

#### **OPTIMISM**

I have heard it said that philatelists are a strange bunch obsessed with the past and little pieces of paper. But I beg to differ. Whilst it is certainly true that we search for and then categorise and store postage stamps, and perhaps the older the better, I cannot accept the moniker "strange". I believe stamp collectors are optimists.

We are quite prepared to go to a stamp fair or club meeting or even go on-line and buy in bulk either a stamp album or box of stamps. And then go home and in high expectation use the magnifying glass and desk lamp to trawl through the purchase looking for the one or more stamps that fill gaps in the collection. And then remain fully expectant of on-selling the remainder to another collector and recoup all or some of the initial expense.

Stamp collectors are forever hopeful of having that Eureka moment of finding a stamp that has a recognisable and known printing flaw that makes it quite valuable. Like for example the 1913 Australian King George V one penny green stamp issued in billions, but is known to have at least 6 flaws. I have seen collectors buy them in thousands hoping to find one with a flaw.

Similarly the 1881 UK one penny lilac Queen Victoria also issued in the billions. The normal one has 16 dots in the border at each corner and is almost worthless. But some were printed with 14 dots in the corners and can be worth up to \$200 depending on condition. Again collectors will buy them in bulk hoping to find a 14 dotter.

Many collectors will keep in their albums a rare but damaged stamp, that in good condition would be quite valuable in the eternal hope of one day coming across an undamaged one to replace it.

And of course always hopeful of a bargain buy though sometimes not always straight forward. Recently I was at a stamp fair looking at an album that had a \$40 price tag. I asked the dealer what was his best price. He paused and then said "Ah my best price? Well that would be \$65". He paused again and then said "But my lowest price is \$35". We both laughed and the deal was done.

# Vale to Leslie Francis Smith 19/1/1937 – 11/2/2025

Leslie Francis Smith "Les" was born to parents William and Annie Smith.

He was one of 6 children.

Early life for Les was in Geelong, before the family moved to 88 Cottrell St Werribee, where his dad's brother John had a building business. Les's dad William built the family home in Werribee.

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


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# Bullecourt, tanks but no tanks.

In the pitch black with a cold and miserable sleet and snow falling, the overall tank commander met others to discuss tactics at Australia's 4<sup>th</sup> Division HQ, less than 12 hours before the battle of Bullecourt.

Tanks were to be involved and this had never happened before. These new tanks were a little touch and go at the best of times.

They were 28 tons of steel and their 6-cylinder petrol engines, which were right in the cabin with the 8 man tank crew (2 were drivers, with 2 others who controlled the gear changes for each track), generated 105 horsepower, meaning there were fewer than 4 horsepower to pull each ton.

Going downhill, or on the flat or even ground they could usually manage about 2 mph without breaking down. On difficult terrain and heading up a slope, particularly a muddy one which clogged up their tracks and made the tank heavier. It was a fairly frequent occurrence that the tanks gave up the ghost and the engines either blew up or were just not strong enough to keep the tank moving. Of the 49 tanks assigned only 18 even made it to the starting line and only a handful make it to the battle. They were late. They were so slow - less than walking pace. The whole idea of attacking the enemy line is to charge!

The men in the tanks would be in a cold sweat if they could get cool enough; the steamy stink of petrol surrounds them, their nerves increasing as their speed slows.

The tanks sounded and looked terrifying, growling their way forward, regularly coughing up front and belching out back with black bursts of smoke and sparks coming out from the exhaust pipes, and their tracks making an extraordinary flap-flap like the padding webbed feet of a gigantic metallic duck.


Soldiers tried to guide the tanks but it was like trying to herd massive drunken cats each with a mind of its own. They wandered aimlessly about in every direction thereby drawing enemy fire on the troops and on their trenches.

The bungling that has resulted in this grotesque fiasco was evident to everyone and confidence in the higher leadership was badly shaken.

The official history of Bullecourt says that the battle will ever remain an imperishable monument to heroism, the fortitude and the unflinching hardihood of the Australian race.

Bullecourt was not captured on April 9, 1917, not even a single yard of enemy trench was secured for the Allies.

