#### **World Day of Prayer**

World Day of Prayer is a worldwide movement of Christian women of all traditions who come together on the first Friday of March each year to observe a common day of prayer. Each year, attention focuses on one country. This year the country was Cuba and the venue was St Joseph's Church.

The Republic of Cuba is a tropical archipelago in the shape of an alligator, made up of 4,195 islands, cays and islets. According to the 2012 census of the 11 million population, 64.1% are white, 9.3% are black and 26.6% are of mixed race. The official and only language is Spanish, and the capital is Havana where 2 million people live.

Cuban women wrote the service, which included hymns, a procession of objects relevant to Cuba carried by people representing a grandmother, mother, young woman and several girls. These people read set passages that told about the lives of Cuban women. In Meredith we were fortunate to have Colin Smithyman from Steiglitz give us his personal insights of the country.

Colin loves to dance, has learnt dancing for many years and first went to Cuba to study Cuban style dance and enjoy the music and lifestyle. He got to know many people there and has now visited Cuba five times. He reports that the country is now slowly moving forward from the time he first visited., but this is not due to America removing the blockade. Many people in Cuba don't have any work and there is no social security. However, education and health care is free and reasonably good. Ration books are available for use at the Government stores and although the quality and quantity of food is not great, no one starves in Cuba.

For visitors, Cuba is very safe, but there is quite a lot of interfamily violence, fuelled by a lack of money, cramped living conditions and family breakdowns. Electricity and water supplies are inconsistent due to lack of maintenance. In heavy rain, buildings can collapse because of lack of maintenance,. The old rundown American taxis belch smoke because owners can't afford repairs.

However, there is lots of music. There are many theatres, and schools of music and dancing. The citizens celebrate religious festivals - often in their backyards - with lots of music. The old buildings and the old plazas have extraordinary character. Even though conditions in Cuba have been difficult, Colin hopes that change comes slowly. He found that the Cubans are not good businessmen or tradesmen because the blockade has prevented market experience, and if the country opens up too quickly it won't help the poorer Cubans.

Access to food is a basic human right – one that unfortunately, many cannot rely on having. In fact, following an analysis of Golden Plains Shire in relation to municipal food security, it was found that just over one in ten people who completed the survey had run out of food in the last 12 months and could not afford to buy more.

So Golden Plains Shire Council's Health and Wellbeing team have been working on improving food access in our communities and two food network groups have been formed to identify and work on local projects. Projects and ideas that have been progressed by the Food Network groups include Community Gardens, Festivals, Greengrocers, Emergency Food Relief and much more. #### **Thank You Paul**


Paul Ryan took over the Elaine shop business on 31 March 2005 because it was about to close and Elaine would have lost its post office, newspaper outlet, milk bar, emergency grocery supply and petrol station.

Paul transferred ownership of the business on 23 March 2016, one week shy of 12 years. Originally, he intended to get the shop up and running as best he could over 2 years and then let someone take over and do more. But time slipped away! He has employed over 32 people in the shop, all locals. Paul spent his days off from his trucking business serving in the shop, mostly working Saturdays and Sundays. Paul tells of the time he worked 12 hours in the shop, drove his truck for 12 hours during the night and opened the shop next morning. He has been known to go to sleep on the chair behind the counter. He has also been accused of sleep walking or of being asleep while he walked! It has been quite a family affair with his father Kevin opening the shop in the mornings and his mother Shirley shutting the shop at night as well as buying needed supplies.

Paul says that he is the 13<sup>th</sup> shopkeeper. Older residents of Elaine tell that Ted East built a garage on the corner using timber from a shed that had housed a battery at a gold mine on the Elaine to Mt Doran Road. He later shifted a hut from near Wells' property and erected it beside the shed. His wife Flo started selling drinks from a table in the corner of the garage. George Grant had a welding business there and Paul tells that they got the shop going. There was a separate Post Office in Elaine but it moved to the shop 39 years ago and apparently the hotel once sold groceries. Eberharts was another store in Elaine and they sold everything!

According to Paul, the shop has always returned a profit, but it has been a tie and has limited the amount of truck work he could do. His ambition now is to build a better truck business. Can he still be Elaine Mayor if he is not in the town centre regularly?

