Sandy), Simon and

Katherine (Kate). Seven years after Kate, June appeared one day with the old pram which had been lent to older brother John for his babies and announced to J,S,S and K she was having another baby. Jane became very nervous as the eldest when she over heard June saying to others she was about to start another run of 4 babies. She was joking of course!

Prior to becoming pregnant with Hamish, June had taken a courageous step (in those days it was not common for a woman to step back into a career beyond her home) to answer a plea for a physiotherapist to fill a long term vacancy at the Geelong Spastic Centre situated behind the Geelong Hospital. June's interest in working with children with special needs was shaped by David, her brother with CP. Young family not withstanding June resumed work part time as a Paediatric Physiotherapist in Geelong for the Spastic Society, eventually full time, and continued into semi-retirement in Ballarat for Specialist Children's Services and for Playhouse. June's career in Paediatric physiotherapy saw her become a foundation member and early president, Paediatric Group, Australian Physiotherapy Association. She and her colleagues instigated the first Victorian Early Intervention Program, based at 'Shannon Park', Barwon Region, Spastic Children's Society (now "Scope"), where she managed to make therapy fun for her clients. Her continuing involvement for people with a disability has included Board Membership of Scope, and close involvement in the redevelopment of Shannon Park; with continuing membership of the Golden Plains Shire Council's 'Action and Inclusion Committee'.

June has being involved in many other community institutions and groups covering all aspects of life including President, Meredith Kindergarten: Woodburn Creek Primary school; Geelong College Council; Alexandra Club, Melbourne; Meredith and Ballarat Red Cross; "Spotted Owl" with Meredith Brownies, and later District Leader, Girl Guides; Church Elder; member of CWA; Advance Meredith: Meredith Community Centre; Bamganie/Meredith Landcare, Water Watch for Barwon Water, Chorister with the Meredith Inter-Church Choir, the Meredith Minstrels, the U3A and Buninyong CWA choirs.

As partner in "Glenspean Partners" she has delivered the odd lamb, planted many a tree, and fallen in the creek at dusk in midwinter, helping Neil push lambs across it. Not only that, but she has returned the country hospitality she received as a child, herself giving a taste of 'country' to city nephew and nieces.

June is still involved in many of these organizations and events but from my perspective it is not just about what she does but who she is as a person, a wonderful mother and friend. As a fellow chorister remarked this week, she is always smiling!

students having to write applications for various roles within the production of the movie including scriptwriters, artists, interviewers, voice actors and musicians to create the background music.

Creating the animations as professionally as possible meant that we needed to research the appropriate techniques involving lighting and animation techniques.

The class worked together to build animation stages that house sliding backgrounds that were hand painted by Ralph Holtz and students in the grade. For promotion purposes we decided to make a giant life-sized LEGO 'mini-fig' to represent Mr G from the movie as well as a series of movie posters depicting different scenes from the movie.

The premise of the movie is based around a student drinking a magic LEGO potion that turned the entire world into LEGO! The students then split up into groups and head off on their own adventures, when unfortunately the world's internet goes down. Luckily Mrs Hart and Mr G are there to save the day. Students had to create LEGO figures that looked like themselves, including creating their own special school uniforms that needed to be applied to their figures for the movie.

Overall, the project was a massive effort that included so many amazing efforts from the students and staff in our classroom. Integrated into many of the subjects at school, especially writing and investigations, many hours of work from the students went into putting this together, including approximately 10,000 photos to piece the animation together. All of this was done on the school's iPads.

But the film festival wasn't just about this one film. The Prep/One class created a lovely animation featuring the whole class and the schools notice board titled "What a Wonderful World." The 3/4, 5 and 6 classes all created a series of movies and animations from which a winner was chosen to be screened on the day at the cinema. A large number of parents and VIPs (Sponsors) attended the day and enjoyed watching all of the student movies.

