Cr Des Phelan Elected Mayor for Golden Plains

Golden Plains Shire's Mayoral election was held at Council's Special Meeting today with Cr Phelan elected as Mayor. Cr Phelan was nominated as Mayor Elect at the October Council Meeting. Cr Phelan makes a return to the Mayoral role after first representing Golden Plains Shire as a Councillor between 1996 and 1999 and was the inaugural Mayor. He has served a total of 23 years with Golden Plains Shire Council and former Grenville Shire Council, including five terms as Mayor.

Cr Phelan said he is honoured to be leading Council for this term and thanked his colleagues for their expression of confidence.

In his acceptance address, Cr Phelan spoke of the challenges facing the municipality in the year to come, stating that Council will continue to face difficult decisions and looked forward to Council working as a team to meet the challenges head on. We know that as the expectation of our communities continues to grow, combined with our continued financial pressures, we will be required to be innovative in our approach to managing the affairs of Council in the years to come," said Cr Phelan.

"We remain one of the fastest growing regional Council's in Victoria, and this continues to place our existing services under pressure; we need to meet the demands of growth within a responsible financial strategy," said Cr Phelan.

Cr Phelan has lived and worked in Golden Plains Shire all his life. He currently resides in Springdallah in the centre of the Shire where he owns and operates a farm. He has had a strong association with organisations and communities within the Shire.

"The task ahead for local government presents many opportunities too and I consider it a privilege to be Mayor of Golden Plains," Cr Phelan concluded.



In my GARDEN

Spring is almost done, and as summer approaches the level of this gardener's anxiety rises. Although the garden is passed its spring best now, it remains green and lush with the roses, fuchsias and callistemon adding bursts of colour and the masses of hydrangea blooms beginning to show their potential. The trees and shrubs have tons of new growth and all is well. One very windy and hot day can change all this and, while inevitable, it would be nice if the first of these days came after Christmas.

I love to have a beautiful garden for Christmas Day and super effort is required to protect the garden should conditions turn nasty prior to this. Heat is the big enemy of the gardener, especially if extreme conditions present early in summer, or even worse, in late spring. Tender new plant growth has not had a chance to harden to the conditions, and will burn crisp in a minute in hot and windy conditions. Protecting the plants becomes a priority and old sheets are at the ready to cover all tender plants including the tomatoes and lettuces that will be exposed to direct sunlight sometime during the hot day. The greenhouse, potted plants and vegetables will be watered at least twice. It becomes a battle between gardener and the elements with the aim of saving plants and minimising the damage. Fortunately, the gardener always recovers after a good night's sleep but sadly the same cannot always be said of the plants.

Managing the garden in hot weather is a daily commitment and to the non-gardener it may seem that the gardener is quite obsessed and unbalanced, even mad. Unavoidably, that daily commitment means that it is simply impossible to consider leaving the garden for a few days, for any reason, from mid spring through to mid autumn. Holidays, interstate weddings, jury service and hospitalisation are completely out of the question. The temperature in a greenhouse can rise in just a few minutes, when the sun comes out, and one needs to be on hand to open doors and vents to prevent overheating. Ensuring adequate water to all parts of the garden during warm to hot weather is nearly a full-time job. I cannot see the point in planting anything, whether it is a crop of vegetables, a fruit tree or any other plant, only to allow them to languish through lack of water and protection.

A reliable water supply is also cause for increasing anxiety as it heats up, and disaster is never far away. In fact, for this gardener, disaster is only ever a broken bore pump away and it can take days before a pump can be repaired depending on demand elsewhere for pump repairs. Relying on tank and town water is a very short-term solution available for use on only the most vulnerable of plants. I remain very thankful that, given a functioning pump, I have a bountiful supply of water. The bore water is also essential for flushing out, and topping up the frog - fish - duck pond. During the hot weather the growth of algae is considerable and can choke the water making life difficult for the normal water inhabitants if the algae are not controlled. Regular replacement of about one-quarter of the pond water assists in keeping the algae growth within healthy pond limits.