It seems that the nome gardener must be an optimist by nature and, after a number of years in the same district, one falls into the cycle of the seasons, knowing instinctively the tasks that accompany turns in the weather. Now the effects of climate change are making themselves felt with scanty rainfall so far this autumn, the dam is a muddy pool and the very warm days seem to stretch on and on. The old gardening cycles are not as reliable now and we all need to consider how we can best use our available resources.

Once we have a few chilly autumn nights the French beans will be on their way out and it will be time to plant broad beans. This is the one cool weather bean even tolerating frost. Broad beans provide a bountiful, nutritious crop and as a bonus they fix nitrogen in the soil. Cooler days are also the signal to plant green peas. I start the peas off in the shed as mice and birds love the seeds if I plant directly into the earth. A friend taught me a lovely seed raising method for peas and French beans. Collect all the cardboard tubes from toilet rolls, stand them together in a tray, fill with your seed raising mixture, and plant a seed in each. The tubes give the roots a good long space to grow in and when the plants are sturdy enough to withstand the perils of life out in the garden, simply bury the entire tube in your well-prepared composted bed.

The cooler weather means that it is time for the brassicas that will grow through autumn into winter and nourish us until late spring. In my garden I have given up growing caulis and cabbages as the few I have success with come at such a cost of time, water and energy. I would rather go to the local farmer's market and buy glorious organic vegies at a ridiculously low price - considering the labour that has gone into their production, and support the vegie farmer. I bought strong healthy seedlings of two varieties of broccoli at the farmer's market several weeks ago, the large-headed one and the broccolini, delicious and you can eat the entire stem and small tops. Nurtured with kitchen water, mulch and some shade they are now well on their way. I thought I had left it too late to grow them from seed and once again I want to support those who are doing this for a living, not for pleasure and no profit as I do.

Luckily I am always able to wander around the garden and pluck a bunch of silver beet, my favourite vegetable. The various kales – red Russian, Tuscan black and a new deep blue variety – also self seed all around and seem to survive harsh conditions.

Make sure you slip in some flowers for colour and sweetness in the vegetable patch. Pansies, marigolds and the old fashioned pinks and dianthus will bloom with little care and cheer up a tired gardener.

#### Grandma's Tomato Sauce

- Prep time 30 minutes plus overnight
- Cooking time 5 hours Makes about 4 litres

#### Ingredients

4.5 kg tomatoes (ripe ones work very well)

60g garlic, peeled

680g onions, chopped

680g granny smith apples, peeled and chopped

60g salt

2 teaspoons powdered ginger

680g white sugar

1 x 375ml bottle Ezy Sauce (available in supermarkets)

#### Method

- Chop onions and tomatoes. Combine in a bowl, cover with plastic wrap and leave overnight (optional).
- 2. Boil onions, tomatoes, apples, ginger and garlic for 3.5 hours.
- 3. Add ¾ cup Ezy Sauce, sugar and salt.
- 4. Simmer for an extra 1.5 hours, stirring frequently so sugar does not burn.
- 5. Puree to desired consistency then pour into clean, sterilized, hot bottles.

Note: Depending on the moisture content of the tomatoes that you use, you may need to simmer the sauce for a longer period of time. Longer cooking time will result in a thicker tomato sauce.

#### Rail, Paddle and Plate



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#### **Conleys is Back**

Written by the Owners.

Conleys B & B at Elaine re-opened for business on July 5, 2015 after a 98 year break. Around 1867 Conley's Hotel was built and commenced operation at Elaine when Victoria's gold rush era was in full swing. It had 13 rooms and is believed to be one of the earliest buildings erected in Elaine. Mr James Conley was the proprietor. It would have been on the original Cobb and Co route from Geelong to Ballarat and an important rest and accommodation hotel for weary travellers. Many meetings of the Elaine Coursing Club were held at the hotel. This was a very popular sport involving greyhounds chasing hares. Conleys was a thriving hotel in the halcyon days with miners, councillors, graziers and early settlers frequently adjourning there.

Sadly on January 13, 1917 the hotel burnt down. The site of the hotel was approximately 80 metres to the west of today's Conleys B & B. The garden area on this 2 acre block is believed to have been a rest area for horses of hotel patrons. It is thought that there were stables also on the site.

After Conleys burnt down, the then owner, Mr Higgins, applied for a licence to rebuild. However he was unsuccessful with police declaring that one hotel in Elaine was sufficient to service the district. The other hotel was the current Railway Hotel. The building was insured for a sum of £500 and the contents were insured for £130. Mrs Hickey was the licensee at the time.

