





Have you found any bright red mushrooms with white spots? They are usually seen close to introduced trees such as pines, oaks or birches, and are sometimes illustrated in children's picture books, often associated with fairies or elves. They form a close relationship with the trees they grow beneath, joining threads of fungus to the tree's roots. The threads help the tree by providing it with water and nutrients from the soil, while the tree feeds the fungus with food that it has created in its leaves. These mushrooms were seen as useful by foresters, so they were introduced to Australia in the 1920s, to assist pines growing in plantations. From there, they have spread to parks and gardens with suitable trees, including my garden and possibly yours.

These red and white mushrooms are called fly agarics and belong to a genus or group known as Amanita. Agaric is a name used for fungi shaped like mushrooms. This species contains toxins, and in Europe, was formerly used to poison flies. While it is dangerous to some insects, others lay their eggs on it. After the grubs hatch, they burrow inside, eating the mushroom's flesh as they go. Slugs crawl across them, leaving holes in their stalks and white scars on their caps, where they have eaten through the red skin. One autumn, we found that some of the fly agarics growing near our oak, lost their caps overnight, leaving just the white stalks standing upright in the grass. We set up a motion sensitive camera overlooking the mushrooms to learn how this happened. When we checked the photos, we found that swamp wallabies were plucking the caps, holding them in their front feet and munching contentedly, apparently with no ill effects. A passing brushtail possum took a quick sniff at one of these mushrooms, then continued on its way with no temptation to stop for a

While a wallaby or possum may recognise these mushrooms by their aroma, we rely on their colours and shape. This works well when they are mature, but at the start of their lives, they look quite different. When a fly agaric first appears above ground, it is a small dome covered in white lumps. This white layer is a universal veil, which covers the whole mushroom from under the base of its stalk to over the top of its cap. As the mushroom grows, this veil breaks, leaving a cup of broken membrane at the base of the stalk and white lumps on the red cap. At first, only a little of the red shows, but as the cap expands the white lumps become further apart. Some may fall off, and occasionally you will see a fly agaric with few or no white spots. The mushroom also has a partial veil which covers the crowded white gills on the underside of the cap. As the cap grows, this veil also breaks, leaving a membranous ring attached to the stalk. The cap continues to grow and can reach a diameter of twenty-five centimetres. Spores drop from the gills and those that are not blown on the

meal.

wind, leave a dusting of white on the ground and on any younger mushrooms growing up below. As fly agarics age, the edges of the cap turn upwards, and they can hold water after rain. Gradually, the mushroom turns brown, and depending on the weather, will either dry out and shrivel or become soft and rotten.

After the mushroom is gone, the underground threads of fungus remain, maintaining the relationship with the tree. The spores that flew on the wind will only grow into new fungi if they land in a suitable place, where they can form a partnership with another tree. Fly agarics have been in Australia for about one hundred years. For most of that time, they have grown with trees from the hemisphere where they originated, but in recent times they have been found growing with one of Australia's native rainforest trees, the myrtle beech. So far, it is unknown if this is causing problems, but it is possible that it is taking the place of our indigenous fungi. These fungi have formed a close relationship with myrtle beeches over many thousands of years and may be more capable of helping it to survive disease and environmental stresses. It is also unknown whether the fly agaric will spread to other indigenous trees.

Fly agarics are not the only Amanita mushrooms in Australia. Another introduced Amanita is the death cap mushroom. There are also plenty of indigenous Amanita species that grow in partnership with our indigenous trees. Most are white or brown, and also have white spots on their caps. In some, the broken partial veil that covered the gills leaves a ragged fringe hanging from the edge of the cap, instead of a ring on the stalk. One attractive species has an orange cap which can vary from nearly yellow to almost red, but is much smaller than the fly agaric, and is only found in native vegetation. There are also green Amanita mushrooms in coastal areas. Some of these Amanita species are as large as the fly agaric, but none is as well known as this introduced eye-catching fairytale mushroom.







EPA's Winter Clean Up Tips

If you're planning a clean-it-up-and-chuck-it-out project as we go into winter, EPA Victoria has some handy hints to make it a satisfying result.

EPA Interim Chief Executive Officer Joss Crawford says the EPA website has useful tips to protect the environment and prevent your jobs from turning into a headache.

"A little knowledge can equip you to avoid the traps of sending waste to the wrong place and turning it into a pollution problem that will come back to get you," Ms Crawford said.