The above anxieties aside, the warmer days and nights have been welcome. Summer vegetables thrive in the warmth and it is wonderful to see just how much pumpkin, zucchini and cucumber vines have grown as the temperature rises. The tomatoes have also put on a growth spurt and especially so when accompanied by good rains. Hand watering is always a poor substitute for a good downpour. Birds of all kinds are still busy nest building and laying eggs. My ducks are sitting on two dozen eggs. I hope the drake rose

to the occasion, before egg laying commenced in earnest, to ensure that eggs will be fertilised and ducklings will result. The comet gold fish continue to frolic in the pond and I will be the happiest person on the planet if I spot any tiny gold fish. I couldn't receive a better Christmas present.

The old gum tree stands alone in the paddock. It started its life as a seedling in a forest, long before Europeans arrived. Most of the forest was cleared for building material, fence posts, mine supports, firewood and to create grazing lands. This is one of the few survivors. Its spreading branches and massive trunk provide shade to the farmer's sheep in summer and shelter from storms and frost. Its roots, reaching far underground, help to hold the soil in place, preventing erosion by wind or water. They convey nutrients from deep in the soil, to its leaves, which eventually fall, releasing the nutrients into the topsoil. The roots suck water from deep below, preventing the water table from rising and bringing salts closer to the surface where they can kill pasture plants.

A deep mound of sticks in a fork of two huge branches is an occasionally used nest for wedge-tailed eagles, who feed themselves and their chicks mostly on rabbits, sighted from high above. Magpies roost in the tree at night, and spend much of their day eating insect pests. Smaller birds hop among the branches, seeking insects or nectar for food, and a resting place on their travels. They peck some of the munching caterpillars off the tree's leaves. Too many caterpillars can defoliate the tree, leading to a slow decline and death. A hawk, perched on a high dead stick looks out for mice and lizards in the grass. A trail of ants climbs from their nest near the base of the tree high into the branches seeking nectar and other insects to feed their colony. A passing echidna presses its nose to the ground. When it detects the ants it uses its strong claws to tear open the nest and its long tongue to lick up ants.

A fallen branch provides shelter for a blue tongue lizard. It creeps out slowly in the morning to bask on top of the branch in the sun, warming up for a day of activity, but remaining close enough to its home to crawl inside if it detects danger. Above, the broken off branch reveals a hollow. A pair of colourful eastern rosellas are preparing a nest, making a soft bed of rotting wood for their eggs. In another hollow, small bats sleep, hanging upside down, wings folded around their bodies. At dusk they awake, stretch their wings and fly out. Their high-pitched echolocation calls detect the insects they hunt around the tree's canopy. Under the bark, spiders and moths spend their day, waiting for darkness.

A koala arrived last night, digging its sharp claws into the trunk as it climbed to a high tree fork. It is sleeping. Later, it will wake and browse on nearby leaves. It may stay a few days, then reverse down the trunk, and walk across the paddock to another tree or a distant patch of bush.

The well-pollinated tree drops many seeds. Some of them germinate to become seedlings, but the sheep eat them. The tree is ancient, but there are no young trees nearby to replace it. When it dies, it will still provide homes for many creatures, but it will no longer provide shelter or nectar or look after the soil. While it is still alive, seeds could be collected to germinate in a nursery and be planted with care to grow into new paddock trees, or a fenced off area near the tree would give seedlings a chance to survive.

Fire Dangers this Summer

Each of you as members of this community need to be aware of the impending fire danger we face this season. The conditions we face this year are more serious than in recent years. Fuel levels around the district are higher, warmer weather has come along earlier than usual which has dried fuel levels in the bush and grasslands and the forecast for the fire danger period is for a long, hot and dry period.

While it is the responsibility of each individual and home owner to be prepared should you be faced with the threat of fire, I would like to outline a few very important tips that may help you be better prepared.

- A written fire plan may save your life. Would you remember a plan that's just in your head if you're surrounded by smoke, heat, flame and noise?
- Know where you'll go and what you'll do on a hot, dry, windy day. Have multiple options and routes.
 Practise packing and travelling the routes, especially if you live in bushland like Pioneer Ridge or Bamganie.
- Don't wait for a warning to be sent to your phone or a knock on your door, leaving early is the key.
- Check the Fire Danger Rating and Total Fire Ban for your district every day over summer, Meredith and surrounding districts comes under the Central District.
- Keep your property clean and tidy from dry combustible materials.
- STAY INFORMED. There are lots of ways to stay informed and it's important to have access to more than one source of information. Stay up-to-date by tuning into ABC local radio, commercial and designated community radio stations, SKY News TV, phone the Victorian Bushfire Information Line on 1800 240 667, visit: emergency.vic.gov.au, CFA's website, Facebook or Twitter accounts, and by downloading the FireReady app. Check firecommissioner.vic.gov.au for a full list of emergency broadcasters.
- Most important of all is to call triple zero (000) to report a fire. The earlier you call 000, the faster the fire trucks arrive to put out the fire. In some cases early reporting is the most important tool a fire brigade can have.