Some years later the land changed ownership. Over the next 95 years there were only 2 different owners. They were Mr Cooper and Mr Crowe in partnership, followed by the Bowers family. Archie and Lorna Bowers farmed the land for many years running sheep for wool production. They retired from the farm in 2013, when Archie was 91 years old.

The 100-year old house you see today was relocated onto the site in April 2014. It came from 22 Bloomfield Avenue, Ascot Vale, Melbourne. Work began immediately and extensive renovations have been made to transform the building and grounds. The idea was to create an establishment that suited the surrounding country side, to pay tribute to the original Conleys Hotel and to create a place that could be enjoyed by many, just like Conley's Hotel all those years ago.

Unfortunately there is no one alive today who can remember Conley's Hotel, so many of the stories and tales have been lost, but we have managed to gather some information. There is only one known photo of the Hotel exterior and no photos of the interior.

Numerous glass bottles and old artefacts have been found on site after works began in 2014. A gold mine was situated approximately 60 metres east of the house where the lone gumtree stands. It is not known if the mine had a name.

If you stay at Conleys you may dream about a bygone era in front of the wood fire, enjoy a drink on the veranda or a hearty stew at the kitchen table, and maybe share a tale or two just like the old folk of the horse and cart days.

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
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## rainfall

#### The Future of our River

The future of the Moorabool River will be decided over the next few months through the development of Victoria's Water Plan. The Discussion Paper for the Plan was released in mid-March, and follows the Government's order for 50 gigalitres of water from the Wonthaggi desalination plant for next summer.

According to the State Government, this order will increase the amount of water that can be moved through Victoria's water pipeline grid, and improve water security for Melbourne, Geelong and Ballarat. It is the government's response to analyses and advice that examined current water storage levels, the likelihood of low inflows, dry conditions and forecast demand.

Lisa Neville, Victoria's Minister for Water said recently: "We're taking action so that kids don't have to play on rock hard ovals, so gardens and sporting ovals are green and will ensure a secure water supply for schools, hospitals and homes from Melbourne to Ballarat."

Geelong can access increased water from Melbourne's storages, which will be boosted with desalinated water from Wonthaggi. So an option under serious consideration for securing more water for Ballarat is piping some or all of Barwon Water's allocation for Geelong from the Lal Lal reservoir into Central Highlands Water supply network.

Currently, Barwon Water's allocation is released from Lal Lal's Bungal Dam and flows down the Moorabool River, to be extracted at the She Oaks weir, then treated and piped to Geelong, Meredith and areas in the Golden Plains shire.

The possibility of this change has concerned the local river protection group, People for A Living Moorabool (PALM). It coordinator, Cameron Steele said: "The Moorabool is arguably the most flow stressed river in the state with up to 90% of its flow taken in summer. Geelong's share of the

water flows down a nearly 30 km stretch before being extracted at She Oaks. If the river were to lose this vital watering it would be a disaster for the Moorabool."

Mr Steele said that the relatively small environmental flow granted to the river in 2010 has been important for the Moorabool all the way to Batesford.


"Careful coordination between Barwon Water and the Corangamite Catchment Management Authority over the past years has meant environmental releases could be piggybacked on those of the water authority benefiting over 100km of river. Without the Barwon Water allocation for Geelong, the lower reaches would be in an even worse state."

He continued: "While the augmentation to the state's water supply is supposed to take pressure off stressed rivers, PALM thinks that there is a very real risk that the possible changes for Geelong and Ballarat will have the opposite impact on the Moorabool River."

PALM is seeking more information from Victoria's Minister for Water, Lisa Neville about the Government's plans for the river.

The Government's Discussion Paper "Water for Victoria" is available to read and download from the follwing site: haveyoursay.delwp.vic.gov.au/water-for-victoria. Community members can make a submission to the Government on the Discussion Paper, and/or take part in community workshops. The nearest ones to Meredith will be in Ballarat (13 April, 6-8 pm) and Geelong (18 April, 6-8pm). Register on-line at the above web site. Public consultation will take place until 29 April, while the Government expects that the final Water Plan will be released in mid-2016.

We are all familiar with the essential balance between our mind, body and spirit in order for us to feel happy and content. So, how do we manage to keep our spirits in balance?



