Interpretative Centre Opening

The Meredith Interpretative Centre or "Midway on the Midland" was officially opened on Tuesday, October 7 by The Hon Simon Ramsay MLC, Member for Western Victoria and Sarah Henderson MP, Federal member for Corangamite. And assisted by Jenny Blake, Mayor of Golden Plains and Diane Ritchie, Chair of Advance Meredith.

The building was full of Politicians, Golden Plains Councillors and Staff and members of the Community of Meredith.

Cr Jenny Blake said that the centre was a great asset for Meredith because it provided space for displaying historic and visitor information as well as toilets, amenities and visitor parking.

Simon Ramsay explained that funding to build the centre had been obtained from Regional Development Victoria and Golden Plains Council and funding to fit out the centre had been obtained from the Australian Government, from Heritage Australia, Geelong Community Foundation, Sovereign Hill Trust and Advance Meredith.

Sarah Henderson said the centre provided the opportunity to research and share the rich and significant history of Meredith and is the first of its kind in the Golden Plains Shire.

Diane Ritchie described how Meredith, with the new centre, will continue to provide hospitality to locals and travellers as it has done in the past. The Meredith Interpretative/Visitor Centre is a focal point for the community to connect with each other and the vast number of travellers on the Midland Highway and will also be a place to showcase district tourism, environment, community and business information and displays by local businesses and groups.

The centre commemorates Sir Henry Bolte, a local farmer and Premier of Victoria for 17 years. He divided public opinion with his unique, often unwavering leadership style and was the cartoonist's dream. A special display of "Openings by Henry Bolte" was set up including Sovereign Hill, Bungal Dam, Alcoa, Tullamarine Freeway and his wife, Jill Bolte switching on the electricity in Meredith.

The Shire indicated that almost 5,000 vehicles travel through Meredith per day. They estimate that the opening of the Visitor Centre will see an additional 5,000 visitors stopping in Meredith per year.

Community displays will change monthly and will showcase various aspects of Meredith and District. Volunteers are very welcome. Please call Fay McFarlane on 52 861283 or drop in when the flag is out!

DO NOT CALL


The Australian Government has introduced legislation to change the Do Not Call Register so it will only be necessary to place a phone number on the Register once, as opposed to re-registering after eight years.

"This change means households will no longer have to remember to renew their registration and it will help them avoid the frustration of being disturbed by unwanted telemarketing calls at dinner and other times,"

The Do Not Call Register is a free government service and registration of a phone line, mobile phone or fax number can be done on line in five easy steps, at www.donotcall.gov.au, by phone on 1300 792 958 or by post.

Where a householder registered on the Do Not Call Register receives a call from a telemarketer, they can report this to the Australian Communications and Media Authority – who can investigate and take action including issuing infringement notices and hefty fines.

Some organisations have an exemption and are able to make unsolicited calls, these include charities, educational institutions and political parties. Phone numbers that are primarily used for business purposes may not be registered however any fax number can be listed on the Register.

What you get looks innocent enough, but when you click to get the details of your parcel, it manages to lock you out of your computer and all the files on it. You then get another email offering you an unlock key for a fee off your credit card!

Having had to 'rescue' a couple PCs from this in the past, and knowing how damaging it can be, it is probably a timely reminder to:

- 1. Back up your important stuff to a USB storage or
- 2. Keep your virus checker up-to-date
- 3. Be suspicious of unsolicited emails, and
- 4. NEVER open attachments or follow links on emails unless you are sure you know what they are

Generally crime has been at quite a low level within the Meredith Township and surrounding areas over the past month. We have still seen some minor theft activity in and around Bamganie and areas west of the Meredith Township where spasmodic thefts are continuing. Burglaries and Thefts are still occurring frequently at larger townships on our borders however.

