It will provide space for local organisations and community groups to meet for a range of activities, programs and services. The new modern facility has ample space for people to meet casually or to join one of our many classes and activities. With additional space freed up in our old building it will give us the opportunity to expand our programs in new directions.

We hope the Hub will be more than the traditional community centre and will include more extensive services like health care and social support and a meeting space for community groups. It will become a place that encourages social gathering and provide spaces for people to congregate and meet together in both planned and incidental ways where people feel welcome to come in and feel included.

Identified as a priority for Meredith in Golden Plains Shire Council's Early Years Infrastructure Plan (2011), this \$1.27M project is an exciting addition to the Meredith community.

Meredith POLICE news

Welcome again to all readers of the Meredith and District News Letter. I have made many references in previous articles requesting readers to report any suspicious behaviour to me to Crime Stoppers and to record as much information as possible with regard to vehicle behaviour and registration details. I know that this message is having a great effect as I have received some great information in recent weeks.

Over recent months, both the Meredith and Bannockburn and surrounding areas have been the target of increasing crime. Much of this crime has been committed with offenders using stolen utes from the Geelong area. This has been confirmed via footage from various locations.

On Wednesday the 13th May, I was returning from processing an offender at the Ballarat Police Station at 10.30 p.m. when I received information of a white ute that had committed a petrol theft on the Midland Highway, Bannockburn. After making further enquiries, I ascertained that the ute had been stolen from Newtown in Geelong only one hour prior. A short time later I located the vehicle on the Midland Highway near Meredith.

Following a brief police pursuit, I arrested two male offenders from the Geelong area. These offenders were charged with a variety of offences including theft of a motor vehicle, theft and initiating a police pursuit. One offender was remanded into custody while the other was released on bail. These offenders made reference during their respective interviews that they intended on "running a muck" in the area.

After a spate of recent motor vehicle collisions within the area where people have lost their lives or been seriously injured, it astounds me to see that a minority of road users are still prepared to drive either at speed or under the influence of alcohol or drugs and place themselves and others at risk.

I am currently investigating the actions of a local probationary licence holder. On Tuesday the 28th April. I intercepted this male driver in the Meredith township at 9.50 p.m after he was observed by people who were horrified by what they saw and contacted police. Statements have now been taken from those witnesses and this matter is under investigation. A male will be charged on summons with serious traffic offences resulting from this incident.

I encourage people in the community to keep up the great work where matters have been reported to me relating to suspicious behaviour within the community.

Message from the Mayor

May was a good month for Council and the residents of Golden Plains Shire.

The State Government Budget included funding for the new P-12 School in Bannockburn, the Federal Government announced a double payment of Roads to Recovery funding which will give Golden Plains \$1,900,420 in the 2015-16 year followed by \$950,000 each year for the following 4 years. This funding will provide a real boost the roads program in our Shire.

Council's Draft 2015-16 Budget was out for public review until 1 June and, at the time of writing this report, a number of submissions had been received from residents. There was also a good deal of engagement in social media about the draft budget, the budget process and how rates are spent. We appreciate all feedback from our residents. Follow Council of Facebook to keep up to date on news and events.

We also celebrated the contributions of Council's volunteers at an event on 12 May as part of Volunteers Week. Special guest speaker Sue Noble, the CEO of Volunteering Victoria, spoke about the range of benefits volunteers gain by volunteering; outlining the significant benefits to volunteers' health, wellbeing and social connectedness. Council also celebrated the launch of a new Community Library Project which commenced in Rokewood this month. The Community Library Project is giving members of the Rokewood Planned Activity Group access to magazines, books and audiobooks as well as DVDs and music CDs. Residents receiving this service may not otherwise have the opportunity to enjoy these resources and this is why the project is such a fantastic initiative.

