Message from the Mayor

On 18 and 19 March CEO Rod Nicholls and I joined the G21 board in Canberra to meet with 18 key ministers, shadow ministers and advisers, including:

- The Prime Minister, the Hon Tony Abbott, MP
- The Deputy Prime Minister, Minister for Infrastructure and Regional Development, the Hon Warren Truss MP
- Minister for Industry, the Hon Ian Macfarlane MP
- Minister for Environment, the Hon Greg Hunt MP
- The Leader of the Opposition, the Hon Bill Shorten MP
- Shadow Minister for Defence, Senator the Hon Stephen Conroy
- Shadow Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Shadow Minister for Tourism, the Hon Anthony Albanese MP
- Shadow Minister for Families, Payments and Disability Reform, the Hon Jenny Macklin MP

Along with Golden Plains' representatives, the G21 delegation included mayors, councillors and CEOs of our neighbouring municipalities (Greater Geelong, Colac Otway, Surf Coast and Queenscliffe) and G21 directors and the G21 CEO Elaine Carbine.

The trip was very successful as we were able to discuss the key priorities for Golden Plains and the G21 region. Local issues included the Federal Government's freeze on Financial Assistance Grants, mobile blackspots, funding for infrastructure for our region such as roads and bridges, NBN and projects such as the Bannockburn Civic Heart Precinct and the Golden Plains Food Production Precinct. The delegation was not aiming to necessarily gain commitments on various projects while in Canberra; rather the aim was to ensure the region's needs are top-of-mind as future decisions are made and budgets are developed.

It's a strategy that has paid dividends for the region in the past and we are confident it will again over the coming months and years.

Walking through the small bush reserve, I heard a rustle. A short-beaked echidna was approaching. I stood silently, watching it. With its poor eyesight, it couldn't see me. It sat with its hindquarters on the ground and nose pointed up in the air, sniffing, relying on its good sense of smell to tell if there was danger nearby. After a few minutes, it decided it was safe, and continued on its way, towards me. It regularly pressed its nose to the ground or to sticks, searching for ants and termites. The echidna may have been using its sense of smell, but it can use another sense for locating food. In the tip of its snout are electroreceptors which can detect the weak electrical fields which all animals create. The snout is always wet which may help. So does wet earth after rain. It may also press its snout into the ground searching for food, leaving oval-shaped holes which taper to a point. When an echidna has located food it uses its strong claws to tear open the ant nest. It pokes its snout into the ants' tunnels, and uses its long tongue covered in sticky saliva to lick up the ants, along with dirt from the walls. Echidnas have no teeth, but have tough areas at the back of their tongue and on their palate, which they use to crush the ants.

The echidna I was watching, continued towards me as I stood motionless. When it was about one metre away, it become uncertain again. It stopped and sniffed, but this time decided that something wasn't right. It waddled away from me, stopping at the base of a tree a few metres away. Its hearing was far better than its sight. When I moved, it heard me and started to dig into the ground. This is one of the echidna's means of defence. It can curl into a ball of prickly spines. It can also hide in a hollow log or a crevice, and extend its legs and spines, wedging itself in securely. Adult echidnas have few predators, although dingoes may be one, and they are at risk from cars. Their defences prevent adults being successfully attacked by cats or foxes. The young are more likely to be eaten by these animals as well as by snakes and goannas.

For most of the year echidnas lead a solitary life. In winter and early spring, they form mating trains with up to ten males following one female, sometimes for weeks. Eventually she mates with one of them. About three weeks later she lays an egg. Although nobody has seen this, it is believed that she can lay it directly into her backwards facing pouch. About 10 days later, the baby, called a puggle, hatches. It is 1.5cm long, bald and poorly developed, but has tiny claws on its front legs. It uses them to cling to its mother's fur and move to her milk patches, which have numerous pores which secrete milk. The puggle grows very fast. By the time it is two months old it has grown spines among dark fur and is out of the pouch. It is then left in a nest lined with leaves and grass inside a short nursery burrow. The mother blocks the entrance and returns every three to ten days to give it a large feed of her rich milk. The baby is weaned at seven months old, but may stay with its mother until it is one year old.

