On the 30th of August, I observed a vehicle travelling at a very fast rate of speed on Wilson St in Meredith. After leaving the station I detected the provisional driver travelling 89KM/H in a 60KM/H zone. She was subsequently issued a penalty notice including a \$543 fine and 3-month suspension of her driver's licence.

On the 1st of September, I detected a vehicle travelling 142KM/H in the 100KM/H zone on the Midland Hwy near Meredith. The driver was fined \$840 with a 6-month licence suspension.

On the 2nd of September at around 9:00PM, police were called to a vehicle doing burnouts on Clarkes Road in Anakie. The driver is alleged to have attempted to evade police, and during my intercept attempt the driver crashed into a tree, with all 4 occupants being taken to hospital, including 1 with serious injuries.

Throughout the month I have attended numerous other collisions and incidents.

In September, members of The Police Association of Victoria have commenced Protected Industrial Action regarding the negotiation of our Enterprise Bargaining Agreement (pay/ benefits etc) which expired in October 2023. I want to reassure the Meredith community that this will not adversely affect any emergency response in our area.

<u>In an emergency</u> (that includes anything where you need police to attend a location for an incident occurring at that time) **call 000**. That includes traffic hazards, erratic vehicles, thefts in progress, suspicious people loitering etc.


For general enquiries call 5286 1222 to speak to me at the Meredith Police Station. This will also call my mobile if I am on duty.

<u>Please don't call this number if you need an immediate</u> police response. Call 000.

If I am not on duty or unable to answer, it will transfer to Bacchus Marsh, please leave a message there and they will pass it on to me. I am still getting people not wanting to speak to Bacchus Marsh. The reality is that they are the 24hr police station for our area and the SGT who has the authority to call me out after hours is there 24/7.

People are still hanging up when being transferred because they don't want Bacchus Marsh to attend. The call diversion is not by accident, you should follow this process. There are always police units around the area who could attend to assist if I am not around.

While I understand the messaging on this is getting repetitive, it is also an ongoing issue.

Mrs Garden

The bulbs the Prep children planted back in April are putting on a stunning display, as you can see in the cover photo with Alberto, Ada and Harriet. The different daffodils are just finishing while the ranunculi are blooming in purples, reds, whites and mauves. The small pansies we popped in the bare spots are adding dashes of yellow and purple and the perennial daisies and lavender are starting to flower. The latter, along with the tiny white flowers of the Erigeron will provide colour and form as the bulbs die down. We will trim the flower stalks from the bulbs but retain the leaves even as they wither and yellow then turn brown. While the leaves are green they are photosynthesising, taking in sunlight and storing energy in the underground bulbs to grow next year's flowers. Once the leaves turn brown it is a signal this

process is finished and it's safe to remove them. We are leaving the bulbs in the garden beds to flower again next spring. However, if your bulbs have been in the ground for a couple of years you can dig them up, and you will notice they have magically multiplied, so you can divide them and plant them in other parts of your garden or share them around.

As our 150th school celebrations come closer we want our beds to be looking their best for our school families and the many visitors we are expecting. Some annuals will go in shortly to take the place of the bulbs which will be well and truly finished by then. Perhaps some marigolds and petunias to provide a spectacular colour display to accompany the sweet peas that are slowly making their way up the frames. We are looking forward to welcoming past pupils and the local community to celebrate with us, and have a look around the school grounds and buildings. This is a wonderful opportunity to see all the changes that are happening inside and out, while viewing a series of slide shows displaying photos and videos of people, and times from past days prepared by the Meredith History Interest Group. So please set aside the afternoon and evening of Friday 13th December to join us for some fun and reflection.

The lettuces that were planted amongst the garlic are ready to be harvested either as a whole or by just trimming a few leaves here and there. Succession planting of leafy greens like lettuce and spinach is a perfect way to provide for your salads and avoid the forgotten plastic bags of sludge that are often discovered at the bottom of the fridge when you have bought from the supermarket. There is nothing like dashing out to the garden to pick only what you need.