The day was hosted by Academy Award winning animator Adam Elliot, who created Harvie Krumpet, for which he won his award. "The Dinner" by Herman Koch

<u>The Dinner</u> opens with Paul Lohman and his wife Claire heading to a gourmet restaurant in The Hague. They've been summoned by Babette and her husband Serge, Paul's brother and the man tipped to be the next Prime Minister of Holland.

Like acts in a play, the novel is divided into parts: appetiser, entrée, main course, dessert and digestive. Everything about his brother infuriates Paul: from his handshake, to his smile to his table manners. We also discover that Paul isn't exactly a reliable narrator as he has his own vicious past.

But the couple have met to talk about their teenage sons and the terrible thing they have done and how far the four of them will go to save their children from the consequences of their actions.

There is a bracing nastiness to this book that grows more intense with the turning of the pages. One reviewer commented that "the writing turns from being satisfying edgy to bleak, then alienating, and on down to flat out unpalatable".

It is a social comment on people's morals and values. It is surprising to what lengths they will go and especially Claire who seems a woman of reason but who is the most terrifying character of all and absolutely ruthless in protecting her son.

Meredith book-club readers digested this book very well.

Winter Drill

Meredith Rural Fire Brigade conducted a live fire drill on Saturday 14th June as part of our winter training program.

The drill simulated a gas fire which required the Brigade to set up the Tankers a safe distance from the fire, hook up to the towns reticulated water supply and boost through two lengths of hose. Once the team had water at their nozzles they conducted what is known as a five person fog attack made up of two branch operators, two assistants and a commander.

The team advance directly towards the seat of the fire where a mock isolation valve is placed. The fog stream creates a barrier between the advancing firefighters and the radiant heat, which would almost certainly be unbearable without it.

The new tanker proved very effective on the day, making the fire fight much easier and more efficient for our firefighters.

The day was finished off with a BBQ and a good yarn. I am pleased with everyone's efforts. The community should be proud to have such competent firefighters in our town.

Caroline Chisholm School Camp: Pioneer Ridge Road

The camp buildings, the camp concept and the location on the end of Pioneer Ridge are all interesting. Many people don't know about this area so close to the Meredith town, so take the opportunity to come and discover it.

If you know anything about the area, about the camp, the river, the reservoir, the land development, the first people to buy or build on the land please let us know or come along on July 13. If the weather is fine we will be able to wander but if the weather is terrible we may be confined to the school buildings. Please bring a small plate of afternoon tea.

The Dunera Boys

Some locals may remember when the scenes were shot at Meredith for the film "The Dunera Boys." The weather was cold and miserable but the actors and some locals who were in the scenes wore summer clothing because the scenes were to represent being in Hay in NSW in summer. The book <u>The Dunera Scandal</u> by Cyril Pearl tells the story of the ship "Dunera" which had a maximum capacity of 1600 including crew. It left Liverpool in July 1940 with 2542 German and Austrian internees for Australia. Most were political or racial refugees who had been interned as "friendly aliens" in various English camps. The ship that was to carry them to freedom was a floating concentration camp. They were stripped of personal possessions, crammed below decks in appalling conditions and subjected to brutal and humiliating treatment. In Australia they were held in barbed wire protected camps for years. Winston Churchill called the "Dunera episode" a deplorable mistake.

Looking for Jean Gartland

Before Jim McKellin came to Meredith in 1953 to take up a Soldier Settler Block on Shelford Road he worked at Harrow for the Gartland family on "Taloona".

Recently Jim's son John McKellin visited Harrow to see where his father worked.

He was told that the daughter of the family for whom his father worked had been a librarian in Geelong and that she had moved to Meredith. Her name was Jean Gartland. If you know anything of her please contact John on 52 823 209.

Join Us - We meet at the Anglican Church Hall on the last Thursday of the month from 9 am. Recently some documents relating to the ownership of a house in Lawler Street from August 1853 were donated to MHIG. Information like this is very valuable to us and adds to the "Who Lived in My House Project".