Echidnas are very adaptable animals and can be found anywhere from sea level to lower alpine areas but not in rainforest or large areas of farmland. They need a constant supply of ants and shelter, and can use dense vegetation, hollow logs or caves. They can also burrow and escape fires by staying underground. In cold areas they hibernate in winter, waking every two or three weeks for a few hours. They are usually active during the day, except in hot weather, when they prefer to be out in the cool of night.

Our local short-beaked echidnas belong to the small group of egg-laying mammals known as monotremes. The others are the platypus and three more species of echidnas in New Guinea. They are always interesting to watch, so if you see one, stay still and silent, and it may come close enough for you to have a very good look at it.

"The Future is not Gas"

The Sustainable Energy Future is All Electric!!! Because it will be the more economic choice...

Mains Gas has been a lower cost alternative to Electricity for Space Heating, Water Heating and Cooking for decades and the arrival of the reticulated Mains Gas Network in small regional towns something to celebrate. Not anymore! Mains gas is no longer cheaper, no longer necessary and no longer something to celebrate.

Mains gas is no longer cheaper: Australia is exporting gas to countries where the price is 2 to 3 times what it is here ... our price will float up to meet those higher global prices.

- Solar Hot Water can provide up to 75% of your Domestic Hot Water needs. It requires some boosting in winter, and that could be gas, but it could also be electricity. A Heat Pump Hot Water System is all electric (but 3 times as efficient as an old style tank with an electric element). No need for gas.
- Many people prefer gas cooktops because they respond quickly when the heat is turned up or down, but now Electric Induction Cooktops (as opposed to typical electric resistance models) have a response time as fast as gas ... and use only 70% as much power as resistance models.

So mains gas is no longer something to celebrate: it is a polluting fossil fuel, it is not cheaper, it does nothing electricity cannot do, and requires that you pay a Daily Service to Property Charge (or a bottle rental) for a second unnecessary energy utility. Why would you want to pay twice?

And finally: electric appliances can be run using wind or solar power that you generate on site giving you (not the power company) control of the price. Not convinced? > Perhaps the best known social networking site is Facebook, so here are some suggestions for getting the most out of your Facebook experience.

> 1. Your home page, i.e. Your timeline, contains the things that <u>you</u> have posted - your status updates, photos, things that you have seen and reposted from other places. Your can post to here from practically anywhere: Pinterest, Twitter, Internet sites, Wikipedia - just look for the blue Facebook "f" symbol, or an arrow that shows sharing options. Things that you post on your timeline will appear on the Newsfeed of your Facebook friends.

2. Check that your security settings are set to "Friends" otherwise your site will be public to everyone. Only add friends that you actually know and whom you are happy to see your posts. While you are checking that, turn off your notifications to avoid irritating pop up messages appearing all the time. Ask for help if you are not sure how to do this. 3. Your Newsfeed shows the items that have been posted by friends and groups that you are linked to. Not everything on these pages will appear here and the more people, pages and groups that you are linked to, the fewer items will appear from each. Liking and sharing items increases the likelihood that you will see further posts from that site or person.

4. Almost anything that you are interested in will have a Facebook page or group. Sailing, knitting, rock climbing, any TV show, performer or celebrity, business, social issue; whatever you want to hear more about, use the search bar at the top of the Newsfeed to look for suggestions. If the site looks interesting, tick Like and you will start to see items from there in your Newsfeed.

5. If you are unhappy about items that are appearing in your Newsfeed, you can easily remove either that specific item or all posts from that source. Just tap the tiny arrow in the top right corner of the item and a drop down menu will offer you some choices. If someone is posting really offensive material, you can also report it and Facebook will deal with it.

6. This is a matter of personal taste, but I try to keep to positive and fun things on my Facebook page, though occasionally some issues get some space. This isn't the place to write about that neighbour who annoys you or the way your boss is getting on your case. Remember that everyone on your Friends list will see what you post, so use the space to keep in touch and to share the joy.

The eagle has landed and the district has a new tourist

destination. On Friday 27th Feb there was an official opening ceremony at the Maude Recreation Reserve (the site of the former school) of the Bunjil Lookout which is in reality a viewing platform, an art piece in its own right and a significant monument to the district's Wathaurung Community's history.