"Everyone has an environmental duty in Victoria. There are pathways for disposal of things like old paint or chemicals, or asbestos that work much better than trying to hide it at the bottom of the bin. You just have to know what to do," she said.

"Victoria's Environment Protection Act includes a General Environmental Duty, that makes it everyone's responsibility to take reasonable action to prevent pollution, so a little homework on the EPA website before you start can make life a lot easier."

Hiring a skip? Choose a respectable company, ask to see the receipts that show they take waste to a licensed landfill or recycling facility, and beware of suspiciously low prices that might mean your waste will be dumped illegally in the bush, a park or a creek.

If you suspect there's asbestos there are simple rules that let you deal with small amounts yourself, and above those amounts it's just a matter of hiring a licensed asbestos removalist.

What about old paint and household chemicals? There are drop-off points and household detox events to allow you to dispose of those without them just becoming contamination.

Check the EPA website before you start, and do your bit to prevent harm to our environment and your local community.

And if you encounter pollution, remember you can report pollution to EPA's 24-hour hotline on 1300 372 842 or provide details online.



Throughout June I have attended numerous collisions in the Meredith area as well as the surrounding response zones.

A reminder to drivers to consider the conditions they are driving in. Use headlights in reduced visibility conditions such as rain.

Some of the roads around our area are quite slippery and narrow, most of these collisions have involved single vehicles into trees. All have been experienced drivers.

I am seeking information on an orange Ford Falcon sedan with a black bonnet and front left panel, which attempted to ram me and was involved in a dangerous driving incident while pursued by police in Meredith. Any information can be provided to myself or confidentially to crime stoppers, use reference 250247614.

I attended a hit and run collision in Meredith in late May and was greatly assisted by some witnesses who helped me to obtain vehicle details. After a short hunt around the state forest, I was able to locate the offenders who will be charged accordingly for the collision and also for weapons offences.

I am investigating an incident where a firearm was discharged into a person's property, fortunately at the time it was unoccupied, otherwise the consequences may have been death or serious injury. This occurred on the Northern side of Meredith, between late February and mid-April.

Any persons with information around the illegal use of firearms in relation to this incident can provide this to me or via crime stoppers, use reference 250215858.

Avoiding Scams

With the beginning of the new financial year, I would like to bring to the attention of members of the Meredith community the likely increase in scams relating to the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) and MyGov.

I also remind people not to provide any personal information to any person or organisation that calls you, regardless of who they claim to be and what they already know about you. That includes telecommunications companies, banks, the ATO, MyGov, Medicare and other governments.

Please hang up and then call the official listed phone number for that entity and speak to someone about the call.

If you receive an email or text message from any address representing themselves as the ATO or MyGov or any other government department do not click on any links. Clicking on links in emails and via text messages can result in offenders being able to hack into your personal devices.

Instead, go to the publicly listed website and log in as normal.

If in doubt, look up the phone number and give them a call.

Please remember the following:

- 1. Scams will increase at this time of year.
- 2. The ATO and MyGov will not send you links to click.
- 3. The government will not threaten you over email or text message with penalties.
- 4. The government will never demand payment in any manner other than on an official notice. They will not request any strange payment methods or bank cards, credit cards, money orders, Western Union, PayPal or gift cards.

You may also receive scam emails and texts that appear to be from Australia Post, claiming that a parcel was unable to be delivered to you and that it will be returned or destroyed if you do not follow the prompts in an attached link. Please do not click on any links in these texts or emails and instead consult Australia Post through official channels if you have any questions

If in doubt, please talk to a trusted friend or relative, the community centre or to me.

If you are the victim of a scam, please report it as soon as possible at www.scamwatch.gov.au and please also visit that site for further information on scams.

Final Press Release for BDG

In 2008 the Bannockburn branch of the Bendigo Bank introduced a local grants programme based on the Community Bank concept. Customers who linked their accounts to the programme generated a commission to fund local grants. A board of volunteers from local organisations was appointed to form Bannockburn & District Grants (BDG) and over the following years have distributed over 250 grants.

The first grant was to the Teesdale Turtle Bend Project of \$5000 for their dry stone wall. The total of funding support given in the past 18 years to projects and organisations in the lower Golden Plains area so far amounts to over \$850,000. Included in this is a major contribution of seed funding for the Youth Hub in Bannockburn of \$100,000. This Hub provides a dedicated space for young people aged 12 to 25 from across Golden Plains Shire supported by the Youth Development Team.

