Message from the Mayor

Thank you to all residents and ratepayers who have contacted Council over the past couple of months regarding the upcoming changes to the household waste and recycle collection service.

In response to feedback, Council is investigating the provision of Green Waste Service to select areas (on a voluntary basis) and is also exploring the feasibility of a Waste and Recycling Transfer Station located within Golden Plains. A transfer station is a processing site for the temporary storage of waste and could also be equipped with materials recovery facilities where residents can take excess waste or recyclables.

A new Engagement Officer has also been appointed to improve information to me here at Meredith phone: 52 861222 direct consultation with the community and how we engage and respond to community need. Residents will be able to take part in consultation on these opportunities in coming months.

Council was successful in 2014 leveraging funds from State and Federal Governments enabling us to take on major projects and works; reducing the use of ratepayer funds. 2015's forecasts looks much more uncertain.

Grants, State Government is vet to confirm funding for critical programs such as the Country Roads and Bridges and will be introducing Rates Capping in 2016/17. These decisions dramatically impact on Council with an immediate loss of hundreds of thousands of dollars and a further deterioration of millions of dollars within a couple of years.

Council will be forced to scrutinise every service and program offered to residents and make cuts. Council is strongly advocating both Governments to reconsider their policies so that we may continue to provide the quality level of services our community expects and needs.


A bushy clump of drooping olive-green leaves hangs from a branch of a gum tree. It is a mistletoe plant, which cannot grow on the ground. It makes some of its food from sunlight and sucks other nutrients and water from the tree. Too many clumps of mistletoe on a tree can kill it, but this usually happens only if the tree is old, unhealthy, or has no other trees near it. There are many types of mistletoe in different parts of the world. In southern Australia, mistletoes commonly grow on eucalypts, and have leaves which look similar to gum Other species of mistletoe grow on trees with leaves. different shaped leaves, and have evolved leaves similar to the host plant on which they grow. The reason for this is unknown, but one theory is that some herbivores prefer to eat the mistletoe, so they have evolved to look like part of the less palatable tree.

For wildlife, mistletoe can be an important source of food and shelter. Possums find the leaves of mistletoe tasty and may also shelter in the dense clump during the day. The base of the plant, where it attaches to the tree, can be a secure and well-hidden place to build a nest. Imperial white butterflies lay their eggs on mistletoe. The purple-brown caterpillars eat the leaves and pupate on the plant. They emerge as eyecatching adults with red and yellow markings on the black and white undersides of their wings. The upper surface is duller, white, grey and black, providing them with camouflage. Another less attractive butterfly, named the dull purple azure, also lays its eggs on mistletoe. Its caterpillars hide beneath the tree's bark during the day and feed on the mistletoe's leaves at night.

The long red mistletoe flowers hang down in clusters, their narrow petals curving upwards as they mature. They are visited by birds, especially honeyeaters, and insects including moths and butterflies, which enjoy the nectar the flowers provide, and in return spread its pollen to fertilise other flowers. The mistletoe continues to flower for longer than many other plants and may provide food at times when other plants do not, making it an important food source.

In autumn, the mistletoe produces little oval-shaped yellowish fruits. These attract birds, especially mistletoebirds. They are small, but the male is handsome with a glossy black head and back, red throat and breast, a black stripe down his white belly and bright red under his tail. The female is much duller with grey on her back, white below and pale red under her tail. Although the mistletoebirds will eat insects and other fruits, their favourite food is mistletoe fruits. The fruits have a sticky layer under the skin with the seed in the middle. Sometimes the fruit sticks to the bird's beak and it wipes it off on the tree branch. More often, the bird eats the fruit, which passes through it very quickly. Several minutes after eating, the bird defecates. The seed is still very sticky.

The bird, who may now be in a different tree, rubs the seed off its feathers onto a branch, where it adheres firmly and quickly begins to grow. Initially, its leaves make all of its food, while its root grows into its host. It may take a year until it reaches the veins in the tree which conduct water and minerals from the roots to the leaves. The mistletoe forms a permanent connection with this nutrient supply, and becomes partially parasitic. Sometimes the branch beyond the clump of mistletoe will die, but the rest of the tree remains healthy, and visiting wildlife can enjoy the resources of tree and mistletoe.







