Meredith Music Festival Traffic Management

We are writing to notify you about the traffic management plans for Meredith Music Festival scheduled to occur on Friday 11 December – Sunday 13 December, 2015.

The summary of the plan is outlined here.

- We will implement one-way traffic on Mount Mercer Road from Bamganie Road to Cameron's Road from approximately 4am on Friday 11 December to approximately 7pm. Traffic within the one-way zone travelling to Meredith will be diverted down Cameron's Road.
- We will implement a speed reduction on Mount Mercer Road and Cameron's Road from Thursday 10 December – Saturday 12 December.
- We have assigned traffic controllers to the corner of Staughton Street and Midland Highway on Sunday 13 December to assist vehicles turning left or right onto Midland Highway.
- We will install a no-parking zone along Mount Mercer Road and some surrounding roads.

We started the year located in the little house opposite while we watched the new building being constructed. We managed to keep functioning and running our usual programs through this process and we thank all of our users for their patience throughout.

In July our admin moved in to the new building and we were able again to use our old rooms for classes and activities. We had to wait a little longer for our Occasional Care to move in as well which was more to do with bureaucracy than the building completion. Finally in October the Kinder joined us and we have all been comfortably co-located since then. It has been great having a whole lot of new people coming into our space and getting to know us and what we do. The Meredith Community Learning Centre is a vibrant busy place with programs and activities for little children with the Playgroup, Occasional Care and Kindergarten right through age groups to senior members of our community.

We are looking forward to 2016 with lots more interest already in our Occasional Care. We are planning to run some longer 5 hour sessions and also a short bridging session between the end of Kinder at 2.00pm through to 3.15pm where kinder children can then go across to the School after hours program or just so that parents can do just a pick-up for School and younger siblings. If these interest you please call in to the Centre to register. We also plan to go to 5 days if there is the demand for us to run the program on Thursdays as well. I think it is a credit to our Occasional Care educators Jo and Rebecca that people recognise the quality of the program they are running.

Finally I would like to thank my Committee for their valuable assistance and contribution to the running of the Centre and my wonderful staff Trudy, Jo and Rebecca as well a number of tutors and childcare assistants who have helped out this year. Without all of these people we could not offer the Community the programs and services we provide. Wishing you a safe and Happy Christmas and New Year. We will be back with lots more happening.

Peaceful Gardening

Recently I spent several hours in the cool air of early morning up in the garlic plot lifting the bulbs and laying them on top of the earth. For the next couple of days the bulbs remained in the sun beginning the all-important curing process. I lifted the garlic (*Allium sativum*) earlier than usual this year as the lower leaves had browned off and some tops had fallen over signaling that the growing period was over for this crop. No spring rain to speak of and a week of unseasonably hot weather in October have made for a somewhat diminished yield but enough for the family and friends with the best cloves stored to replant in autumn for next year.

The next stage in preparing the garlic for storage is to hang the bulbs in a dry and airy place for four to six weeks. This job is time consuming but I find it a good time to be still and to reflect. I sit on the old bed in my shed, surrounded by boxes of garlic, with two old brushes, one has soft bristles and one is a large soft artists' paintbrush. I trim the roots of each bulb close to the base of the plant and gently brush any earth off the bulb with the bristle brush followed by a soft dusting of the artists' brush. I then gather together six to eight clean bulbs, tie them with string and hang on a drying line out of direct sunlight. In this way around 800 and more garlic bulbs have passed through my hands. I have explained this in unnecessary detail I suppose, not supposing ignorance on your, the reader's part, but to draw you into the small world of this work that is spread over several days. It is repetitive and could be mindless and this is the thing, while I notice each bulb and its particularities - variety, size, colour, too damaged to keep - I am focused and this ritual becomes a peaceful and quieting occupation.

Gardening is much more than turning the earth, planting seeds and watching them germinate and grow into food and flowers. The garden is a great teacher. I learn so much through the small daily acts of observing and tending, bending over to look closely at the various unknown flying creatures, stretching up and looking into the distance for the change in the weather, waiting patiently for the first cherry to ripen or bud to open, investigating the treatment for a diseased plant.

I am reminded of a story told by the French writer Colette that speaks to those of us who are dedicated to the gardening life. She quotes from a letter written by her elderly mother Sidonie in response to Colette's invitation to come and stay with her for a few days. Sidonie answers that she would dearly love to see her daughter, however she writes: I am already a very old woman, and if I went away when my pink cactus is about to flower, I am certain I shouldn't see it flower again.

Goodbye Fr. Herman & Hello Fr. Galdo (Boy).

Goodbye to Father Herman and Hello to Father Florentino Galdo (Boy).