Members of the community can find out more information by visiting the Country Fire Authority website at: cfa.vic.gov.au. There you will find helpful hints and tips to better prepare yourself for this coming fire season.

Police Paddocks Burnt

On a Sunday morning late last month the Meredith Rural Fire Brigade conducted a controlled burn in the Police Paddock Reserve. The burn was undertaken to reduce the fuel levels in the paddock that had been increasing over many years. Starting at 9:30am it was very smoky for a short time, but everything went according to plan, and the goal was achieved. All Brigade members did an outstanding job.

The burn has multiple benefits, as well as reducing the fire hazard for neighbouring properties, it takes an enormous weight off the shoulders of the brigade by removing a large part of the hazard that the paddock posed. There is also a considerable environmental benefit, as the removal of the large mass of exotic grass, creates an opportunity for residual native grasses to re-establish.





Every quarter, we report water quality of the Moorabool River at Slate Quarry Road, using a measure of salinity. While this is a good overall indicator, Waterwatch volunteers also measure turbidity, pH, phosphorus, and oxygen to gain a more complete picture of river health. Built in Apps (Part 2)

The Apple Store is a giant Department Store with lots of different shop fronts. Here are just a few of them:

#Note that if you haven't yet downloaded the latest software upgrade IOS 8.1, some of these may look and behave a little different to the way they are described below.

Music

When you open Music you will find yourself in the Radio section. Have a look through the free stations that are available. Whatever your tastes, you can find a station to enjoy, advertisement free. You are not actually buying the music, just listening to whatever they play, but do remember that you can chew up quite a bit of download if you have it on for hours.

To get to the shop, select Songs from the options at the bottom of screen. This takes you to your own music if you have any loaded. In the top left of screen, touch Store. There is a search engine in the top left so you can type in a performer, a song title, a genre, even a decade, such as the seventies and see what comes up. Individual songs usually cost between \$1.50 and \$2.50, or whole albums are around \$15 to \$20. At the bottom of the screen you will see that you can also browse Movies, TV Shows and Audiobooks, so there is plenty to keep you entertained.

iBooks

iBooks is now linked directly to the Store, so when you open it you see your own bookshelf, then options across the bottom of the screen for Featured, Top Charts and Top Authors. Just as in the Music Storefront, there is a search icon in the top right. The Featured section changes regularly and shows new releases, top sellers, etc. it is a good place to start if you are not sure what you are looking for. Tap the Categories button top left to see all sorts of options from Crime Thrillers, to Humour, to Romance. Choose a particular book to get a detailed description and reviews from other readers. The Sample button lets you download the first 10% free so you can decide if you want the book.

App Store

The App Store is set out the same way with a front page showing new and recommended Apps, then have a look at Explore to see Apps organised into categories for easy browsing. Do you have a little red number showing on the App store icon? That means that there is an update waiting for one or more of your Apps. You can download each one separately or Upgrade All with one touch. Again, there is a search engine in the top right corner, and additional info about each App to help you choose.

Once you have explored one section of the Apple Store, the format becomes familiar and it is easy to find your way around new sections. You don't need to spend lots of cash to find enjoyable and informative content to add to your iPad. Have fun!

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Meredith Dairy News



Julie Cameron

At the opening of the Meredith Visitors Centre it was proudly announced that Meredith Dairy has been granted several million dollars towards developing the business. We wish, in fact the State Government has promised a \$200,000 grant, conditional on Meredith Dairy investing \$3 million dollars towards increasing manufacturing capacity and facilitating expansion.