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
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## Corangamite Community Update

It is terrific that all members of the Meredith community are able to access this exciting space and the many programs the hub has to offer.



Leonard Broom grew up in Lethbridge. His bedroom was a section of the front veranda which a bed would have completely filled. His parents and Auntie and Uncle ran the general store in Russell Street. He can remember when it went up in flames and they built a new shop. After he married, he built a house behind the family home where he still lives.

He went to Lethbridge State School as had his won the Boy's Championship at the interschool athletics competition at Bannockburn when he was in Grade 6 and still has the medal. He travelled by train to St Joseph's College in Geelong where he also excelled at athletics. He still holds the school's Under 14 years, Long Jump record of 16 feet 6 inches. He was always on the athletic team at St Joseph's.

Len joined the Geelong Guild (later to be called Geelong Athletics) after he left school and was a foundation member of Geelong

Cross Country Club - he was second in a cross-country race at Lethbridge and first in a race at Moorabool. Len and Raymond Kelly remember travelling by train to the Stawell Gift to watch runners who were trained by the man who trained the St Joseph's school athletics team.

After Len left school he worked in the family store. When business got slack after supermarkets started, he worked at

Brinton's Carpets, then took a better job at Fords in the clerical department. He took redundancy when he was in his 50's and retired. He and his wife Yvonne have bred dogs. In 1983 they won The Best Gun Dog at the Royal Melbourne Show with a Golden Retriever. In 1984 he featured in an advertisement for Pal dog food with their dogs. He has a collection of items resulting from his metal detecting, he's been selling his stamp collection on ebay and has read 1000's of books.

On his 80<sup>th</sup> birthday, Majella from the corner store in Lethbridge, presented him with a big slice of chocolate cake that she had made specially. He travels to the store each day to pick up the newspaper on his scooter. He also visits his dog friends and gives them treats. 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
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
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
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A small grey head peeked out of a nestbox, disturbed by voices below. It looked down with large dark eyes. The nestbox, built in 2013 by children from Meredith Primary School, had been attached several metres up the trunk of a tree in the Meredith Police Paddocks. Members of the Meredith Police Paddocks Support Group were talking while they enjoyed a picnic lunch in the shade of the swamp gums. Someone noticed the watcher. Out came the binoculars and cameras. The bird, with black stripes over its head, and whiskers around its beak, was identified as an Australian owlet-nightjar. Out of sight, its grey tail and body, which was paler on the front, were covered in faint horizontal black lines. Its pink feet gripped the edge of the entrance as it perched, leaning forward for a better view.

Australian owlet-nightjars are Australia's smallest nocturnal bird. Despite their name, they are not related to owls or nightjars. Although they are common, they are rarely seen. Their eyes do not reflect torchlight, so they are difficult to see at night. They spend most of their days inside a tree hollow, and are most likely to be seen when they become curious about happenings outside, or sunbake at the entrance to their home. They are territorial and find a permanent mate, so at least one owlet-nightjar has settled in the Police Paddocks. At night they come out to hunt. They catch flying insects in the air, or sit on a branch and pounce on insects in the tree or on the ground. They are more often heard than seen, with a fairly sharp and high-pitched territorial call, and a slightly lower, longer call of two or three notes. Owlet-nightjars live in areas with trees containing hollows, across most of Australia. Inside the hollow, in late winter or spring, they make a nest of leaves and lay between two and five eggs, which they incubate for nearly a month. The chicks can fly one month later, but remain with their parents for a few months

Another common nocturnal bird found around Meredith, that is also not an owl, is the Tawny frogmouth. It too is difficult to see during the day, but for a different reason. They are solid looking birds with silvery grey feathers, dark vertical streaks on their front and a darker pattern of brown, grev and black on their back. They have grey feet and a wide strong grey beak, surrounded by whiskers. During the day they perch on a tree branch, often low down. If they feel threatened, they close their large yellow eyes and tilt their head so the point of their beak is uppermost. They remain motionless and with the colouring and patterns of their feathers are perfectly camouflaged as a broken-off dead branch. They choose their roost with care. Not only must they be well-disguised as part of the tree, but they need to consider the weather. In summer, they will choose a place with plenty of shade, and may breathe faster, pant, and increase blood flow to their mouth to keep cool. In winter, they roost in a sunny place on the north side of a tree, huddle next to their mate and sunbake on the ground. When the weather is coldest, and there is less food to be found, tawny frogmouths and owlet-nightjars will enter torpor for a few hours at a time. Their heart rate and metabolism slows, lowering the body temperature by up to ten degrees, and conserving their limited supply of body fat and energy.