Looking ahead there are more ways for residents to get involved, Council has a number of surveys and consultations running over the next eight weeks and is seeking public comment. Please make sure you visit the website www.goldenplainsdigital.com.au/consultations and have your say. Lastly, your kerbside collection service will be changing as of 1 July, all ratepayers should receive a 'Let's Get it Sorted' pack in the mail mid-June which will include a range of information to assist you with the transition to the new collection service. This pack includes a General Waste and Recycling Booklet, a Collection Calendar identifying your collection week, a Fridge Magnet and Bin Sticker identifying the items which can be recycled. If you have not received your pack by the end of June, please contact Council's Customer Service Centre on 5220 7111 to have a copy mailed out to you.

Recently scammers have been cold calling, claiming to be from energy providers, telecommunication providers or even government departments. Scamwatch have received reports of these phone calls demanding payments for overdue accounts and using the threat of disconnection to try to convince people to pay. These calls are targeting both individuals and businesses. On some occasions it has been reported that the caller was from Centrelink and that pension payments would be stopped unless the debt was paid. Other examples

include threats of arrest or court action for unpaid fines or bills or the threat of disconnection to essential services. What appears to be common to all these scams is the use of threats to create a sense of urgency so the recipient of the call doesn't have the time to check the authenticity of the demand.

If you receive any phone calls claiming you owe money for your energy or phone bill you should investigate this independently. You should call your provider usingthe phone number found on your bills or on their website. Do not provide any personal or financial details over the phone.

How these scams work

- You receive an unexpected phone call from a person claiming you owe money for your phone or energy bill.
- The phone numbers they use will appear local but this doesn't make the demand any more legitimate.
- The caller may be very threatening saying that if you do not pay you will be disconnected, receive a fine or your government benefits will cease.
 - The scammer will provide some bank account details that they want you to pay to or ask you to pay by wire transfer.

Protect yourself

- If you receive a phone call asking to pay an overdue account, check its legitimacy by contacting your supplier using telephone numbers you know from bills you have received, the phone book or that you have found independently from an online search.
- Never give your personal, credit card or online account details over the phone unless you made the call and the phone number came from a trusted source.
- If you think you have provided your account details to a scammer, contact your bank or financial institution immediately.
- Do not send money via a wire transfer to pay a bill.

Vale to Gerald Francis Norman Smith



Gerry was known far and wide as "The Rocking Horse Man". He estimated that he made over 1000 rocking horses or hobby horses during the 18 years that he lived in Meredith and that the horses have travelled to all parts of Australia. A photo was sent to Gerry and Joy showing one of his horses on a wheel barrow. It had been unloaded from a small aeroplane on a station on the border between Northern Territory and Queensland which was considered by the School of the Air to be the most isolated cattle station in Australia. The owners of the horse sent the photo as testament to the sturdy construction of the horse since it had travelled by car, truck, boat and plane since leaving Meredith.

Gerry was born in Castle Combe, Wiltshire in England in 1936. He joined the Air Force after leaving school. In 1961 he married Joy and following the birth of their three sons they decided to emigrate. "Westinghouse Brake and Signal Company", for whom Gerry worked, offered him a job in New Zealand. The family took this opportunity and lived for some time in a newly renovated house on a New Zealand dairy farm where the boys could fish in a river, swim in the sea, help on the farm to learn skills and earn pocket money and drink lots of milk. When the boys were getting to the age when they needed jobs Gerry and Joy decided that Australia offered more opportunities so the family shifted to Williamstown and Gerry once again worked for "Westinghouse Brake and Signal Company".

Chris recalled the individuality of his father. He explained how Gerry chose to buy older vehicles and repair them and that one time he bought two old cars to make one good one out of them. He was a handy man who renovated houses, built furniture and mended anything that needed a mend. Gerry was strict about table manners and swearing, a practical joker who liked to grizzle a bit and enjoy a smoke. About eight years ago he suffered his first stroke but continued to make rocking horses with help from friends until the effort became too much. One of the delights of his last years was the weekly Sunday visit of Peter Nemstis to talk about their Air Force service and to taste test beers from all over the world.

Gerry died on March 27, 2015 and a service of remembrance was held at Geelong Memorial Park at Mt Duneed on Tuesday, March 31 followed by afternoon tea at the Royal Hotel at Meredith. His memory will forever live in the 1000 rocking horses being ridden around Australia.