Meredith Dairy is indeed investing a lot into the business. Some of the investment is obvious- a new dairy on the Mt Mercer Rd, and other investment less so (research into vaccine development and genetic improvement).. We now milk on four different dairies scattered across the farm- about 1,200 ewes and 3,500 goats are milked twice a day. This milk, along with that from the goat farm at Bannockburn, and another at Ross Creek is processed daily, mainly into fresh cheese. We have 80 or so people keeping the whole show ticking over, including several who are constantly building something or other. We have sales staff in Sydney and Melbourne. About half our cheese is sold in Melbourne, 5% exported (mainly to NZ and USA) and the rest across Australia. We now sell direct to Coles (only to about a quarter of their stores) and via a distributor we sell in about 120 Woolworths stores).

Our aim is not just to grow the business just for the sake of it. The Cameron family only ever intended to replace their city incomes (which as a scientist and a nurse were pretty modest) when they went farming in 1990. But there seems plenty of demand for the cheese and yoghurt, and plenty of keen helpers, so provided we continue to be supported by so many in the community we will continue to develop at a reasonable pace, hopefully in an environmentally and socially responsible way

Sydney was responding to a reported attack on a communications station at Direction Island by the German light Cruiser SMS Emden, under the Command of Karl Von Muller with a crew of 316 personnel. During a two month period the German Cruiser captured or sank 25 civilian vessels, shelled Madras, and destroyed two Allied warships at Penang.

Early November 1914 the Emden arrived of the Cocos (Keeling) Islands, Karl Von Muller decided to attack the communication station at Direction Island and hamper communications and frustrate the search for his ship.

Around this time the first convoy was leaving Albany and HMAS Sydney, under the command of Captain John Glossop and a crew of 434 personnel, was dispatched to investigate a distress call from the communication station.

Emden arrived at the islands during the night of 8th-9th November and sent a shore party to disable the communication station. During the attack the station was able to transmit a distress call before it was shut down.

Emden opened fire on Sydney at 0940 hrs scoring hits but was unable to inflict disabling damage to the Australian Cruiser, before Sydney opened fire with her powerful main guns. At 1120hrs Von Muller ordered that the Emden beach on North Keeling Island. The Australian warship broke away to pursue the collier Buresk which was with the Emden. This vessel was scuttled by its crew, Sydney then returned to North Keeling Island at 1600hrs, at this point the Emden's Battle Ensign was still flying, and after no resonse to instructions to lower the ensign, Captain Glossop ordered two salvoes shot into the beached cruiser. Sydney had orders to ascertain the status of the transmission station, but returned the next day to provide medical assistance to the Germans.

Of the Emden's crew, 134 were killed and 69 wounded, Sydney suffered 4 killed and 16 wounded. The German survivors were taken aboard the Sydney and then transferred to the auxiliary cruiser

Empress of Russia on the 12th November. Sydney rejoined the ANZAC convoy in Colombo then spent the rest of the war assigned to the North America and West Indies Station and then the British Grand Fleet. Von Muller and some of his officers were imprisoned in Malta and the rest of the German personnel were sent to POW camps in Australia. Source Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia

country and starting again' have all been drawn upon to create her latest record.

And reviews that have suggested she's moved away from her blues roots? 'I'm a fan of soulful music, whatever the genre, and

on this latest album I really enjoyed allowing some of my 80s childhood influences to come through.'

As the MMF fast approaches, Mia explains that festivals are a great way to expose audiences to different music and genres and that playing to people that have not heard her music before is an exciting part of performing at such events. 'Trying to win people over as opposed to playing to fans who know the songs...it can be challenging but definitely a thrill.'

'Our set at Meredith will be pretty rocking and dynamic,' she says before explaining that the act she's looking forward to seeing is The War on Drugs.

So if you're heading to the Meredith Music Festival do yourself a favour and check her out, and make sure you keep an ear out for her title track *Idyllwild* which is her personal favourite because of its frenetic mood and *'it's so much fun to play.'*

And to any first time festival goers, her general advice is to 'get amongst it down the front!'

iVan the Terrific

Young people in the Golden Plains Shire are celebrating the official opening of the Golden Plains Youth Connection project. They now have access to public transport, information regarding community programs, health and wellbeing resources and a mobile youth friendly space.

A 2011 forum of young people in Geelong found some regional towns had limited public transport options, preventing young people from getting involved in community and sporting events.

A mini bus between Inverleigh and Geelong was trialled over five consecutive Saturdays during school holidays with encouraging results. The current project extends the service to Golden Plains Shire.