One of our wicking beds is on the move! As ours don't have a fixed base, this will be a tricky exercise and it will probably have to be redone. It will be an excellent opportunity after over a decade of use to renew the soil, and check the fittings and see it into its next stage of life with new plantings.

As the hours of sunlight each day increase and the weather warms, it is an ideal time to get some seeds started. Beans, beetroot, capsicum, cucumber, peas, potatoes, pumpkins, corn and zucchini can go in. If you are waiting for your winter crops to finish, or are unsure of your soil temperature you can always pop them into a pot and transfer them later.

Tomatoes need warm soil temperatures, so keep those seedlings in their pots for now ready to plant out in November. Some gardeners do this to lightly stress the plants which causes them to flower earlier than usual in an attempt to get fruit sooner. You might even like to put in a few sunflower seeds as these will reward you with a wonderfully cheerful and showy display. You can even plant them amongst the pumpkins to help with pollination and provide a frame for climbing beans.

Enjoy these productive and fruitful months in your garden or maybe take a walk next time you are in your town and delight in what others are doing in their patches.







The Caribbean

The history, and for what it matters the Postal History, of the Caribbean is quite fascinating. Columbus discovered many of the islands in the 1490's and was followed by many explorers who found other islands and places. Interestingly some of the islands were uninhabited and were settled by the nations of their discoverers. Many empires including British, French, Spanish, Dutch and even the USA have ruled various parts since then.

The island of Redonda is one of 3 islands that make the country Antigua & Barbuda. Antigua stamps were overprinted with Redonda and sometimes used in Antigua. But strangely not in Redonda. Well perhaps not so strange given that Redonda is basically just a big rock in the ocean and no-one lives there.

The Danish West Indies was a group of 53 islands occupied by Denmark and declared a colony in 1674. Stamps were issued from 1855. But in 1917 Denmark must have become short of a quid and sold the lot to the USA who renamed them the US Virgin Islands. Wonder what the residents thought because the transfer date was 1 April 1917. Virgin Island stamps in US currency have been used since.

There is a long history of squabbles between the various empires over various islands and often settled with treaties and agreements. In 1762 the British captured Havana and therefore controlled Cuba. But then in 1763 gave the island back to Spain in a direct swap for Florida. Spain kept control of Cuba until 1901 when USA forced Spain to recognise an independent republic. Britain got the short straw since it lost Florida in the American War of Independence only 20 years later in 1783.

But spare a thought for the people of St Lucia. Between 1605 and 1803 the island changed hands between France and Britain 16 times. Arthur and Martha must have been very dizzy. Just as well all this was before the use of postage stamps because trying to keep up with which stamps to use would have been a nightmare.

September BacchChat

The theme for the September BacchChat was Local Heroes in Flight.

BacchChat is an initiative of the Bacchus Marsh library under the umbrella of the Moorabool Shire, to present interesting stories through presentations at the library.

On Saturday, September 7, starting at 10 am, Leigh Durham and his friend Peter Lawford talked about Leigh's father Max Durham, and then John Molesworth and his daughter Emma talked about John's father Bob Molesworth.

Both men were pilots in WW11.

Max enlisted aged 18 years, had 480 hours of training which cost 30,000 pounds per pilot. He was in the No 115 Squadron in the RAF as a pilot officer, flew 30 missions in Lancasters over Europe with loads of 64,000 lbs of fuel and bombs. In November 1945 Max was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross . The largest raid he took part in, consisted of 1200 Lancasters. In an interview recorded before he died, he said that in that raid the planes were like a swarm of bees. He came home after the war and was very unsettled. Imagine a 21-year-old who had trained as a pilot, gone overseas, been in control of an aircraft and a crew flying missions, bombing railways and oil tanks etc coming home to the hum drum life of orcharding in Bacchus Marsh.

