John's Really Big Bike Ride


On a Sunday morning in August 2008 on Macka's ABC radio program "Australia All Over", it was announced that a "Great Australia Bike Ride" was being planned. The ride was to start in Mornington in March 2009, circumnavigate the country including Tasmania, and would be finishing in October 2009. There were to be 9 stages and participation was open to anyone. The purpose of the ride was to fund raise for mental health awareness on behalf of Australian Rotary.

John Farrugia, at the age of 61, started training, riding approximately 2,000 kms before he started the 204 day ride. His wife Denise volunteered as escort for Tasmania and the east coast but by Townsville her patience at driving 20kms per hour, "was shot". She rejoined the ride for the "across the top" section.

One hundred riders rode out of Melbourne (including 20 exchange students who were heading to a Rotary Conference in Hobart). Riders joined for various stages of the ride and various bike clubs rode for a day. The largest contingent rode the Tasmanian stage. A convoy of nine vehicles accompanied the riders including a bike mechanic, first aid, two bike trailers and a motor home where food was stored and prepared and from which meals were served. The riders stayed in various accommodation: including home stays, camp outs, a Police Academy, caravan parks, a mansion, hotels, motels, a paddle steamer and a funeral parlour.

Riders visited over 200 Rotary Groups, numerous schools and heard speakers at breakfasts, dinners and lunches. They met every State Rotary Governor and CEO, most town Mayors, visited 52 McDonald's and learnt a lot about mental health. John raised an amazing \$31,000 out of the total \$250,000 raised (after expenses).

The most difficult part of the ride was from Geraldton to Adelaide as the weather was cold, windy and miserable. John rode one handed for 17 kms on the Nullarbor carrying a stumpy-tailed lizard with a can jammed on his head to the nearest roadhouse so that the can could be removed. The longest time on the bike was for 8 hours riding into a head wind. He came down four times and had four flat tyres. In the north of Australia the riders started early and finished by midday. The longest distance travelled in one day was 193 kms from Fitzroy Crossing to Derby. news have had a safe and festive Christmas and New Year award winners are; with family and friends.

Firstly I would like to acknowledge the great work done by many local volunteers at the Meredith Music Festival in December. From my point of view the festival ran extremely well. Once significant arrest however was made with regards to a male trafficking in a large quantity of amphetamine. This male was detected by staff who alerted police members on site. After his arrest, police located a large quantity of drugs and cash in his vehicle. He was arrested and interviewed and consequently charged at the Meredith Police Station.

The male made admissions to selling large quantities of amphetamine and was charged with trafficking and possession of amphetamine and possessing the proceeds of crime. He was bailed to appear at the Frankston Magistrates Court for hearing in March.

On the 22nd December 2014 I arrested and charged a local 27 year old male with multiple burglaries and thefts which In Golden Plains Shire approximately 17% of the waste being Geelong Magistrates Court for hearing in February. A to its owner.

Brendan Rayner made a welcome return to form with the bat last week compiling a solid 68. Keep up the good work boys.



"GO CROCS"

A small group of locals (who must remain anonymous to preserve their flagging reputations) have decided to catch up for lunch at a regional eatery each month this year and file a review of their findings. Here's their first.



We chose Café Meigus Bridge Mall Ballarat for this month's treat.

If you want to go to Spain and can't afford the airfare here is the next best thing. Café Meigus is a small intimate Spanish café located off the Bridge mall in Ballarat.

When we arrived, there was drinking water on the table and menus ready to go. Wines on offer were predominantly Spanish and we ordered sangria – a red wine based punch laced with diced fruit - very pleasant on a warm day.

We let the waitress choose our meals, comprising several tapas dishes to share. They were all tasty and reflected the typical Spanish foods you read about, varying from seafood to pork and chorizo sausage cooked in apple cider; all really tasty.

We checked out the dessert menu to finish off a great lunch. There are only a few sweet things to choose from but all are yummy, from Chorios (Spanish doughnuts with a warm chocolate sauce) to crème caramel, plus some really nice looking cakes etc. Larger serves and, at around \$7.00 each, offered good value. The coffee is good without being outstanding. The service was great with friendly, helpful waiting staff.

All up, cost per head was around \$35 including drinks. Café Meigus - really good value.