The proceedings were started by Wathaurung Elder, Uncle Bryon, who performed a moving smoking ceremony and then spoke about the significance of this ceremony and the importance of the area to his people.

Speeches from Shire Mayor, Des Phelan and the Hon Gail Tierney M L C, both congratulated the local community for its initiative and the Government and the Shire for their financial support. The importance of such projects in invigorating smaller communities was highlighted and the end result has been the development of another, must place to visit in the shire.

The final speaker was Dr Fiona Gray, who was, along with another local Catherine Schurmann, joint designer of the project. Fiona spoke about the Community and its history. She thanked the Community Planning Group individually for their efforts and congratulated them on the initiative. It was initially intended to be a small elevated platform but following a comment that it would be great if it could become a bit more and finish up as impressive as Teesdale's wonderful turtle, the project grew in stature. The architects linked the project to the eagles that soar the valley and this led to the Bunjil story. She paid tribute to Uncle Bryon for his advice and support, shire officers David Miocic and Shannon Fielder for their work and local builder Adam East who built the structure.

The finished building provides a spectacular view across the Moorabool Valley as well as a 360 degree view which encompasses the Brisbane Ranges, the Sutherland's Creek Valley and the Barrabool Hills. This complements the existing BBQ area and the playground.

Seven of the poles that support the structure have carvings depicting the main characters in the Bunjil Creation Story and when you enter via the steps and step onto the platform the imposing figure of Bunjil looms above you. These impressive carvings are the work of artist, Viktor Cebergs, as is the paving.

The Community Planning Group and the Recreation Reserve Committee were pleased at the support from the community as over 70 people made the effort to attend and witness the opening. The Bunjil Creation Story, as told by Uncle Bryon, the creator of the Kulin land and its people was the work of the Great Creator ancestor Spirit, Bunjil, The Wedge-tailed Eagle. Bunjil summoned six men to assist him in the creation of the land, the people and all living things and to pass on his teachings and knowledge to all men and women.

The six men were

- Djurt-Djurt The Nankeen Kestrel
- Thara The Black-shouldered Kite
- Dantun The Blue Mountain Parrot
- Tadjeri The Bush-tailed Phascogale
- Turnun The Feather-tailed Glider
- Yukope The Great Parakeet.

All were capable of mighty deeds in the name of Bunjil.

After he made the country and all the living things in it, he taught the people how to use their tools and the rules of social behaviour.

When he had finished, Bunjil gathered his wives (one of whom was Ganawarra, the Black Swan) and his children (one of whom was Binbeal, the Rainbow) and instructed Belin-Belin (the Musk Crow) who was in charge of the winds. "Belin-Belin, open your bag and let out some wind."

Bellin-Bellin opened his bag and released a wind so strong that it carried big trees into the air, roots and all.

Bunjil wanted more wind, so Bellin-Bellin opened all his bags and released a wind so great that it carried Bunjil and his family to Tharangalk-Bek (the Heavens).

Bunjil and his family now live in the Heavens and are stars looking down on the world.

You can see them in the night sky:

- Bunjil is the star Altair in the Eagle Constellation
- The two stars beside Bunjil are Gannawarra and her spirit
- Bunjil's brother is the star Antares in the Scorpion Constellation
- Turnung is Venus
- Tadjeri is the star Achernar, in the Eridanus Constellation
- Yukope is the star Alpha Crucis, in the Southern Cross
- Dantun is the star Beta Crucis, in the Southern Cross
- Djurt-Djurt is the star Beta Centauri, one of the pointers
- Thara is the star Alpha Centauri, the other pointer.



An Anzac Recalled

Jan Crump

Thomas Augustus Orr, the grandfather of Peter Crump of Steiglitz Rd enlisted with his 3 brothers in early 1915. He

embarked on the troop ship "Euripedes" with the 21st Battalion and arrived in Egypt, in June. Following training near Cairo and preparing for the great adventure, the battalion boarded the troop ship "Southland", bound for Gallipoli. But the ship was torpedoed near Lemnos in Greece. Official records state that "casualties were slight and the troops left the sinking ship in a calm and orderly manner"

Thomas finally arrived at Gallipoli in early September and was involved in fighting around Monash Gully and Quinn's Post.

