Cobbity

Michaela Holroyd, as told to Marg Cooper.

My father, Michael Gibbs, bought 160 acres of land in what is now Betsons Lane in Elaine, and also leased some land there after he sold 300 acres of his farm at Lara. He wanted some property with a later season and more rain. The average rainfall at Lara was 18 inches with what seemed like, two good seasons followed by two years of drought.

The Elaine property, which my mother Ruth named *Cobbity*, had an old weatherboard house with hessian and paper walls, timber shingles on the roof and a large population of possums and rats, but it had a superb shearing shed and a good hay shed. The family only lived in the house during hay making and shearing. Later my sister lived there while she was at Teachers College in Ballarat, but mostly it was our party house. Dad allowed parties on the proviso that we clean up, don't wreck anything and if there was any trouble we weren't to call him.

Dad and Mum ran Angus cattle and Corriedale cross Poll Dorset sheep at Elaine. At Lara it was cropping and sheep and Angus cattle. Later Dad and my sister ran a very successful Angora goat enterprise. Dad's work ute or paddock bomb, was a little old green 1952 Austin ute, that we called Ollie Austin and was kept in the shed on the farm. Next to the outhouse or outside dunny.

Ollie Austin was a crank start and to cope with the frosts, we had to put a woolly blanket over the distributor cap after each use. A family of mice lived in the blanket and kept that motor warm in between farm visits.

Dad bought the Elaine property from Athol Smith. Apparently Athol had bought it at auction from the Lugg family after Lizzie Betson [who was related to the Luggs] died. It is told that she got word from her mother at Elmore to come straight away because her mother was sick. Lizzie literally, went straight away and never came back leaving all her belongings in the house. The Pitcher family leased the land from Lizzie Betson after WW11 and locals remember that Donald McNaughton ploughed it all when his brother-in-law, Athol Smith owned it.

Michael Gibbs was a quiet achiever. He only swore at the dog in the sheep yards or if the bull jumped over the fence. He grew up on a dairy farm and moved around a bit before buying at Lara in 1961. For ten years, from 1972 he drove the yellow Falcon ute back and forward to *Cobbity*, often with my mother and all their five children on board. He also worked at the Ford Motor Company in Geelong as a metallurgist in the stamping plant. He was a good father, husband and businessman, never stopped working and died after suffering a stroke at the Geelong Stock Yards.

He also had a kind heart. When Kevin Ryan's house burnt down in 1975 he allowed the Ryan family to live in the house rent free.

His kind heart agreed to hosting a hay ride to Cobbity for my 16th birthday party. We put barley straw bales in the farm truck with the stock crate on and a tarp over the top. I have fond memories of that party, but being winter it was cold. With both the wood stove and the open fire burning, we thawed out and had a great time.

Approximately three years ago the "Brisbane Ranges Sketchers" group was formed. The formation of the informal group was the initiative of Amanda Hyatt and Kerry Thomson and championed by the "Meredith and District News" committee.

The objective was to provide our community with an opportunity to meet once a month to sketch local scenes, buildings, people etc. No previous artistic experience was required and it was open to everyone. It became an amicable and non-competitive group who chatted, enjoyed each other's company and created work depicting our wonderful environment. Coffee and biscuits were always in abundance and the display of the morning sketches and paintings always produced friendly discussions. Lunch usually followed at a cafe or more recently at a pub. Kerry kindly wrote up these paint-outs for publication in the monthly Meredith Newsletter. It was through the Newsletter that locals and visitors to the region read about our exploits and had the opportunity to join the group.

From humble beginnings of 5 sketchers, the reputation of the group rapidly grew to include approximately 20, including those from Meredith, She Oaks, Steiglitz, Bannockburn and Geelong. Even inclement weather did not deter the enthusiasm of the group, who upon such occasions met in community halls and participants' sheds sketching still life, figures and portraits.

The success of the group has resulted in the initiative being adopted by the Bannockburn Art Group and GPArts and consequently the disbandment of our group.

Congratulations Amanda and Kerry for your initiative, generosity, good nature and efforts which resulted in the groups success. We always looked forward to the paint-outs and will miss them.