I love the winter garden. In June the last leaves fall from the deciduous trees and vines and we often have clear blue sky days after the early morning frost has thawed. On these glorious mornings I like to wander around the garden secateurs in hand and snip away at the perennial herbs and ground covers. It's a kind of walking meditation and a tidy up but the pruning also removes old foliage and makes way for new growth, some of which is already pushing through the earth. Now is a good time to divide perennials and share with friends or plant out in other parts of the garden. Slice down through the plant with a sharp edged spade, lift the divided clump of roots and earth and find another spot for it to grow. This is such a simple way to grow plants. Try this with the mints, the marjorams, oregano, the achilleas, the thymes, comfrey.

My garden is replete with plants grown in this way, many I have carried around for years from garden to garden, each one a memory of a friend or an old aunt who grew the original. A memory garden is an enchanted place. As I wander around I recall Aunty Chris who grew the crinums, Aunty Ivy who grew the Madonna lilies and a friend who shared that unusual marjoram with me. But - I'm wandering in the garden again and must get back to the gardening column.

Another reason for my pleasure in the winter garden is that I can see its shapes clearly without the foliage, observe the bare bones as it were. Not that our garden is planned, it has grown like topsy to a degree but this is a good time to decide which plants could be moved to a better or more suitable position. Don't be too timid about digging up a shrub or even a small tree at this time of year. Cut through the roots with a sharp spade around the drip edge and irrigate with seaweed concentrate mixed into a couple of buckets of water. In a week or two the roots will have healed and you can lift the plant gently, including as much of the root system as possible, trim off any torn roots and replant in a well watered hole with some healthy compost or loamy soil.

We are plucking broccoli heads now and have broad beans, green and snap peas and silver beet growing strongly now, but it's not too late to plant these vegies. In fact we will continue to put in more of these seeds so as to stagger the harvest. A bright green crop of nettles has appeared in what was a bare patch a couple of weeks ago. I'm fond of nettles as I've heard they indicate healthy soil and I give myself a sting now and then in the belief that the sting is good for my arthritis. Certainly I will make nettle soup which is delicious and probably healthier than the sting. I haven't room for a recipe here but this is a good one: rivercottage.net/recipes/nettle-soup

The Friday Lunchers got a bit adventurous this month and wheeled it all the way to Daylesford for a bit of mid-day nosh. Jimmy's Bar is the flash part of Frangos and Frangos at the top of Vincent Street. (So don't expect to get a nearby park any time after daybreak!) We booked to make sure we got an indoor table overlooking the delightful courtyard – a recommended practice but, amazingly, we were the only diners on this cold and heartless Friday in late autumn. Maybe it was the prices, as it certainly wasn't cheap. At \$40 a plate with wine prices to match, it is a (very) special treat venue.

Restaurant staff were missing when we turned up, and we were greeted by a terrified cleaner with vacuum cleaner in tow. They soon made up for it though with plenty of gush and carry on befitting a venue of this standard. Now to the food.

It is only a small selection but very, very stylish. With a focus on local produce – the suppliers are listed on the back of the menu – every dish brought together some fabulous ingredients. Like: "Slow Braised Pork Belly", comprising chestnut soil (that's what it said!) turnip, brussell sprouts and orange glaze. The very helpful waiter explained the new French chef had been taken on a tour of the suppliers' farms and the setting he found the pigs in provided the inspiration for plating the dish. (Sounded dangerous to us!)

But all the dishes – we also had Wagyu Steak and Fish of the Day - were beautifully presented and a joy to eat. Unsurprisingly, the coffee was excellent.

This is certainly only an occasional indulgence for most people – and never, for some – but if you can afford it, it is a very worthwhile treat. (You could even buy a pie at the bakery across the road, then pop in for a \$20 entrée and coffee – you will feel just as special.)

Two of the Lunchers decided to go even further afield, missing this treat, in favour of lunch at the Cunnamulla Pub, (literally, the back of Bourke) where a Surf and Turf sets you back \$38 but the wedges and sour cream is much more reasonably priced at\$18. (Until you remember it's a plate of chips for goodness sake!.) Then, of course, there's the petrol costs.