By Dec, plans were well under way for the secret evacuation of the troops but Thomas was badly wounded in the leg by shrapnel a few days before the withdrawal began. He was taken to the 1st General Hospital in Heliopolis where he stayed for the next 4 months.

Following discharge from hospital Thomas (and his leg) was transferred to Pay Corps in London where he stayed until the end of the war.

Of his 3 brothers, Vincent served with the 23^{rd} Battalion at Gallipoli He then went to the Western Front and fought in the Battle of the Somme. He was wounded at the Battle of Pozieres where the 23rd suffered nearly 90% casualties. He re-joined his unit and was killed at the "Second Battle of Bullecourt" in May 1917 Vincent was killed just after his 22^{nd} birthday and has no known grave.

Langley served with the 2nd Signal Coy. He was wounded in France and returned home in 1920. Francis embarked for overseas on the "Orantes" in 1916 and served with the 8th Support Battalion in London until 1919.

Like so many veterans, Thomas rarely mentioned his war experiences and returned home to his family and a position in the Victorian public service. He rose through the ranks and was the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages for many years. He died suddenly shortly after his retirement.

His only mention of his war was when he displayed a large piece of metal that he claimed was a piece of the torpedo that sent the "Southland" the bottom of the Med.

ANZAC Biscuits

- Prep time 15 minutes
- Cooking time 25 minutes

Makes approx. 36

Ingredients

- 1 cup rolled oats
- 1 cup plain flour
- 1 cup castor sugar
- 1 cup desiccated coconut
- 125g butter, chopped
- 1 tablespoon golden syrup
- 2 tablespoons boiling water
- 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda **Method**

1. Preheat oven to moderately slow, 160C and lightly grease trays.

2. In a medium bowl, combine oats, flour, sugar and coconut.

3. In a small pan, combine butter and golden syrup. Stir over low heat until melted.

- 4. In a small jug, combine water and bi carbonate of soda. Stir into butter mixture. Pour into dry ingredients and mix well.
- 5. Roll walnut sized pieces of mixture into balls. Arrange onto prepare trays, leaving a 4cm space between each biscuit to allow for spreading. Press lightly to flatten.
- 6. Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden. Allow to stand for 5minutes before transferring to a wire rack to cool.

TIP: These biscuits will harden on cooling. Store in an airtight container.

Every stone block fitting perfectly in place. They terraced the mountain to give more area for farming and supplied irrigation water through stone channels. The Spanish conquered the last Inca stronghold in 1572.

Then we transferred to a 10 night cruise of the Antarctica. The crossing of the Drakes Passage wasn't too bad but the return trip with winds of 120 knots and gusting to 180 knots and swells of 8 to 10 mts created some interesting times.

Our first expedition with the guides and naturalist using inflatable Zodiacs was Whalers Bay in Deception Bay, which was a collapsed, but still active volcano . From Deception Bay we travelled further south to the Palmer Archipelago and again perfect weather for camping , thanks to Christine Port Lockroy, which is the worlds most southern and for organizing the kinder shift at the tucker tent and operational post office. We continued south and crossed the thank you to our volunteers for helping on the day. Mrs Antarctic Circle and enjoyed a campaign on a large section of floating sea ice whilst watching a couple of Crabeater seals book club at Kinder, we are receiving many orders from playing with a group of Chip Strap penguins. We spent a morning whale watching, seeing many humpbacks, fin and minke whales - a magnificent sight as they came up for air, giving a last wave with their large tail fin before the mammal descended again into the deep, cold ocean. I don't know how anyone could hunt and kill these beautiful defenseless mammals.

awe-inspiring and the shutters on the cameras were smoking you all back at kinder ready to laugh, play and continue trying to capture the serenity. Then we spent a few days in on the learning journey with us in term two. Rio De Janiero before flying home. Rio, a busy, lively city, is dwarfed by mountain ranges on two sides and the Atlantic sea on the other.