Ritual Realisation

There are rituals in our society that call for a coming together of multiple voices to help convey certain degrees of celebration.Generally when there is cause for a group of people to come together, there is also a need to collectively chant, sing or repeat certain phrases in order to adhere to the tradition of playing out rituals such as birthdays and weddings. Over the years, I have noticed that I am developing a habit when it comes time to sing happy birthday. As everybody gathers around the cake and the candles have been lit, a general sense of merriness ignites amongst family and friends as they prepare to display their happiness and congratulations in lyrical form.

As people take in deep breathes to burst forth into the familiar lines of 'Happy Birthday to You', I will display excitement on my facial features and imitate a taking in of deep breath. I will open my mouth and utter a tiny 'hhhu' sound and, after finding it to be offensive to mine own ears, will continue on to mime the rest of the song, joining back in at the end to shout 'hurray!' three times.

I realised the other day that this habit wasn't just limited to birthday celebrations. At a wedding recently, I noticed that despite my best efforts to force myself to reply to the priest's prompts and to chant along to the Lord's Prayer, I was at a loss to produce any noise.

While a rather harmless habit, I must admit that I do live in fear. This is because I know that as some of you read this, you're thinking 'I do that too!' When I pitched this article to my sister, she replied with 'doesn't everybody do that?' And this just confirmed my fear.

One day—whether it be sooner or later—we will be at a celebratory function, and as we all go to commence a 'Happy Birthday' or an 'Amen', nothing will happen. Silence will fall on our ears and suddenly you'll realise that it wasn't just you all along. That there are millions of mimes out there, each afraid of hearing their own voice shrieking out tonelessly above the others. And that is when we will have to change these very old traditions.

Perhaps we will have to change these vocal displays into another type of aural experience. We will have to add finger clicking and tongue clacking to the rituals of hand clapping and glass clinking. And while on the subject of glass clinking...how many cut hands and spilt drinks must we endure before this gesture ends?

- We have assigned traffic controllers to the corner of Staughton Street and Midland Highway on Monday 9 March to assist vehicles turning left or right onto Midland Highway.
- We will install a no-parking zone along Mount Mercer Road and some surrounding roads.

Celebrating our Youth

Local young people have the opportunity to be recognised for their diverse range of personal and community contributions they have made to the Golden Plains community. We are delighted to introduce this month a new column devoted to the important subject of renewable energy. Simon Reid manages a Team of Energy Consultants for BREAZE, a Ballarat based registered charity that promotes the adoption of renewable energy. It owns and runs a business to support itself in the absence of government or other funding. The renewable energy scene is changing rapidly and Simon's column will keep you in touch.

"Setting the Scene"

Renewable Energy: Is it Still Economically Viable? Energy costs are rising ... and people are feeling the pain. Many people who have considered Renewable Energy, such as Solar Power, for their home or business are aware that Government Incentives, such as Rebates and Feed-in Tariffs, have been cut back significantly ... and are likely to be cut back further, possible very soon.

People want to make sustainable choices but rightly have to I look forward to next time when I can have another go at ask themselves "Is renewable energy still economically viable? ... And can it protect me from the rising cost of that you need to consider renewable energy energy?"

In one word "Yes" ... But the design of Solar Power, Wind Power and Solar Hot Water Systems needs to more carefully match the generation to the users demand for energy at the time that it occurs at different times of the day, days of the weeks and weeks of the year. And it needs to be combined with an overall assessment of energy use on site and Energy-Efficieny measures to reduce energy demand such as Insulation, Double-Glazing, LED Lighting and Reverse-Cycle Air-Conditioners. It also needs to consider how storing energy from intermittent sources (Sun, Wind) can be done economically now and how to prepare for the coming widespread uptake of energy storage as battery costs come down over the next 5 years.

In this column, I want to explore ways that renewable energy can stack up economically for homes and businesses, looking at specific technologies in turn.