Driver behaviour is always of major concern to Victoria Police and a clear example of extreme poor behaviour on the Midland occurred in recent weeks where the male occupants of a Kia Carnival were observed in an intoxicated state allegedly assisting a younger male. This occurred near the Meredith Township and the vehicle was the subject of numerous other police enquiries during the course of the day due to the driver's behaviour. This matter is currently under investigation.

Not a day seems to pass where there is discussion and concern on television or radio with regard to the drug Ice. Crystal Methamphetamine is having a horrific effect on communities large and small across the country.

On Monday evening the 17th November starting at 7.30 p.m., at the Meredith Community Centre a drug awareness night will be run where a Senior Victoria Police Detective attached to the Werribee Crime Investigation Unit will be attending together with myself to attempt to answer questions and to give a detailed insight into this illegal drug and its effects on family and the community.

In my GARDEN

October

There has been a lush response in the garden to the warm and slightly moist Spring weather. The garden is almost fully awake following the winter sleep and blooms abound. The wisterias, Banksia roses, flowering cherries, crab apples and Dutch iris have been in full flower and bring shades of pink, yellow, blue, white, mauve and purple to the garden in volumes. The lawns are soft and green. There is much activity in the pond with the gold fish doing what gold fish do in the Spring. I feel very fortunate to be able to enjoy such a beautiful home environment.

In addition to beauty Spring also brings bounty. The vegetable garden is now almost fully planted with summer vegetables. The pumpkins (Queensland Blue), zucchinis (mixed heirloom varieties), cucumbers (continental) and tomatoes (cherry, Roma and Oxhearts) while enjoying the warm days still need to be covered at night with a frost blanket as they do not like the cold nights at all. Even a mild frost will kill these tender young plants. Snow peas are emerging along with a new crop of assorted lettuces. Broad beans are almost ready for the first picking and I like to pick them when the pods are small and the beans are very sweet and tender, as you would with peas.

This year I have grown potatoes in large pots and it is my view that they are doing much better than the potatoes grown in the ground. Potatoes are another crop that will not grow if exposed to frost. The other advantage of growing potatoes in pots is the ease of harvesting. The pot is simply turned upside down and the potatoes picked out of the soil. This avoids stabbing potatoes with the fork when digging them out of the soil.

Of course, weeds abound in garden beds, lawns and paths and have been dealt with in the usual ways. My preference is to cover emerging weeds with pea straw as it has the advantage of moisture retention in the soil but there is a limit to how many bales of pea straw I can purchase. Consequently, the great majority of weeds are removed manually or by the judicial use of weed killer. Regular mowing of lawns and grassed areas are also part of my weed management: preventing weeds from seeding is essential. Achieving this gives me the opportunity to do what is possibly my very favourite garden work – mowing the grass.


Weekly spraying of roses continues and has kept the black spot well under control with the result that the roses are looking very lush and beautiful. I think that roses are a mainstay of any sizeable garden and their health has a major impact on the overall look of the summer garden. While black spot may not kill a rose bush it certainly will limit growth and flower production. Although it is good to try and limit the use of chemicals in the garden, I have learned that black spot control is not one of those things that one can

ignore and I am not aware of any effective non-chemical remedy.

As the days have warmed I have moved the potted orange trees and the banana tree from the greenhouse. They are moved back into the greenhouse on nights when the minimum temperature is predicted to be 6 degrees or below, or are covered with a frost blanket. Potted fuchsias and hydrangeas have been moved into shady areas beneath trees along with other assorted shade preferring plants. I think that this helps create a lush look that can be difficult to achieve if relying on plantings in the ground. In fact, I use potted plants anywhere there are gaps and a little something extra is needed. The greenhouse makes the propagation of plants very doable and it is wonderful to have a cheap and ready supply of new plants to replace the inevitable failures.

As usual, there is much to do, so until next month, happy gardening.