Y112 Steam Engine


On Friday evening May 8, 2015 a special train consisting of steam locomotive K153 hauling six passenger carriages, plus steam engine Y112 built in 1889, with diesel engine T353 providing assistance in the rear, came through Meredith.

The train was being transferred to Ballarat from the Steamrail Depot in Newport for the Ballarat Heritage Festival weekend. On each day of the festival Steamrail Victoria ran five trips departing from Ballarat station to Lal Lal and returning.

On Saturday when the 1pm shuttle pulled into number two platform at the Ballarat station it contrasted enormously with the 2.31 pm Velocity train standing in number one platform. The latter included VL56 the newest Velocity train to enter service with V/Line.

Over three thousand passengers travelled on the shuttles over the weekend. The train departed from the Ballarat station at 6.45 pm on Sunday evening minus Y112 which remained in Ballarat with the T class diesel leading the train to Nth Geelong and steam locomotive K153 leading from Geelong to Newport.

[Twenty Y class steam locomotives were built about 1889 by the Phoenix Foundry in Ballarat, including Y112. It is now owned by Sovereign Hill and is leased to Steamrail, Victoria.]

"Cutting For Stone" by Abraham Verghese

"My brother Shiva and I came into the world in the late afternoon of the twentieth of September in the year of grace 1954. We took our first breaths in the thin air of Addis Ababa, capital city of Ethiopia." The miracle of the birth of identical twins Shiva and Marion took place at Missing Hospital in Operating Theatre 3 where their mother Sister Mary Joseph Praise, a nun of the Diocesan Carmelite, Order of Madras spent most of her working hours with their father, surgeon Thomas Stone.

The story that follows evolves because their mother dies of complications from her hidden pregnancy and their father immediately disappears. They are raised by Dr Kalpana Hemlatha and Dr Abhi Ghosh, both immigrants from Madras and both doctors at the hospital. They grow up amid the political turmoil of Ethiopia. The twins who are almost supernaturally close as children but become more distant as the novel progresses and are dramatically reunited at its end through the mysterious agency of their long vanished father, Thomas Stone. The title is puzzling until we are told that "I will not cut for stone" is part of the Hippocratic Oath which translates to "I will leave this operation to be performed by practitioners, specialists in this art". The twins become doctors who specialise, their father is a specialist as are the doctors at Missing Hospital. The surname "Stone" also puzzles the mind as to the title.

The author was born and brought up by Indian parents in Ethiopia. He qualified as a doctor in Madras and in 2009 was Professor of Medicine at Stanford University, California. He has written several books. Some reviews of the book describe it as absorbing, exhilarating, exhausting and baggy! He tries to cram in every last fact including medical facts and practices. In 2011 President Barack Obama chose "Cutting For Stone" as one of the five books on his summer vacation reading list.

Bookclub members enjoyed reading this book and were particularly interested in the medical cases. The book for discussion in July is "Life after Life" by Kate Atkinson.

Young drivers engaged in the program will:







Lamb & Date Tagine with Couscous

• Prep time 27 minutes •

rvac 6

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 6 lamb shanks
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 tablespoon ground cumin
- 2 teaspoons fresh ginger, grated
- 2 teaspoons paprika
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 750g sweet potato, peeled, cut into 2.5cm pieces
- 2 parsnips, thickly sliced
- 3/4 cup pitted dates cut in half
- 1/3 cup coriander leaves
- 2 cups of water
- 2 cups of couscous
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

Method

- Preheat oven to 160C. Heat oil in a large flameproof casserole dish over medium heat.
 Cook the lamb shanks in batches, turning occasionally until browned. Transfer to a plate.
- Add the onions to the pan and cook for 5
 minutes or until brown. Add the garlic, cumin,
 ginger and paprika. Cook, stirring for 30
 seconds. Stir in the stock. Return the lamb to
 the pan Cover and bring to a simmer.
- 3. Transfer the pan to the oven and cook for 1 hour. Carefully remove from the oven and turn the lamb. Add the sweet potato, parsnip and dates and cook for a further 1 hour.
- 4. To make the couscous, place water in a saucepan. Cover and bring to the boil. Turn off the heat. Add the couscous and quickly replace the lid. Swirl the pan to combine, then stand for 5 minutes or until the water is absorbed. Uncover, drizzle with the oil and fluff with a fork to separate the grains.
- 5. Sprinkle the tagine with coriander and serve with the couscous.