Tawny frogmouths are found throughout most of Australia where trees are present, including suburban parks and gardens, but not dense rainforest. At dusk they begin hunting. They eat mainly insects, spiders, snails and slugs, but also other invertebrates and small birds, mammals, reptiles and frogs. They have soft feathers which allow them to pounce silently from their perch. Their feet are weak, so they catch their meal with their beak and carry it to a branch to kill and eat. They catch some insects, such as moths, while in flight, and are occasionally killed by flying in front of car headlights, chasing food. Tawny frogmouths breed from late winter to early summer. Like owlet-nightjars, they mate for life and stay in their territory. They build a fragile nest of sticks in a tree fork and line it with leaf litter and grass stems. The female lays up to three eggs, which the male sits on during the day. They share the job at night. Both find food for the chicks which fledge at about one month old when they are half the size of their parents.




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#### **Lessons to Learn**

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#### Ma Mooney at the Royal Hotel

It seemed to Josie that everyone came into the kitchen and were served with a hot cup of tea and everything happened in the kitchen including sewing, ironing, polishing, cooking and washing up. Often people came into the kitchen for some support, if they were in difficulty or needed to talk to someone. Non-drinkers often came into the kitchen. She remembers that Jack Bowman who was a short man did all the odd jobs, inside and outside at the hotel.

The postie would stay 10 or 15 minutes. He left mail there for many people from outlying areas. They would come in and ask Grandma if there was mail for them. She'd reply, "I think that there are a couple of letters for you. Have a look in the box over there". The newspaper was delivered to the hotel daily after arriving on the early train.

When her mother Kath was about 14 years old, in Grade 8 at St Joseph's Catholic School in Meredith and about to leave school their teacher got sick. Father Bourne asked Kath to take over so she ran the school for 6 months. Kath could turn her hand to anything and never raised her voice, even at home with her nine children.

She remembers sale days at the saleyards opposite the hotel. A three course meal that was served in the dining room. Ma put the plum pudding on the stove at 6 am, set the tables with starched tablecloths, serviettes and silver cutlery and cooked a roast dinner with the help of her daughters and their friends who loved to help and be involved in the fun. Sometimes the youngsters took over the kitchen and gave Grandma a rest.

Her table was as good as at the Windsor. A cruet set, which was like a merry-go-round sat in the middle of the table. It was made of silver which was polished every week at the kitchen table. Josie called it a "la pern" and it held the salt, pepper, mustard and Worcestershire sauce. Josie also remembers the gravy boats with the delicious gravy that Grandma made. Josie tells that the children and boarders ate in the kitchen. The dining room was only used for sale days, weddings and parties. The hotel didn't serve counter meals, every day as hotels do now.

And she remembers Christmas. All the family came for Christmas. There was Irene and Tom Lewis and their daughter Rita, Christopher, Mena and Rix Brady and their daughter Margaret, {when stationed at Broadford with the railways they came at Easter rather than at Christmas} Kath and Les Graham and their children, John, Josie, Carmel, Kathleen, Kevin, Graham, Les, Chris, Peter and Allan and Gert and Dinny Ryan and their daughter Doreen.

The front bedroom which at other times was used as the town morgue was locked. Everyone went to Midnight Mass in their new dress and hat. They'd walk home under the magic of the stars. They were put to bed and told to go to sleep immediately because Santa was on his way.

On Christmas morning the children got up early and Ma sent them to wake Uncle Chris, who slept in the back bedroom which was beside the kitchen. While they woke Uncle Chris, Ma Mooney lit hundreds of small candles on the branches of the Christmas tree so when the children came back and she opened the door, a wondrous sight greeted them of a big, decorated tree with many presents under it, many presents from everyone.

Presents were not wrapped in those days, but her grandmother was very generous. One year Josie and her brother got a new bike each. Another year Aunt Mena made beautiful rag dolls for the girls.