Two pools

I am sitting beside the creek. I still think of creeks as flowing streams of water, but this one rarely flows. For a few days, or perhaps weeks, each year, there'll be a small trickle of water flowing downstream. I've seen it in rare flood, a fast-moving brown snake, filling its bed and in a few places overflowing the banks, carrying sticks, soil, uprooted reeds and rubbish downstream towards the Moorabool River, the Barwon River and the sea. For most of the year the creek bed is dry between regular pools of water. Some of these pools are shallow and dry up in the heat of summer, but most are deep and permanent. Some are long enough that I can imagine the creek is flowing.

I am sitting on a rock beside a small deep brown pool, partly shaded by the eucalypts and wattles that surround it. The banks are quite high and steep in places, lower in others. One side has sedimentary rocks, some with swirling patterns of brown and grey, and all with layers, perhaps formed beneath the floor of an ancient, long-gone sea. Grasses, indigenous flowering plants, bushes, saplings and mature trees flourish on the banks. Lichens cover the branches of one bush. Aquatic plants grow around the edges of the pool. There are reeds, milfoil with its circles of small feathery leaves, and water ribbons with long flat leaves lying on the surface like bright green ribbons, a few with white-green flower spikes standing up out of the water.

On the surface of the pool are beautiful reflections – dark trunks, feathery wattle leaves, a grassy bank and blue sky with a few white clouds. There is movement on the surface caused by a gentle breeze, and ripples of busy water beetles held up by the surface tension. Small leaves float among many silvery-winged insects that landed in the wrong place. Other insects fly above the pool. A honeyeater hops through the branches. A bird of prey soars high above. I hear other birds, a distant kookaburra's laugh, a cuckoo calling for a mate to lay an egg in someone else's nest, a fairy wren perhaps building a nest in the dry reeds downstream of the pool.


A dragonfly flits over the surface, perfectly reflected in the now still water. It turns at the end of the pool and flies back downstream. I follow it, climbing over rocks where small lizards, warmed by the sun, leap off as I approach. I arrive at the next pool. It is shallower, narrower and longer. This pool is sunny, surrounded by clumps of rushes, grasses and smaller plants. There is one tree, a small blackwood wattle, its twisted trunk growing out of the side of an eroded section of

bank, then upwards. The trunk of a larger blackwood lies across the pool. Grasses and rushes grow on the cracks in the top of it. As they die, they breakdown to form soil. Maybe, one day a small bush will grow here. The trunk creates a stripe of shade in the sunny pool. It is surrounded by small water ribbons, and milfoil growing little yellow flowers above the water. I watch the dragonfly, its wings silvery in the sun. There are few other insects. The silverwinged insects that landed in this pool are now just silver wings floating on the surface, their bodies eaten by the many tiny fish below, risking death themselves as the water mostly dries up in summer. Some must survive for there to be so many. I saw no sign on them in the deeper cooler pool. The surface of this pool has a milky layer. I see fewer water beetles and no nearby birds. The dragonfly prefers it here, flying back and forth across the water, as is a smaller red-bodied dragonfly.

The two pools are only a short distance apart, but perhaps the presence or absence of shady trees, has created two very different habitats, each suiting different plants and animals.

Control Serrated Tussock NOW

Many people will have seen 'Control Serrated Tussock Now' signs on roadsides, from freeways to tiny local roads, but when is now?

With many weeds there is a clear season of opportunity to apply effective treatment, and outside of the given season much of the effort to control the weed will be wasted. However with Serrated Tussock there is a range of treatment options to choose from, which means there are methods appropriate for most times of year, and using a combination of techniques will achieve the best outcome.

Cultivation can be used whenever it's timely to put in a crop. Not only will good cultivation itself kill the plants present, the vigorous competition of the crop or new pasture is the best thing to combat the re-emergence of Serrated Tussock. Even cultivation left fallow can be used to help beat an infestation by promoting the germination of seed sitting in the soil, providing an excellent opportunity to undertake follow-up treatment the following season. Herbicide application may be the best option for non-arable areas. The herbicide Flupropanate will selectively kill Serrated Tussock without killing many other desirable species, it does however take several months for plants to absorb the herbicide through their roots but it will last in the soil for a number of years, killing new Serrated Tussock seedlings as they germinate. Glyphosate can take effect in a couple weeks, so can be applied to prevent seeding most of the year, it has no residual effect and is non-selective, so needs careful application and frequent follow-up.