French Apple Cake

Ingredients

2 eggs

150g caster sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

125ml vegetable oil

150g plain flour

1/4 tsp salt

1 tsp baking powder

4 medium apples, peeled, cored and cut into

2cm pieces

2 tbsp demerara sugar

Method

- 1. Heat oven to 170° fan-forced (190° conventional)
- 2. Grease and line a 1.2 litre loaf tin
- 3. In a bowl, lightly whisk together the eggs and sugar, then whisk in the flour, salt and
- 4. Gently fold in the flour, salt and baking powder to form a batter
- 5. Stir the apples through the batter and pour into the tin, scatter the demerara sugar on
- 6. Bake for 45-50 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean
- 7. Cool for 10 minutes then remove from the tin
- 8. Serve warm or at room temperature

Recipe by Adam Liaw "The Age Good Food"

We made a French Apple Cake using four apples, sugar, oil, eggs and flour. The apple peeler makes a slinky, it gets all the seeds out, and the peel and the core. You put some of the ingredients in and mix it with the whisk and then you put more in and gently mix it with the spatula. It goes in a loaf tin and then in the hot oven. Afterwards the chooks were happy to see us coming because we fed them the peels and the cores.

Marg Cooper



Brigade Readies for Fire Season. (You Can Too.)

While the Meredith Rural Fire Brigade responds to emergencies year-round, extra training and preparation are now in full swing ahead of the fire season.

Recently, our members took part in a training exercise at Cooper's Bridge, refreshing vital skills in pumping, drafting, map reading, fire behaviour, hazardous trees, entrapment drills, and radio use. We've also checked and tested our equipment to make sure everything is in top condition when it's needed most.

What can you do to prepare?

While the brigade is getting ready, here's how you can prepare for summer:

Prepare your property: Clear dry grass, twigs, and loose bark from your yard. Move woodpiles and store flammable liquids well away from the house.

Have a plan: Know what you'll do for each fire danger rating and be ready to act early. Decide if you'll stay or leave, where you'll go, and what you'll take with you.

Stay informed: Download the VicEmergency app, set up your watch zones, and keep an ear on emergency broadcasters such as ABC.



Out in the Garden, Outside Now

Spring rains and warmer weather mean growth is everywhere—but not all of it is welcome. Grass and weeds are taking off, and weekends have become the familiar rhythm of *mow*, *sleep*, *repeat*. Whether it's riding on or push mowers, the sound of cutting fills the garden and farm.

Amid the maintenance, there's beauty to enjoy. Magnolias and azaleas are flowering in full colour, creating eyecatching displays across garden beds and borders. Camellia petals are still carpeting paths, adding a soft, fragrant layer to the earth beneath. Meanwhile, our Highland cattle are happily grazing nearby, keeping the paddocks low and adding a calm, gentle presence to the busy spring scene.

On Our Farm

October is a busy month behind the scenes. Right now, our main tasks include:

- Growing seedlings for the upcoming season, ensuring they're healthy and strong before planting out
- Ordering annual plugs to fill empty beds and keep displays vibrant
- Completing the division of our dahlias
- Preparing beds with compost and soil amendments such a lime, blood and bone and fertiliser to provide a rich, well-balanced foundation
- Sowing green spring manure on resting beds to improve soil structure and fertility

Installing weed suppressant layers by laying strips of cardboard in rows and covering with woodchip mulch (thanks to the local powerline arborists for the extra supply!) Make sure the cardboard is overlapping to prevent weeds coming through.

Our Highland cattle play a part too—while they aren't allowed in the flower beds, their grazing helps keep surrounding paddocks tidy, and their slow, steady presence reminds us to pause and enjoy the view between jobs.

Things You Can Do Now

Start Seeds

October is perfect for sowing seeds. Plant directly into beds or raise seedlings in trays. If your seedlings have already started growing in a sheltered spot, thin them out—calendula, for example, benefits from extra space to ensure mature plants thrive.

Weeding

Keep weeds under control by pulling, mulching, or using other preventative methods. Regular attention now saves work later and helps your desired plants flourish.

Dividing Perennials

Divide perennials and remove dead wood. Lavender, rosemary hedges, and salvias respond well to trimming, producing stronger growth and more flowers. Don't prune

to hard into the hardwood – keep it to the soft wood Feeding Roses

Roses are hungry in spring. A good feed supports new growth, encourages plenty of blooms, and helps plants recover from winter. Be patient with aphids — the ladybirds will be arriving shortly

Citrus Care

Avoid pruning citrus now—the pruning window has passed. Cutting back at the wrong time can attract citrus gall wasps, leaving unsightly bumps and weakening the tree.