Bob Molesworth used his brother's birth certificate so he could enlist in the Air Force. The cut off age for pilot's enlistment was 28 and Bob was already 30 years old in 1940. He was also married. He told his friends who were joining the Army that he had done enough walking as a jackeroo in Western Australia during the Depression, so wanted to fly. He became leader of No 114 Squadron six weeks after he arrived in England, served 3¹/₂ years, flew 74 operations and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross by King George V1. In 1944 he applied for discharge because his wife was running the farm and by then they had three children. [He had had a couple of visits home during his time of service.] He met several important world leaders including Winston Churchill, who asked him if he wore woollen underwear, when he heard he came from Australia. Bob only flew in an aeroplane once, during the rest of his life.

A large crowd attended and were served morning tea between the presentations that finished about noon.





Meredith Farm Produce Shop

Sandy and I are often asked if we have a shop at the farm, a place for people to visit and buy Meredith Cheese. We have avoided going into retail, as it would take capital, time and energy away from the other areas of the business and compete with the fantastic retailers who have supported Meredith Dairy for the last 33 years. When asked, I have always said, "we can't do it all, something would have to give!", but a truly sustainable mature enterprise should run independent of its founders. Meredith Dairy's marketing strategy is to constantly tell our story and promote our vision. (I'm reminded of a TED talk by Simon Sinek, "people buy why you do it, not what you do"). Our latest initiative, to process goat meat, needs a supply chain direct to consumers, so when number 30 Staughton Street came on the market, complete with a commercial kitchen, a backyard and street frontage, it was too good to pass up. In a couple of weeks, the Meredith Farm Produce shop will be open for business.

On offer will be great coffee, Meredith Dairy products, honey from the farm, goat meat, lamb, baked goods, plants and flowers. Eventually we aim to sell take-home meals made using our farm's produce. There is also an area to exhibit fine art made by talented artists which will reflect the local landscape and history.

Behind the counter you will meet Anthony Hamilton -Smith, son of Graham who is well known in Meredith, after establishing the wool store now called "Meredith Rural and Pet Supplies". In 2018, Graham renovated 30 Staughton Street as a project after losing his wife to cancer. He called this venue "Dorothy's Kitchen". Anthony has worked in some serious restaurants and will be making coffee, serving, doing the social media



and basically being a jack of all trades. We feel lucky to have a local experienced and talented person to guide us through the perils of hospitality and retail.

Our aim is for the "Meredith Farm Produce" to be a meeting place, a function venue as well as a cafe and retail outlet. Workshops, cooking classes and exhibitions are planned to promote the benefits of produce direct from the farm and our fantastic region. The main purpose however will be to promote the Meredith Dairy story, our vision and legacy -there will always be the thread of "from the farm" as a theme. When our doors open, (Thursday to Sunday, 9am to 3pm) a new adventure begins as we show case the local bounty from our patch of earth here at Meredith.

PRACTICAL ADVICE FOR MANAGING YOUR MONEY

Your Motor Vehicle and Tax!

As I look at the sparrows carrying leaf litter and feathers to make a nest for spring I wonder, could you be sitting on a nest egg of your own....

If you use your own Motor Vehicle (MV) to travel for work as an employee, that is travel during your working day, then you can claim this travel as a tax deduction.

It could be that you are carrying bulky tools to job sites, or it could be that you start your day working in one location and then have to travel to another.

If your employer would be willing to write a letter confirming that you need to use your MV for work purposes, then you may be able to claim the kms travelled in your tax return.

The first thing you need to do is work out the kms you travelled for the year. For some this is an easy calculation but for others this can be a bit tricky. Therefore, you may wish to try recording a Logbook.

With a Logbook, we can get the total work kms travelled for the year, and if the kms are over the set rate of 5,000kms we can use the logbook method as a second option, based on which one gives you the higher deduction in your tax return.

The Logbook calculates the percentage you use your MV for private v employment. The employment percentage is then used to apportion the expenses of the running costs of your MV. This would include insurance, registration, repair and maintenance and an average of the fuel costs.

A lot of my clients are surprised at how easy this is to do. You simply need the following:

The odometer reading of your car as at 1.7 of the year and then the closing odometer reading as at the 30.6 of the following year.

A period of 3 months, when you will note the kms you travel for work purposes only. This can be done in a note book, or a template from google.