Grubbing or digging out is great for small infestations anywhere any time of year, but preferably before October in order to beat seeding. If there are seeds present on the removed plants, whole plants should be placed in bags on site and incinerated when safe to do so.

Grazing management is also important year round, it is essential to maintain a competitive plant cover by avoiding overgrazing, this will minimise the occurrence of bare ground and reduce the opportunity for weed invasion.

Serrated Tussock treatment should always be done with the aim of preventing plants from setting seed. Flowering generally starts in October, with seed development occurring over the warmer months, and the mature seed ready to blow across the landscape in December.

So the right time to control Serrated Tussock is always NOW.



Parents/guardians are required to apply for Child Care Benefit with the **Family Assistance Office on 13 61 50**. Parents/guardians must be assessed prior to commencement of care. Both families and the service will be notified of eligibility. Parents/guardians are required to pay their part of the fees (i.e. the balance after subsidy) directly to the school. We will accept cash, cheque, EFTPOS, Credit Card.

Families may also be eligible for <u>Child Care Rebate (CCR)</u>. If you are using approved child care for work, training or study related reasons, the government will provide you with 50 per cent of your out of pocket child care costs.

Vale to Margaret Lorraine Fink

Long time Meredith resident and postmistress, Lorraine Fink met her husband Lyndsay at P.F.A. meetings in Dandenong and married in 1952. They had four daughters: Alison, Julie, Jenny and Merrilyn.

They farmed at Tarwin, near Meeniyan in South Gippsland, then share-dairy farmed on the Mornington Peninsula before being allocated a Soldier Settlement block on the Heytsbury Settlement about 1965.

Lorraine was Postmaster from 1977 until they sold the Post Office business to Pat and Derrick Dodson, who owned the General Store known as the "Top Shop" in Staughton Street. The Post Office accounts Commonwealth Bank and organizing mail runs to Bamganie, Durdidwarrah and the town.

Dot Hearn tells that Lorraine also made good coffee. When Dot came to the Post Office after escorting children across the road at the school crossing or between mail runs, Lorraine would have a hot cup of coffee ready for her on cold mornings.

Lorraine was always friendly, professional, discreet, efficient and Some of us took advantage of a free course run by competent. She helped people by hearing their stories, advising and caring for everyone. She was a Justice of the Peace and was awarded the Australia Day Citizens Award on 26th January 1994. A vellow scented gum tree was planted in Pioneer Park, Meredith to honour the Citizen of the Year award given to Lorraine.

> Lorraine and Lyndsay were a devoted couple who enjoyed many interests together, including a love of gardens and gardening, the Field Naturalists Club, Legacy, photography and sharing photos,

They moved to a unit in Sebastopol in 2002. Lyndsay died in 2010 "Mapping Our Anzacs" as being born at Meredith, are and Lorraine lived by herself in the unit until she suffered some ill being researched. 

Built in Apps (Part 1)

If you have an iPad you will have noticed that the device comes with a number of Apps already loaded, but have you explored what these Apps can really do?

The Calendar

Any calendar or daily organiser is only as useful as you make it, but there are some good reasons to consider using this one. You can set up one-off appointments or schedule regular meetings. You can send invitations to others on your contacts list, and set alerts to let you know when an appointment is coming up. If you receive an email or message with a time and date in it, your iPad will ask if you want to create that as a new event in your calendar. Once you get the hang of the appointment menu, it is easy to add, delete or change events you have scheduled. Whether it is for a dental appointment or coffee with friends, the calendar helps you keep organised.