Managing Psychological and Physical Abuse

The topic of partner abuse and family violence is being talked about more and more, especially by the media. Our 2015 Australian of the Year was awarded to Rosie Batty in recognition for her work as a family violence campaigner. Her son Luke Batty was murdered by his father last year in public viewing whilst Luke was attending cricket practice. It is an unpleasant topic to talk about, but the impact of domestic violence has become a very serious social problem that needs to be addressed.

Family violence has shocking effects on men, women and children. The impact ranges from emotional abuse, trauma, mental illness, injury and death. It weighs heavily on police resources, crisis services and on our states health, welfare and legal system. Thankfully earlier this year it was announced by the Governor of Victoria there will be a Royal Commission into Family Violence. I believe that the relentless campaign work of Luke's mum Rosie Batty has contributed to this social problem being addressed not only by the state but by the wider community as well.

Given that evidence from Victoria Police (2011/12) states that although it can happen to anyone, in the majority of cases acts of domestic and family violence are perpetrated by men against women. It is known that women can also be perpetrators and that family violence occurs in same sex attracted couples. However, due to the high prevalence of male violence against women in our community it is considered not only the responsibility of the abuser but also the responsibility of society to turn this problem around.

We need to challenge our attitudes and belief systems that make it difficult for women and children to gain help and support. For example, here is a list of societal attitudes that do not help, they have been highlighted by the *No to Violence* organisation;

- Blaming the woman for the violence
- Putting the 'family' before the safety of women and children
- Tolerating the use of violence
- Privileging men over women and children's needs
- Treating domestic violence as a private matter
- Posing excuses for the violence such as alcohol and drug abuse, deflecting responsibility from themselves and putting the blame on the woman for the violence

It is fortunate that organisations such as *No to Violence* and the work of Rosie Batty can help us all to gain more awareness about the issue of family violence and clearly from the list above we can all do our bit by working towards changing such attitudes.

I deal with many cases of family violence issues and I am often surprised that people do not realise that domestic violence is **NOT** just about the occurrence of physical assault in relationships; it also involves emotional and psychological abuse, as well as, financial and social control. The following Quiz may help you or a loved one determine if you are at risk.

Family violence Quiz

I have selected the following questions from the Safe Steps Family Violence Response Centre's website, their list is more extensive and descriptive and I encourage you to do more research if you need more information. If you answer yes to any of the following questions you are experiencing family violence problems.

- 1. Does your partner call you names or make you feel bad about the way you look?
- 2. Does your partner monitor or limit your phone calls, conversations and emails?
- 3. Does your partner take away your money and control how you use it?
- 4. Does your partner ever push, shove, slap, pinch, punch or physically hurt you?
- 5. Does or has your partner smashed your belongings or broken things around the house?
- 6. Has your partner ever done anything that really frightened you?
- 7. Do you feel your partner tries to control your contact with your family and friends?
- 8. If your partner has been aggressive, have they blamed you for their anger and violence, saying it's your fault?

If your relationship doesn't feel right and/or you are fearful, then call Safe Steps (see below) for confidential support and information. Call 000 if in danger. Support is available 24/7, every day of the year.

The Travelling Blue House

It's not what it used to be and it's not where it used to be!

The blue house at 9 Wallace Street Meredith has been almost rebuilt over the years since it was transported from Coopers Road to Meredith in 1947. It is believed that it was originally built by Smith Bros for Ern Cooper when he married Annie Fry. It was situated on the west side of Coopers Road, about 6 kms down the road and was surrounded by cypress trees.

The house was jacked up and loaded on a house Jinker owned by Brown from Geelong who was a house removalist. The back skillion was removed but the rest of the house was moved in one piece with the roof intact. The truck carried the house through the paddocks behind the Coopers shearing shed, through Boltes paddocks, through a paddock owned by Hendersons, out on the road before Boltes, past Tommy Grants, through the Lily dam and down Boundary Road to Meredith. The route was to avoid trees, power lines and bridges. The house was erected on wooden stumps and changed direction, it now faced west whereas at the farm it faced east.

The skillion and toilet came to Meredith on an old Austin truck owned by Annie's brothers who farmed at Balliang. They helped to put it back on to the house, helped to prepare the kitchen and put the toilet down the back.