The expenses you incurred throughout the year for the running of the car. Don't provide or keep the fuel receipts (your accountant can calculate this for you).

Once you have done the Logbook this is your evidence and is used till such time as you change your work travel. At that point it may be better to do another 3 month recording.

I have seen major differences in deductions using the set rate method compared to the Logbook method.

Most people go with the set rate because it seems easier. If one stays under 5,000kms and multiplies this by the commissioner rate of .85c (2024FY) then that is the claim most people use, but even if you are under 5,000kms you can work out which claim is better. I have seen this first hand with repairs of older vehicles and now the cost of fuel being so high. The advantage of a Logbook is choice and knowing that if you go over 5,000kms you are not stuck, missing out on potential money in your tax refund. I say, short term pain for long term gain and ask you once again....

Could you be sitting on a nest egg?

Household savings hack of the month:

Do you have a mortgage with a repayment set to monthly? Did you know that interest on your home loan is calculated daily and charged monthly. So, if you can change the repayments to weekly or even fortnightly you will be reducing the overall length of the home loan with zero effort. Then if you can round up the repayments for example \$592 to \$600, you will actually shave off around 3-4 years on average, on the overall loan.

Meredith Community Plan Follow-Up Launch

On 15 August 2024, the Meredith Community Plan Launch was held at the Community Centre with approximately 20 people in attendance, including the Mayor of the Golden Plains Shire, Cr Brett Cunningham.

In 2023 Susan Vandenham, Community Partnerships Officer with the Shire, attended a meeting in Meredith

where she discussed the formation of Community Co-Ordinators for Meredith and the benefits that could be

achieved by working with already established groups and clubs within the town.

Four community members, Bridget Dyer, Maddy McColl, Lucy Banks and Cheryl Gilbert agreed to become Co-Ordinators. 

Competition Winner:

In the 1890's a skeleton rail link existed, but the west to east line, across Australia was missing a section between Kalgoorlie and Port Augusta spanning almost 2000 kilometers.

In one of Australia's most remarkable surveying and engineering feats two construction teams worked for more than five years to fill the gap. They met on October 17, 1917 finishing the longest straight stretch of railway ever built in Australia. I walked briskly along the sandy track towards the bend where the dunes met the claypan. The scattered gum trees each grew several slender trunks forming typical mallee

eucalypts. On the sand dunes, small plants and shrubs with tough leaves showed their springtime colourful flowers. Tracks left by kangaroos, emus, goannas and smaller lizards, and birds of various sizes passed between them. It was late in the afternoon, and I was looking for one of those birds, the malleefowl, a bird that lived once in the Brisbane Ranges near Meredith, but is now locally extinct there. It is still found in the mallee country of north-



west Victoria, where I Photo by Colin Cook

was visiting a private conservation property, north of Nhill. My family had camped there often, and I knew that if I walked quietly along this track at this time on a spring day, I would see malleefowl.

I slowed my pace as I approached the bend. Ahead of me, near the dunes was the place to find the birds. Cautiously, I continued around the next two curves in the track. As I passed one of the rounded bushes of wallowa, a common wattle, a bird came into view. Its grey body was about the size of a goose with shorter legs and neck. Its wing feathers were patterned with rich brown patches surrounded by lines of black and white. The details on its tail feathers were finer, while a wide black stripe ran down the pale front of its neck. A line of white from its stubby grey beak passed below its round brown eye and above the orange-brown feathers of its chin and throat. This was the bird I was expecting, a malleefowl also known by the indigenous name of lowan. I paused and watched as it ate seeds from the ground, then continued my approach very carefully. I transferred my weight to my front foot, then raised my back foot and stepped forwards so slowly that the movement was barely noticeable. In this manner, I advanced to within a few metres. The bird remained unconcerned and as I turned my head slightly, I saw a second malleefowl a little further away. Still and silent, I watched them for several minutes as they continued to feed and gradually made their way towards the edge of the dune. Here they moved between the bushes, the patterns on their feathers providing camouflage amongst the leaves. I made no attempt to follow them.