(This information was gleaned from the book The Legend of Albert Jacka by Peter Fitzsimons. Albert Jacka was a timber worked from regional Victoria who became the first winner of the Victoria Cross from Australia in WWI. Charles Bean said that everyone who knew the facts, knew that Jack earned the VC three times. He was an extraordinary soldier and the book tells his story superbly.)



# Rabbit Baiting in Police Paddocks Continues

Rabbit baits continue to be laid in the Meredith Police Paddocks. This is an ongoing program conducted by site managers, Western Region Ecological Network (WREN), in an attempt to reduce the large number of rabbits on the site and arrest the damage being done to both soil and vegetation.

The bait is an oats based Pindone and presented in plastic containers that the rabbits have to enter. This reduces the likelihood of harm to marsupials.

Signs have been placed at Reserve entrances to alert visitors and, notwithstanding the low risk and the precautions being taken, pet owners are advised to ensure their animals cannot access the baits. Any queries should be directed to 0449 706 501.

but first, meet John...



PRODUCTION VOLUNTEERS



Using dedicated publishing software, a new issue is created by stripping out unwanted content from the previous issue, then adding new contributions (mostly received by email) and assembling them into a standardised layout grid.

The production volunteer and the editor confer on issues to be resolved such as choice of photos, inclusion or size of articles, etc.



Our proofreader scrutinises all content, correcting any spelling, grammatical or layout errors.

VOLUNTEER EDITOR Content is further scrutinised to ensure compliance with Publication Guidelines and readability. Content is consolidated to minimise white space and suitable fillers found to fill remaining spaces. A cover photo and the rainfall chart are added at this stage. The document is converted to PDF format and sent back to the Proofreader for a final look. That's the end of the Production phase and it is finally ready to be turned in to a printed magazine. At this point, the editor uploads it to the cloud, sending a link to the printer.

ONLINE VOLUNTEER Our Online Manager loads extracts, alerts, links and a complete digital copy to our Facebook page and Website. She also passes copies on to the Public Record Office and others.

PRINTER

Our distribution volunteer collects the printed newsletter from the printer, packed in boxes of 100, counts them out and delivers them to 13 pickup and delivery points in Elaine, Meredith, Lethbridge and Bannockburn. They also monitor any significant shortfalls or leftovers and periodically report to the editor/Committee chair.



Collects copies and mails them out to our subscribers, near and far.



VOLUNTEER TREASURER

The Treasurer's duties, include sending out invoices to all advertisers and following up any arrears. The Treasurer also undertakes bank reconciliations, manages bank accounts and payments, produces performance and sustainability reports for the Committee and provides required information to the Community House accountant/auditor for BAS returns and audit.

#### Rabbit baiting campaign

This year's campaign held over late February to early March saw an increase in the members of the community participating.

The enduring dry conditions and limited feed meant that, for at least some participants, the elimination of most rabbits was possible. Unfortunately, it is not possible to relax for another 12 months as now the real work must start with the destruction of rabbit burrows, failing to do so, any gains made can be lost.

#### Former Meredith Municipal Tip Site

On 2 March 2025 a number of group members and other volunteers converged on the former tip site as part of Clean Up Australia Day.

The site is located in attractive bushland to the North of the Meredith Steiglitz Rd and had becoming a dumping ground for various items of household and other rubbish. The tip was successfully capped many years ago and it is a matter of public shame that the site should subsequently become so degraded.

With the support of the Golden Plains Shire Council which provided a rubbish skip and other assistance, it was possible to make a substantial difference to the site, which included filling the skip and stockpiling other rubbish for collection. 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# MONEY Matters

PRACTICAL ADVICE FOR MANAGING YOUR MONEY

Easter is almost here and along with eating those delicious chocolate easter eggs there is always a flurry of activity around the Good Friday appeal or an outdoor event supported by the Good Friday Appeal. This is a reminder to keep your receipts if you make the donation via telephone or website as the charity is listed as a Deductible Gift Recipients (DGR). If you place money into the buckets or tins, then you are unlikely to get a receipt, and it will be harder for you to claim the deduction. The maximum that is then claimable is \$10 and you must have donated \$2 or more.