Over many generations, animals can change. Those that have the best camouflage are less likely to be found by predators or may be the most successful hunters. They are more likely to have offspring to whom they will pass on their camouflage. Over time, the shape and colour of the species can change, as the best camouflage pattern becomes the commonest pattern. For these creatures, being least visible is the best way to survive and reproduce.

As children, we are taught by our parents to not talk to strangers. They decided who we would make it into contact with and who we wouldn't.

They did all of our talking for us, filtering out the friendly from the not so friendly and disapproving our choice of 'bad' friends.

The Essence of Change

I thought that this topic would be appropriate for this time of the year especially those of you who have made new year resolutions. Most of us would like to change, tame or cut back certain habits. However, we end up giving up on the idea because no matter how hard we try we end up reverting back to our old ways. The behaviours or habits become so embedded and they occur automatically as though we function on 'auto pilot'. Many of us believe that people cannot change and support the idea that 'you cannot teach an old dog new tricks'. I totally disagree with this and will share with you how you can develop self mastery over any behaviour or habit you want to change. The essesnce of change is to believe that you are capable and to start by focusing on the small things. It is the small things that make the biggest difference!

The DO's and DONT'S to consider when working towards change;

DO

- do research and gain as much information about the behaviour or habit that you can muster. Google the topic, talk to others who have succeeded, borrow books from the library. This new knowledge will give you the power and motivation you will need to begin.
- do start small in order to regain confidence in yourself and grow the belief that you can make a difference. Begin with something tiny and achievable it may even be unrelated to what you want to change , for example, try going to bed 30 minutes earlier one or two nights a week. Then build it up to 5 nights per week. Or else try eating a healthy home cooked meal one or two nights a week. Begin by changing a small aspect of your usual routine no matter how tiny it is!
- do be kinder to yourself as our habits often make us feel disappointed especially when past attempts to change them have failed. Add to your day 10 mins of leisure or a daily activity that gives you pleasure and makes you feel good about yourself. This is contrary to most methods where abstinence and deprivation are promoted. I like to suggest that you add a new 'healthy' behaviour and have it well established before tackling the core problem. It also provides the best foundation for motivation. We achieve great things when we feel better.
- do recruit support and a team of helpers, we are more likely to make changes if we have someone on our side encouraging us and keeping us on track

• do practice and practice doing something different again and again. We all know that this is required in order to learn new skills. It's a similar approach to riding a bike, driving a car or using a touch pad phone. Practise makes perfect!

DON'T

- do not set impossible goals and impose strict timelines, this often results in bitter disappointment.
- do not focus on what you cannot do. Instead focus on what you can control and have control over already.
- do not give up! If you do not succeed try try again...it is well researched that it takes a number of attempts to change, learn new skills or create new habits.
- do not seek support from negative sources or those who do not have faith in you. Seek information from your local doctor, teacher or health professional.
- do not keep doing the same thing if it is not working. Try a different tactic or strategy as what works for someone else may not work for you. Trial and error is to be expected.

"The Mechanics Institute was crowded on Saturday afternoon when the Meredith & District Honor Board was unveiled by Mr Lister MHR. On the platform with him were Mr A.A. Austin MLC, Mr Griffiths (President of the Vigilance Committee), Cr. Synot (President) and Crs. Spiller, Fraser, M. McColl, Peel, Moody, Venters, Mr W.G. Sharpley, Rev. Stone and Rev. Scott. The hall and stage were nicely decorated with flags and pot plants by the ladies. The proceedings opened with the National Anthem. The Chairman Mr Griffiths explained the reason for the function. Mr Austin said that he regretted that he had time only to say a few words as he had to catch the 4pm train back to Geelong. He had attended every unveiling that he could and urged that nothing was too good for our boys who fought and died that we may live in peace. Mr Lister was greeted by loud applause. He asked them all to stand in silence for five minutes while he unveiled the Honor Board. There is always a tinge of sadness in the unveiling as on all of them was the sign that showed that several had paid the supreme sacrifice and our sympathy and deep reverence were due to the relatives bereaved."