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
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#### Religion for Atheists by Alain de Botton

Alain de Botton is a Swiss born, British based philosopher, writer and television presenter who was brought up as an atheist. He has written various books, started "The School of Life", launched "Living Architecture" and in August 2009 became "writer in residence" at Heathrow airport. The post involved sitting at a desk in Terminal 5 and writing about the comings and goings of passengers over a week.

In this book de Botton describes problems in society, discusses how religions have attempted to solve these problems and then proposes secular alternatives. The book is divided into ten chapters: Wisdom without Doctrine, Community, Kindness, Education, Tenderness, Pessimism, Perspective, Art, Architecture and Institutions. He tells that he was liberated by the thought that there might be a way to engage with religion without having to subscribe to its supernatural aspects. He didn't want to give up the music, buildings, prayers, rituals, feasts, shrines, pilgrimages, communal meals and illustrated manuscripts of the faiths.

The book does not argue whether religion is true or not because de Botton believes that "no religions are true in any God given sense". Instead, he studies what effects religious practices have in people's daily lives, most importantly satisfying the need for community and consolation in the face of life's problems. He calls for secular institutions to adopt religion's pedagogy, to mimic their rituals, habits and teaching techniques that churches, mosques and synagogues perfected over centuries. In the chapter about Architecture he admits that sacred architecture is a reminder of sacramental truths. One of his secular suggestions is a "temple of perspective", whose structure would represent the age of the earth with each centimetre of height equating to a million years, with a tiny gold band a mere millimetre thick standing for mankind's time on earth. He proposes that the tower would have a therapeutic perspective giving capacity that would stir awe. "Being put in our place by something larger, older, greater than ourselves is not a humiliation; it should be accepted as a relief from our insanely hopeful ambitious lives."

Alain de Botton finishes the book with the statement that "Religions are intermittently too useful, effective and intelligent to be abandoned to the religious alone."

This book is stimulating but in my opinion, nowhere does he suggest secular alternatives that could replace what thousands of years of advice assembled by the world's great religions have created.

The book for discussion in April is "Far from the Madding Crowd" by Thomas Hardy



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#### **Morrison Tableland Honor Roll**

You are invited to the Morrison Fire Shed on Sunday, April 24 at 1.30 pm for the official unveiling of the re-created Morrison Tableland No 2086 WW1 Honor Roll. It was displayed in the State School until the school closed in December 1951, in the hall until the hall was demolished in the late 1960's and at the Recreation Reserve. After the tennis players hung up their racquets, it was lost. Luckily Ballan Shire Historical Society had taken photos of the very ornate Honor Roll which contained the names and photos of over 40 soldiers who went to WW1 from the Morrisons district. It has been lovingly re-created by members of families represented on the Roll. It is beautiful and there are lots of stories about the school, the soldiers, the families and the re-creation process.

MHIG received a "Restoring Community War Memorials" grant from the Victorian State Government for this project of the Morrisons Community.

#### **Annual Meeting**

The annual Meeting was held on Sunday, March 6 at the Golf Club. After reports and election of office bearers - Marg Cooper as President, Peter Griffiths as Vice President, Jan Crump as secretary and Fay McFarlane as Treasurer - several speakers talked about the "parcel of land" that was gazetted as a site for racing and general recreation on February 26, 1866. The gazette in which this announcement appeared was dated March 6, 1866 exactly 150 years, to the day that we met on the land to discuss that particular land.

Peter Macdonald has been a Trustee for almost 50 years and told us about the role of the trustees, what the minute books tell and many interesting facts including a description of the old golf clubhouse and how golf club members managed to fund the new clubhouse fairly economically.

Jan Crump, as the judge's clerk told about the murder of William Purcell by Thomas Dawson. The hut where the Dawson's lived, on the north/west corner of the Racecourse Reserve was constructed of bark, held together by saplings fastened with string, hoop iron etc.. On each side of the hut rank grass grew to a height of 2 feet whilst the moss growing on the roof gave the place a romantic and antiquated appearance. We do not know what sentence Thomas Dawson received!! Did he hang?

Jan McDonald, as an early racegoer complete with fascinator, summer frock, high heels and Meredith Race Club Official Programme, told about the races she attended from March 1861. She came from Melbourne by train and she arranged a carriage to take her the <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile to the Meredith Racecourse from the station. She wasn't sure when the last race meeting was held because she had died by then and it was all a bit vague!