Father Herman Licayan was farewelled by hundreds of people on Sunday, November 8, at a Mass and a family picnic in the grounds of St Josephs Church at Meredith. He has gone back to the Philippines after almost 5 years 8 months as Parish Priest of the Meredith Parish. On the Friday before leaving he told a kitchen full of people at the Presbytery about his early life, his education, his family and the history of the Philippines. He kept them enthralled for a couple of hours. What a history lesson!

He told us that the Philippines had a long history of civilization before the Spanish occupation and before the Americans purchased the Philippines from Spain in 1901. He described how there are two main islands, Luzon and Mindanao, and over 7,000 smaller islands. He said he grew up on a farm where his family were tenant farmers who grew rice, bananas and coconuts. He went to elementary school in the village for six years and high school in another village for four years. All the children in his family hated the subsistence farming and struggled to get a better education. At 17 years of age he joined the seminary as an intern and received a Degree in Philosophy after five years, a Degree in Theology after another five years and was ordained a Deacon after another year. He assisted a Parish Priest and taught at a university before coming to Australia on January 13, 2010.

It is interesting that Father Boy comes from a village on Mindanao not far from where Father Herman grew up.



Visit to the Holy Land

Father Herman was the leader of a group of twenty two people who recently made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Many of them belong to churches in the Meredith Parish. They flew into Amman in Jordon and immediately began visiting places which they had heard of from the Bible, including Mt Nebo where Moses viewed the promised land of Israel and a Byzantine Church which has a mosaic on the floor that depicts a 6th century or the earliest map of the Holy land.

The next day they crossed the heavily fortified check point into Israel and travelled straight to Jericho, a very important Biblical city. In the afternoon, they went to the Sea of Galilee where Jesus spent a lot of his time. From there they could see Syria, Golan Heights and Lebanon and they viewed a boat from the time of Jesus. They found the area very peaceful. The group visited many places on their trip to Jerusalem and Bethlehem including Capernaum with its narrow streets where Jesus spent a lot of time teaching, Mt Hermon, Mt Carmel, Caesarea Maritima and Bethany.

After a few days in Galilee, they headed off to Jerusalem where they visited many churches including one church which had the Lord's Prayer written in every language on panels on the walls. The Francisican Order maintained the churches and the holy grounds. They felt very emotional when they walked the Way of the Cross at the Via Dolorosa in the Old City. In the last few days they were around the Dead Sea and were amazed to see where the population had lived in caves and they swam or paddled in the Dead Sea. They were petrified when a storm blew up while they were on the cable car going up to see Masada, King Herod's Fortress. Back in the Old City of Jerusalem, men and women were segregated to visit the Western Wall.

Father Herman said Mass nearly every day but the Mass in the small space under the Holy Sepulchre was extra special. Helen Dunne and Diane Ritchie said that Father Herman knew the history very well and as well as the guides, he helped the group to understand the significance of what they saw. Both agreed that it was a life changing experience.

The graph well illustrates the dry year we have had to date. All that space between the black line and the grey columns represents the difference between long term average (LTA) rainfall and what we have actually received. Numerically, it is a 191 mm shortfall, and November is the 11th month in a

row that has been below average. And spring, typically our wettest season, was the driest of the year, receiving only 43% of the LTA.

This is an uncomfortable starting point for summer, so be sure to have your water saving practices in place.

\$1 Co-Payment Discount

You may, or may not, be aware that the 6th Pharmacy agreement has been finalized between the Government & Pharmacy Guild of Australia. There are many changes within this agreement but a significant change is the **"Optional" \$1 co-payment discount** that Pharmacies can pass onto customers for medicines that are <u>fully subsidized</u> by the Government **from 1st January 2016**. Currently customers with a pension, concession, healthcare or repatriation card pay a co-payment of \$6.10 per prescription & the government pays the rest.

From the 1st January 2016, all Pharmacies will have the "*choice*" if they want to give customers a \$1 co-payment discount or not. So instead of paying \$6.10, concessional customers will only pay \$5.10 only if the Pharmacy chooses to pass on the discount. I have to stress that this is **NOT mandatory** for all Pharmacies to pass on this \$1 co-payment discount. If a Pharmacy doesn't want to give this discount to customers they don't have to.

From 1st January we <u>WILL</u> be offering this \$1 co-payment discount to our customers on fully subsidized medicines.

I hope this makes sense. If you have any questions regarding this please do not hesitate to call into the Pharmacy and have a chat with Scott who will be able to answer your questions.

Shire Gets Graffiti Prevention Funding

Golden Plains Shire Council has successfully secured a grant to develop four murals within skate parks in Dereel, Enfield, Haddon and Lethbridge.