Billie has a passion for shoes as demonstrated by her cupboard full of beautiful shoes. Her father was a shoe maker at a factory in Fitzroy and he also made shoes in a back room at their home near Brunswick Street. Billie always had plenty of lovely shoes. She started work at the shoe factory in Fitzroy the day she turned 16 years of age and when buyers came she would dress up and model the shoes.

She had attended St Brigid's in North Fitzroy but her

consuming interest was netball which she played nearly every night of the week. She played wing attack because she was short but could jump and move quickly. There were teams organized by schools, police and army and they played at many different venues. The teenagers would often walk home after netball in the dark and they knew the alleys and the back streets of the city very well. They had short cuts everywhere and looked after each other. They had no money but had lots of fun and lots of friends.

Billie met a handsome Wycheproof boy, Toby Elder, who had come to the city to play football for Fitzroy. She remembers that she was terrified when she was invited to meet Toby's Uncle Henry and Auntie Jill for dinner when Toby's parents came to town from the country. When they met at the Windsor Hotel, Henry immediately welcomed Billie, invited her to sit next to him and asked her what she would like to order. He suggested a steak, she agreed and they got on well from that moment.

Toby Elder and Billie were married at St Brigids, Fitzroy when she was about 21 years old. They had a family of three sons and lived in various places, Wycheproof, Jakarna at Glenroy and Redesdale before they came to Bamganie in the early 1980's to look after Toby's Uncle Henry and to run the farm "Kialla". Billie accompanied Henry Bolte, ex Premier of Victoria to many official functions and to the races, she met many important people including the Queen and dressed smartly. She always had the right shoes for every occasion!

Billie celebrated her 80th birthday on November 24, 2014.

Built-in Apps (Part 3)

FaceTime

Have you used Skype? FaceTime is the Apple version of this popular App. With it you can video or audio call anyone who has an iPhone or an iPad. You need the phone number or email address of the other person, another reason it is useful to set these up in your Contacts list, then just call. Siri

Ah Siri, you inspire delight and frustration in about equal measure. Siri is available on all but the first generation iPad, and is a voice activated assistant. You have probably turned it on accidentally by holding down the Home Button a touch too long. You can change Siri's voice in Settings, making it male, having a Brit accent, or speaking Chinese if you prefer! In the latest version, if you are connected to power you can activate Siri by just saying her name then giving an instruction, such as, "Hey Siri, send a message to my sister." Of course, you will need to have your sister in your Contacts list for this to work. There are lots of interesting or just silly things you can ask Siri, from "What will the weather be tomorrow?" or "Where can I get a coffee nearby?" to "Do you have a boyfriend" Have a play and see what you think.

Tips

I was going to write about Messages, but there is a better way for you to find out. In the latest upgrade, Apple have added a Tips App, which includes lots of useful information about making the most of your iPad. The Messages App has been significantly expanded, so have a look at what it can now do for you. Apple intend to keep adding to the Tips as new things come up, so check in now and then to see what is new.

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

- Prep time approx. 20 mins
- Cooking time 1 hour 45 minutes
- Makes approximately 8 cups

Ingredients

2kg blood plums, quartered, stones removed 1litre (4 cups) water 80ml (1/3 cup) fresh lemon juice 1.35kg (6 cups) sugar

Method

Combine plums and water in a large saucepan and bring to the boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium–low and simmer uncovered for 1 hour.

Add the lemon juice and sugar to the pan and stir without boiling, until the sugar dissolves. Increase heat to medium-high and bring to the boil. Boil, uncovered, stirring occasionally for 25-45 minutes until the jam jells when tested.

Ladle jam immediately unto 8 clean 250ml (1 cup) jars and seal. Invert the jars for 2 minutes then turn upright and set aside to cool. Label and date jars before storing.

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



We also were told a little about the paints which were used, often a rather toxic mix of plant and animal extract and how in the later paintings there was evidence of Western Art influence.

This gathering of usually very busy people enjoyed the opportunity to relax and chat, and most importantly to congratulate Diane on her significant milestone and to wish her a very happy birthday. And we add our thanks and congratulations too. Diane has been a force for community engagement and development over several decades and we live in a better place because of her efforts - Ed.







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

A Life Member of Mooney Cup Tennis, he was Secretary from 1957 until 1969 and President from 1974 until 1988. In 1993 the Bannockburn Shire awarded Roy an Australia Day certificate.