This wonderful effort has been facilitated by the bank customers who willingly linked their accounts to help the community, and we acknowledge the Bannockburn branch managers and staff who have supported the board of Bannockburn & District Grants.

BDG was the last of the original Community Enterprises in the Geelong district still operating in 2024. The Bendigo Bank has changed its community focus to Benefit Geelong, a similar organisation comprising the eight bank branches in greater Geelong, who will continue to provide grants.

All Too Easy

Collecting stamps is lots of fun and enjoyment. And like many hobbies can be a lovely stress release from the worries of life. Well that is of course until it isn't. There are sadly many difficulties for the stamp collector to face and overcome. Some of these are the result of decisions made by postal agencies around the world.

Let's go to the top. A few decades ago some genius created the peel and stick stamp. For philatelists this is the worst innovation since the inventions of scissors and rust. Now post office customers can buy their stamps in a handy roll or strip and just peel off one self adhesive stamp and stick it on an envelope. But this makes it very difficult after the event to soak off the stamp to put into your collection.

Previously you could put a stamp on paper into a bowl of warm water, wait 15 minutes for the glue to release and then slide the stamp off the paper and put it onto a towel to dry. But not the same with peel and stick because the glue doesn't release the same. So you often finish up with still some glue or paper on the stamp and rarely do you get an undamaged good copy.

And to make it worse, more recently peel and stick stamps are printed with a little triangle shape nicked into the side of the stamp. This separates from the stamp during the soaking process and is designed to stop naughty people re-using the stamp. But is horrid for collectors.

Other headaches include language with some countries in the past issuing stamps with no country identification. Early Nepal and various Indian states stamps were like this. Some Balkan countries and Arab and Asian countries use their own language on stamps which doesn't help English speaking collectors.

Sometimes colour becomes an issue. In philately there are many versions of the main colours of red, blue, and green. And there are some instances of the same stamp being printed separately in purple, mauve and lilac. Overtime colours fade and differentiation becomes difficult.

And the worst stress is Murphy's Law which decrees that the stamp that develops damage through rust or creasing is the most expensive one in the set! But will any of this stop me from collecting – absolutely not!



Another Step in the Adventure

On May 4, 2025 Paul Nolan and his two inaugural guests, Andrea and her cousin Rob, took their first steps on their adventure, of walking the Camino. Both guests had decided that "life's too short, let's do something completely out of our comfort zone".

The Camino or Camino de Santiago or Way of St James is a network of pilgrimage routes heading to the shrine of St James in the Cathedral in Santiago Compostela in Spain. Many people/pilgrims walk the routes and stay in budget, dormitory type accommodation that operates on a first come first served basis. Paul offered his guests the luxury of booked rooms in hotels about 20 km apart, bag luggage pickup, the option of a bus trip if the feet got too sore and his guidance or experience, having walked the Camino previously.

The first day of walking took them to Orrison and on to Roncesvalles, 26 km over a 1500 metre mountain. Every time you think you've hit the top, another climb smacks you in the face. And when you finish that one? Surprise! Another one. Without doubt this is one of the most iconic and rewarding days on the Camino.

Day 5 was a rest day in Pamplona described as one of Spain's true gems, a full blown celebration of life. It was a day to breathe, rinse out the mud-soaked socks, reassemble their dignity and prepare for the next stretch.

Day 7 they arrived at Estella, easily one of the jewels of the journey. The town is on a river, full of ancient bridges, cobbled lanes, buzzing cafes and bars and even though rain was falling lightly the streets were full of families out together, kids running amok, laughter, wine, food and music. I seemed to be a simple and beautiful way to live.

Day 10 at Navarrete with its twisting lanes, terracotta rooftops and that distinctly Spanish way of living made you wonder if stress has ever set foot here.

Day 11 started their travel by road for this leg of the journey. It seems time in Spain is a suggestion and not a rule. A 1.15pm bus could arrive at 11.30 am or next week.

Day 15 they stumble across a little roadside oasis known as The House of Gods which is run completely by volunteers who offer food all on a pay what you can basis. In this place the spirit of Camino was in full bloom.

Day 24 they arrived at Santiago and to the Cathedral. If you ever dreamed of completing an Olympic Marathon and entering the arena to the roar of the crowd, that is what it felt like. A moment of awe, relief, emotion and pride all bundled together. You have done something remarkable!

Paul says that whilst on the Camino the best part is the people you meet along the way: some quirky, some chatty, some quiet. It all adds to the mystique where strangers instantly become mates, conversations pass the time and lighten the load and sometimes even steal the pain from your feet.