But first let's take a step back and place renewable energy in the context of the wider energy market, starting with a statement that might surprise some people: Unless ways are found by the Fossil Fuel Industry to reduce the cost of producing their polluting product. Renewables will be seen as the economic choice for homes and most small to medium businesses within a decade. People will be asking "Are fossil fuels and centralized generation still economically viable?" And this will disrupt the current business model of centralized generators and distributors to such a degree that utility companies may seek to abandon whole sections of the mains electricity grid, forcing energy consumers to consider standalone off-grid renewable energy.

Not convinced?


Consider these points:

- The price of a Solar Panel fell about 80% of the 5 years from 2008 and 2013 before stabilizing somewhat in 2014
- Tesla Motors in the USA recently opened the longanticipated "Giga-Factory" to make batteries for Electric Cars - could that be the start of battery prices undergoing the same dramatic 80% fall?
- Throughout Australia, the price of Mains Gas is predicted to double (or even triple) as export contracts come into effect and see locally-mined gas exported to countries where the price of gas is 2 to 3 times our price.
- The International Energy Agency says solar will produce 27 per cent of all electricity globally by 2050.
- By 2050, the Fraunhofer Institute in Germany predicts solar will cost as little as 2c per kWh
- Back home in South Australia, on one day in December 2014, Solar Power met 1/3 of the demand for electricity between 11.30am and 3.30pm.

Hello to all my iPad friends. Here are three more informative apps for you to explore:

Storm

There are quite a few weather information apps out there, but this one is very pretty and has a few particular pluses. It is a free app with a really nice visual presentation and all the information you could ask for, both current and predictive. Most particularly, it shows radar sweeps of rain and storm activity (hence the name) so you can watch weather patterns form and shift. It was fascinating (if a little frightening) to watch the recent storm activity off Queensland for example.

Translate

This clever little app does what it says - it translates between 92 different languages. Choose English and Swahili or any other combination. You can then type or handwrite the words or phrases you want translated and the app shows you the result. Even more clever, for 36 of the most common languages you can photograph a word, sign or other writing an it will provide an English translation. I can see lots of uses for this when travelling.

Expense

Need help tracking you budget? Another free app, Expense lets you set goal amounts for your spending in lots of categories, from Home Repairs to Eating Out, or you can set up your own categories. You then record purchases as they happen and it will track how you are going in each category or overall. Information is presented in several forms and it can be a real eyeopener to realise just where the money goes. You can set up regular payments to be tracked automatically and the app remembers the details of previous transactions so you don't have to fill in all the details each time.

Once you have used Expense to improve your savings, perhaps you will have enough to travel to somewhere exotic to use the Translate app. You can even check the weather at your destination with Storm before leaving...sounds like a plan!








Anzac Centenary

While the Australian troops were training at Alexandria, Egypt, the Navies of the British and French were in the process of becoming involved in conflict off the Dardanelles.

The Gallipoli campaign was conceived by the First Lord of the Admiralty, Winston Churchill, and approved by the First Sea Lord, Admiral Sir John Fisher, they elaborated a strategy in the face of failure on the Western Front.

The British Empire and its Allies needed a win. The war on the Western Front, even by late 1914, was a costly stalemate where the movement of troops and the gaining of territory from the enemy was virtually impossible. Russia needed across the Dardanelles. This was true, but the Turks had also laid a support and supplies as much as their Allies needed a victory, stretch of mines parallel to the eastern (Asian) shoreline. British

To approach Russia from behind Germany's back, through the Black Sea, made strategic sense.

The way to the Black Sea was through the Dardanelles, through the Sea of Marmara and beyond Constantinople (modern Istanbul).

The problem was that late 1914, Turkey had declared itself on the side of the Germans. Turkish forts guarded the waterway of the Dardanelles and powerful guns could be used against any ships seeking passage through those waters.

military capacity, underestimating the possibility of Turkish reach the Black Sea. The Stage was set now for the Gallipoli Landing. resistance. From late 1914 onwards, British warships began shelling the Turkish forts from a considerable distance



offshore. This bombardment achieved notable success and gave the British an unrealistic sense of the ease of their mission. Eventually the British realised they could not knock the forts out at great distance. It was decided to send the warships into the Dardanelles for direct action against the forts.