All are stunning for their subject, scale and detail. It really is a collection worthy of a permanent gallery.



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Meet the Maker

In November, soon after the couch was positioned in the outdoor room in front of the Royal Hotel I walked past. Two people were looking at the couch and I commented to the man, "Did you make this couch?" and to my surprise he answered "Yes!"

Mark Cuthbertson is an artist who lives at Inverleigh. He experiments with a variety of mediums in the development and application of new work.

He studied fine arts at Latrobe University in Bendigo but says what he produces now is totally different to what he learnt at Uni. In his artistic works he likes to use common materials in unusual ways, to reinvent their application and use. He has produced many inflatable works including a 5 metre high "Teddy Bear" in Johnston Park, Geelong, a "Film in a Duck" at Southbank, and recently was invited to participate in Art Prospect 2015 in St Petersburg.

Regular collaboration with Geelong based "Back to Back Theatre" has seen Mark designing and fabricating sets. The company tours extensively internationally and their productions have won countless awards and their work is highly acclaimed.

Mark was invited by the Golden Plains Shire to submit designs for a "couch" as it fitted with Meredith and the Music Festival. The site determined that a scene be created of a couch with a pouffe, a bookcase with books and lamp, and a snap shot of Aunty Meredith's living room. He explained how he is basically selftaught in cast concrete, but the process is like making plaster casts as a child except on a larger scale. He sourced an old couch from a local Op. shop which formed the basis for the silicone mould making process. The couch is made of 1½ tonnes of concrete which was hand mixed. The hardest part to recreate was the throw rug.

He is very pleased with the installed artworks, the artistic outcome is attractive, functional and the incorporation of solar power has an environmental component. The use of a rudimentary material like concrete in such a pleasing manner, invites you to use extra senses and to think outside the square. He has many ideas in the pipeline for future large-scale art works, utilising this technique. He also has an exhibition opening in April in Boom Gallery in Newtown, Geelong, which will include a new series of soft form cast concrete works for sale.

Many of his works are on display at the Red Door Café, Inverliegh, including the latest duct tape portrait of Andy Warhol. Which is amazing!



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Letters From Burma by Aung San Suu Kyi

Aung San Suu Kyi is the leader of the struggle for human rights and democracy in Burma. She wrote a letter per week, for a year, beginning in November 1995 for publication in a newspaper "to bring the Burmese situation to the attention of the world outside Burma". The letters have been reproduced in this book.

In the letters Aung San Suu Kyi intended to concentrate on the political aspect of life in the country but because politics is about people she has sought to bring out the human face of their political struggle. She writes of the effect on the people of official requirements, what inflation means at the common everyday level and how every level of government is corrupt. She tells about her friends and colleagues, about the activities of the party and about the trials, in more than one sense of the word, of political prisoners. She describes traditional festivals, Buddhist festivals and the beauty of the country. Her exploration of how people try to be happy despite their oppression is insightful.

In 1989, not long before her house arrest, she was granted an audience with U Pandita, a spiritual mentor whose words act constantly as an aid to a better existence. He spoke of the importance of "*right speech*". "*Not only should one only speak only the truth, one's speech should lead to harmony among beings, it should be pleasant and it should be beneficial.*"

In 1991 Aung San Suu Kyi was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for her unflagging efforts and to show its support for the many people throughout the world who are striving to attain democracy, human rights and ethnic conciliation by peaceful means.

Aung San Suu Kyi spent most of the nineteen years before 1995 imprisoned either in jail or in her own home. Upon release in July 1995 she immediately resumed the struggle for political freedom in her country. She was imprisoned again in 2000 and after an operation in 2003 she was allowed to return home but remained under effective house arrest.

A review of this book described Aung San Suu Kyi as one of the world's most inspiring figures. In this book she celebrates the courageous army officers, academics and everyday people who have supported the National League for Democracy often at great risk to their own lives. She reveals that state oppression has adversely affected everything from the national diet to traditions and hospitality. She also evokes the beauty of the country's seasons and scenery, customs and festivities which remain close to her heart.

This book was easy to read, interesting and inspirational.



The Trail Beckons






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
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