John Cameron with the help of his brother Neil told about the beginnings of the golf club. John had drawn a map of the first 9 hole course that Martin Smith of Bell Park Golf Club designed. The professional recommended tussocks be planted on the course because bunkers would not work at Meredith. The tussocks were dug from "Glenspean" by their father and other early golf club members and replanted on the course.

Unfortunately Miss Meredith couldn't come but I reported that Dorothy Mitchell is still pretty and sweet over 60 years after she

won the title, twice. Joan Shell did come and she is pictured in the 1954 Weekly Times photo with the other contestants for Miss Meredith.

## THE ACCIDENT AT THE MEREDITH RACES: CORONER'S INQUEST.

An inquest was held yesterday at the Hospital on the body of John Carroll, deceased, who came by his death under the circumstances detailed.

Richard Knott, constable at Stieglitz, sworn—-I saw the deceased, John Carroll, on the 15th instant, at Meredith race-course in charge of a race horse which he had mounted to ride a race. Saw him start and heard afterwards one of the jockeys say as they came round that he had fallen off. Found him on his back stunned. With the assistance of others helped him up, and then gave him brandy and water, and poured vinegar and water on his head, and then went for the doctor who was not at home. Deceased was then taken in a cart to the hotel, and left in charge of Mr Sharman, and immediately he was under the treatment of Mr Pardey. When deceased mounted the horse he appeared to be under the influence of liquor. I saw that the horse bolted from the course, and that in endeavouring to avoid a tree, the saddle turned round and the deceased fell to the ground.

William Pardey deposed—Saw the deceased start from the weighing stand and go round to the starting post. He was not sober. After the accident the inspector asked witness to go to the hotel and see him, and witness returned stating that he was only a chemist; but, finding that there was no medical man available, witness went to the hotel and found deceased recovering his senses....witness advised his immediate removal to the hospital. He seemed to sit his horse well when he started. Dr Reid stated that John Carroll, the deceased, was admitted into the hospital on the 15th March. It was evident then that his spine was fractured high up, and that it was a fatal case. He died the next day....Deceased had been a wardsman in the hospital until lately, and had to be discharged for irregular habits.

The verdict returned was, that John Carroll whilst riding on the Meredith Racecourse fell from his horse, in consequence of his saddle not being properly girthed, he being under the influence of drink, by which fall he fractured his spine, of which fracture he died.

To this conclusion the jury added a rider—that in their opinion, blame was attached to the stewards of the said racecourse, for permitting a man in the state that deceased was represented to have been, to ride a racehorse on that occasion.

Twenty six bridesmaids dressed in shimmering orange and twenty six groomsmen dressed in black slacks and white shirts with orange ties and buttonholes attended Imelda and Shane for their wedding in the Philippines. They were married in Australia in June 2009 and at the Cathedral in the Philippines in November 2009 by the Bishop and 3 Monsignors. Two hundred and fifty guests celebrated with them.

Imelda came to Australia in 1989 as a migrant. Immigration required her to answer questions and be interviewed in Manilla. Although her qualifications as a midwife were not recognized and she found it difficult to understand the interviewer, she passed. Her first job was at the Regent Hotel in Melbourne, moving to the Gold Coast in 1991 and then to Perth in 2008. She got a job at a remote mining site, but didn't like the small aeroplanes and gravel landing strips. So she worked at nursing homes in Perth often doing the "graveyard shift".

Imelda was looking for a man who didn't have children and hadn't been married, and found him on an internet dating site. Imelda was cautious, but because Shane was so persistent she flew to Newman to meet him. Her fears of meeting a crocodile were unfounded! She quickly became known to his workmates as she ironed his clothes meticulously and sent delicious food back with him.

Shane grew up in rural Western Australia, left home when he was 15 years old with \$5, a pound of apples and a push bike. He soon got a job, but lived in the bush with a blanket until he could rent some accommodation. He says that he was a workaholic and always had itchy feet, so didn't settle until he met Imelda. He worked in the mines for over 22 years, gold, copper, iron ore and nickel. He worked hard and paid his first house off in 5 years. In his later years at the mines he completed a Mechanical Fitters apprenticeship and then an Electrical apprenticeship.

Imelda and Shane bought a house in Nuttall Street last Christmas, and are busier than they have ever been. Because Imelda had relatives in Victoria who were ill and needed help they decided to relocate from Perth to Victoria, although Shane didn't really want to come.