The Skate Park Graffiti Prevention project will receive \$23,400 funding from the Victorian Department of Justice and Regulation Graffiti Prevention Grants program. The Council-led project will involve an artist working with local young people and community

members to improve the visual appearance of the existing skate parks by designing and producing murals on the skate park surfaces.

It is hoped that this project will increase local ownership of the skate parks, which will reduce the presence of graffiti and decrease anti-social behaviour. Mayor, Cr Des Phelan said, "This is an exciting project for Golden Plains Shire and will build on the successful work that has already taken place at the Bannockburn, Smythesdale, Teesdale, Rokewood and Linton skate parks." "We will be holding community workshops in early 2016 to prepare the designs and community members will then be actively involved in painting the murals."

"It is important that we continue to work with our young people. I'm looking forward to seeing what our creative and innovative residents come up with."

... and some for Public Safety

Golden Plains Shire Council has made the most of 2014/15 Public Safety Infrastructure Fund grants from the Department of Justice.

The grants, designed to assist councils in increasing community safety and confidence in public places, were awarded in May 2014 and works were completed on eight Golden Plains facilities by July this year.

The project involved installation of lighting and security infrastructure at five recreation reserves and three community facilities, with the aim of reducing crime and improving community safety and confidence.

Council worked with community groups and committees of management from the facilities to determine the areas where improvements were most vital.

Works were completed on the following facilities: Inverleigh Amenity Block, Inverleigh Sporting Complex, Leighdale Equestrian Centre, Linton Recreation Reserve, Meredith Interpretive Centre, Smythesdale Well, Teesdale Recreation Reserve and Woady Yaloak Recreation Facility.

Mayor, Cr Des Phelan, reinforced the importance of community safety to Council, "It is essential that we continue to be active in ensuring our growing community feels safe in public facilities."

"These works provided an additional benefit of improving safety for community members and volunteers leaving the facilities at night," Cr Phelan said.

Aussie Barbecued Ham

- Prep time 15 minutes
- Cooking time 1 hour 45 mins
- Serves between 8 and 12 people

Ingredients

- 7kg cooked leg of ham
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- 2/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- ¹/₂ cup pineapple juice
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sweet sherry
- 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar, extra
- 2 cloves of garlic, halved lengthways
- ¹/₄ teaspoon ground clove

Method

- Cut through rind about 10 cm from shank end of leg in a decorative pattern; run thumb around edge of rind just under skin to remove rind. Start pulling rind from shank end to widest edge of ham; discard rind.
- Using sharp knife, make shallow cuts in one direction diagonally across fat at 3cm intervals, then shallow cut in opposite direction to form diamonds. Do not cut through top fat or fat will spread apart during cooking.
- Place ham in a disposable aluminium baking dish; rub with combined mustard and sugar. Place ham on heated barbecue. Cook covered using indirect method, 1 hour.
- 4. Meanwhile, combine juice, sherry, extra sugar garlic and clove in a small saucepan; stir over heat until sugar dissolves. Reduce heat, simmer uncovered, about 10 minutes or until glaze reduces by half. Brush ham with glaze, cook covered, using indirect method, 45 minutes, brushing several times with glaze during cooking.

Cover ham with foil; stand for 15 minutes before serving.

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A Dream Job

Anthony Hamilton-Smith always liked to make, build, draw and paint.

His Meredith and Ballarat school teachers encouraged him to create as did his mother, Dorothy, who was a very talented painter.

After he left school Anthony did many jobs including buying wool for his father's business and cooking in restaurants. While in the UK, he helped convert a hospital into a hostel and made items to decorate it, including shields, swords, armour and tapestries. Returning to Australia he studied design and architecture at RMIT and for his thesis project, made a bicycle trailer set up as a "slow kitchen" which won him a National Design Award.

Anthony was asked to design some sets for a short film being made by a friend of his. He thoroughly enjoyed the experience with his sets being applauded for their originality and workmanship. His first "big job" was helping to create the set for the film "Gallipoli". That job involved designing and building sets and collecting and displaying props.

Anthony described the gully near Werribee where the battle scenes of "Gallipoli" were being shot. Arriving early one morning, he walked up the hill and was confronted by hundreds of distorted bodies lying haphazardly across the landscape. He quickly realized that they were latex bodies ready for the next scene to be shot. The distant bodies were only shop dummies splashed with lots of tomato sauce.