18th March 1914 the British and French assembled a mighty armada. The First Sea Lord, Admiral Sir John Fisher was reluctant to use his modern and powerful warships but he was overruled, the armada was thought to be an irresistible force.

The Turkish forces, along with the fort's guns, employed mobile artillery, and a crucial tactic to mine the sea lanes added a third line of defence. The British believed that the mines were stretched reconnaissance failed to detect this and though British minesweepers removed many of the mines the parallel mines remained undisturbed. The armada sailed in and created havoc among the forts. The British Vice Admiral John de Robeck had his ships in three lines and as the first line withdrew they turned seawards along the Asiatic coast when suddenly the French ship Bouvet struck a mine and sank within minutes, with only a small number of survivors, two other ships struck mines and were heavily damaged, De Robeck decided the Turkishs forces were floating mines on the current placing his ships in great danger. He withdrew his ships and declined to engage the forts the following day. Sellars Brothers Go to War

Two sons of Richard Baker and Edith Sellars of "3B Corner" (the corner where the Shires of Buninyong, Ballan and Bannckburn met) went to World War 1. Richard Ernest Sellars enlisted on 6/7/1915 when he was 28 years of age and his brother Robert Charles Sellars enlisted on 31/10/1916 when he was 26 years of age."

On Monday, October 18, 1915 Privates M. Smith, W. Smith and C. Wyatt were entertained and presented with fountain pens at the Meredith Mechanics Hall before they embarked for WW1. The committee had invited six soldiers but Privates Sellars and Lowne and Sergeant Worland were unable to obtain the necessary leave."

Richard Sellars was in the 7th Battalion but transferred to the 58th Battalion, the same battalion as his brother was in. Family tell that they met up with the three East brothers from Elaine in France.

Richard Ernest Sellars received a shrapnel wound to his chest and abdomen in France in July 1916 and a second time in October 1918. He returned to Australia per the "Wyrema"in May 1919 after 3¹/₂ years of active service. Locals say he was in a bunker when all his comrades were killed. He had plenty of guns and ammunition and continued to defend by shooting through a pop hole until he was rescued by the British Army.

In the 1920's he married Alice Craig, and had a family: Bob, Ken, Joyce, Daphne, Don and Dorothy. He mostly worked as a fencer at "Moranghurk".

Robert Charles Sellars was gassed in October 1917, rejoined his unit in June 1918 and was killed in action in July 1918 in France.

"On July 4 near Ville sur Ancre he was killed. I did not see the casualty but was told about it from his brother who was with the battalion. He also said he was buried on the bank of the river Ancre between Ville-sur-Ancre and Dernancourt. The brothers Christian name is Richard. He is now in hospital at Rouen and I know he could give details. Pte. G. Hill"

Another report describes him as about 5 feet 10 inches tall with a dark complexion with a dark moustache. He was killed by a high explosive shell. Death was instantaneous.


"Mr and Mrs Sellars of Meredith were notified by the Defence Department on Wednesday that their youngest son, Pte Robert Charles Sellars, had been killed in action in France. The deceased soldier was on active service for the past 20 months and was gassed about two months ago and must have just recovered and gone back to France when he was killed. Chas. H Chalmers* broke the news to the bereaved parents. The late Pte. Sellars was well known and liked throughout the surrounding districts and was 28 years of age. Mr and Mrs Sellars have another son, Pte. Richard Ernest Sellars still on active service."

This month's foray of the Friday Foragers on their epicurean expedition was to Zest in Main Rd Ballarat opposite Sovereign Hill. My dictionary has two definitions of Zest, firstly, the peel of an orange or lemon, and secondly, enthusiasm. We hoped that it was named after the latter and that its appeal was not just *a peel*.

You walk in what feels like a side door past the kitchen on the left, a little disconcerting, to a quite small capacity restaurant, probably only 30 patrons. The lunch menu was only one page and didn't differentiate between entrees and main courses. The wine list had a very limited offering. We waited some time for any service, although to be fair our booking was for six and only four had arrived, so they may have been holding back. Our waitress was the owner who was both pleasant and helpful, and once we explained that the remaining couple were coming later and insisted we start without them, the service was most acceptable although she had never done a wine serving course. We were not given the wine to inspect that it was as ordered, nor a tasting, simply poured at one end of the table and each glass placed in front of its recipient.