The old log is green, covered in a minute world of lichens. There are slowly spreading circles of light green, flat and crinkly. Bright olive-green clumps branch like corals. Pale green flattened branches reach out beyond the edge of the log. Many spikes of dull green end in specks of brown, or broaden to flat discs, or have a bulge of startling bright red on the top. There are delicate miniature shrubs of pale green. Between these larger lichens, where they can find space, are tiny scales of grey-green and grey, some with hints of pink, and specks of green lichen waiting to develop.

Attached to the lichens are a few incredibly thin white stalks, ending in white pointed football-shaped eggs. These were laid by a lacewing, an insect with a soft body and clear wings covered in a lacework of veins. When they hatch, the predatory larvae will roam the lichen forest, preying on the herbivores that graze there. In the miniature world on the log, lichens provide shelter for many tiny, even microscopic, creatures. Mites, snails, caterpillars and others live here, protected from drying out, and able to hide from larger predators outside the world of the log.

The log may look like it is covered in a forest of miniature plants, but lichens are not plants. They are specialised fungi that can only grow in partnership with algae or a type of bacteria called cyanobacteria. The algae or cyanobacteria can create food from sunlight in the same manner as a plant. It uses some of the food, and some is used by its fungal partner. The fungus holds the lichen in place, contributes nutrients from the log and prevents its partner from drying out. In hot weather, lichens become very dry and far less noticeable. When it rains, lichens quickly rehydrate.

Different partnerships lead to different species of lichen, which have different colours and shapes. Lichens that look like small bushes or hang down from tree branches are called fruticose lichens. Those that are flatter, but not completely attached to the surface are foliose lichens. Crustose lichens are flat and stuck firmly to the surface on which they grow, sometimes creating patterns of grey, yellow or orange on rocks.

New lichens can grow from broken off fragments of a lichen. Some lichens produce clumps of cells from both partners which can grow into new lichens. Lichens also produce spores, often in dark discs on the surface of the lichen, but also on cups or coloured shapes on the ends of spikes. The spores are only from the fungal partner. They can be spread by wind, water or animals. To grow, the spore must find an algae or cyanobacteria, with which it can form a partnership.

Lichens colonise new habitats. As well as growing on logs, they can be found on soil, where they can help to prevent erosion, on trees and smaller plants, rocks, bones, roof tiles, roads, abandoned cars, gravestones, metal and many other surfaces. Different species of lichen grow on different surfaces. They help to break down the substrate on which they grow, so that it and the lichen eventually become part of the soil creating a place for new lichens or plants. Some lichens are very sensitive to air pollution, while some can happily live in cities. This makes them useful indicators of air quality. Lichens manufacture some unusual chemicals which have been used by people as medicines and dyes.

Police Paddocks' Treasures

Jim Elvev & Sarah Hibberd

Ballarat archaeologist, Sarah Hibberd, visited the Meredith Police Paddocks last month to inspect the building remnants revealed by recent burn-off and grazing activities. Some of these remnants are thought to date back to the mid-19th century, when police and mounted trooper facilities started We are having a wonderful time with our kinder children this of slate tiles, bricks and crockery.

Equally interesting to Sarah, who is currently studying geology, were the site's rock forms. She was particularly intrigued by the hole and "pipe" formations in several large basalt boulders in the creek bed. Described as "vesicular basalt" meaning that the basaltic flow had a high gas conten trapped within it, (creating air bubbles as it became a solid rock)was likely formed any time between 4.5 million to a mere 5,000 years ago during the Newer Volcanics in the Quaternary. The unusual formations, such as the one pictured below, probably exhibit what are known as "plant casts" where trees may have been trapped in the first lava flow. They then disintegrated and left depressions in the rock which was then I filled by a later more vesicular flow.