Father Michael Denis Murphy

Father Murphy was the Parish Priest at Meredith from 1900 until 1911. He was born at Coburg and was the eldest child of James and Catherine Murphy. His father James was a blacksmith and opened a blacksmith shop on the east side of Sydney Road next to a hotel on the corner of Sydney and Bell Streets in 1853. His father was an early member of the Roads Board at Coburg and Treasurer of the Committee formed to build the first Catholic Church in Coburg.

Michael Murphy was one of the first students at the Catholic school in Coburg and afterwards went to St Patrick's College in East Melbourne where he did his ecclesiastical studies and was prepared for the priesthood by the Jesuit Fathers. He was ordained by Bishop Goold at St Patrick's Cathedral on September 29, 1879 and was the second Victorian born priest to be ordained. He also had the distinction of being the oldest Victorian born priest before he died in 1939.

He served as assistant priest to Archdeacon Slattery in Geelong for nine years then in 1900 was transferred from Castlemaine to Meredith.

After his retirement in 1919 (because of ill health) he lived with his sister in Sydney Road, Coburg which was almost opposite where his father had been a blacksmith.

He died on February 13, 1939, aged 85 years within a few months of the 60th year of his ordination. His funeral was held in St Paul's Church Coburg and he was buried in the Murphy family grave in Coburg Cemetery.

During Father Murphy's time at Meredith he endeared himself to the parishioners. With his shillelagh in his hand he was in demand to sing and to entertain at functions. Possessed of a fine voice he sang at concerts held in the Meredith Hall and attended School Christmas break up nights. He was also elected the first President of the C.Y.M.S and was later made a Life Member. He was the Parish Priest when Elaine Catholic Church was opened in 1909. After his transfer to Footscray he often returned to

visit his many friends in the district.

Vicar Vernon Cohen

Vernon Cohen studied metallurgical engineering and was lecturing at Melbourne Technical Institute when he had a "calling to the ministry".

He was brought up in the church and he and his family were members of the congregation at St Paul's at Malvern and Caulfield. They lived next door to the church for a time and he met his wife at church where her father was the organist.

In 1951, when he was 25 years old, Vernon began studies in theology at St John's College in Morpeth, NSW. They lived frugally, he rarely saw his fiancée Joan and it was like living in a monastery. After two years he was appointed to be Deacon at Christ Church in Essendon and on March 1, 1953 he was ordained a Priest.

On April 11, 1953 Vernon and Joan were married and in 1954 he was appointed to the Inverleigh Parish. Vernon recalls he had to initiate building or repairs at all six churches. At Lethbridge Geelong Grammar boys built a wooden church, whilst at Steiglitz and Bannockburn buttresses were built to hold the churches straight and at Meredith they blocked the possums out of the turret.

They arrived at Inverleigh with their three week old son Tim to live in the old vicarage which hadn't been lived in for some time. The rats had eaten the floor boards in the passage, the hessian on the ceiling in the bedrooms was dangling down, there was a funny wood hot water heater in the bathroom and there was a possum in the tank.

Vernon felt the vocation but didn't feel trained enough. He preached at Inverleigh and Meredith every Sunday and the other churches every two or three weeks. Sundays were busy. Usually Joan and Tim travelled with him. Joan's father had made a basket for the car which took a cot mattress so Tim could sleep between services.

Vernon visited schools and conducted Religious Education. He said that Woodburn Creek, with Mrs Barber as Head Teacher, was like a Private School. He visited the sick at home and at hospitals in Ballarat and Geelong and attended meetings everywhere including Inverleigh School Council where he was elected President although Tim was only a baby.

When he started he was paid £300 a year plus a small car allowance and they received wood for the house and two pints of milk a week.

He had a Morris Minor car that got bogged on Shelford Road and on corrugated roads would spin out! The Roman Catholic Priest at Meredith had won Tatts and had bought a beautiful Lagonda car. Sometimes he'd take Vernon fishing in his flash car and they had quite a friendship.