Ern and Annie Cooper bought the half acre block of land from George Mayo. It had a boxthorn hedge in the middle and had previously had saleyards on it.

Neil Cooper, son of Ern and Annie is a diligent tradesman who has reblocked the house, replaced most of the weatherboards, replaced the wooden framed windows with aluminium windows, altered the internal layout of the house and installed a new kitchen and built many outbuildings and sheds and extended most of them. He has also repainted the house about every 18 months. He used to have a bountiful vegetable garden but these days he concentrates on the flowers in the front yard which this year have looked absolutely beautiful.

"Murder in Mississippi" by John Safran

The author of this book is a documentary film maker who often asks dangerous people indelicate questions and tries not to get thumped. He often asks questions about race. He has been described as "irreverent" which means that he shows a lack of respect for people or things that are generally taken seriously. He likes to 'stir the pot'! He likes to make us reassess our conceptions and beliefs.

When filming his TV series "Race Relations", which covers cross cultural, interracial and interfaith love, John Safran spent an uneasy couple of days with one of Mississippi's most notorious white supremacists. A year later, he heard that the man had been murdered and the killer was black. He flew to the US to investigate with the aim to write a book about the case. And he uncovered a fascinating story.

His detective work led him to many associates of both Richard Barrett the white supremacist and Vincent McGee the murderer who stabbed his victim sixteen times and tried to burn his house down. He ended up developing strangely close bonds with some key people, particularly the killer and towards the end of the book he has increasingly surreal conversations with him on the phone from prison.

Safran writes as if he was speaking to you and he lets the people speak for themselves. Their dialect and slang make you feel you are in the Deep South. He describes everything including how the solicitor rocks in his big leather chair as he is interviewed. He wrote about how he feels, the weather, the surroundings, the towns and the politics.

At first the murder seemed to be a race crime. But the more he talked to various people the less simple the crime and the world seemed. Maybe it was a dispute over money or most intriguingly, over sex. Could the infamous racist actually have been secretly 'gay' with a liking for black men. Could this be the story of a lifetime?

Safran takes us places most of us will never go to, he reveals a portrait of a dead man, his murderer, the place they lived and the process of trying to find out the truth about anything. He has used a direct approach to investigate the crime and has documented his findings in a very straightforward, unique way. He doesn't come to any conclusion as to why Vincent murdered Richard.

There was a mixed reaction to the book by the bookclub members and some could not finish it.

'Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness ...'

John Keats wrote these words nearly two hundred years ago on the other side of the world and still they paint a picture for us of the season in all its glory - fruit filled with 'ripeness to the core'. No mention in Keats' autumnal romance of the more easily knowing that the possibility of bushfire is and Blackwood. receding.

However autumn can be a tricky time in the home garden. Although the days are growing shorter and there's a chill in the early morning air it's easy to forget that we have had and nature a minimalist when it comes to using water both in the house and in our garden. However when I walk around on these crisp autumn mornings and scratch around beneath the mulch I find the earth is bone dry especially in the vegetable patch. So, I will have to turn on the tap. Vegetables grow best in good soil that holds moisture. Healthy friable soil that has had plenty of organic matter dug in will not only produce delicious vegies, but will hold water without becoming waterlogged. Mulch that is too dense may Police Paddocks and see what you can find! prevent water from reaching the earth.

This year I have grown the old varieties of tomatoes from seed. They were slow to germinate and take off but now, after what has been a relatively kind summer with only a couple of exceedingly hot days I am able to fill a colander with red, yellow, red and green striped and dark brown tomatoes every day. I had built up the soil in my tomato bed well before planting out the seedlings in November. However long ago our patch of earth was mined for gold so you can imagine me working with acidic, skeletal soils derived from ancient sedimentary rock and no matter how much good stuff I dig in, by the end of a dry summer the soil is worn out and leached of all vitality. I'm sure some of you will be working in richer volcanic soils and you may receive greater rainfall and these struggles of mine with soil and soil moisture will not be as relevant.

We're lucky to still have some water in the dam so I am watering, a slow and deep soak once or twice a week as the

experts suggest and I push the hose nozzle underneath the mulch layer.

I'm longing for rain. I wonder if you have noticed as I have that plants seem to respond more vigorously to a good downpour from the skies than to being irrigated by a hand held hose.