The Clock

I do like having a clock that automatically adjusts to daylight savings, but this clever little tool has other features as well. Do you know someone overseas? You can set up separate clocks for any of dozens of cities, so you know not to call someone at 3am in Brazil! The world map shows you briefly what the weather is in each of your chosen destinations as well. The clock also has an alarm, a timer and a stopwatch. I rarely do anything fast enough to make a stop watch worthwhile but the timer can remind you to take the cake out of the oven or when your favourite show is about to start.

Contacts

If you have an iPhone, you will already have a contacts list, and your iPad will synch with it automatically. I find it much easier to add to or amend my contacts on the iPad with the larger screen and keyboard. It is worth taking a few minutes to set up your regular contacts as this information can then be used in other applications. For example you can easily send a message to a contact, use FaceTime to video call them, or ask Siri to take a message to that person. We will discuss these apps in more detail next time.

It's Time to Get FireReady

Be Prepared This Fire Season.

Spring is well and truly upon us and with vegetation growth at its peak it is a timely reminder that the fire season is just around the corner and you should be fully prepared.

It is important to prepare before the fire season and Council is urging all residents to take the necessary steps to ensure they are Fire Ready now.

High Fire Danger Expected.

The Bushfire and Natural Hazard Cooperative Research Centre has released its Southern Australia Seasonal Bushfire Outlook, which forecasts a trend towards an increasing number of bad fire weather days.

The forecast for Victoria is for an above normal season in many areas of central, north and western Victoria. Key factors informing this forecast are the below average rainfall, a warmer spring and potential for the fire season to start earlier and end later.



Heavy Infringements if you put others at risk.

Council's Fire Prevention Officers will commence inspecting properties in November to ensure flammable material located close to homes is cut or removed to reduce the risk posed by fire to lives and property over the fire season.

Almost 1000 fire prevention notices are issued each year to residents who place their neighbours and themselves at risk by not undertaking reasonable management of their properties during the fire season.

This year in accordance with the CFA Act (1958) and in light of the continued irresponsible behaviour and significant community risk these properties present, Council will be issuing fines in excess of \$1400 to any person failing to respond to a fire hazard notification. Non-compliant property owners will also be responsible for the costs associated with removal of the hazard.

Excuses for placing the wider community at risk will no longer be tolerated.

Place noodles in medium heatproof bowl, cover with boiling water, stand for 3 minutes, drain. Cut into random lengths. Heat oil in wok or frypan. Stir fry mince and onion until mince changes color. Add curry powder, stir fry until fragrant. Add carrot, stir fry until carrot softens. Add sauces, wombok and peas to wok. Stir fry about 2 minutes or until vegetables soften.

Divide wombok or lettuce leaves among serving bowls. Toss noodles with mince mixture and divide among wombok cups.







"Barracuda" by Christos Tsiolkas

Daniel Kelly is such a prodigy at swimming that he wins a scholarship to a 'posh' Melbourne private school with the finest swimming program. His whole life Danny has only wanted one thing: to win Olympic Gold and every thought, every dream, every action takes him closer to that moment of glory. He is given every chance to make a heroic dash for the prize but at what cost to his family, his friends and himself.

Danny finds that he can't always achieve what he sets out to do and the shame that comes with this almost ruins him. For a long time he battles with his personal character and believes that people pity him. He struggles with alcohol, leftover resentments from school, hatred of himself, his nation and many others. He sees others achieving but cannot get himself out of the mire.

It has been described as a social realist novel. It is about class and sport and migration and politics and education and about families. The author favours a frankness of language and has some explicit descriptions of bodily functions. It has been described as an unflinching look at modern Australia and has a texture of how people really live and speak.

The language is also filled with watery metaphors like drowning, floating and freestyle that have both swimming and non-swimming meanings. Breathing is important in swimming and Danny later found its importance in living and coping.