Known as iVan, the vehicle has been fitted with a television, PlayStation and Wii console, sound system, in-built table, reversed seating and lighting. The vehicle is used at many local community festivals, and school holiday programs to promote services and programs available for young people.

It is also used as a mobile meeting space for the Golden Plains Shire's youth committees and provides small groups of young people with a viable transport option.

The project has increased awareness of how young people can become involved in their local communities, which has decreased the likelihood of them feeling a sense of isolation.

It has also provided access to information regarding health and wellbeing.

The proejcted was fudned by the state governemnt (\$75,000) and \$15,000 of in-kind support from Golden Plains Shire Council.

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it's **H**istory

Let us go on a journey through history, back 100 years to April 1914:

The Meredith Progress Association is going strong, last month the Anglican Church of Epiphany dedicated their beautiful new building, built by the Smith Brothers, the Bush Fire Brigade is three years old, but still don't have a fire cart, and the grand three storey Royal Hotel on the corner of Staughton and Wallace streets, has just celebrated its 60th birthday.

The licensee, James Bourke, 10 days ago employed a new Cook, 48 yr old, Katherine Leahy. Katherine was recommended by the employment registry in Ballarat, she arrived with all her possessions in a tin trunk. We don't know much about her, we don't even know if she had a family.

Its Saturday night, it has been a busy day, lots of meals prepared, lots of beers pulled, & lots of 'yarning'. At 11 pm James Bourke, calls **"last drinks gentlemen**". At 11.30 pm as the last man staggers out of the Bar, James locks up for the night, securing all the doors and windows. Katherine the new Cook & the children have already gone to bed. James checks that the fires in the grates are all out, extinguishes all the lamps and candles, and James and his wife climb the stairs and retire to bed. it's been a busy night satisfying the thirsts of the men of Meredith.

All is quiet at the Royal, all sleeping soundly.

Now it's 2 am. A neighbour living opposite awakes, he sees a red glow on his bedroom window, he gets up to see the Royal Hotel in flames. About this same time James Bourke awakes to the smell of something burning and as he steps out into the passage he realises the hotel is on fire, and it seems to be coming from the kitchen area, downstairs.

James quickly arouses all his family, runs to Katherine's room, knocks on her door yelling "fire" "fire". He returns to help his family to safety. The passage on the second floor where they sleep, is filled with smoke. James lights a couple of candles to guide them to the stairway, but the smoke is so dense that they can't see anything, so they all hold onto each other and grope their way along the wall, they find the stairs, and escape out into the street through the front door. By the time the family have reached safety, several neighbours have seen the reflection of the flames lighting up the night sky, and have gathered to help, they endeavour to save some of their belongings. They break down the Bar door and get the iron safe out, at least the takings are safe. Then they realise that Katherine is not with them, some men enter the burning building in an attempt to reach her, but are driven back by the intensity of the heat.

Within half an hour the roof has collapsed and only the chimneys are left standing. All that is left is a pile of ash All the contents are destroyed, including two pianos. Sadly Katherine's charred body is found among the ashes. She is buried in an unmarked grave in the Meredith Cemetery.

The surrounding buildings somehow managed to escape any damage. Meredith's Mounted Constable Loughron investigated this fatal fire, and his findings were, that he is satisfied that the fire was accidental.

It was reported that the building was underinsured, but by September of the same year, a new single story Hotel has risen from the ashes, the building that continues to serve the community of Meredith and district today, 100 years on.

One Hundred Years at the Royal Hotel

Nostalgia filled the air at the Royal Hotel on Sunday, November 9 when MHIG held a "birthday bash" to celebrate 100 years of the hotel building.

In the beer garden behind the hotel building, on a balmy Sunday afternoon, surrounded by the historic billiard room, the shed which would have housed horses, the morgue and the underground tank we listened to people tell stories about the hotel.

Les Smith related how his family built the new hotel building in 1914 which they later owned. Les' mother was one of the seven daughters of Mr and Mrs Gardiner who had the Railway Hotel in Meredith and the family are in the process of restoring graves of their relatives.

Doreen Vanstan recalled how the hotel ledger book recorded that the whole Mooney family and others stayed at the Royal on Christmas Eve in 1939.

According to Rita Beggs, the morgue was part of the outside shed and that the door was always locked. She also told of the cupboard that drinks were served from After hours.