Anzac Day is also at the end of April and if you buy one of those label pins, wristbands or stickers then you can claim this as well. The ATO calls this token items which are of no material value and used to promote the DGR.

The above charities are well known and come to mind specifically for April but there are many many more. Charities are not obliged to provide receipts, so if you don't get a copy, this is one of those rare time you can use Bank Statements as evidence as well.

April is also the time for Easter Holidays.... travelling away with family or friends. But for those of you staying home to work a second job, please check the box you tick for the second job when you fill in the Tax Declaration Form.

I have met so many people who are unhappy at the end of the tax interview simply because they have to pay tax because they had two jobs.

When you have one job the employer should withhold the right amount of tax so that at the end of the year you are either even or get a slight refund.

The second job does the same. But the problem is that each job doesn't know about the other. Therefore, the employer's payroll system cannot calculate how much tax you really need to pay by the end of the year considering both incomes. This could cause a big tax payable at the end of the year especially if both jobs combined move you into a new tax bracket.

The Tax Declaration Form you need to fill in when you get a job is the form that helps you ensure that both jobs are considered. When accepting the second job and filling in the Tax Declaration Form, the job that is irregular and has less income, should be ticked with No Tax Free Threshold. This means that you pay tax on the first dollar you earn. This will mean more tax paid but help ensure that you are not one of the unhappy taxpayers, who at the end of the interview gets told that they have to pay back money to the ATO.

#### Household savings hack of the month:

Plant Plant Plant...

Buy your first set of seedlings, like lettuce, from places like Bunnings and then ensure that at least one food plant is not picked for eating and goes to seed. Not only do the seeds spread around the garden and then germinate themselves (a happy surprise in my book) but you will not need to buy that plant again for the next planting.

Additionally, those weeds growing in your garden... learn to identity the weeds that are actually food for your chickens to save you money and increase the range in their diet



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
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Our landscape is dotted with extinct volcanoes, including Mt Anakie, Mt Mercer, Mt Buninyong and Mt Wallace. They sit quietly, visible from kilometres away. Their role in shaping the countryside is often not obvious to us. In many places, we see dark grey rocks. This is basalt, also known as bluestone, and it is the most common rock type which forms when lava has flowed from a volcano and become cold. Bubbles of gas in the lava often leave their mark on the rocks in the form of small holes. The local Wadawurrung people tell stories about the eruptions of these volcanoes. The land would have looked different at that time, but to those with the knowledge, there are still clues to be found.

On our property, we have a hilltop dotted with basalt rocks. They are found down the steep sides of the hill, partially hidden among tussock grasses, and beside the creeks, which run along each side of the hill and meet at its base. Walking away from the hilltop, down a slight dip and onto the ridge between the creek valleys, the rocks change abruptly. Here, there are sandstones, in shades of red and brown. They formed in layers at the bottom of a sea around 470 million years ago, so long ago that the time is unimaginable to most of us. Rocks that form in this manner are referred to as sedimentary. By comparison, the basalt rocks are less then eight million years old, still older than we can comprehend, and perhaps as young as ten thousand years. The sedimentary rocks can be seen in places down the side of the ridge and beside the larger creek, but across this creek, the hill is steeper and all the rocks are basalt. Recently, I have been reading books about geology, the study of how landscapes and rocks are created and change. In these, I have found the story of how this hill and valley were formed.

Where the hill and ridge are now, was a valley of ancient sandstone with a flowing stream. When our local volcano erupted, its lava spilled downhill. As it moved across the landscape, it entered valleys and followed their courses, evaporating the stream's water in clouds of steam. The sandstone valley filled with lava, which slowly cooled to form basalt in a thick layer above the sandstone. Water continued to flow towards the former valley, but when it reached the basalt, its path was blocked. It needed a new route, so it took the easiest way, along the edge of the basalt. Creeks that take this path are known as lateral streams, as they flow lateral to the cooled lava.