The book has been described as structurally cunning in that chapters proceed non-chronologically. We know from early on that Danny has been in jail but the precise nature of his crime is lengthily withheld, although hinted

At different times in the story that covers 16 years Danny is known as Danny, Dan, Dino and Barracuda. This range of names reflects the unstable identity of the swimmer who suffers both class and sexual confusion.

Almost every major character is an immigrant or emigrant of some kind. The book explores both the personal character of Danny but also the national character and what it means to be Australian. Is the image that is promoted by politicians and marketers, who we really are?

The book raised many issues for discussion but is not a book full of joy and positive thoughts. Only at the very end of the book do we see a small ray of sunshine, maybe! Christos Tsiolkas is also the author of the much acclaimed book "The Slap" which is described as another startling, profound novel about modern Australia. Many bookclub members loved this book.

The book for discussion in November is "The Immortal Life of Henrieta Lacks" by Rebecca Skloot.



Anzac Centenary

Mal Johns President Inverleigh RSL Sub - Branch

Australian forces first involvements in World War One was an attack on the German Wireless station at BitaPaka southeast of Rabual on New Britain on the 11th September 1914. The force consisted of 3 officers, 25 naval reservists and 15 support personnel. Lt Rowland Bowen was in charge

The first Australian casualty of the war, Able Seaman Billy Williams From Northcote and an ex employee of the city of Melbourne, occurred at this battle. In all, six Australians were killed: 2 officers and 4 able seamen. These servicemen now rest at the BitaPaka War Cemetery established in 1945 when World War 1 graves were transferred from Rabaul cemetery in 1950 and the old Kokopo German cemetery in 1961. In all, the graves of 32 world war 1 servicemen are at BitaPaka

Also in the cemetery is the Rabaul Memorial in memory of 1,200 members of the Australian Army and Airforce and personnel of the PNG local forces and Constabulary who lost their lives in the area in Jan/Feb 1942 and from Nov 1944/Aug 1945 and have no known grave

Last November, my wife and I went to the Milne Bay area and Rabaul and visited the BitaPaka war cemetery. Like all the cemeterys throughout the world, it is well maintained. At Bita Paka, rows of graves with numerous panels with names of all who died in various conflicts in the region and as prisoners of war, sit in a peaceful setting. We also located a memorial to those Allied POW'S who perished on the Montevideo Maru when sunk off the Phillipines. We laid a poppy in Remembrance to two of the local men from Teesdale: Richard Bromilow and Keith Wilson, who perished along with all the others. Their names are listed on the monument at Teesdale



Joyce Stanley (Eberhart) celebrated her 80th birthday in August with a family lunch at Craigs Hotel in Ballarat.

Joyce has been a sportswoman of considerable talent and enjoyed playing tennis and golf. Recently she recalled that she started playing tennis around 12 years old, at Elaine where she grew up. The tennis court at the Recreation Reserve was the meeting place for the young people of Elaine at that time. She recalls that Girlie Le Maitre asked Mavis Connell and herself to play in the Elaine team on Saturdays when Dot Randall and Kath Randall went to horse gymkhanas. (The team mainly consisted of members of the Le Maitre and Randall families.) Girlie told Joyce that she liked to play with her "as long as she ran".

Joyce had a special talent when playing on the net. She moved quickly, anticipated the play and won a lot of shots. She remembers that one opponent always tried "to put the ball through the player on the net" and scared his opposition so that they wouldn't play on the net. Joyce was frightened but was determined to not let him bluff her. So she stayed on the net and learnt to volley the ball for winners.

A Mooney Cup team that consisted of all Elaine players except Mondo Kennedy and Theo Irvine won Country Week (played in Ballarat) A Grade in 1951. Joyce played with the team in 1952 and 1953. They won the A Grade in both of those years and because they won the cup for three consecutive years they were allowed to keep it.


While women tennis players usually wore dresses or skirts and shirts, Joyce wore a shirt and shorts. She says that she never played with anything but a wooden racket. She would practice hitting balls on the door behind their house. There was a bitumen back yard that gave a good bounce but her father 'went crook' when she missed the door and the ball went through the plaster wall.