Ibis Walk Pergola Needs Help

The handsome and unusual structure that has adorned the Ibis Walk for around a decade is in need of repair. And it is at risk of losing a lot of it distinctive charm in the process.

Golden Plains Shire Arts and Culture Officer, Deb Sansom, is pursuing the possibility of Council carrying out essential maintenance work on the pergola and Ibis statues in the *Walk of the Ibis* along the creek at the back of the Primary School. This was identified as an early action by the interest group assembled by the Community Coordinators to develop the "Coolebarghurk Creek Project."

Council have costed the replacement of the lapped timber with a Colourbond roof and also the cost of dispensing with the fabricated steel ornamentation that currently decorates the pergola (due to its height and shape, this may entail a crane/boom).

We are hopeful that this striking piece of public art will be saved, and we are currently negotiating with Council about the possibility of them providing timber (which volunteers could install for the roof) and a community member about how we can best go about restoring the ornamentation for the top.



Unbelievable Crazy Low Prices !!!

Okay, I have your attention, but I am not going to try to sell you anything ... and in fact, I am going to advise you <u>not</u> to buy ... at least not yet ... But I have exciting news about prices.

For the last couple of years the Solar Industry has been hyping the adding Batteries to Grid-Connected Solar Power Systems as the next big thing ... The reasons are obvious: while the sun is shining and a Solar Power System is generating power, the majority of households in use very little power because Mum & Dad are at work and the Kids are at school. Power is really needed in the evening for cooking, heating/cooling, lights, television, etc ... Batteries allow the capturing of solar energy at lunchtime for use at dinnertime.

Previously State Governments created incentives to "Go Solar" by mandating generous subsidized Feed-in Tariffs Schemes under which households sold power back to their Electricity Retailer during the day for at least the price they could buy it for, earning Credit that could be used to buy power in the evening. But the current feed-in rate in Victoria is now only 6c/kWh with no guarantee into the future that there will be any mandated minimum feed-in tariff at all ...

So while the technology already exists to deliver the solutions, the price of the Batteries has made the Value Proposition (despite what some players in the Industry might tell you) economically unexciting – breakeven over the life of the equipment at best and not something that will save you money. But that is all about to change.

Many people are aware of the Tesla Electric Car Corporation in the USA. Telsa knows that the key to popularizing their Electric Car is getting the price of Batteries down. In 2014, Telsa announced their huge new GigaFactory for Batteries designed to reduce prices by increasing production volumes. The other obvious market to grow demand for Batteries is Grid-Connected Solar Power. And in May 2015, Telsa has announced their Grid-Connected Battery Storage solution - "The PowerWall".

Tesla is so good at Razzle-Dazzle Marketing that many media reports seem to suggest that Telsa invented off Grid-Connected Battery Storage with Solar. They didn't. But what they have done is release the PowerWall into the US Market at an *Unbelievable*

Crazy Low Price – less than half the price of competing solutions. For me, this is the long-predicted beginning of fierce competition between manufacturers to bring their prices down to compete.

I would not be investing in Batteries yet ... but I would be watching this space very carefully and expect exciting economic returns from Batteries within five years and possibly in just one or two.





Meredith History Interest Group

John James Graham Colclough

On May 31 J.J.G. Colclough's daughter, Jan Dimmick from Melbourne, was at the Meredith Anglican Church Hall to tell us about her father. He attended Scotch College before playing football for Melbourne and later farming at Meredith. Mr Colclough was very involved in the Meredith community; eventually marrying two Meredith girls (not at the same time!) from established families. After serving in World War 1, he was welcomed home by residents and the State School students.

The Bluestone House on Steiglitz Road

On Sunday, May 3 2015, a crowd of people visited the bluestone house to view the house, kitchen building, huge trees and the block of land and to hear about the history. The owner, David Steele, has done extensive research and collated significant amounts of information which he presented as an interesting sequential history that contained mystery, hidden money and crime.