Lois Hoad remembered how they served a record 250 plus meals one night. She said they always cooked the steaks on the top of the wood stove and the chips were made at the hotel. Peter would peel potatoes when he was behind the bar.

Jack Connell laughed as he told how Ma Mooney supplied a bottle of whisky each week for the footballers but Uke Kerger, the trainer, often drank it before half time.

Brendan O'Loughlin remembered how Chris Mooney spoiled his nephews and nieces with chocolates and lemonade.

Although her family lived next door in the CRB house, Pat McCormack explained how she lived at the hotel when she worked for Ma Mooney.

As a child Denis Ryan was not allowed into the kitchen but the kids climbed up to the loft and had to look through a window into the kitchen. and saw patients weekly.

Geoff Hardy told how Ron Barker, an ex Bank Manager, kept meticulous records when he owned the Royal.

John Stevens explained how Chris Mooney was a great sportsman and how he and his wife Kit supported sport, especially Country Week Tennis.

With photographs to show everyone, Bernard Ryan told how his parents had their wedding breakfast in the dining room.

Damian Kelly, the licencee welcomed the crowd to the hotel and conducted a tour of the building. We sang Happy Birthday and Les Smith and Rita Beggs, representing two families who were associated with the hotel for many years, blew out the candle and cut the cake before afternoon tea was served.

"In 1893 Louis De Grandi sold at Royal Saleyards, Meredith a Saddlers shop and dwelling house. "His property situated in the township of Meredith comprised a saddler's shop, dwelling house and one acre of land. There is a very nice garden at the rear of the house and the whole property is well fenced with a good picket fence. The shop now occupied by Mr Young has a frontage to the main street and is in the most central position in the township to command all the business."

They had seen the house advertised for sale in the Weekly Times and it came from down Lismore way. Kevin went back to driving trucks for JC Taylors, builders in Geelong. Melva Watts died soon after they shifted to Mooney Street. After he retired Kevin worked at the Meredith Golf Club keeping the course in excellent condition.

Bob Watts, a brother of Vern and Ron and his wife Kay had the Meredith Corner Store for three or four years in the early 1980's. Vern worked for Corio Whiskey before working at Darnum Engineering for 25 years and Ron worked at the Phosphate Company before he was retrenched. Now they like to travel but they travel separately! That way there are no arguments!

Vern has a car and a small pop-top caravan and Ron has a twin cab ute and a bigger pop-top caravan.

Kelvin Pitcher reported that Dr Pern had a room at the hotel During the Christmas holiday period they both go to Port Fairy and park next to each other. They describe how they grew up there and know many of the locals. Last year Ron left for Western Australia in April and travelled for about 12 weeks. This year he went to NSW and Queensland in May, has been back to Echuca a couple of times, has been to the Barossa Valley and may go to Port Fairy soon. He plans to go to Western Australia next year to see the areas that he missed last year.

> Ron loves travelling to see new country and says it's surprising who vou meet and there is always someone to talk to. Most meals he cooks in his van and always has a supply of tin food on hand but buys fresh food as needed. He has an excellent knowledge of the geography of Australia and knows how and when to travel to avoid heavy traffic and trouble.

Descendants of Charles and Frances Ford gathered at the Morrisons Cemetery to unveil this plaque that commemorates one of the five original families who settled in the area over 150 years ago.

To escape the potato famine and in search of gold or at least the chance of a better life, Charles and Frances travelled from Ireland and arrived in Geelong before moving up the Moorabool River to take up land at Morrisons.

Their son Robert Alexander Ford married Alice Caroline Brawn, the granddaughter of James Brawn and Sarah Pearce who had emigrated from England to live in Creswick. Their son Edward, Alice's father, was responsible for the discovery of what was considered one of 'the richest alluvial gold mines in the world' at Broomfield.

Both the Brawn and Ford families were actively involved in local affairs and governance. Robert and Alice continued to farm at "Rockvale" where they raised five boys and two girls, all of whom went on to have successful careers - their youngest son, Lindsay, would have turned ninety on this day.

Many of these descendants then adjourned for one of their regular reunions to view a Family History Book, started by members of the last generation and carried on by the next, which is being assembled for printing. As well as the book, there is a Web site designed for the next generation to add their own stories, plus a slide show covering six generations, that will be available on DVD.