Tony says that "she never one day work" from when they married until they bought a run down dairy farm at Deans Marsh in 1985. Toni bought an industrial sewing machine and intended to sew piece work for the uniform factory but home duties prevailed and she revealed the machine did not make one penny.

The dairy farmer helped Tony for one week and then Toni who had no previous farm experience got into gear. She helped to milk every day. They built the farm up until they milked 300 cows and had one of the top five herds in Australia. They believe the farm was good for their children. Although it was hard, consistent work and that they made a lot of money but they also had to spend a lot of money to keep improving the farm. Tony improved pastures, the farm setup and installed a rotary dairy and he recalled how people came to see his farm and copied some of his innovations. They sold the farm and moved to Boundary Road in 2004 where they

Meredith History Interest Group

Henry Bolte the Cricketer compiled by Terry Southall Association.

Henry Bolte was a young farmer from Bamganie who volunteered to put a team together to make up four sides in the new association. Their home ground was at the Bolte property where parts of the pitch can still be seen. Bamganie was the 'ugly duckling' of the competition, always struggling at the Anglican Church Hall to catalogue and to talk history. We'll to field a side but Bolte was the glue that held it together. He was an outstanding player. Forced to open the batting and bowling he carried the side for the four years. Time and again it was only able to get 8 or 9 players and if Bolte failed there was only one or two others to pick up the slack, and then only weakly.

Highlighting some of his performances gives an indication of Henry Bolte's talents. In December 1936 he made 28 of a team total of 59 and took 3/43 off 12 overs. In February 1937 he made 46 out of 84 and took 3/35 off 10 overs. But this may have been one of the greatest innings of all for any player, anywhere. Only able to field 9 players Bolte was the last man out for 90 in a team total of 100. And finally, in a landmark innings in the very last game of the Bamganie Association Bolte, opening made 208 of 332 and took 5/56 from 11 overs. This is the only known instance of an individual making a double century on the Lethbridge Ground in senior cricket dating back to 1879/80 season."

The Rev. Fr Thomas Considine was born in County Clare, Ireland and after ecclesiastical studies was ordained at St Patrick's College, Maynooth. He left almost immediately for the Australian mission becoming attached to the Melbourne Archdiocese. He was one of 33 Irish who arrived in R.M.S. Melbourne on



"Orpauz" ex London on June 8th, 1888. After labouring as assistant priest in several parishes he was appointed to the charge of Meredith Parish in February 1889. (He would have been just 29 years of age.) The present Meredith Church was built and opened during Father Considine's pastorate and within a year of his arriving the Catholic school reopened.

Throughout his life he suffered indifferent health. He complained that the bluestone presbytery was too cold and damp in winter so the bluestone was replaced by weatherboard. While this was taking place Fr. Considine moved into a cottage at Lethbridge owned by Mr John Gebbie, the local wheelwright and blacksmith. The parishioners were sad to see Fr. Considine depart to the Parish of Seymour in 1900. He was presented with a purse containing 70 sovereigns subscribed throughout the district. He died in May 1931 at the age of 71 years. An article in The Advocate reported that he and Archbishop Mannix were fellow students at Maynooth and that they continued a close friendship in Australia.

He had the reputation for being a saintly priest. "He led a life beautifully edifying in every way seeking little human companionship." A priest remarked that Fr. Considine's daily walk through the park was more eloquent than the most telling sermon.

A Journey into Meredith

This is part of an extraordinarily detailed account Jan McDonald found of a cross country journey early last century from Bacchus Marsh to Meredith. We pick it up at the plummet into Morrisons.