That was probably several million years ago, and the landscape has continued to change, although more slowly. Time and water gradually wear away rock. The mass of lava has been broken into separate rocks with rounded edges. The creek's flow has worn its way down through the sandstone, which is softer than basalt. Stones of basalt that have rolled down the hill, can be found in the creek bed. At the same time, the country has been gradually rising, in a process called uplift. If this did not occur, erosion would eventually cause the landscape to be flat. The basalt, and the sandstone beneath it in the valley, have been pushed up,

while the creek has been cutting its way down. The softer sandstone has eroded more than the basalt, forming a gentler slope on its side of the valley. The basalt slope is much steeper, as it has been less worn away by the water.

At the base of the hill, there is basalt on both sides of the valley, and the creek flows over a bed of basalt. It then winds across a creek flat and meets the creek flowing beside the other side of the hill. This creek follows a gentler course through gradually sloping paddocks for most of its journey. The creeks combine and continue along their rocky path towards the Moorabool River.

I find interpreting my local geology challenging, but there are places that have been well studied by geologists, and they have told us the story of the landscape. North of us, along the road between Bacchus Marsh and Gisborne, a basalt lava flow and lateral streams can be seen. After you leave Gisborne and drive through the small town of Bullengarook, you pass Mount Bullengarook, a former volcano. The road follows a ridge with creeks on both sides, their valleys becoming deeper and deeper. This ridge is formed from lava that erupted from Mount Bullengarook and filled the course of a stream. The water from the original stream became divided by the lava flow, so that a creek formed along each side of it. The lava was uplifted over a long period of time, while the creeks eroded their down into the sedimentary rock, forming spectacularly deep valleys. As there is one parallel to each edge of the lava flow, they are known as twin lateral streams. Geologists refer to this kind of landscape as inverted, as the rock that was at the bottom of the valley is now on the hilltop.

Once I have heard a story like this, it is easier to imagine it happening, as a tale of long ago. However, the process of uplift and erosion continues today and into the future. We may not notice the changes in our lifetimes, but it is intriguing to consider how the landscape may look in another million years, or ten million years. How deep have the valleys become? Is the ridge still there? Perhaps there has been an earthquake or another volcanic eruption, and the landscape has changed again and begun a new chapter in its story.





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
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#### The Secrets of the Huon Wren by Claire Van Ryn

This debut novel by Claire Van Ryn is set in Tasmania and centres around the lives of two women who build a connection after a chance meeting.

Allira, who is a journalist for a local magazine, spends her days utilizing her creative storytelling abilities to uncover and bring to life local stories. Although, her life is one of quiet satisfaction, the itch to discover the next big story is ever present.

She arrives at a nursing home to interview a resident but when that isn't possible the manager tells Allira of Nora, a dementia patient who sits cradling a doll lovingly in her arms, treating it like a real baby. As the story progresses it is interesting how the connection builds between the two Although they can't connect simply through words, Allira is gradually drawn into Nora's world, wondering who she is, how she came to be alone in the home, why she is so attached to the baby doll and what tragedy has befallen her. It turns out that the two women share a life changing experience that is revealed as the story unfolds.

The story alternates between present day Launceston and the life of Allira, including her visits to the Nursing home, and Nora's life in the Central Highlands in 1953. There is quite a lot going on trying to follow these two timelines. But, at the same time, Allira receives hints from Nora of her history which the reader has to piece into the puzzle.

Van Ryn does a beautiful job of creating a strong sense of place while weaving a comprehensive picture of life in a small Tasmanian town. Apparently, the book is set in the area where she herself grew up and she transmits the awe of the natural landscapes of these places.

The book is for readers who love the intersection of past and present, family mysteries, a strong sense of place and the satisfaction of two people bringing healing to each other. A reviewer wrote that 'he found the book entertaining but that there was one twist in the story that pushed his own head'. I think he means that the ending was just a bit too neat or unrealistic. I agree.

She loved the erratic, wounded and determined woman in front of her: enough to traipse into the night searching for her, to burrow into historical records looking for some morsel of information about her identity and to sit quietly at her bedside without searching for something unnamed, Just being.

Yes, I did know, and I was eternally grateful for Thursdays and my mother.



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


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