What to Plant This Month

Vegetables & Herbs:

- Direct sow: beans, carrots, radishes, beetroot, lettuce
- Plant seedlings: tomatoes, capsicum, chillies, zucchini, pumpkin (protect from frost)

Herbs: basil, parsley, coriander, chives

Flowers & Ornamentals:

- Annuals: petunias, marigolds, cosmos, salvias
- Perennials: echinacea, and other summer-flowering varieties
 - Bulbs: tulips and lilies for autumn bloom. Other Tasks:
- Mulch young plants to conserve moisture and suppress weeds
- Continue composting and feeding established plants

Don't be too hasty to cut your early bulb foliage off. Give the plant time to conserve energy back into the bulb to bloom again next year

Looking Ahead

October is all about momentum. Growth is rapid, the garden is filling out, and the fruits (and flowers) of your early-season work will start to appear soon. By staying on top of mowing, weeding, feeding, and seedling care, you'll set yourself up for a productive and beautiful season.

With the Highland cattle grazing nearby, spring blooms in full display, and seedlings taking root, October is a month to roll up your sleeves, enjoy the energy of the season, and appreciate the little pleasures that come with life on the farm.

Flowing along the northern and eastern edges of Meredith is a small creek, Coolebarghurk Creek. It begins its journey south of Elaine amidst paddocks. When it reaches Meredith, it is a line of pools, often with a dry reedy channel between them, unless recent rains cause it to flow. Beside the creek is a gravel path, following a route originally used by the Wadawurrung people, who walked quietly beneath the trees lining the creek, hunting ducks or eels. If they were on a journey, they may have chatted with family and friends as they walked. The Coolebarghurk is believed to be based on their words, meaning "man's track by the creek". Later, the track was used by Europeans on their travels between Geelong and Ballarat, on foot or horse, or in wagons. Now, part of it is a peaceful place of trees and birds known as the Path of the Ibis.

If you wish to take this gentle walk, you can begin outside the Meredith Community Centre. Turn downhill and you will see the gravel path leading you towards the creek. Pause to take note of the trees that you pass. One displays clusters of gumnuts below its leaves. From the next, hang ribbons of bark, swinging in the breeze. Chirping and chattering sounds from higher up, let you know that small birds are among its leaves, although you may not see them. Ahead is a statue of a bird's neck and head, its long beak curving downwards, typical of an ibis. Around its base grow thick clumps of native tussock grass, surrounded by tiles designed by the local school children and professional artists when the Path was established in 1990. There is another ibis statue further along. You can walk around them and study the tiles. They show birds, mammals, reptiles, frogs and insects, many of them creatures that lived in or close to the creek. If you keep your eyes and ears open, you will find that some of them remain.

When you reach the creek, stop and look around. Growing beside the water, three gum trees close together give a shady peaceful feel. If you watch for a while, you may see birds among the branches, or superb fairy-wrens, tails pointing upwards, hopping across the mossy ground. You can observe the different shapes and sizes of the gum leaves, and the bushes that grow here. There are tea trees with dull grey-green leaves and round furry seed pods. Hop goodenias with bright green leaves have yellow flowers in spring. Layers of leaves and bark on the ground create a moist place for insects and worms to hide. Long green leaves of water ribbons lie on the surface of the pool. In autumn and winter, you may find fungi growing here and elsewhere near the path.

Walk downstream towards the shelter with its attractive metalwork designs. It is a good place to sit and watch and think. It is surrounded by more animal tiles, and beneath the wooden seat is a surprise. The course of the creek follows gentle curves, often lined with trees, some native and some deciduous trees from other lands. In places, pools of water reflect leaves and branches, and on sunny days, the clear blue sky. Here, you may hear frogs calling for a mate. In other parts of the creek, rushes grow, their brown stalks and leaves rustling with the wind. Among them, small birds go about their lives, feeding and nesting, out of sight of human eyes or the eyes of predatory birds high above. Listen to the different calls of each species. If you wait quietly, you may see the birds emerge from their hidden world and hop among the branches of trees nearby.