Part of the land was part of the former pound site. It has been owned by a number of people including Thomas Connor, John Davies, Charlie Davies and Norm McDonald. Charlie Davies married Ellen English and her niece and nephew lived there as well as her sister Grace. It was later known as Creeds. Neil Cooper lived there with his family in the 1940's after they moved from their farm at Bamganie.

The bluestone house was built using the bluestone blocks that were removed from the Catholic Presbytery in 1889. The house has an inner wall made of bricks that supported the roof and plaster lining. Some of the building is floorless and one

bluestone wall has a precarious bend in it. If only the walls could talk!

Heritage Walk Book

MHIG received a grant from the Golden Plains Shire to re-design and re-print the "Heritage Walk Book" and leaflet. The book was originally produced in 2004 as a project of Meredith Town Team and Meredith Community House. Initiated by Lyndsay Fink it was launched at an event in Pioneer Park on November 14, 2004. High Tech Printing have done a wonderful job to re-design and re-print the book. The little book now has a laminated, modern cover, is bound rather than being stapled and is for sale for \$10. The leaflet or flyer matches the book cover and is free to people who wish to walk around Meredith and discover the historic sites. Both are available at the Interpretative Centre.

A Meredith Soldier

George Francis Moir was born at Morrisons near Ballarat on March 6, 1867. He was the second son of Reverend John Strachan and Margaret (Stephen) Moir and was educated at The Geelong College. After matriculating he entered the Colonial Bank, then was a clerk to Mr McKechnie, St Arnaud and Secretary to Mr McBride in his candidature for Parliament. Later he went to Western Australia and Sydney. George married Helen Armstrong in 1896 and they had a son James who was born on July 2, 1897. His father had been Reverend at the High Church in Bendigo and before that had been Presbyterian Minister at Meredith. George had a number of siblings who were born at various locations including Brighton, Tarr., Morrisons, Moorabool, Melbourne and Sandringham.

When he enlisted on June 27, 1915 George was working as an accountant in Sydney and the family lived at Wahroonga, NSW. He embarked with the 9th Reinforcement Group on HMAT A8 Argyllshire on September 30, 1915 for Egypt and joined the 4th Battalion at Tel-el-Kebir on January 6, 1916. He arrived at Marseilles on March 30 and served as a stretcher bearer for his battalion in France where he was killed in action at Pozieres on July 24, 1916, aged 48. He is commemorated on the Villers Bretonneux Memorial, France. His son James Moir enlisted on September 11, 1916 and served with the 13th battalion for almost three years after the death of his father.

In *Mapping Our Anzacs*, George Francis Moir is listed as being born at Meredith. He is commemorated on Panel 41 at the Australian War Memorial.

The service of Private George Francis Moir, no. 2865, is described in a book by James Affleck about Geelong Collegians at the Great World War.

Lethbridge, Meredith, Bamganie, She Oaks, and Steiglitz State Schools are holding a combined sports meeting on March 27 to raise funds for the group scholarship. Two trophies for Schools' championships will be awarded.

The Birth of a Township

The new township of Meredith is already progressing at railroad pace." So claimed a Geelong Advertiser reporter on 19th October 1853, when he reported on the laying of a foundation stone for a new hotel in the township. This new building was situated on the corner of Wallace and Wilson streets. (Currently the service station). On this great day on the towns calendar, Henry Gosling laid the foundation stone for Gosling's Hotel. Present at this observance were, Edward and Richard Gosling, Proprietors; Robert Coxon Young, Architect; Messrs. Pearce, Clark, and Matthews, Contractors. A number of coins of the reign of Her Majesty, were put into a bottle, and placed, and a lead plate with an inscription engraved was mortared onto the foundation stone which was then laid by Henry Gosling.

Henry in his address to those gathered, remarked "... it was not only the foundation stone to Gosling's Hotel they were laying, but it was also the foundation stone of the new township of Meredith, and he hoped it would prosper, and all connected to it."


Captain Berry then proposed the success of the new Hotel with Champagne, and three cheers were given to the proprietors. The company then adjourned to Mr. Watson's Hotel, who it was thought intended to shortly lay another stone to the foundation of the new township of Meredith.

Artists Fly Again