Joyce played most of her tennis with Meredith teams in the Mooney Cup Association although she did play two years with Morrison in her early career. She also helped to get juniors playing in C Grade teams before Saturday morning tennis for juniors started. She retired from tennis in her mid-forties.

Paddock Plans

The Police Paddocks Support Group met last month to review progress for the year and plans for the year ahead. Of immediate concern was the annual fire abatement strategy, which will again include slashing a broad strip along the western boundary after the growth season. The Group plans to attempt a narrow "natural" path across the Coolebarghurk Creek as the northern end of the site by selectively poisoning and clearing vegetation. It will also seek the permission of Ballarat Environment Network (which manages the site) to plan and construct enhanced entrances at both Campion Road and Nuttall Street entry points.

Another focus will be the maintenance of the newly established wildflower patch and the construction of another one or two next autumn. It is intended that this will form part of a primary school engagement project.

A third project for the coming year, will be the first stage of a wetlands development in the natural "soak" area near Nuttall Street. This has potential to be quite extensive and build on the site's biodiversity as well as adding further visitor interest.

The Meredith Art Group attended the Opening of Warwick Fuller's Art Exhibition at Lost Bear Gallery in Katoomba on Saturday, October 4 at 3pm.

We flew from Avalon on a 6am flight to Sydney. Breakfast was enjoyed at Lindsay's café at the Norman Lindsay Gallery and Museum at Faulconbridge in the Blue Mountains. The house and surrounding land was first purchased by Norman Lindsay and his wife Rose in 1913. Lindsay was a celebrated artist (lots of nude women) and writer (Magic Pudding) who grew up at Creswick. After breakfast we toured the buildings and estate and saw preparations being made for a wedding to be held there later in the day.

We then travelled on to Katoomba in our two hire cars. After viewing the mountains at a popular spot in Katoomba we went to the gallery to see the art works, which included a garden full of rusty sculptures, to speak to Warwick and to attend the opening ceremony.

Walking the Paddocks

On a warm sunny Sunday afternoon, fourteen members of the Meredith Police Paddocks Support Group went for a walk in the Police Paddocks. Our aim was to see the results of our labours and to look for spring wildflowers. We started our walk following a grassy path down the hillside to the creek, passing healthy young trees planted and cared for over the The northern part of the Police Paddocks has been grazed boxes constructed by the schoolchildren last year. In the mud species of watercress, possibly edible, but definitely an indigenous to the area. We found a small group of bulbine the long green leaves of water ribbons were seen in the water. lilies with a few yellow flowers opening on the stalk of one. We also found a beautiful big brown spider on the grass. Its large round abdomen earns it the name of football spider. On its underside it had a bright orange stripe with a black stripe in the centre, giving it its alternative name of badge huntsman. Its legs were also striped with black, orange and blue-grey.

We walked back to the hilltop and followed the track with its views over the valley. We stopped to check on a recent project, the creation of the first wildflower patch. A range of

local wildflowers have been planted around a patch of naturally occurring milky beauty-heads, which creeps along the ground with small grey-green leaves and spherical heads of tiny white daisy flowers in autumn. Further along the path more of this lovely plant was found, giving us another place for a wildflower patch. On the steep slope on the opposite side of the path, purple-blue flowers of bluebells are growing among the rocks.

last few years. We saw that birds have been using the nesting recently to remove excess grass, both to benefit any native plants and to reduce the fire risk. > We returned to the grazed area and made another discovery. We found rocks laid out along three sides of a rectangle, with a low bank of earth along the fourth side. We suspect that this may be the foundations of a lockup built in the mid to late 1850s, the oldest European building in the Police Paddocks. We finished our walk satisfied with our work, excited by our discoveries and wondering what other secrets we'll uncover as we keep working on this beautiful reserve.