These trees support forms of life apart from the birds. Insects and spiders live on and under their bark and leaves. Many have lichens on their branches and trunks, patches of grey or green, or miniature bushy clumps of bright yellow. The bark of gum trees may be rough and full of hiding places, or smooth and creamy, or coloured in several shades of brown and grey. None are old enough to have formed hollows, which are crucial homes and nesting sites for many mammals and birds. A few nesting boxes in the trees could help the local wildlife.

Two of the trees look different. Dark green and appearing to have needles rather than leaves, they are sheoaks. These needles are branchlets, with tiny brown leaves in well spaced rings, so small that they are difficult to see. The wind in their leaves makes a gentle whooshing noise as if blowing through something hollow. If you study these two trees you may notice a difference between them. One has little woody cones and the other does not. The one with cones is a female tree, with bright red tufts of flowers which develop into cones after they are pollinated. The other tree is male. Its flowers grow in brown catkins on the ends of its branchlets. The pollen from these is spread by the wind, some of it reaching the female.

Near the second sheoak that you pass, are rocks which allow you to easily cross the creek to an open grassy area. In the neighbouring paddock grow a few old trees, poplars, fruit trees and a conifer, which mark the site of the first hotel in Meredith, dating from the 1840s. When you return to the path and continue downstream, you will soon meet the slender branches of a weeping willow, hanging in front of you. In winter, they are yellowish and bare with brown buds sprouting delicate leaves as spring approaches. In summer, they form a green curtain to push through. Beyond, is the modern world of bitumen road and cars. Here, you have choices. You can turn right towards the highway; or walk straight ahead along Champ Street, and continue following the journey of the Coolebarghurk Creek through the Meredith Police Paddocks, as its valley deepens; or you can return through the swishing green willow curtain to the Path of the Ibis.

While your walk is short, the path of the water beside you is far longer. After passing Meredith, it winds its way to join the Moorabool River near Sheoaks. From here, the water that flowed past Meredith continues to travel downstream, combining with the waters of the Barwon River at Fyansford on the western edge of Geelong. Now, in a wider, deeper channel it flows through the city's parklands and beyond, to reach Lake Connewarre and finally the saltwater of the river's estuary at Barwon Heads, before entering Bass Strait.



IT REALLY HAPPENED

On 1/6/1966 the British GPO issued a set of 3 stamps to celebrate the start of the soccer World Cup. Amazingly after many weeks of competition England won the final. So on 18/8/1966 the GPO reissued the 4 penny stamp from the set but overprinted with the words "England Winners". The soccer mad public said Yes Please and stocks were sold out within 2 days. Britain's biggest stamp dealer, Stanley Gibbons Ltd, had ordered and did receive a huge number of these stamps direct from the GPO. The day after the GPO announced that stocks had sold out, Stanley Gibbons started selling their supply of the overprinted 4 penny stamps for 2 shillings 6 pence each. This was a rather healthy mark up of 750%. They rationed their customers to only 4 stamps each. Who says there is no profit in philately!

The world's first adhesive postage stamp the 1 penny black was issued 1/5/1840. The stamps were printed in sheets without perforations and with very narrow blank paper margins between the stamps. When the sheets were cut into individual stamps, it became very random indeed in respect of the margins. Whilst all Penny Blacks are now quite valuable, the question of how valuable depends a lot on how many and how good are the margins around the stamp. Ones with 3 neat margins are rare and ones with 4 good margins are very rare.

The design on the Penny Black was open to a competition which received 2,600 entries. But none were deemed suitable. So it was decided to use the profile portrait of Queen Victoria which had already been used on the 1837 Coronation Medal when she took the throne at age 18. The Queen was very pleased with the stamp's portrait. So much so that this same portrait was used on Great Britain stamps throughout her 60 year reign.

The Penny Black revolutionised postal communications. But it did have an inherent problem - the colour. Post Offices normally used black ink when postmarking the mail and it was often difficult to determine if the stamp had been postmarked and if so, at which Post Office. In 1841 the colour was changed to reddish-brown and was used for the next 15 years. Subsequent stamps were issued with the same portrait but in different designs, colours and denominations.

On 28/1/1999 the US Postal Service issued a pair of quite beautiful stamps celebrating Love. The thought was they would be used to post wedding invitations and reply cards. They also issued a Valentines Day stamp. These stamps were launched at the main post office in the city of Loveland in Colorado. This city became known as America's Sweetheart City.