The birds I had seen were a pair and like many other birds in springtime, they were caring for their eggs. Rather than sitting on their eggs and using their body's warmth to incubate them, malleefowl use the heat of composting vegetation and the sun. A malleefowl nest appears to be a hill of sand over one metre tall. During winter, the male digs out the centre of an old nesting mound or begins a new nest. He makes a hole three metres wide and nearly one metre deep. Working his way backwards towards the hole, he scratches leaf litter from the surrounding area into it. After rain, he turns it over and begins the composting process. This forms the centre of the mound of sand. The

male digs a chamber into it, where the female lays a large egg once or twice a week until the mound contains between ten and twenty-five eggs. The male checks the temperature of the mound by testing it with his beak. If it is too hot, he reduces the pile of sand above the eggs and replaces it before the cool of the evening. Malleefowl concentrate their attention on the care of their eggs, but have no interest in the chicks. After two or three months, the young birds hatch and dig upwards until they reach the

surface of the mound. Here they rest for up to twenty minutes before finding a hiding place in a nearby bush. They have all their feathers and are fully independent. Within two hours they can run fast, and a day later they can fly.

Watching malleefowl or seeing a nesting mound is an uncommon occurrence, and I was very fortunate to be able to do both for many years. Malleefowl are a threatened species in Victoria. Much of their habitat has been destroyed for agricultural use or by rabbits or fire, and they are hunted by foxes. European settlers and goldminers dug eggs out of mounds and ate the adults, so that now the birds are only found in areas of natural vegetation in less populated places, such as the Mallee. Malleefowl are not the only creatures known to be lost from our local area. Once, there were bandicoots, bettongs, native rats and brush-tailed rock wallabies. Quolls were the predators, to which the local wildlife were accustomed. Other species, such as koalas, native water rats now known as rakali, and barking owls are still here, but have become much less common. Some of these animals can be visited in sanctuaries, such as Mt Rothwell north of the You Yangs, but I can't help thinking how wonderful it would be to walk along one of our local bush tracks and come across a malleefowl as I round a bend.





The Physician by Noah Gordon

This is an epic book. It is a book that would have required incredible research. It is a story set in the eleventh century in many countries. The story is a good one.

The Physician is 700 + pages of historical fiction. The story begins in London when a young Christian lad is left orphaned after both parents die. His siblings are passed along by his father's guild to various other families but Rob J Cole, who is not yet 10 years old becomes an apprentice to a barber-surgeon who roams around England performing magic tricks, giving medical advice and selling questionable health remedies.

During the years he spends with the barber surgeon Rob is inducted into the rudiments of medieval medicine but develops a wish to know more. He hears that the best training is at a University in Persia, so he carries out a bold scheme to travel across Europe and study there.

Rob travels as a Christian from London to Constantinople. Here he becomes Jewish in appearance and actions because he knows that a Christian would not be allowed to study at the university. He travels westward with a group of Jewish merchants learning their ways as best he can. He also learns the language he will need to speak in Persia, on the long trip.

He is passed as a physician and helps instruct new physicians in the school in Isfahan [in modern day Iran]. He and his Scottish/Christian wife intend to return to Britain and when Isfahan is conquered by a rival king they take the opportunity to flee.

This book is part of a trilogy. The author Noah Gordon has written *Sharman* and *Matters of the Heart* which apparently follow certain Cole family descendants and include themes of medicine and the Jewish faith.

The tale of the twenty two month journey to Persia, his studies, his interaction with the Shah and political leaders of the time and his return home is full of adventure and interesting characters.

Reviewers compare the book with *Pillars of the Earth* by Ken Follett. I would compare it with books by James Mitchener.

Vivid in historical detail, it is an inspiring tale of a quest for medical knowledge pursued in a violent world full of superstition and prejudice.

[In those times students dissected pigs to learn about the body and its diseases as pigs were believed to be the animal closest in composition to the human body. In this book several people die of appendicitis. A pig doesn't have an appendix!]