Paul (Gumbo's Camino Adventures) invites others to join him next year to walk 280 kms over hills, through mud, across cobblestones and through weather most wouldn't dream of. "Come join us", he says, "and be part of the communities and add to the spirit of the Camino. It is hard, but something happens that is subtle but powerful. You just need an open mind, a bit of grit and a sense of humour."

Paul and Andrea both grew up in Meredith and their cousin often visited here as well.





Invented Lives by Andrea Goldsmith.

The book tells about Galina's life in Russia, her nine month trip from Russia to Australia and how she grapples with the tumultuous demands that come with being an immigrant in Australia. In the second part of this book the author documents the lives of a husband, wife and their son as well as the life of Galina but after reading some reviews I realize that the author is trying to show how the presence of Galina, an immigrant to Australia, disrupts the lives of all the members of the family she is befriended by. No one is left unchanged!

The novel is predominately set in Melbourne but it starts in Leningrad in late 1985, as 24-year-old Galina Kogan mourns the death of her mother. They intended to escape the Soviet Union together to America seeking exile as Soviet Jews. On the day her mother dies she accidentally collides with a shy 25-year-old Australian who is studying in her city and seeing this meeting as an omen she decides to move to Australia.

So, Galina leaves her homeland to come to Australia and we follow her progress while she reconciles her past and present identities and split national affiliations. She goes through a process of purging, listening and absorbing and learning as much information about her new surroundings as possible. As a Soviet citizen she is completely unprepared for Australia and its easy-going ways and as a Jew, she's inherited several generations worth of Russia's chronic anti-Semitism.

The first part of the novel tells of Galina and her mother and their life in Leningrad. The next part gives a short history of politics in Russia and resulting hardships that generations of Russians had to endure. The 25-year-old Australian is Andrew Morrow and his parents only enter the narrative 120 pages in yet their relationship with Galina and one another becomes a major focus for the rest of the novel.

The Morrow marriage of thirty years balances on secrets. Leonard is a man with conflicted desires and passions while Sylvia chafes against the confines of domestic life. A reviewer enjoyed watching Sylvia's metamorphous unfolding in tandem with Leonard's destabilization. But for the public they are a respectable couple until Galina's arrival when their stability is disturbed.

There is a focus on art within the novel. Galina is an illustrator, Andrew a mosaic artist, Leonard had been a poet in his younger days and Sylvia embraced many types of creativity but was passionate about letters which she had collected.

The book illustrates how difficult it is to adapt to a new country with totally different traditions, regulations and history.



Books, Books & More Books:

Because we didn't have a digital copy of the previous cover the printer had to recreate a cover and decided that an image of a tree that Eliza Emmlin painted (in a flash) when she was about 12 years old (that I had in mind to be used on the cover for the first print)would make a brighter, more appealing cover. He has done a great job!

On Sunday, August 3 the History Centre will have a special day when everyone will be invited to visit, to see history and to talk history- but, don't forget that you are always welcome to drop in on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9.30 am onwards. The theme is Who do you think we are?

Alexander McKenzie:

On Friday, June 20, Ian and Sue drove from the other side of Melbourne to personally give MHIG a letter that Andrew McKenzie wrote to his brother Alexander in October 1857. He addressed the letter to Mr Alexander McKenzie, to be left at Mr W Hooley's Geelong and Ballarate Hotel Kildair, near Geelong, South Australia. Alexander and his family were living at that time in Skene Street which was only about one mile from the hotel that the letter was addressed to.

Alexander and the woman he married apparently had 21 children. Both were convicts who had been sentenced to 7 years and both were sent to Tasmania. Alexander and Elizabeth came to Victoria after receiving their Tickets of Leave and spent some time in Geelong before buying land at Darra. Alexander died there on December 18, 1876 at the age of 56 years. He was buried on the farm with his three children who had died earlier. They had their own burial ground on their land near Eclipse Creek located about two chains from the back door of their home. After Alexander's death Elizabeth carried on the farm. She lived there for over 50 years before moving to Millgrove where she died.

The scammers call you claiming to be from the ACCC and ask you for personal information like passwords or bank details. They will make it sound urgent and ask you act immediately.

- cold call or email to ask for your personal information like passwords, bank details or answers to security questions
- threaten or pressure you to stay on the line.