A little over a mile hence we cap the much dreaded Morrisons hill, where the Moorabool creeps at our feet, and the far reaching majestic gully dwindles away into the overhang-ing hills. In our downward progress of this hill the recent regrading at its top marks a pleasurable improvement. Trending down the river we put up at jovial faced John Acheson's hostelry to bait both man and horse. Looking down stream from this point the eye is at once arrested by that huge and ungainly piece of mechanism, the Morrisons dredge. From information their efforts appear to have been attended with varying success, and although the clean up previously to this last week was 56ozs., the week past has not given the same satisfactory results, as, in the middle of the river bed, although they have delved down to a depth of 30 feet, they cannot reach the gold. Obstructions, such as huge trees, even at that depth, barring the way. Their operations are not alone restricted to the river bed; isolated islands, and the bordering banks, are all swallowed up in the capacious maw of this ungainly looking machine, their revolving buckets working on the principle of the Californian pump, grasping in their rotary and endless working all that is before them. Huge boulders which are carried out of the exhaust tip show the power that is exerted in their excavation. Guved to the river bank on either side by stout steel ropes the head of the machine can turn its attention to all available land from the roadway to the opposite foot hills, the continual forward delving answering the twofold purpose of feeding the machine and at the same time excavating a dam on whose surface the ark floats. If no other purpose were served it has widened the river bed, which should leave the township less liable to inundation by flood water, although I fear the fish with which the water in deeper pools is now well stocked are doomed to extermination. Passing down this one-street hamlet decay seems busy in its work, and amongst it that old familiar landmark, Adamson's store, has disappeared, evidently by fire, as the piled up charred timber lying promiscuously near attests. Before crossing the bridge an immense amount of excavation has been carried on, all the low lying ground having been treated to a turnover. The old bridge, as well as some chains of the road, had to give place to this innovation, but these have now been replaced with new, although some portion of this road requires fencing-in, as an ugly looking embankment skirts a goodly portion of it. From here Harvey's old homestead looms out on the south side of the river, and over on the opposing bank Mr. Cole's house, with orchard, peeps out from amidst a delightfully cool looking cluster of trees. At this latter establishment there is a curiosity in the shape of a whitethorn, which has been grafted with an apple. At my last visit here this (now a tall slim apple tree) was in full bearing, laden with apples of a sweetish bitter taste, the fruit not larger than a small marble. Mr. Cole, like many another orchardist in this and surrounding districts, is despairing over the ravages of the codlin moth, his pear and apple crop being about ruined by

their ravages. There was the consolation, however, that the cherry crop was magnificent, and the plum closely equalling it. Surmounting the hill from the bridge, parched up grass greets the eye again in our surroundings; and looking over to the S.W., Mt. Buninyong rears its elongated rounded back, always reminding one in its sombre hue and shape of some huge elephant, minus his trunk and tail. Along the five mile stretch to Meredith, wayside farmhouses dot the landscape here and there, with apparently little cultivation. Nearing Meredith that old time hostelry, the Royal Mail, an upper storey building, frowns down apparently on all its rivals, proud in its commanding height, and its career, which dates from the early diggings. What an unwritten history attaches to this pub, in the old coaching days where men in rags have sought its shelter; men with thousands helter skelter made the money fly. A stroll through the town reveals its possessing post and telegraph office, also three hotels, two blacksmiths, two general stores, saddler, Shire Council, Police station, two very creditable Institutes the C.Y.M.S. and the public hall just about completed, which Premier Bent has promised to open, and which is installed with my acetylene gas plant. There are saleyards where sales are held every first Friday in the month. As far as I saw the only houses of worship are the Catholic and Protestant. A thriving business seems to attend the efforts of those engaged in each branch of it, and if the wealth of a community may be gauged by the attention paid to the pubs. then I should say the general public are not in want. Although drink is indulged in it is in a mild and friendly form. One thing ... generation, they are all confirmed cigarette smokers. Great credit is due to the committee of the new Mechanics' Institute, of which Mr. Robt. Deans is Secretary, and Mr. George E. Mayo Treasurer, and their coworkers, in bringing about the completion of an Institute that will do credit to a much larger township than Meredith. Out of a cost of between £600 and £700 the Government aid was only £100. The most pleasing feature is the united manner in which they go to work, as on the day I left, there were farmers, graziers, store- keepers, the schoolmaster, saddlers, and publicans working away, some delving, some barrowing, some carting, and all engaged in filling in the approaches to give a fall for storm water away from the building. Truly an object lesson for all townships, and in many of them such working bees are not unknown.

We have some very exciting news!!!

From <u>Monday 1st June</u> will be joining the **HealthSave** pharmacy brand.