Anthony worked on the recent film "The Dressmaker", hiring some period items, including kitchen utensils, from an old Meredith house for the film. A ragged tea towel which had hung on a three pronged rack for over 50 years was very suitable for the 1950's kitchen scene. Some rusty tanks, vintage shearing gear and cupboards were among the other items borrowed from Meredith people. He is now working on the film "Tomorrow when the War Began" as well as helping his father Graeme fit out his Staughton Street shop.

Anthony described his job as a little like being a shearer in that if you do a good job, you will be invited to to do another. Although the work is spasmodic and doesn't pay well, he relishes the experience as it satisfies his creative spirit. *Anthony's "slow kitchen"*.

Outside my back door, lavender is flowering, intermingled with bright pink stalks of red valerian flowers, all creating a wonderful attraction for insects. Honey bees are common visitors. So are butterflies. Some are mostly white, such as cabbage whites. Others, such as the Australian painted ladies, are brown with intricate black patterns. Occasionally the plants attract more colourful butterflies. As the bushes become busier over summer, predators arrive. Little spiders hide amongst the flowers, waiting to pounce on the smaller pollinating insects. A praying mantis sits patiently on a lavender stalk, ready to reach out its long arms and grab an unwary bee or butterfly.

Among the more interesting visitors are the native blue-banded bees. They are similar in size to a honey bee and partly brown, but with four or five stripes of very pale blue on their black abdomen which is curled downwards. They dart between flowers, then appear to hover in front of them. These bees have a special way of releasing pollen from flowers. It is called buzz pollination. The bee holds the flower and moves its flight muscles quickly, causing the flower to vibrate, releasing the pollen. For some flowers with pollen held in place very tightly, this is the only effective way to be pollinated. Wind, honey bees or other insects may remove some pollen, but most will stay in the flowers. Tomatoes are one plant which requires buzz pollination, so blue-banded bees are under investigation as a means of efficiently pollinating tomatoes grown in glasshouses. At the moment many of these plants are pollinated mechanically. Some growers wish to import bumblebees which can also buzz pollinate, but if they escape there is a risk of environmental havoc, such as is caused by foxes, rabbits and cane toads.

Blue-banded bees are different from honey bees in other ways. Unlike honey bees, they are native, and like most native bees they are solitary, living an independent life, although they may live close to others of their species. Females dig a nest in soft sandstone, which may become full of bee tunnels, or in river banks, mud bricks or mortar. In each cell at the end of her tunnel, the bee lays an egg and provides a mix of pollen and nectar as food for the larva when it hatches. While the females live in their burrows, males spend the night outside clinging to a plant stem.

Australia has over 1500 species of solitary bees, which range in size from 2mm to 2.5cm. They are often considered economically unimportant as they do not produce honey, but they are extremely important in the pollination of plants, both native and introduced, including crops and garden flowers. They collect nectar and pollen for food for themselves and as a larder for their larvae. As they travel from flower to flower they spread pollen that has attached to their bodies. Blue-banded bees will forage up to 300m from their nest and have a preference for blue flowers, but will visit others, such as my lavender. Although they can sting they are less aggressive than honey bees, so if you find them in your garden, you can fairly safely watch them as they go about their business.

Last month we wrapped up our eating out adventures for the year at a venue you have almost certainly been to many times: friends. Yes, instead of going to a restaurant or café, we did that most hospitable of things: freeload on friends at their place. (Well, it's a matter of perspective – for half of us, the "freeloadees" there was quite a bit of work involved.) Of course, it would be quite un-Australian or just plain ungrateful, if you didn't return the gesture, so there is no free ride here.

We started with nibbles and drinks in a cosy sitting room which went quite well, although the host did mess up one of the drinks orders. This was soon put right, and off we sailed into the evening. By the time we got to the dining room, we were all feeling quite affable (there's a tip for you, especially if you want to cut corners on the catering!) But no corners cut here. Our meal was a mild Thai Curried Chicken, or something like that, and quite delicious. Servings were generous and included plenty of veges. (And they weren't offered as an extra as is so often the case these days.)

It was followed by fresh fruit and homemade custard dessert which was equally well received, albeit by a by now even more affable table. Drinks were of a high standard, but this is optional. You decide by bringing something of your own and the host will usually respond by matching the quality of yours. (But watch out here for wines poured out of the room, or already open bottles – some hosts have been known to test the visiting palates at price points that should be reserved for unwelcome relatives.

But, based on our experience, we highly recommend eating at "Friends" where we got the three G's: Good Food, Good Wine, Good Company.

Be mindful though, that you will have to phone ahead with any dietary requirements, as Friends usually offer just two choices: eat it or go hungry.

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"Crossing to Safety" by Wallace Stegnar

Wallace Stegnar published his first novel in 1937. "Crossing to Safety" was his last book published when he was 78 years old and we are told "written with the wisdom of age".