However the food was very good with approval all round. We were simply told what the two desserts available were, crème caramel and chocolate tart. Like many restaurants nowadays it was badly let down by its coffee which most of us judged to be poor.

The meal was not expensive and the food was very good.

Chicken with roasted cherry tomato and basil sauce

- Prep time 5 minutes
- Cooking time 25 minutes
- Serves 4
- Ingredients

500g cherry tomatoes

- 5 cloves garlic, unpeeled
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 x 200g chicken breast fillets
- 1/4 cup coarsely chopped fresh basil

$\frac{1}{4}$ cup (60ml) cream

Method







Every quarter, we report the quality of the Moorabool River at Slate Quarry Road, using a measure of salinity. While this is a good overall indicator, Water Watch volunteers phosphorous and oxygen to gain a turbidity, more complete picture of river health. 



When Ian was born in 1934 his father was the manager of "Larundel" and the family lived in a house on the property they called "Gillanders". Ian started school at Cargarie aged 4¹/₂ years

He told stories of how, in WA, the spinifex wore the wool from the belly of the sheep so they were often "bare bellied". He had three years as a 'rousie' and Yarrawonga for a week of golf. They all looked forward to presser before he became a shearer. He shore from 1950 until 2006. this holiday and to the friendship of the group. "Wyvern" in NSW was the biggest shed in which Ian shore. They shore 54,000 sheep on 18 stands. Ian enjoyed his time in Western Australia as the climate was good, meals were good, it was easy to live on the job and on weekends he could relax, socialise or follow some horses in which he had an interest.

Ian came back to Elaine to live in the family home with his brother Jim, 23 years ago. He continued to shear and do crutching for a few years and after he retired he continued to visit shearing sheds in the district to share a yarn. He loved to tell stories and to relive his life on the boards. He never learned to watch TV but always had the 'trannie' on, he read the newspaper from back to front, he kept up to date with politics and current affairs and he cooked for himself and Jim and loved a good pot of soup. He enjoyed a drink all his life and he always had a 'rollie' hanging out of his mouth, when he was shearing or not shearing, even if it wasn't lit.

Ian would have been 81 years old next month. He worked hard and he played hard but he lived the life he chose. He was a good honest bloke, laid back, always up for a yarn with a sense of humour. He was a real character.

A funeral service was held on Thursday, February 19 and he was buried at Clarendon Cemetery. The introductory music at the service was "I Was Born Under a Wandering Star" sung by Lee Marvin. This song summed up the life of Tiger Connell.

On Saturday, January 17, 2014 a gathering of friends and family was held at Sanctuary Lakes Golf Club to honour and remember former Meredith resident, Keith who died just before Christmas. A friend of Keith and Gail's from Sanctuary Lakes spoke about their friendship, Keith's business partner Mal spoke about studying and working with Keith and the President of the Sanctuary Lakes Golf Club spoke about their golf games and Keith's notorious bad putting.

Keith and Gail bought Concannons farm in Boundary Road in the early 1980's when Keith realized his dream to become a farmer. They built a new house, built a huge "turkey nest" dam to ensure the farm always had water, renovated pastures, built cattle yards and sheds and laid miles of poly pipe. Keith was nicknamed "poly pipe" because he continually arrived home with trailer loads of poly pipe which were laid underground in a system that only Keith knew.

After Keith graduated as a pharmacist in the early 1960's he travelled to England with three friends to work and to travel. He met Gail, a Melbourne girl, and they married a month later. He bought a Lotus Super 7 car which he had to construct without a manual in the garage of a friend. Meredith History Interest Group

Annual Meeting: Sunday, March 1, 1.30pm at the Anglican Church Hall followed by a sojourn to the Meredith Information Centre to view the building and the exhibits. There is an exhibit about Sir Henry Bolte, a display of Jeff Hook's cartoons of Sir Henry and many images of Sir Henry shown on a television screen. Please bring a story about Sir Henry and a small plate of afternoon tea. Also bring ideas for activities, excursions and displays for 2015.