Stop - Don't give money or personal information to anyone if you're unsure. Scammers will create a sense of urgency. Don't rush to act. Say 'no', hang up, delete. Do not click on any links or download attachments from messages unless you are sure it is from someone you can trust.

Check - Ask yourself could the call or text be fake? Scammers pretend to be from organisations you know and trust. Contact the organisation using information you source independently, so that you can verify if the call is real or not.

Protect - Act quickly if something feels wrong. If you have had money or personal information stolen contact your bank immediately. Help others by reporting scams to Scamwatch.

Grace was riding horses before she could walk. A walker strapped to roping saddles made a perfect seat for a small child. She loved it!

Her mother's parents travelled Australia wide, show jumping and her mother and father both rode competently from a young age.

Grace performed at Shows before she was five years old and has competed at Rodeos since she was five years old, the legal age to start.

Grace's mother Lyndelle says this season (between Christmas and Easter) they have attended 15 rodeos, sometimes two on the one weekend. Grace competes in Barrel Racing where she has to ride around three barrels on a clover leaf route, in the quickest time and her father Brodie competes in Team Roping where one person ropes the horns of a bull and the other person ropes the back feet of the bull to immobilize it.

At both Tarcutta and Narrandera, Grace won prize money and a horse rug. At Cootamundra she won an encouragement award and also was awarded Australian Professional Rodeo Association's Junior Encouragement Award for the year. Next season she aims to win the Under 12 Australian Junior APRA Final because the prize is a trip to Oklahoma to attend the Cinch World Junior Rodeo. She has also won Cross Country Races at Colac, Drysdale and Bacchus Marsh.

Her horse is called Turbo. He is a 19 years old, chestnut, 16 hands, quarter horse with a lot more experience than Grace! He is semi retired in that he is no longer fast enough for senior competition but good for juniors. Her previous horse was named Roy. Her four year old sister rides him and is yearning to turn five, so she can also compete.


At their home at Pioneer Ridge, Grace practices in their arena and likes to trail ride along local roads. During the season she practices every day but not so often during the winter months.

She has been quite competitive all her life. At one rodeo she went faster to beat someone else and as a result her horse Roy pig-rooted and she fell off but her boot stuck in the stirrup. The whole arena sighed in unison! After a 200 metre sprint when Grace was hanging upside down and bumping along like a rag doll with her head next to Roy's flank, her boot came loose and she fell to the ground. She was not badly hurt and was determined to get back on the horse.


Lyndelle says a Meredith local, Jason, runs training sessions, Stock Horse Rides for youngsters to introduce and improve their horse skills. This is marvellous for the kids and the rodeos as often people don't know where to start to get into competing.


She has lost someone she loved, but she still has one small thing she loves. Her egg.

Realistically, my needs were few. Definitely a phone jammer, to get people's attention when I needed service.





One-pot chicken and tomato rice







Ingredients

- 2 cups basmati rice
- ☐ 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 small brown onion, finely diced
- □ 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 500g chicken thigh fillet, cut into strips
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- ☐ ½ teaspoon ground cumin
- ☐ ½ teaspoon ground paprika
- ☐ ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ☐ 1 ½ teaspoons salt
- ☐ ¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- ☐ 400g can diced tomatoes
- 3 cups chicken stock

- 1. Rinse the basmati rice in cold water until the water runs clear.
- 2. In a large pot, which has a lid, heat the oil and melt the butter over medium heat. Add the diced onion and sauté until it becomes translucent, about 5 minutes.
- 3. Add the minced garlic and cook for another 1-2 minutes until fragrant. Add the chicken and continue cooking until the chicken is sealed on all sides.
- 4. Stir in the tomato paste and cook for about 2 minutes to develop its flavour.
- 5. Add the cumin, paprika, cinnamon, salt, pepper, diced tomatoes, and rice to the pot. Stir to coat the rice with the tomato and spice mixture.
- 6. Pour in the stock and stir well to mix the seasoning evenly throughout the rice and liquid.
- 7. Bring the mixture to a boil over medium-high heat. Once boiling, reduce the heat to low, cover the pot with a tight-fitting lid, and simmer for 15 minutes until the rice is tender and has absorbed all the liquid. You can tie a tea towel around the pot's lid to give you extra fluffy rice (see tips and photo above to do it safely).
- 8. Remove the pot from the heat and let it sit, covered, for an additional 5-10 minutes to steam. Fluff the rice with a fork before serving. This dish is delicious topped with freshly chopped parsley, a side of Greek yoghurt or a cucumber raita or a salad.