He tells about two couples who form a lifelong bond extending from the Great Depression to the 1970's. Larry and Sally Morgan are poor but Larry's literary career is promising. Charity and Sid Lang are wealthy, smart and magnetic. Through the eyes of Larry we follow the couples through better, worse, richer, poorer, sickness and health of their marriages, careers and families. They take different paths in life but spend much of their summer holidays together in a small Vermont town where Charity's family have been holidaying for decades.

It is Charity who starts the friendship and then dictates much of what ensues. She is a very strong character and continues to control until and after her death.

The book is reflection on the complex nature of the emotional web of human relationships. Wallace Stegnar's descriptions of landscape and nature are wondrous, his depictions of characters are wonderful and his gems of wisdom are pearls.

"Death is as natural as being born. Even when we stop being the individuals we once were there is the immortality of organic molecules that's absolutely certain. To think we'll become part of the grass and the trees and animals and that we will stay right here where we loved it while we were alive. People will drink us as their morning milk or pour us as maple syrup over their pancakes."

"Talent, I tell him, believing what I say is at least half luck. We are lucky in our parents, teachers, experience, circumstances, friends, times, physical or mental endowment or we are not. Born to the English language and American opportunity we are among the incredibly lucky ones. What if we had been born Bushmen of the Kalahari? What if our parents had been undernourished villagers in Uttar Pradesh, and we faced the problem of commanding the attention of the world on a diet of 500 calories a day, and in Urdu?"

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Last month we visited Steiglitz and were treated to a marvellous talk and walk and a delicious afternoon tea.

We met at the hotel in Regent Street and were welcomed into the hotel by the owners Peter Sharp and Chris McKenzie. Peter had prepared a talk which involved a time-line, maps and a display of history. His time-line which stretched from 60,000 years ago when the Aborigines were resident in the area until 1930 when Mr Harriot mined under the hotel, really placed Steiglitz on a world map. Peter described mines (to which we later walked) called "Copenhagen" and "Waterloo". "Copenhagen" was the horse which the Duke of Wellington rode in the battle of Waterloo and that that horse was descended from a horse called "Eclipse". Peter also talked about how the Scott family, who owned the hotel for many years, came to Australia on the "Great Britain" which was the first ocean-going ship to be built of iron that had a screw propeller. After a few years in Australia the Scott family went back to England on the same ship and then returned to Australia on her again. The ship was the longest ship in the world when launched in 1843, was designed by Brunel and she operated on the England to Australia route for over 30 years. Peter also mentioned Jason and the Argonauts, Cook's first voyage, Otway and his Chilian Mill and much more. The day finished with Peter leading us on a walk along the creek and through his property. We certainly discovered that there was much more than gold at Steiglitz. A huge thank you to Peter and Chris for their hospitality and sharing their knowledge.

The Age Thursday 11 May 1865 Compliled by Jan McDonald *The extract included share details and the manager's name. Let us know if you would like this information. – Ed.

An accident of a rather peculiar character occurred at Steiglitz on Saturday at the Gibraltar Quartz Company's claim. Two men were coming up the shaft in a large bucket. One of them addressed some observation to the other, but got no reply; and upon arriving at the top of the shaft, it was found that the poor fellow's head had come in contact with a beam on the passage up, and it had completely severed the head from his body-the latter still lying in the bucket, and the head was found at the bottom of the shaft.

Geelong Advertiser Tuesday 29 April 1862

"A flourishing debating society of 170 members has been established at Meredith, and affords the wit and intellect of the district abundant opportunity of shining forth during the discussion of grave subjects of national importance. In fact the combined intellect of Meredith has developed into something even beyond a mere local parliament, and the most careful consideration is given to the Rabbit Suppression Act, or the law relating to the exclusion of aliens, before the debating club's policy in regard to matters of each moment is decided upon. As the present assembly rooms is becoming too limited serious attention is being given to the advisability of erecting a suitable hall and furnishing a well-stocked library."

Geelong Advertiser, Thursday, May 21, 1891

A Public meeting was convened in the Lethbridge schoolhouse for the purpose of taking steps to prevent the removal of the Police Station....The population of Lethbridge and surrounding localities, dependant on police protection at this time was estimated to be 800. It was pointed out the great want of protection of life and property, especially as goods were left exposed at the railway station overnight.... The meeting moved a deputation be sent to the Hon. Chief Secretary in Melbourne to give the views of the meeting. Some present expressed regret that they did not possess a little of the **"rowdyism**" attributed to their Meredith neighbours, as in that case there was no danger of the station being removed.