Coolebarghurk Creek quietly meanders through Meredith without being noticed for most of the time. It starts its life just before Meredith and joins the Moorabool River just after Meredith so it is unique to our town. It has a history and a presence. MHIG was asked to document the history of the creek as a prelude to asking the community how this creek can be become a major feature of the town.

"The Meredith State School children have contributed to the various patriotic movements:- cash $\pounds 3/1/4$, 15 pair of socks, 2 pillowslips, 25 pair of bootlaces and a quantity of old linen. Subscriptions are still coming in, and the girls are busy making shorts and more socks.

Seventeen old boys have enlisted for active service. Their names are:- Fred Lowne, Geo. Lowne, T. Boyd, H. Boyd, F. McKay, C Wyatt, R.D. Sellars, Jack Randall, Wm. G. Bell, Andrew Bell, Wm. McPherson, Cliff Phillips, Reg Farrar, Eric Bird, Joe Randall, Jack Cowan and Stan Bowker. The head teacher would be glad to hear of any others whose names are omitted from this list, as it is intended to erect an Honour Board in the school."

"There was a large attendance at the Mechanics Institute on Friday night when a euchre party and dance was held in aid of funds of the State School Honour Board."

Geelong Advertiser 31st July, 1915

The Honour Board names forty men and women who served plus twelve men who 'made the supreme sacrifice."

"A meeting of the electors of South Grant was held in the Shire Hall Meredith yesterday for the purpose of considering the political situation and taking steps to have their views enforced by their representatives in the Legislative Assembly. At the end of the meeting there were "three cheers for Mr Berry and three groans for Sir James McCulloch were given and the meeting terminated".

Geelong Advertiser, Thursday, September 30, 1875

My Story

The Coolabaghurk Creek (translated by Fay McFarlane)

Let me introduce myself, I begin life as a simple drain. My favourite times are following heavy rain, then I can run very fast which is fun, other times I just trickle. My birthplace was near a railway line between the towns of Elaine and Meredith. When I had travelled about two miles, I grew larger, and the Wathaurong tribe that wore tracks along my banks called me Kooly bar ghurk, meaning "man's track by creek". And so I became known as Coolebarghurk Creek. I happily meander many miles south to a place called She Oaks, and here I meet a much larger body of water, Moorabool River, it is much wider than I and it is more than happy for me to join in, and together we flow on to Fyansford to meet another big waterway, Barwon River. We three then become very important to a City called Geelong, and on we traverse to Barwon Heads until we eventually enter the sea.

Melville. ---- Myth or fact? Is the story that Bushranger Melville 'hung out' along my banks a myth or really true. I know the answer, you will need to discover the truth for yourself.

I am visited by many different birds and animals who value my existence. I am a bit salty, so only select fauna enjoy my hospitality, but cattle can quench their thirst. Because I am deep in some sections, humans have erected bridges, so they can travel across me. Firstly they built fords from rocks, then began building these bridges way back in the 1860's. Children used one of them to cross to school. Boys would stand on the bridges and throw stones into me and loved to hear me 'splash'. Sometimes after very heavy rain which gives me strength, I have got a bit excited and have washed these bridges away. That caused expense for the Shire to replace them. 100 years ago Joseph Ward released Carp into me, I was quite happy about that, and carried them on to share with Moorabool River. Men loved to fish for them, this made us feel very important.

Mr William Watson had a hotel on my eastern bank near the Steiglitz Road, way back around 1853. Then I was described as a "clear trickling stream, a nice creek". That made me proud. In 1910 the railways proposed forming a dam to make a reservoir for water for their engines, that would have stopped my flow, so I was very glad that didn't happen.

Many people loved me as I flowed through Meredith, past the school, on down past the police paddocks. Even now, they keep my grassy banks mown where a walking track has been established between Steiglitz road and Ballan road. Because of the many Ibis that frequent my place, the 'Walk of the Ibis' was established 1999, by artist Susan Barlow-Clifton with the help of the school children, and a picturesque rotunda was erected.

Sadly I have been a bit neglected the past few years, and lots of weeds are now choking me, and stopping my flow, and I am no longer the beauty I once was. Please help restore me to my former glory.