Vernon was appointed to Cheltenham at the end of 1956. He and his wife enjoyed visiting Meredith for the 100th celebration of the church and how much he enjoyed meeting people that he knew from Meredith.

Gorgeous Greek Chicken Herby Vegetable Couscous & Tzatziki

Serves 4

Ingredients

Couscous

1 cup (300g) couscous

2 mixed colour peppers

1 fresh red chilli

4 spring onions

½ bunch fresh dill

200g podded raw of frozen peas

1 small handful of black olives

2tbsp olive oil

40g feta cheese

Chicken

2 x 200g skinless chicken breasts

1 heaped tps dried oregano

1 tps ground allspice

1 lemon

Olive oil

Tzatziki

½ a cucumber

250g fat free natural yoghurt

½ a lemon

½ a bunch of fresh mint

Start Cooking


Put 1 mug of couscous and 2 mugs of boiling water into a bowl with a pinch of salt and cover. On a large sheet of greaseproof paper, toss the chicken with salt, pepper, the oregano, allspice and finely grated lemon zest. Fold over the paper then bash and flatten the chicken to 1.5cm thick with a rolling pin. Put into the frying pan with 2 tablespoons of olive oil, turning after 3 or 4 minutes until golden and cooked through.

Coarsely grate the cucumber and sprinkle it with a good pinch of salt then squeeze with clean hands to get rid of the excess salty water. Pop in a bowl with yoghurt, juice of ½ a lemon and pinch of pepper, finely chop and add the top part of the mint and mix together. Remove the stalk and seeds from the peppers and chilli, then pulse in a food processor with trimmed spring onions and the dill until finely chopped. Scatter over a large tray or platter.

Add the peas to the veg (if using frozen peas, blanch in boiling water for a couple of minutes first), tear over the olives, then squeeze over the juice of the zested lemon and add the extra virgin olive oil. Fluff up and scatter over the couscous, toss well and season to taste. Slice cooked chicken and lay it around the couscous. Crumble over the feta and serve with tzatziki.



The BamganieSpartans

On Saturday May 31 Bamganie was visited by thousands of people who wanted to be active, to test their fitness and to be excited. They were also prepared to get dirty and to get wet.

The Spartan Race was held on a property on Bamganie Road. The course had been prepared by "Spartanrace" who claim to design the toughest and most competitive courses in the world.

The Bamganie course involved a 7km run and many obstacles including throwing a spear into hay bales representing the stomach of a warrior, crawling or rolling up a muddy hill under razor wire, carrying a medicine ball for a distance up hill, climbing over an eight foot high wall, the Slippery Wall which involves ascending a sloping board using a rope after swimming a dam, hauling a heavy object to the top of a pole via a long rope, the Balance Beams which involve walking across boards without touching the ground, traversing a rock climbing wall, jumping a fire, crossing a rope mesh in the air strung between 2 shipping containers high, monkey bars, pulling a tyre up a hill with a rope before sliding down on the tyre, crossing an area on a thick rope using arms and legs, dragging concrete blocks through the trees and the most spectacular obstacle: the rolling ditches where contestants clamber over six mounds of clay into six pools of water and then swim through a dam which looked to be thick with clay. (Phew...I'm out of breath, just reading about it! - Ed.)


If the contestants did not successfully complete an obstacle they were required to do 30 "burpees" which a re a bit like push-ups.

"Commando" from the TV Show "The Biggest Loser" ran the course and although he successfully completed all the obstacles, he also did 30 burpees after each obstacle as well as some for other contestants. Children were catered for with a scaled down version of the course and a three storey jumping castle (with obstacles, of course).

Thousands of people enjoyed the race. It was obvious that they were in high spirits, enjoying helping each other and seemingly unfazed by getting wet and cold.

The elite athletes competed at 7.15 am. The announcer who called the contestants to the starting line told the crowd that he had sent 175 people off every 20 minutes from 7.15 am until 3 pm.