Da Vinci's Last Supper

by Paul Arrowsmith.

His gait was long and purposeful, while his reddish-brown hair and beard speckled with streaks of grey, flapped in the wind. A tall man, standing head and shoulders above many of his peers, Leonardo was undeniably handsome. His appearance often aroused envy in less attractive members of his sex, while women on the other hand had been known to swoon in his presence. His fingers were slender and calloused at the tips and when he shook your hand he did so firmly, perhaps too firmly for lesser men. Below the furrows of his forehead his strikingly blue eyes could convey either the calm of wisdom, or that a riot of thought was taking place inside his extraordinary brain.

There are many books written about Leonardo Da Vinci and his painting of *The Last Supper*. Paul Arrowsmith claims to have written *The Forgotten Tale*. Da Vinci's constant search for new ways to reveal the world through art defined the Renaissance and set an artistic standard for centuries to come. In this book the author shows Da Vinci within his time and lets the reader learn a bit about the man behind the genius.

Leonardo was commissioned to paint *The Last Supper* in the former refectory of Santa Maria delle Grazie in Milan. All did not go to plan. In this book, the reader is dragged into the political and religious upheaval, violence and scandal of the 1490's, that beset Leonardo while creating his masterpiece which measures 29 feet x 15 feet and depicts Jesus at his last meal with his disciples, before he was betrayed. The painting took Leonardo and his team of assistants about three years to complete and they didn't use traditional paints but experimented with an oil based medium. Apparently, the painting did spoil fairly quickly but recent restorers have discovered wonderful details such as what food was on the table.

Of particular interest to Paul Arrowsmith is the identity of the man who Da Vinci chose to paint as Jesus. Da Vinci chose actual people to pose for the characters so they were realistic. It is believed that members of Sforza's court (he commissioned the work) posed and that James the Lesser and Thomas are based on Da Vinci himself. In a notebook it was written that a certain Alessandro Carissimo from Parma was the model for Christ's hands. In this book Alessandro is an out of work weaver who after he is chosen starts to believe that he is indeed Jesus. This does not go well for him and he reappears at the end of the book to pose for Da Vinci as another completely different character.

Viewing the painting from left to right there is Bartholomew, James (the eventual head of the church in Jerusalem), Andrew, Peter, Judas and John. On the other side there are James (the son of Zebedee), Thomas, Phillip, Matthew, Thadddeus (sometimes called Jude) and Simon. We are told that nothing in Leonard's painting is trivial!

This book offers an engaging and unusually intimate view of one of the great icons of western art and the historical context in which it was created. It was not a peaceful time, violence was rife and the church officials delighted in accusing and punishing or killing anyone whom they thought was a threat to their agenda.

Bookclub:







High Tea at Werribee Mansion

The Art Girls went to Werribee Park Mansion on Saturday, September 20 to celebrate the birthday of Yvonne Gulle. A special event for a special member of the Art Group.

Werribee Park Mansion is grand and was built in 1877 from basalt and sandstone for the Chirnside family, who made their money from wool. The mansion became a Catholic Seminary in the 1920's and was bought by the State Government in 1977.

We were served High Tea in Joseph's Dining room. This is part of the Lancemore Mansion Hotel and is named to honour the previous occupants, the Catholic Church. We would have felt really grand if we had sat around the dining room in the mansion, but St Josephs had been built on the side of the mansion, and had many features of the original building, like high ceilings and tall windows that overlooked the parterre garden.

We sat at a table beautifully set with a crisp white tablecloth and serviettes, silver cutlery and fine china. Prosecco was poured for each, three-tiered cake stands were delivered to the table for those with special dietary requirements, and for the others, and tea was poured continuously. We were looked after like kings or queens by the staff who were so attentive and obliging.

The food included ribbon sandwiches, sausage rolls, oysters served in their shells, scones, jam and cream, macaroons, a type of custard in shot glasses, little sweet pastries and more. The food was finely crafted, a feast for the senses. Some of our group tried to determine the flavourings used, which included rose water in the scones and saffron in the custard.

We hope that Yvonne enjoyed this special treat. We could have also explored the mansion, the rose garden, the orchard, the open range zoo, the cliffs by the Werribee River, Shadowfax Winery and the equestrian events.
